ALEDO City approves plat for Parks of Aledo south tract, 'The Lakes'

Increased water and wastewater fees adopted

The Aledo City Council unanimously approved the preliminary plat for Parks of Aledo's south tract — The Lakes — during its regular city council meeting on Thursday, Oct. 28.

The 107-acre development tract would include 267 lots and about 45 acres of open space, said Justin Welborn of James R. Harris Partners, LLC, a real estate developer.

This would equate to about 2.5 lots per acre.

"As you can see, over time, we have dialed up a percentage of open space and we dialed down the density from the first phase, because what's obvious to a lot of you is having home sites adjacent to open space — it's been a big selling points of this project," Welborn said. "And so, it gave us the confidence to go forward and do more of that."

He added that the quantity of open space and the bike trail has been "hugely popular" to residents, so the developers have continued to pursue more green space.

Once completed, the Parks of Aledo will be made up of 427 acres total - 1,028 lots and 160 acres of open space.

Mayor Kit Marshall thanked Welborn and his developing partners for "caring so much about having good product."

"It's an amazing development, and I think the best development in Parker County," said Marshall, who also works for the county. "Maybe I'm prejudiced — I don't think so. I think it has met many, many needs up to this point, and I believe it will well into the future."

Special needs child is recipient of Thanksgiving Trot By Randy Keck

Love is patient and kind two traits evident in Joe and Kelli McCoy as it pertains to their daughter, Brittney, who will be the recipient of the 2021 Thanksgiving Trot in Aledo.



With approval of the preliminary plat, Aledo will annex The Lakes into city boundaries.

"The staff and Planning and Zoning commission have reviewed the preliminary plat of Parks of Aledo — the south tract at The Lakes — and we have determined that it complies with the subdivision ordinance and would recommend approval," said planning consultant Betty Chew. "The vote of the Planning and Zoning Commission was unanimous of the members present."

Wastewater fees

City Council also voted to increase its water and wastewater fees.

To align with its shared contract with Fort Worth's water department, the city was required to adopt the same increase that Fort Worth had adopted earlier.

The new schedule is effective between Jan. 1, 2022 and Jan. 1, 2023.



Brittney, now 11, functions as a six-month-old. She can't walk, she is legally blind, and she experiences epilepsy.

And she also experiences the love and patience of her parents.

"She was probably born this way," explained Kelli. "We didn't know anything was wrong until she was six months old."

Joe said it was about that time they realized Brittney was not progressing.

"She couldn't lift her head," Joe said. "We'd go to church and drop her off and she wouldn't turn and 'oh, there's mom; there's dad.' So early on we knew something was going on with her development."

The family started looking for doctors, and Joe said they went to as many as 25 doctors trying to find out what was wrong.

There were "probably a dozen at least procedures — 'Okay, let's try this. Let's try this. Let's try this.' And we've done genetic testing and they just haven't found anything that caused the delay in the development or her not being able to use her hands or legs or

her feet or anything like that," Joe said.

rier to us being able to get any help — we didn't have anything we could say that was wrong with her. So for those five years until she went to kindergarten, we were pretty much on our own. I was working to pay her medical bills. At that point, we were finally able through a waiver program to get assistance from the government," Kelli said.

That was about the time their oldest son, Braxton, went off to college, so college bills were coming in as well.





Obituaries

Robert G Hunt

Robert G. "Bob" Hunt - a stellar musician, loving parent and grandparent, and a gentle man who devoted his life to helping those in need - died Sunday, Aug. 22, 2021, in Pearland, Texas, of complications from COVID-19. He was 81.

Robert Gardner Hunt was born May 23, 1940, in Massachusetts, Melrose, and lived throughout the Boston area as his father

moved within the Episcopal Church. He graduated from high school in Boston in 1957 and attended Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut, where he was a long-distance runner and competed in pole vaulting. There, he received the first of several degrees, a bachelor's in psychology, in 1962. He later moved to Austin, Texas, to attend the Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest, where he obtained a master's in divinity in 1967.

Music always played a role in his life. He met his first wife, Zonna, in the 1960s while attending seminary and playing bass for Oedipus and the Mothers, an acclaimed Austin band that recorded a hit single, "How It Used to Be," at the same Texas studio where The 13th Floor Elevators recorded. He also recorded as a studio musician in Texas with Trini Lopez.

He married Zonna in June 1967, a month after he graduated from seminary. Instead of following his father into the priesthood, however, he veered off into social work and worked for the state in East Texas. He took a break to obtain his master's in social work at the University of Texas at Arlington in 1975 before moving to Austin to continue his government work.

As a widower in the early 1980s, he met Sherry while playing with the band Sunrise at a Lake Travis resort where she was visiting. He moved to Denver and they married in October 1981. They owned a business providing job training, and relocated to the Washington, D.C. area before moving in 1995 to Aledo, where Sherry worked as a teacher and Bob taught guitar lessons on the side.

He was active with Trinity Episcopal Church in Fort Worth, and performed with a church band at a weekly service that featured contemporary music. He moved several years ago to the Houston area to be with his daughter, Rebecca, and her family. In addition to his music, he was an avid model railroader, remaining a long-distance member of the Nauset Model Railroad Club and participating with a group in Fort Worth. At 8:35 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 22,

2021, he died at peace and without distress with his daughter Rebecca holding his hand and his daughter Dianna just around the corner.

He leaves behind a legacy marked by ood deeds, kindness to those who crossed his path and a mean touch with his electric bass, upright bass, and guitars.

Bob and his wife, Sherry, moved to Aledo in 1995, and their daughter, Rebecca, graduated from Aledo High School, as did his grandson, Evan Moore IV. Sherry, an Aledo teacher, died in 2010.

Bob had been hospitalized for more than two weeks at the time of his death. In his weakened condition, he couldn't fight off the virus, despite having received the vaccine in the first wave of inoculations.

Twice a widower, he is survived by his daughters, Rebecca Jung and her husband, Peter, of Pearland, and Dianna Hunt and her husband, Evan Moore III, of Tennessee; his sister, Judy Scherzo and husband Carmen, of Brewster, Massachusetts; step-daughters Mauri Elkins and her husband, Shawn, and Jodi Elland and her husband, Michael Clark, all of Virginia; grandchildren Griffin Jung, Evan Moore IV, and Jessica and Jillian Elkins; and other family and friends.

He was preceded in death by his first wife, Zonna Horton Hunt, in 1979, and second wife Sherry Hunt in 2010, and by his parents, The Rev. Warren G. Hunt and Bernice Hayes Hunt, of Massachusetts.

Services were held Sept. 19 at Trinity Episcopal Church in Fort Worth. He will make one final trip next summer to his beloved Cape Cod and the sand flats at Brewster, Massachusetts.

on both hips. And it was a major surgery and we were in the hospital for 10 days. And then we got out and then we were readmitted two more times."

Kelli said expenses pile up — even things you wouldn't think about. When Brittney was three, they needed a special chair to feed her because she couldn't hold her head up. That chair was \$500.

"The car seat she can sit in because she has special needs is 600 -the car seat you can buy at Sam's for \$60 doesn't work for her you know, it's just stuff like that," Kelli said.

Joe and Kelli have adjusted. Joe came to Aledo on the football coaching staff in 1993. He left four years later.

"I chased moving up the ladder as a football coach. And then in 2008 I was actually working at Brewer and resigned in January because things just weren't working out," Joe said. The road led him back to Aledo, where he took a middle school coaching job. He is now Aledo's head tennis coach.

Kelli started here in Aledo as well, and is now an Instructional Coach in White Settlement.

"We're lucky now we have nursing care," Kelli said. "That's the only way I'm able to keep working because they put her on the bus in the morning because I've already gone to work, and obviously he (Joe) is because he's coaching; and they get her off the bus in the afternoon.

I wouldn't be home for an hour and a half. So that's the only way that I can work is for us to have nursing care."

The nursing care is not available on weekends, which is why Joe got out of football coaching, because it's a seven-day commitment, and Brittney is getting heavier.

"She's 75 pounds and she's four foot nine," Kelli said.

"She's totally dependent on somebody getting her out of a wheelchair to the ground, getting her from the ground to a feeding chair, getting her from a feeding chair back to the ground; getting her from the ground to her bed," Joe said. "You have to lift 75 pounds and she doesn't help at all. It's dead weight. That's why I had to get out of football and spend a little more time helping her out."

Their younger son, Brevin, has stayed at home and helps at home as well.

Joe also pointed out a truth anyone who has medical procedures knows: one procedure isn't just one visit.

"One thing turns into four or five meetings with a doctor and they don't care if you work or not," Joe said. "They're going to schedule their appointments when they're working"

Finding support

Kelli recalls that she was working at Fine Arts Academy in White Settlement when they first started finding the issues with Brittney.



Capital Highlights Rare human case of rabies under investigation

A Medina County child is being treated for rabies in a Texas hospital, the Department of State Health Services reported last week. It is the first case of rabies in a human reported in the state since 2009. The child was bitten by a bat, according to DSHS.

Public health officials have identified all the places where someone could have come into contact with either the bat or the child. Experts are assessing the risk to those people and whether they should receive post-exposure vaccinations to prevent them from contracting rabies.

The department noted that rabies is almost always fatal once contracted, but is preventable if the vaccine and immune globulin are administered before symptoms begin. In Texas, according to DSHS, skunks and bats account for most animal rabies cases. Nearly 600 animals in Texas tested positive for rabies last year, about half of them bats.

10-digit dialing mandatory in several new areas

The days of being able to just dial seven digits in seven Texas area codes are behind us. In July 2020 the Federal Communications Commission approved 988 as the abbreviated dialing code for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. Several Texas area codes (254, 361, 409, 806, 830, 915 and 940) have numbers with a 988 prefix, and had to transition to 10-digit local dialing after the FCC order.

The Texas Public Utility Commission announced effective Oct. 25 that all local calls dialed in those area codes with just seven digits will reach a recording that prompts the caller to redial using all 10 digits. The change does not affect price, coverage area or other rates and services, according to the PUC.

from \$80 billion to \$130 billion, according to Comptroller Glenn Hegar.

The comptroller's report explains the economic toll of the storm and the legislative changes to the electric market structure passed in the 87th Legislature. Critics have said the changes do not go far enough to make power companies weatherize their plants to insure against further outages due to extreme weather.

Drought expands throughout state

Texas is drying up.

Warmer and drier conditions are being reported throughout much of the state, reports the Texas Water Development Board. Approximately one-fifth of the state is now experiencing drought conditions, mainly in Northeast Texas, the Panhandle, Far West Texas and South Texas.

The National Weather Service expects drought to expand across the state through the end of January due to La Niña conditions that are expected to bring Texas a warmer and drier winter than normal.

COVID-19 vaccines for kids coming to state

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has authorized the emergency use of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine for children aged 5 to 11 years. In Texas that could mean nearly three million children are now eligible for the vaccine.

The FDA reported immune responses in children in that age range were comparable to those of persons 16 to 25 years old. The vaccine was found to be 90.7% effective in preventing the virus in children 5 through 11. The ongoing study of approximately 3,100 children found no serious side effects.

More than a million doses targeting children in that age group are being



<u>Guest Column</u> Public facts about the card room

Neighbor Gould, thank you for your Guest Column in last week's *The Community News*, titled "Another view of the card room." That is what your neighbors who spoke about the card room to the city council were doing, speaking their views.

And that is the point. City leaders have not publicly shared any facts about The Fort Card Room that was about to open in Willow Park, a city that until July 2021 — just three months earlier — would not have allowed a private card room. So, all we have is our views.

Let's look at the facts we do have (dry as they are) about the The Fort Card Room and the new Willow Park Commercial Amusement Ordinance.

According to a direct quote in the Oct. 1 edition of The Community News from Burt Parnell, one of the owners of the card room, "... and so I came back and started the process here in the county. And then with the city, with law enforcement, with city council, mayors, whomever, to see if they would allow it in Willow Park, and they said yes,' Parnell said. 'And we then tried to find a building, found it, and we got a lease." "The owners of the club signed their lease in June," according to the same article. A lease was signed June 2021 for a private card room that could not have legally opened in the City of Willow Park at that time, since there was no ordinance for commercial amusement until 13 July.

Amusement Ordinance was one page of information, which had the following definitions: "Commercial Amusement – Indoor: An operation which is conducted within an enclosed building, including bowling alleys, video arcades, dance hall or theater, auditoriums, and recreational facilities with or without fixed seating. Commercial Amusement -Outdoor: An operation including miniature golf courses, driving ranges, swimming pools, skateboard parks, water parks and associated facilities."

As a factual aside, a city employee "designated as staff liaison by the city administrator" is responsible for managing the agenda and agenda information packet and for providing expert advice to the P&Z members. P&Z meetings are recorded by the city employee, and although these recordings are not posted for the public, I attended that P&Z Commission meeting and recorded it and will be glad to share. During the June 15 P&Z meeting, one of the commissioners asked what precipitated this agenda item that had not been on any previous agenda; the commissioners were told a movie theatre had approached Willow Park for a location "over by the [Parker County] Ice House" but lost interest when they found Willow Park had no ordinance to allow amusement in commercial or light industrial zoned districts. What followed was a robust 20-minute discussion, including other examples of commercial amusements; assurances that indoor adult amusement was covered under another ordinance; using specific use permits to manage commercial amusement; creating a more detailed definition of what was to be considered appropriate commercial

In the proposed Commercial anusement, to eliminate loopholes that might be used by businesses not appropriate to an area close to residential zoning; and buffering commercial anusement from residential zoning.

> Based on the facts presented to them, the P&Z voted unanimously to approve the Commercial Amusement Ordinance. Please note, I am in no way suggesting or implying any questionable actions or wrong doings by the city employee who assists the P&Z Commission; she was sharing information as she knew it, information provided by the city administration and elected officials.

> During the July 13 regular city council meeting, Agenda Item 5 indicated a public hearing, discussion, and action on Ordinance 834-21 to consider amending the city zoning ordinance to include definitions for Commercial Amusement. A city employee introduced the new ordinance with the examples of a theater and batting cages, and one council member asked for clarification about outdoor amusement activities. Discussion on this agenda item took less than five minutes and the council voted unanimously to approve the new Commercial Amusement Ordinance. By mid-July, the city council had not publicly shared any information about The Fort Card Room or about how the new Commercial Amusement Ordinance would specifically allow - according to The Fort Card Room website – an adult only, seven day a week, sixteen table, private card room, rumored to be open until 4 a.m. or 7/24 hours. (Sorry, but rumor always fills the vacuum left by a dearth of information.)

Another look at impact of Winter Storm Uri

More than eight months after an unprecedented snow and ice storm led to widespread power blackouts in Texas, the Texas Comptroller's office took an in-depth look at the state's response and the legislative actions that followed.

Texas is the only state in the continental United States with its own electric power grid, which serves 90% of its population. Parts of East Texas, the Panhandle and El Paso are outside the area managed by the Electric Reliability Council of Texas and didn't experience widespread outages.

Winter Storm Uri knocked out power and disrupted water utilities for nearly 70% of the state's residents for extended periods. Financial loss estimates range sent to providers in nearly half of the state's counties, according to DSHS. As of Sunday, 15.44 million Texans have been fully vaccinated, which is right at 53% of the state's population.

COVID-19 cases, deaths continue to drop

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas in the past week dropped to 28,840, and new deaths dipped to 937 the first time below 1,000 since summer, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University.

The total number of lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations continues to decrease, with 3,571 reported throughout the state, down nearly 19% from the previous week, according to DSHS.





There was one citizen speaker who asked for clarification about the relationship between the Chapter 380 economic development agreement and The Fort Card Room; the council explained there was no connection between the two issues.



On Sept. 23, a small group of citizens discovered The Fort Card Room had signed a lease in June to operate in the mall across from the Parker County Ice House. And we shared that information as widely as we could because that is what good neighbors do. And we made sure our neighbors knew one of the most effective ways to communicate to our elected officials was to speak in person at a council meeting.

At the Sept. 28 regular city council meeting, The Fort Card Room and the new Commercial Amusement Ordinance were not on the agenda. While fifteen people stood at the podium and spoke on the card room during general public comments, there were over fifty people at the meeting. And those citizens represented many more who could not attend the evening

council meeting, especially on such short notice.

My neighborhood alone had six people present and four spoke. At the end of the meeting, one council member thanked those who spoke, and another council member requested the issue of The Fort Card Room and the Commercial Amusement Ordinance be put on the council agenda. And directly after the council meeting and for a few days afterwards, several of the council communicated with several of the citizens assuring them the issue would be addressed.

In the Oct. 2 edition of The Community News, there was an excellent front page article that covered both sides of The Fort Card Room issue and promised to continue the investigation.

As promised, a front page article in the Oct. 8 *The* Community News continued to pursue facts about the card room and how it related to the new Commercial Amusement several attempts to obtain further information from the city, at the last minute before publication, the newspaper was given only a terse statement from a city representative that no additional information would be forthcoming because of a potential lawsuit. As the article so aptly and succinctly concluded, "When optics are bad, it is incumbent on a government body to explain. So far, no one at the City of Willow Park has found it necessary to do so."

During the next regular city council meeting on Oct. 12, the card room and the new ordinance were not on the agenda. There was one citizen speaker who asked why. As an interesting aside, Agenda Item 4 was "to consider and act on designating the official newspaper of the City of Willow Park for the fiscal year 2021 - 2022." Although The Community News has been designated as the official newspaper for the



Once the second quarter started, Sammy Steffe began his big day. He took his first carry 59 yards to paydirt, extending the Aledo lead







Junior Maddie Frank is shown in the bi-district game against Birdville. Frank has committed to play for the University of North Texas.


