WILLOW PARK City set to receive water from Fort Worth in July

Additional projects still in motion

This summer may be the first in many that Willow Park will not utilize Weatherford water in the wake of a near water shortage.

While the Fort Worth Water Project is expected to be fully completed in April 2022, Willow Park may receive water from Fort Worth as early as next month.

Crews officially began work in early March after the cities spent more than five years negotiating and planning.

The nearly \$20 million project divided into a 52-48 cost split between Willow Park and Hudson Oaks, respectively - will include a 24-inch water main, wholesale water meter station and storage tank and pump station that would help transport water to Hudson Oaks.

Preston Dillard of Halff Associates said the main project is separated into multiple components with different timelines.

"The cross-country pipeline component of the (Fort Worth to Willow Park pipeline) is basically complete," Dillard updated council on Tuesday. "If you drive along the access road of I-20, there's still obviously a lot of disturbed earth that they will need to clean up and some other business they need to tidy up.

"Those components may be delayed by the weather, but we don't need the grass replanted to operate the pipeline," Dillard added.

The projected completion date is July 25 – though it is still pending approval for a temporary pipeline shutdown from Fort Worth.

"That is the final completion date that - hopefully, knock on wood operational components of the project are ready to go before," he said. The temporary meter station at El Chico Trail is also expected to be operational in early July, allowing the city to immediately receive water from Fort Worth when the pipeline is fully in place. Hudson Oaks will receive the water from the pipeline about a month later with a scheduled completion on Aug. 26. However, Dillard told council he expects there will be a delay due to the recent weather.



The final component of the project – the pump station and ground storage tank - is projected to be completed in the spring, he said.

City wells can currently produce up to 1.6 million gallons of water per day, leaving little room for emergencies during the summer months with city water usage averaging to about 1.2 million gallons daily.

The new project is expected to provide an additional 3.5 million gallons per day, on average, totaling about 5 million gallons per day.

ALEDO **Suspect** arrested in car burglary investigation

Parker County Sheriff's Criminal Investigations Division investigators arrested a male suspect June 2 in connection with multiple vehicle burglaries which occurred in Aledo in May.

Parker County Sheriff Russ Authier said the suspect, a 17-year-old male from Aledo, was arrested on charges of credit card/debit card abuse and a prior warrant for manufacturing delivery of a controlled substance. His bond was set at \$30,000. Additional charges are pending.

A female suspect was also identified with charges pending the investigation.

Sheriff Authier said the suspects were identified through multiple tips which were submitted through tip411.

"The tips submitted also helped our investigators identify and locate the female suspect," Authier said. "We would like to thank the public for their assistance in this case."



Street is excited to return to AISD, a move which fit both her professional and personal life.





Quality season for young team comes to an end



Road for Bearcats ends in Midland

Amarillo takes three-game regional championship series

Last Thursday morning (June 3), the Aledo Bearcats

weather delays, but it was able to finish. It all started Friday (June 4) at Leander Glenn High School due to conditions at Red and Charline McCombs Field not being up to par.

Facing the Georgetown Lady Eagles, the Ladycats were out to prove they belonged at the state tournament. Madysen Boutwell drove in the first run on a single to left field that scored Marissa Powell from second.

Despite Georgetown getting a run in the first inning, Kayleigh Smith settled in on the rubber and kept the Eagles at bay. In the fourth inning, the Ladycats broke it open. Reagan Davis drove in Audrey Pearce with a ground ball single to the shortstop. Two pitches later, Powell homered over the center field fence to score Davis and Macy Graf, giving Aledo a 5-1 lead. In the fifth, Graf imitated Powell by hitting a threerun home run of her own, scoring Pearce and Claire Byars. Georgetown was not going to go quietly as they scored four runs to close the gap, but the Ladycats had already done their job offensively, and Smith shut the Eagles down for the rest of the game, holding on for an 8-5 victory and a spot in the state championship game.

The next day was hectic as the 4A state championship game was delayed in the fourth inning for multiple hours, pushing Aledo's game against Barbers Hill back from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

When the teams finally did step on the field, it was obvious how determined each team was. Unfortunately, the Ladycats got off to a shaky start. Two early errors gave Barbers *Turn to* **SOFTBALL**, *page A5* baseball team helped send the Ladycats softball team off to Austin for the state tournament. As soon as the sendoff ended, the team loaded its own bus and drove off to Midland to take on the Amarillo Sandies for the regional crown.

After a five-hour road trip, the Bearcats had checked into their hotel and made their way to the field. The first game got underway that night and was a tightly contested battle all the way through.

Amarillo took a 1-0 lead in the second inning, but Aledo tied it in the third when Zach Harrison hit a sacrifice fly to left field allowing Parker Stegall to score. The score held there until the sixth inning when the Bearcats took the lead for good. Max Belyeu hit a

Hill a 2-0 lead in the first inning. Smith was in the circle for Aledo again, and got settled in, pitching very well from that point.

Davis cut the lead in half in the fifth inning when she singled home Graf to make it a 2-1 game. However, Barbers Hill added two more runs in the sixth and kept the Ladycats chasing. Behind their Texas-commit pitcher, Barbers Hill shut down Aledo in the final innings, denving them a fourth softball title.

"Barbers Hill is a great team." Aledo head coach Heather Myers said postgame. "They know how to win and they had confidence that they would. Playing a team like that can always be overwhelming, but we settled down after the first inning and played our game. Our offense wasn't firing like normal, but small improvements were made and the adjustments were quality for most of the game. After losing last season to COVID, this season was the first true high school season for a lot of our girls. They gained a ton of experience and will no doubt be less overwhelmed next season. We certainly plan on going back and we definitely

know it won't be easy, but that's what makes it great."

Aledo falls just one game short of the ultimate goal but looks to be back as they lose only two seniors, catcher Morgan Brown and left fielder Audrey Pearce, though their absence will be felt.

"Losing the leadership and calming presence of both Morgan and Audrey will be hard to replace," Myers said about her only two departing players. "They both brought a special balance and dynamic to this team that cannot be taught. They will be missed by their teammates and coaches alike. We pray blessings and favor over them as they step into this next chapter."

line drive single that brought home David Jones to give the Bearcats a 2-1 win.

Creed Willems came in to close the game out and retired the only three batters he faced in order.

The Bearcats came out in game two and got off to a fast start. Nolan Garcia drove in Stegall, and Harrison knocked in Gabe Baker with a sacrifice fly. However, it was

short lived. The first three Amarillo batters got on base, setting up a grand slam to give the Sandies the lead. They added one more before the end of the inning to make it a 5-2 game.

The bats went silent from that point, with each team scoring just one more time late in the game. Amarillo won game two 6-3 to force a deciding game three.

Unfortunately for the Bearcats, Amarillo once again jumped out to an early lead and left Aledo

chasing all game. Five runs in the first inning and two in the second inning had the Sandies leading 7-0 through most of the game. Stegall drove in the only Aledo run when he bunted in Belyeu in the fourth inning. Amarillo shut down the Bearcats from there, taking the series two games to one and advancing to the state tournament in Round Rock.

Aledo's season comes to an end as regional finalists with a 30-11-2 overall record.

The U.S. Census Bureau has released is sub-county population estimates from April 2010 to July 2020. That includes population estimates for the 1,200 incorporated places in Texas.

Nine additional Texas towns were incorporated in the past decade, while 13 additional cities surpassed a population of 50,000.

The Texas Demographic Center reported that of the 71 Texas cities with populations of more than 50,000, only two lost population - continuing the trend of smaller towns and areas in the state losing population to larger cities. More than 55% of the state's population growth has been in cities with more than 50,000 residents.

Small and mid-sized cities surrounding major metropolitan areas, such as Dallas-Fort Worth, Austin and Houston, saw the fastest growth rates, while many of the cities in West Texas and the Panhandle were among the 372 Texas cities that lost population, according to TDC.

Emergency food benefits extended

Benefits for families under a federal nutrition plan have been increased through September, the Texas Health and Human Services week.

Under the American Rescue Plan signed by President Biden in March, states can provide eligible families up to \$35 per month to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables. Clients of the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program are eligible.

"Texas WIC provides foods that have great nutritional value – providing key nutrients at key stages of development," Texas WIC Director Edgar Curtis said. "This nutritional support early in life builds stronger, smarter, healthier and happier children and Texans. Fresh fruits and vegetables, which are loaded with vitamins and other plant-based nutrients, are at the forefront of that strategy."

The HHSC also announced it is providing roughly \$208 million in emergency food benefits under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, extending the maximum SNAP benefits allowable through June. All SNAP recipients will get a minimum of \$95 in emergency allotment, in addition to the 15% increase that continues through September.

The program is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and administered by HHSC.



Experts: Weatherization bill falls short

The Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 3 in response to February's deadly storm and widespread failure of power plants. The package addresses the problems that threaten electric reliability, but public radio's Texas Standard reports that many electric grid experts and policy analysts say not enough has been done to prevent another blackout disaster.

One section of SB3 allows regulators to determine what portions of the natural gas supply must be weatherized. Since it only applies to equipment that directly connects to power plants, experts say it might not be enough.

Dan Cohan, civil engineering professor at Rice University, told the Standard that "whoever has those direct lines into the power plants and winterizes those is going to point upstream and say 'well those upstream



gas.' So yeah, it's hard to see how this is going to provide us full coverage."

In addition, critics say the penalties of \$5,000 a day for not doing the required weatherization amount to little more than a rounding error for non-complying oil and gas companies.

GOP chairman resignation sparks speculation

Texas Republican Party chairman Allen West resigned Friday, sparking speculation he is considering a statewide race.

The Republican party issued a statement that West "will take this opportunity to

prayerfully reflect on a new chapter in his already distinguished career." West has not ruled out challenging Gov. Greg Abbott, who last week touted a re-election endorsement from former President Trump.

COVID-19 cases dropping; 36% fully vaccinated

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas continues to drop, with 9,534 reported as of Sunday for the previous week — a small fraction of mid-January's record high of nearly 159,000.

Inthepastweek, 210 deaths from COVID-19 in Texas were reported, according to the Johns Hopkins University Coronavirus Resource Center. That is also a decrease.

The number of Texans fully vaccinated stands at 10.5 million, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services, or about 36% of the state's population. The number of lab-confirmed COVID-19 patients who are hospitalized dropped nearly a fifth from the previous week, to 1,504, according to DSHS.

Earline Grant Wall Prescott

Earline Grant Wall Prescott passed away in the presence of her two surviving children on April 26, 2020.

Earline was born on September 12, 1919 to Helmuth Albert Grant and Candace Effie Woodin in Fort Worth. She was the second of three children, the eldest being Marvin Grant and the youngest being Charles Albert "C.A." Grant. She attended Denver, Colorado public schools and graduated from Fort Worth North Side High School. She met her first love, Lewis D. Wall, Jr., who was training to be a pilot. They married secretly in Weatherford, Texas on November 16, 1940 so as not to jeopardize Lewis' chances of flying in the U.S. Army Air Corps. Together they had two children,

daughter Marion Suzanne and son Lewis III.

Earline campaigned for her husband, who sought and won election to the office of Tarrant County District Clerk. But in 1950 tragedy struck when he died in a multi-plane accident while flying in the Air National Guard. Suddenly widowed with two young children, she was sworn in by the Tarrant County Commissioners Court to succeed her husband as District Clerk. She ran that office and successfully won reelection three times.

On November 26, 1955, she married Fay W. Prescott, who was a Fort Worth attorney and also widowed with one teenaged son, Wesley, and she retired from public office. Together they had a daughter, Victoria, in 1957. She and Fay

traveled extensively in an Airstream trailer throughout the Continental United States, Canada and Mexico. Tragedy again struck when Fay died in 1967.

Earline viewed education as critically important and she helped put all four children through the University of Texas as well as support in various post graduate degrees.

Throughout her life Earline made do with whatever she had to provide for her family. She sold real estate as an independent realtor and remodeled homes. She did or at least supervised all manner of residential construction and remodels.

Earline was a longtime member of University Christian Church, Eastern Star and the Fort Worth Woman's Club.

Earline was preceded in death by her parents: her husband Lewis Jr. and her second husband Fay; two of her children. Suzanne Motion and Wesley Prescott; and both of her brothers, Marvin and C.A.

She is survived by her son, Lewis

III and his wife, Jana, and their three children, Joanna Baumhardt, Rebecca Joslin and Lewis Wall IV; her daughter, Victoria and her husband, Richard, together with their two children, Ian Henderson and Alistair Henderson; her son in law, Ben Motion, together with his and Suzanne's two children, Robert Motion and Lewis Motion;

her daughter in law, Diana Prescott, together with her and Wes' two children, Travis Prescott and Katie Beasley: ten great grandchildren; her sister in law, Julia Grant; and many nieces and nephews.

Her interment will take place with her family on June 12, 2021 at Mount Olivet Cemetery followed by a memorial service at University Christian Church.
