## Council discusses safety solutions for FM 1187 railroad crossing

Motion failed to zone 500 Old Annetta Road as commercial

Aledo staff and city council have begun looking at short-term safety solutions for the railroad crossing at Farm-to-Market Road 1187, after a private citizen came forward with drone footage that showed a car seconds from being hit by a train.

The private citizen, Rick Campbell, described the intersection as "dangerous situation."

"My concern, of course, is safety with the railroad crossing because part of what I do professionally is investigate and work with major railroad crossing collisions across the country," Campbell said. "I don't want to see one in Aledo, and we're poised for one, I hate to say."

He said a "myriad of traffic issues" at the crossing could someday cause a potentially fatal accident.

"It's easy to sit in traffic for 15 minutes trying to get through this," he said.

Mayor Kit Marshall and city administrator Bill Funderburk said the city is aware of the issue and faces the same concerns of safety as residents.

However, because it's a state highway, city staff and council await a permanent fix from the Texas Department of Transportation.

"I'd like to have seen it taken care of a couple of years ago, but we don't have control over that," Marshall said. "We can do what we can do."

She said she expects to see some relief in congestion when the new middle school is built,

"Having been in Aledo ISD for eight years, Mrs. Elgin will be able to immediately make a difference by hiring a staff that understands the exceptional experiences expected in the Aledo ISD."

Elgin was the district's Don Daniel Assistant Principal of the Year in 2017, and she was the AISD Marva Collins Intermediate Teacher of the Year in 2014. She has a bachelor of arts in educational ministries from Moody Bible Institute and a masters of education in education administration from Texas A&M-Commerce. She will complete her certificate in school management and leadership from the Harvard Graduate School of Education this summer.





but that still doesn't offer an immediate solution.

Campbell suggested a short-term fix of traffic control from law enforcement to prevent drivers from stopping on the tracks.

Another potential fix, he said, is to place a queue-cutter signal at Underwood Road, which would measure traffic, and as it backs up, would automatically turn the light red.

"That's a year and a half away if TxDot said, 'OK, let's do this today,' and the problem is still going to exist tomorrow at 8 o'clock," Campbell said.

The city council did not vote on the item during the March 25 council meeting, but will continue to collaborate with city staff on potential short-term fixes.

#### **Old Annetta Road**

After a majority residents of the Parker Station subdivision — 48 of 51 homes - signed a petition against the zoning change for 500 Old Annetta Road and several spoke out during public hearings, Aledo City Council voted against the change during the March 25 council meeting.

The property had already been rezoned to a commercial property in 1987, but the changes did not get reflected on the city's zoning maps, city officials said.

It was brought to the city's attention by longtime resident and former council member Jim Lasater, who owns the property and voted for the change in the late 1980s. City officials said he made them aware that he was paying commercial property taxes, but when trying to sell the land, it was zoned as a residential property.

Because the zoning maps did not accurately reflect the subdivision as a commercial property, the city was required to complete the traditional process for a zoning change, including two public hearings, a recommendation from the planning and zoning committee, and a vote by the council, which failed to pass.

has a maximum capacity of 889 students and will serve grades K-5, is located on the far western side of the district off FM 5 about two-anda-half miles south of Interstate 20 in Annetta.

Originally from Pennsylvania, Elgin attended Moody Bible Institute before getting married and moving to Texas. Her husband, Matt, went to Dallas Seminary, and she began teaching.

And then I started working in an elementary classroom while I was in high school."

In her senior year of high school, Elgin divided her time between her classes and helping at the elementary school.

"And then when I went to college, I knew that's the direction I wanted to go," she said.

Elgin has said she feels fortunate to have worked with Bob Harmon, long-time principal at McAnally Intermediate School.

"He's the one who hired me at McAnally. And he was a great mentor those first few years that I was able to work alongside him, and he just had such a unique perspective that allowed me to see what mattered the most as we worked together."

At McAnally she taught for one year and was an assistant principal for five years.



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

# Voting restriction bill passes Senate committee

A Texas Senate committee on Friday passed an elections bill that would tighten the state's voting rules by limiting extended early voting hours, requiring proof of disability to qualify for mail-in voting, and prohibiting drive-thru voting. Senate Bill 7, sponsored by Sen. Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola, is one of Gov. Gregg Abbott's legislative priorities this session.

During testimony Friday, the committee received opposition testimony from AARP, the League of Women Voters, NAACP, and other groups. Hughes described his bill as attempting to strike a balance between "maintaining fair and honest elections with the opportunity to exercise one's right to vote," according to the Texas Tribune.

#### Any Texan old enough to legally drive can receive COVID-19 vaccine

More than 10.2 million Texans have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine as of Sunday, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services. The pace is expected to quicken now that anyone 16 years and older can receive one of the three versions available in the state. A total of 3.57 million Texans are fully vaccinated — about 12% of the state's population. DSHS has directed vaccine providers to give priority to people 80 years and older.

To that point, a new outreach partnership between the Texas Health and Human Services Commission and several partners was announced last week by Gov. Gregg Abbott. Among those participating to expand the state's Save Our Seniors program launched in February are the Texas Employee Retirement System, Texas Teachers Retirement System, AARP, and various Medicare health plans.

More than one million doses of the vaccine are being shipped to Texas providers this week. Texans can call 2-1-1 or go to https://tinyurl.com/9dvpetm9 for more information about getting the vaccine.

#### **COVID-19** cases in **Texas drop slightly**

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas dropped to 27,185 last week, with 741 deaths reported. Both are down just slightly from the previous week, according to the Coronavirus Center at Johns Hopkins University. Hospitalizations of confirmed COVID-19 cases also showed a slight decrease to 3,308, according to DSHS.

#### **Health care fraud case** ends with prison time, \$82.9 million restitution

The state's Department of Workers' Compensation announced last week that the remaining defendants in a health care fraud bribery scam were sentenced by a federal judge. The case involved surgeons, physicians, and hospital administrators at Forest Park Medical Hospital in Dallas. It began in 2016 and involved 14 defendants, who were sentenced to a combined 74-plus years in prison and ordered to pay \$82.9 million in restitution. According to a news release from DWC, the department's fraud unit identified health care providers at Forest Park who billed the state's workers' compensation system. The unit turned over the data to the FBI.

"Fraudulent billing within the health care system drives up the costs of health care for everyone," Debra Knight, DWC deputy commissioner, said. "These significant sentences demonstrate that health care fraud will not be tolerated."

#### **Border transportation** master plan approved by state

The Texas Department of Transportation has approved the Border Transportation Master Plan after years of research and analysis of current and future transportation needs and growth in the border region. Secretary of State Ruth R. Hughs, who chaired the Board Trade Advisory Committee, praised the decision. The plan recommended strategies to help U.S. and Mexican officials improve efficiency in the movement of freight, goods and people across the state's 28 border crossings.

"I look forward to our continued work together on the implementation of the master plan to raise awareness of its importance, improve quality of life for residents of the border region, and secure economic prosperity for all on both sides of the border," Hughs said.

#### Forest service acquires acreage through legacy grant

The Texas A&M Forest Service has acquired Fox Hunters Hill, a \$1.6 million conservation easement of sustainably managed forest adjacent to the Sabine National Forest in Deep East Texas. The acreage was acquired through the U.S. Forest Legacy Program, which acquired more than 23,000 acres throughout the South to protect forestlands at risk due to urban development or clear cutting.

TFS works with landowners on a "willing buyer/willing seller" basis to obtain the lands and enhance sustainable forest management. "A conservation easement is an interest in land acquired to protect certain conservation values," explained Gretchen Riley, the Forest Legacy Program Coordinator at Texas A&M Forest Service. "It is a good way to assure important, vulnerable landscapes – and the benefits they provide to Texans - are sustained for the future."

Fox Hunters Hill borders 213,000 acres of protected lands in the Angelina and Sabine National Forests, including one of the last undeveloped coves of Toledo Bend Reservoir.

#### **Protect yourself from** social media identity theft

The Texas Department of Insurance has some advice on taking simple steps to protect social media accounts and thus avoid most scams. Those tips include:

- · Don't post ID cards, including a COVID-19 vaccination
- Watch out for online quizzes and surveys that ask for personal information, such as the model of your first car, name of your first pet, or your hometown. Those are often also security login questions.
- Don't overshare. The more a scammer finds out about you, the easier it is to create a fake account.
- Limit app sharing and close old accounts.
- Protect family members, especially teens, who are the most likely to overshare.

The term stirs many emotional reactions: compassion in some, fear and anger in others.


Most of us have many immigrants in their family histories. My great grandfather, James Gregg Henderson, came to Fort Worth from Scotland around 1880. He and his mother previously had to leave Australia where he was born in 1855 after his father, Andrew Henderson, was murdered there during a labor strike, according to family legend.

The trips around the tip of South Africa to Scotland, and later from Scotland to Fort Worth, must have been challenging. He was naturalized in Fort Worth around 1895. He had a large stone contracting business and built the St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church in downtown Fort Worth from 1888-1892. He is buried in a Henderson family plot in Oakwood Cemetery in Fort Worth's North Side.

He brought with him family photos and photos of his home town Coupar Angus, knowing he would never see Scotland again. I think of the endless hours a young boy and young man spent on the ships, pondering his future destiny. When he got to Fort Worth with his strange accent, I hope he experienced compassion and not fear and anger.

The people who are walking 2,000plus miles across Mexico from Central America must face great challenges and uncertainties. Most want a better life like my great grandfather. I think they share similarities with him. They are leaving their homes and walking, I mean walking, thousands of miles.

I believe most of them just want to work and raise families and live decent lives on this planet Earth that we all share. Many are taken into custody and returned to their countries. As President Biden has said, stay in place, apply and come legally. Despite these warnings,



desperation and poverty drive them to take risky chances.

A few years ago, Sonia Nazario wrote a book called Enrique's Journey. It was the story of a young Honduran boy who walked and rode dangerous trains across Mexico to find his mother in the U.S.

She spoke at the Aledo Untied Methodist Church. She showed photos of a huge garbage dump in Tegucigalpa, Honduras, where children and birds fight over the trash when trucks unload, trying to find food or anything of value. She noted that hospital waste is often mixed in. And she describes the unimaginable hunger and desperation the people face. That is why they come against all odds.

My sincere hope and prayer is that we find a way to deal with these disparate human beings with compassion instead of political rhetoric laced with fear and

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

The Eagles are in the tough TAPPS DIII - District 1 this season. All four district opponents are ranked in the Top 10 in the state.


