Gilliland appointed to succeed VanSant

No applicants for May election

Willow Park City Council on Tuesday accepted a resignation from councilman Tyler VanSant, who has served in Place 2 since 2020.

The council member was recalled to active duty in the United States Air Force for three years, and in compliance with the Air Force code, could no longer "hold or exercise the functions of civil office."

During a brief proclamation, Mayor Doyle Moss described VanSant as a "valued member of council" and gave him an award of appreciation.

"For your service to the city of Willow Park and commitment to our country, we thank you," Moss said as the crowd stood up and applauded him.

VanSant, who has served on the council for about a year half, said he's proud to have served the council for the last couple years.

"I think we're really squared away with where we are today versus where we were when I started 18

Americans with Ukranian families looking for ways to help

The news coming from Ukraine is disturbing enough for Americans who see what is happening with the ongoing Russian invasion. It hits closer to home for a Fort Worth resident who works in Willow Park.

Yana Begma is a teller at First Bank Texas. The 20-year-old young woman moved with her parents to the United States before she turned four, so she doesn't have many first-hand memories of the country.

But she still has a lot of family in Ukraine - uncles, aunts, grandmothers — and close friends there as well.

"I was supposed to go back and visit and COVID happened," she said. Her parents ended up being able to go while Yana stayed home to work.

"It was really sad. I wanted to see everybody. Hopefully I'll get

to go when things settle down, she said.

When asked how she felt about what was happening there, Yana said "it was really scary at first. It was like at night. My sister was blowing up my phone and she was saying that they got bombed and it was like 12 in the morning for us. They were expecting it — at the same time they were preparing that something bad was gonna happen. They just didn't know when."

Yana said her family here called the family in Ukraine when they heard what happened.

"They told us they were scared I mean, in that situation, you just don't know what to do — feel like frozen," Yana said. "A lot of our family lives in the countryside, so it's far from the capital, maybe an eight-hour drive. So they're not in as much danger. But we do have some friends and family that live in cities. And that's the ones we were really concerned about — not

that anybody in the country was completely safe, but a little bit safer"

Yana understood the stakes in the conflict when asked how she thought the situation would end.

"I have no idea," she replied. "I don't think Putin is going to stop because he was once a really big leader in the USSR. And I feel like



his ultimate goal is to gain all that back. And he wants to be the most powerful man that there is and I don't think he's going to stop."

At the same time, she recognized the difficult position the United States and the rest of the world faces. When we asked her if the thought the United States and the rest of the world were doing enough, she provided a thoughtful answer.

"Do I feel like should they get involved?" she said. "In a way, yes, but not to the point where you're putting the American people in danger too, because it's not our fight. You know, it's nice to help people,

but the last thing we need is this huge world war. We don't need that."

Yana said her family has tried to send money to the family in Ukraine, but the Ukrainian banks are taking 20% off the top.

"Even if we send money they're not getting all the money that we send, and it's pointless. You don't know if they're giving them all that we've sent — they could be taking more than 20% and pocketing it," Yana said. "Right now we're trying to put a thing together — they have a food bank there. So my mom's going to put together a donation flyer —that's the only way you can really help them is through that food bank so that they at least have food."

Yana said her aunt in one of the cities is trying to help other families who don't have a place to go.

Master's Degree agreements signed with two universities

Weatherford College President Tod Allen Farmer is now a member of the national board of directors for the Community College Baccalaureate Association.

Founded in 1999, the CCBA has supported more than 23 states in their efforts to allow community colleges to offer baccalaureate programs.

"I am both humbled and honored to have been elected to the board of directors of the Community College Baccalaureate Association," Farmer said. "Affordable bachelor's degrees are accelerators of opportunity and engines of economic development. I plan to strongly support the expansion of affordable bachelor's degrees both locally and nationally."

The CCBA promotes affordable access to community college bachelor's degrees as a means of closing the nation's racial, ethnic and economic gaps.

WC's Bachelor of Science in Nursing program began in 2020 and the Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Organizational Leadership program opened last August. A medical and health services management degree will become WC's third baccalaureate program when it opens in the fall, and the college is eyeing a bachelor's in robotics and automation engineering as well as an elementary teaching degree with English as a second language certification in the near future.



WC, TAMUC enter master's degree agreement

Weatherford College officially signed its first master's degree articulation agreement on Feb. 21 with Texas A&M University - Commerce at TAMUC's Dallas campus to provide a pathway for WC graduates of the Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Organizational Leadership to transition to the Master of Science in Management at TAMUC.

Qualified students will receive guaranteed admission to A&M-Commerce through their TransferPride program. The agreement ensures WC students can easily transfer credits, and A&M-Commerce students may transfer coursework back to WC to complete requirements for an associate degree.

There are also scholarship opportunities available up to \$500 per semester for four semesters for qualified WC students.

The BAAS in Organizational Leadership is WC's second bachelor's degree program.

"This agreement with our partners at TAMUC creates a seamless pathway for our current and future BAAS-Organizational Leadership students, providing an exciting opportunity to build on their accomplishments at Weatherford College, earn a master's degree from a high-quality graduate program and ultimately broaden their career horizon," said Dr. Philip Mathew, director of WC's BAAS in Organization Leadership program.

The master's degree provided by TAMUC is available to students fully online or through face-to-face courses.

WC signs master's degree agreement with Tarleton

Weatherford College now has a second master's degree articulation agreement with a Texas university.

WC and Tarleton State University signed an agreement Tuesday, March 8, to expand educational access and opportunities for Weatherford College students starting in the Fall 2022 semester.

This agreement offers WC's graduates from the Bachelor


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

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 2)

SJR 2 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the reduction of the amount of a limitation on the total amount of property taxes that may be imposed for general elementary and secondary public school purposes on the residence homestead of a person who is elderly or disabled in order to reflect any statutory reduction in the maximum compressed rate of the maintenance and operations taxes imposed for those purposes on the person's homestead from the preceding tax year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the reduction of the amount of a limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for general elementary and secondary public school purposes on the residence homestead of a person who is elderly or disabled to reflect any statutory reduction from the preceding tax year in the maximum compressed rate of the maintenance and operations taxes imposed for those purposes on the homestead."

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 2)

SJR 2 proposes a constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from property taxes for public school purposes from \$25,000 to \$40,000.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$25,000 to \$40,000."

Capital Highlights

Several races headed to runoffs

A number of statewide races are headed for a May 24 runoff after the votes were tallied in the March 1 primary.

Topping the ballot in the Republican races is the contest for attorney general, where incumbent Ken Paxton led the field with 42.7% of votes cast, followed by George P. Bush, current land commissioner, who garnered 22.8%. The remainder of GOP ballots went to former Supreme Court justice Eva Guzman at 17.5% and U.S. Rep. Louie Gohmert with 17%.

In the Democratic race for lieutenant governor, Houston businessman Mike Collier took 41.5%, with Carrollton state Rep. Michelle Beckley getting 30.2%. They will face each other in the runoff to determine who will face incumbent Dan Patrick in November. Patrick handily won the GOP primary with 76.6% of the vote.

In the race to succeed Bush as land commissioner, there will be runoffs in both parties, with State Sen. Dawn Buckingham, R-Lakeway, taking 41.8% and Tim Westley, the historian for the Texas Republican party, trailing with 14.8%. On the Democratic ballot, Sandragrace Martinez, a San Antonio licensed professional counselor, took 32% while Jay Kleberg, a conservationist whose family owns the storied King Ranch, trailed with 25.8%.

Two Democrats are vying to face incumbent Glenn Hegar in the race for state comptroller. Janet T. Dudding, who retired from Texas A&M to run, led the field with 46.2%. She will face Angel Luis Vega, a business strategist, who received 34.7% of the vote.

GOP incumbent Wayne Christian, chair of the Texas Railroad Commission, fell short of gathering a majority in the primary with 47.2% of the vote. Sarah Stogner, a Midland attorney who gained attention by posting a semi-nude video of herself on top of an oil pumpjack, finished second with 15.1%.

Voters may cast ballots in a party's runoff races if they originally voted in that party's primary or didn't vote at all. Voters who cast ballots in the Republican primary can't cross over and vote in the Democratic runoff, and vice versa. Early voting runs from May 16-20.

Emergency SNAP benefits again extended

The U.S. Department of Agriculture again has extended emergency food benefits for eligible Texas families, with more than \$310 million going to more than 1.5 million Texas households for the month of March. The allotments are distributed through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and administered by the Texas Health and Human Services Commission.

"Putting food on the table is critical for the health and well-being of families, and we're proud to continue helping with these most basic needs," said Texas HHS Access and Eligibility Services Deputy Executive Commissioner Wayne Salter.

Since April 2020, more than \$6.13 billion in emergency food benefits have been provided through SNAP. All SNAP households will receive at least \$95 in emergency allotments by March 31.

Operation Lone Star marks one year

Gov. Greg Abbott, the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the Texas National Guard last week marked the one-year anniversary of Operation Lone Star, the state's effort to "secure the border." Since its launch, more than 208,000 migrants have been apprehended, with 11,800 criminal charges filed.

In the last legislative session, lawmakers approved an additional \$1.8 billion in state funding, bringing the total of funding for border security to \$3 billion.

New website highlights early childhood services

A streamlined resource for Texas parents to get information about early childhood services is now up and running. The new website, earlychildhood.texas.gov, serves as a one-stop-shop to connect Texas parents with access to a variety of free or low-cost services and resources.

The website offers information and resources for health and development, parenting, child care and education.

Federal COVID-19 funding tops \$75.6 billion

The Legislative Budget Board reports that the state received an estimated \$75.6 billion in COVID-19 federal funding, not counting funds awarded directly to individuals and local entities. The funding came from a half dozen pandemic response packages passed by Congress since March 2020.

The funding provided assistance to Texas public schools, higher education, local governments, and health care providers. More detailed information can be found at the budget board's website: lbb.texas.gov/Covid-19.

Meanwhile, the state's Division of Workers Compensation reported more than 78,000 workers' compensation claims with 422 fatalities. More than half of the fatalities involved first responders and correctional officers.


COVID-19 cases continue to drop

The number of COVID-19 cases continues to drop across the state, with 26,520 reported in the past week by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University, along with 936 deaths. The omicron variant continues to wane, with lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations dropping to 2,838 statewide, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

The number of Texans who are fully vaccinated now stands at 17.282 million, according to DSHS, with 6.322 million getting a booster dose as well. As of Sunday, 59.2% of Texans are fully vaccinated.

The negative ads seem to be unavoidable. I would rather have candidates tell me why they are the best, not why their opponent is the worst person ever born and are not fit for office.

I do admire people who stick their necks out to run. It is not easy to lay yourself bare before the public. The worst thing that could happen is to have no candidates.

Meanwhile, maybe we can sit down with our better selves and see if there is a way to improve the system.

And congratulations to all of the candidates, winners and losers. You all tried your best.



The DFW Clash tournament started off in Southlake when the team had the first of three double headers against Lubbock Cooper and Southlake Carroll. Hunter Rudel took the mound in the first game and pitched six innings allowing just three hits and no runs as the Bearcats downed Cooper by a score of 10-0.

The first Aledo run came in the second inning when Bosten Dwinell singled to center field to score Estevan Flores. Adrian Guzman drove in another in the fifth to make it a 2-0 game. The Bearcat offense exploded in the sixth inning, scoring eight runs to end the game by run-rule.
