## Earle receives Tom Landry Award

For the third time since The Landry Award was first awarded, an Aledo Bearcat has his name on the trophy. On Jan 29, CBS Sports DFW announced that Jo Jo Earle was the recipient of the annual award given to the top Texas high school football player in north

"This means a lot," Earle said after the medal draping ceremony at Bearcat Stadium three days after winning the award. "Compared to the other candidates who deserved it as much as I did, it feels amazing. Knowing how amazing Tom Landry was as a person, winning this award really caps off my high school career really well."

Earle is now the second Bearcat to win the award, the other being running back Johnathan Gray in both 2010 and 2011, and the second wide receiver to be given the award.

Other finalists for the award included Cedar Hill quarterback Kaidon Salter,

Denton Guyer quarterback Eli Stowers, Lovejoy quarterback R.W. Rucker, and Southlake Carroll quarterback Quinn Ewers.

Past winners include Johnathan Gray, Cleveland Browns defensive end Myles Garrett, and Arizona Cardinals quarterback

Earle found out he won the award over zoom meeting with all other finalists.

"I had a cameraman in my house," Earle recalled with a laugh. "He told me that everyone else had a cameraman in their houses. After they announced I had won, he walked out of the back with the trophy and told me that he already knew I had won. So I guess I was the only one with a cameraman in my house."

The award adds to a list of accolades that Earle has received in his career with the Bearcats. He will be in Tuscaloosa next year playing for the national champion Alabama Crimson Tide alongside former teammate Jase McClellan.

### Re-zone attempt in Lasater addition fails

New plat, annexation application accepted

Following a series of community voices that strongly opposed the rezoning of three lots in the Lasater addition, the Aledo City Council took no action at its regular meeting on Thursday, Jan. 28. The issue died due to lack of a motion on the part of the council.

Community members stood among the council with issues stemming from emotion and law.

Residents expressed concerns that the history, character, and charm of their neighborhood would be diminished with the changes.

The zoning change was requested by Doug Boyd, the owner of the three lots, who wanted to develop the three lots into five smaller lots.

The property in the subdivision -anamesake of Mayola Lasater, who was a well-known business owner, political leader, and long-time resident of Parker County – was first planned in 1955, which pre-dates the city's own ordinances.

Resident Susan Houghtalin told council during citizens' input that she wants to preserve the history that Lasater has brought to past residents and long-time residents.

"Our fear is that, if approved, it will set a precedence that will reshape the Lasater addition until the character and charm and little piece of history will be lost forever," Houghtalin said.

The proposed changes would transition the addition from a single-family residential district to a planned development and bring in five two-story row houses, which Houghtalin said would "stick out like a sore thumb" in their rural neighborhood.

Jim Eggleston, a prominent attorney in Parker County, spoke to the council on behalf of neighborhood residents, who gathered in the crowd behind him.

He said if the item is approved the city would face legal issues due to two contractual problems: the setback line on the covenants and variance from the ordinance.

He added that, aside from potential legal issues, there has been a "lack of foresight" and planning by the city, as the proposed development would offer no drainage support and limited parking and cause a potential obstruction for fire access in the currently undeveloped alleyway.

"You can see the shortfall in the efficiencies in the size and the setback ... the drainage, parking, no shoulder, no sidewalks, bar ditches — those issues have just been thought through."

#### **Preliminary Plat and Annexation**

The council also approved a preliminary plat for The Enclave, a


Because emergency access to the development would be through the church property, Mayor Kit Marshall asked the fire marshal and the Emergency Services District No. 1 fire chief if they approved of the plan.

The next phase of the Parks of Aledo, Parks of Aledo Bluffs, was on the agenda in the form of a petition from the property owners for annexation of the 87.67-acre development just west of Aledo High School into the

The council accepted the petition and public hearings will be held on the annexation in the future.

Council voted to join an agreement with Edmonds & Association for the preparation of a Home Rule Charter for the City of Aledo, but held the item to appoint members for March or April.

It also voted to join an agreement with Union Pacific Railroad Company, in effort to establish an "Aledo Quiet Zone" at the railroad crossing on Underwood Road.

## **Board approves 2021-**2026 strategic plans

The Weatherford College Board of Trustees approved the 2021-26 academic, technology and facilities strategic plans during the board Health Science meeting on Thursday, Jan. 14.

The plans provide for future planning and assessment at the college.

Mike King, a planner with Huckabee Architects, spoke specifically on the facilities plan which includes a number of new buildings, green spaces, and a parking garage for the Weatherford campus.

The conceptual includes a new student union building and large green spaces to be used as student activity zones in what is now the main parking lot.

"As we come into campus now, the concern was 'What catches our eye? What do we want to see when we first drive into campus,' King asked. "Right now you see a large parking lot and that's our impression of Weatherford College. First impressions are very important. So we felt like what needed to happen is a new student union building could possibly be located in this place."

From there, a pathway would connect the new roundabout on College Park Drive to the historic arch at the top of the hill. The green space could be a place for student activities and group meetings.

To replace lost parking, a garage could be constructed on top of existing parking.

Other possible structures in the five-year facilities strategic plan include additional student housing and a new tennis center.

Looking further into the future, the plan calls for a possible addition to the Don Allen





creating additional pedestrian pathways, a new business building and a new gymnasium/coliseum.

The facilities strategic plan presented by Huckabee and approved by the board does not bind the college to building any of the structures outlined in the plan.

"Strategic planning is generally a view from 30,000 feet," said Dan Curley, WC general counsel. "As we consider things from that view we know the devil's in the details. We also know that if we're planning something that's supposed to give us guidance for five years, it has to be revisited on a regular basis."





# Shelter dogs are the best

"Major" became the first adopted shelter dog to live at the White House with President Joe and First Lady Jill Biden. That is a first that was long overdue. I learned a long time ago that shelter or street rescue dogs are the

I admit I am sometimes more than a little judgmental that some folks think shelter dogs are second-class citizens, preferring to buy a pure bred dog with a pedigree.

All of our dogs since my wife and I bought our first home in the TCU area in 1984 have been shelter dogs. Some of then have been pure-bred dogs that were abandoned. And sometimes we have adopted strays from the street, some of them injured and abused.

When it was "decided" that we would get a dog, we

went to the Humane Society of North Texas on Lancaster Street in Fort Worth. It was a moving and overwhelming experience. The cacophony of sounds and the desperation of the candidates for adoption was hard to take. I wanted to save them all.

We went to the shelter to get one dog, and ended up adopting three at the same time. Three was the limit for pets allowed per household in Fort Worth.

There was Princess, a beautiful sweet-natured silver coat Collie-German Shepherd mix, was first. She was already named. Then Strider, a playful German Shepherd-Chow mix was next. I thought we were done, but then —

Well, then I saw the depressed, downtrodden, matted-fur, desperately-malnourished Afghan who I would name Guinevere. The sign said "Found wandering on Beach Street." She had what looked like warts on the joints of her legs. She would barely lift her head. We took her out of the cage and walked her. Something about her was special. The shelter said that they needed to "inspect" our fence to be sure she could not escape at our home. I said "fine," but we wanted to adopt her.

When she was walked back toward her cage by the shelter worker, she went limp and collapsed like a protester and refused to move. They picked her up and she splayed her feet out at the door resisting with all her might.

But most compelling was a deep, mournful, penetrating wail of grief that came from deep within her. She was overcome with sadness to be going back to her cage. We were determined to take her home.

After the fence inspection we picked her up and took her to our veterinarian. I was concerned about what I thought were warts. Turns out, they were large cockle burrs deeply entangled in her fur. They were cut out fairly easily. We cut the rest of the matted fur off. She was an emaciated sad mess.

When we got her home, she was still in a funk of doggy depression. She would barely move her head or wag a tail. There was just no reaction or interaction with us. I began to wonder how it would turn

A few nights later, she was lying down in the living room and I petted her head and neck and removed my hand. She suddenly pressed against my hand wanting more affection. She became desperate for human contact. The depression lifted.

After some proper nutrition and grooming she turned in to the most beautiful Afghan hound you ever saw. Taking her for walks in the neighborhood was a joy and she looked so beautiful as her fur shimmered when she walked or ran.

I always wondered what her story was behind her being found wandering Beach Street, but I can tell you rescuing her was one of the most rewarding experiences of my

## Vaccine pace picks up slowly

The rate of COVID-19 vaccine administration is slowly increasing in Texas as we enter the second full month of shots going into arms. The Texas Department of State Health Services last weekend reported that about 1.6 million Texans — overwhelmingly frontline health workers, people over 65 or those with chronic health conditions — have received the first dose. Just over 400,000 are fully vaccinated. The state has received 3.16 million doses so far; nearly half remain to be administered. Texas ranks near the bottom in per-capita doses administered when compared to other states, according to the Centers for Disease Control.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Department of Defense sent 80 medical military personnel last week to Abilene,

newspapers across the state. Lufkin and Eagle Pass to assist in administering the vaccine in those cities. "The medical personnel deployed to our communities will provide much-needed support Your input is welcomed and to our front-line healthcare workers," Gov. Greg Abbott said in a news release

> The state surpassed two million COVID-19 with nearly 36,000 fatalities as January came to a close. A total of 11,473 COVID-19 patients are in Texas hospitals as of Jan. 31, according to TDSHS. Across the state, there are only 753 intensive-care beds available. Even as vaccines are being administered, health officials across the state are urging Texans to wear marks and follow other safety protocols that have been in place since last March.

#### **Grants available for** special needs students affected by COVID-19

Abbott and the Texas Education Agency late last week announced the rollout of a grant program for eligible

families of children with "significant cognitive disabilities and complex educational needs." The \$1,500 grants can be used to purchase educational resources and services through the TEA's supplemental special education

services program. A total of \$30 million was allocated, which could provide help for up to 20,000 students. To find out if your child is eligible, email the agency at ssesinfor@tea.texas.gov or call 855-772-3839.

#### Texas Lyceum poll measures impact of the pandemic

The Texas Lyceum, a nonpartisan group of movers and shakers based in Austin, released its annual survey last week. It painted a fairly negative picture of the state's economy as a result of the pandemic and illustrated the widespread impact of the coronavirus on Texans. Responding to the pandemic is the most important issue facing the state, according to 37 percent of respondents. Political corruption and

leadership ran a distant second at 10 percent.

The 2021 poll presented the most negative views of the state's and nation's economies since the Great Recession of knew someone who had contracted COVID-19, while half knew someone who had died from it. On the somewhat brighter side, nearly threefourths were either "very hopeful" or "somewhat hopeful" that the nation would get the pandemic under control in the next six months. But just 45 percent of Texans say they plan to get vaccinated when it becomes available to

#### Score one for the chiropractors

In a decade-long battle between the Texas Medical Association and the group that represents the state's chiropractors, the Texas Supreme Court ruled late last week that the lawful scope

of practice for chiropractors includes nerves and related testing as it pertains to the musculoskeletal system. TMA originally sued the Texas Board of Chiropractor 2008. Additionally, four in Examiners in 2011, arguing five respondents said they that such diagnoses exceeded what chiropractors were licensed to do.

> In a split decision, the high court overturned a ruling from the Austin Court of Appeals that had sided with TMA. Matt Webb, attorney for the chiropractic board, said in an email: "Today's decision was not only legally sound but a victory for common sense and patient care. A different outcome could have drastically curtailed access to critical chiropractic care for patients across the State of Texas."

Three-pointers rained down like fire on the heads of the Rider Raiders when they visited the Aledo High School gym to take on the Bearcats in a district basketball game on Tuesday, Feb. 2.

The 'Cats jumped out to a quick 6-0 lead when Landry Simmons and Cam Yielding hit nothing-but-net threes, followed by an inside two points by Daniel Sohn, who led scorers in the game with 15 points.

Rider responded with a trey to pull within five at 8-3, but Yielding and Simmons each connected from outside the circle to put the Bearcats up 14-3.

Peyton Wiggins added a basket and Simmons hit his third three-pointer to round out Aledo's scoring in the first quarter, leading 19-9.

Clark Crawford started Aledo's second-quarter scoring on a baseline drive, and then Drew Clock joined the three-pointer club to put the Bearcats up 24-9. Rider responded with five points before Clock again hit the basket from the key and scored the next basket with a put-back. The Bearcats went to the dressing room up

Wiggins started the third-quarter scoring with a three-pointer of his own, Simmons scored on a fast-break pass from Sohn, who also scored on another fast break to put Aledo up 35-20 before Rider got on the board for its only three points of the quarter. Sohn scored fro the baseline, added two points on free throws, Yielding dropped another bomb, Sohn scored on a fast-break assist from Simmons, Yielding hit a field goal, and Sohn scored on another fast break to put Aledo up 48-23 at the end of the third quarter.

Sohn started the fourth quarter with a trey, Simmons fed Jason Llewellyn under the basket, and Crawford scored on another assist from Simmons.

Braedyn Eicke scored to put the Bearcats up 57-24 and Christian Hillman added two free throws before Ethan Pierce added another three to close out Aledo's scoring.

The Bearcats hit a total of 10 three-pointers from six different players in the game.

The win against Rider follows a loss to Azle on Jan 28. With two district games remaining, the Bearcats are a full game behind Brewer in the district standings. Brewer stands at 7-1 while the Bearcats are 6-2. Rider and Granbury are tied for third with records of 4-4, while Azle sits at 3-5 and Wichita Falls is winless with a record of 0-8.

The Bearcats have at least second place in the district clinched. Assuming a win at Wichita Falls and a Brewer win at Rider on Friday, the Bearcats would have a bite at the apple in the district finale on Tuesday at home against the Bears.

The Ladycats also had a split week, defeating Azle 46-44 on Jan 29 at home but falling to Rider 22-52 on the road on Tuesday. Addyson Hebel (15), Audrey Pearce (14), and Claire Byars (10) were in double-figures for the Ladycats against Azle.


