Parade honors young Lincoln Finley

When six-year-old Lincoln Finley was diagnosed with Leukemia in July, it turned his world - and that of his family - upside-down, as it does with any family faced with the same situation. There are preparations to be made - lots and lots of medical appointments, chemo infusions, emotions, explanations, education, work arrangements, and the physical affects of the chemo on a little body — and then the realization that, just a few weeks later, Lincoln would not be able to celebrate his seventh birthday with a traditional party.



WILLOW PARK Council passes 2023 fiscal year budget

At their meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 13, the Willow Park City Council approved the city's budget for the 2022-23 fiscal year.

The budget has anticipated general fund revenues of \$5,124,659 compared to expenses of \$5,124,660.

As expected, the most revenue willcome from property taxes (\$1.9 million) and sales taxes (\$1.75 million). The police department (\$1,903,517) and fire department (\$1,425,021) are the largest expenses.

"This budget reflects fiscal responsibility while still providing for the needs of Willow Park, particularly in the public safety departments," City Manager Bryan Grimes said. "While we are going below the no-new-revenue rate, we will see increased revenue through new development."

The city finished the 2021-22 fiscal year with \$1,738,308 in sales tax revenue, besting the budgeted \$1.4 million. It also continued a trend of increased sales tax revenue from \$1,223,675 in FY 2019-20 to \$1,448,563 in FY 2020-21.

The fire department's future impact on the budget remains to be seen. In November, Willow Park residents will vote on whether to allow Parker County Emergency Services District 1 to adopt the department.

The new budget will become effective Oct. 1.

Lower property taxes

The council also approved a new property tax rate to go into effect on the same day as the new budget. The new rate is 54 cents per \$100.

Friends stepped in, and the idea of drive-by well-wishers turned into a concept for a fullscale parade (See The Community News, Sept. 2, 2022).

That parade became a reality on Saturday, Sept. 10.

Sheltered in the portico of Faith Presbyterian Church in Aledo, family and friends set up balloons, a table with cupcakes, and a bullhorn for Lincoln.

And suddenly at 10 a.m. the parade started, starting with an Aledo ISD police car and Willow Park fire truck, lights flashing and horns blaring.

Next came a slew of Corvettes, a Willow Park police car, and then an assortment of classic cars, cheerleaders, and friends – many

poking out of sunroofs – waving greetings and flashing homemade signs of encouragement and birthday wishes.

And they kept coming – Firebirds, convertibles, pickups, SUVs, cars, an Aledo fire truck, a Fort Worth Police car- all with heartfelt wishes for Lincoln.

"My hope — the whole parade - is that Lincoln has a visible idea of how many people are alongside him during this fight," his mother, Ashley Cunningham, said. "It's very hard to explain to a sevenyear-old why he has cancer."

Capital Highlights **Poll: Most Texas teachers** consider quitting

More than three-fourths of Texas teachers say they have seriously considered quitting the profession largely because of a perceived lack of respect and support, according to a new survey by the Charles Butt Foundation. Excessive workload and inadequate pay were other major reasons that teachers are considering leaving, The Dallas Morning News and other media outlets reported.

The percentage of teachers considering quitting has risen to 77% this year from 58% in 2020, when the foundation conducted the first survey on the subject.

Since the COVID-19 pandemic, Texas has experienced a teacher shortage that prompted the Texas Education Agency to form a task force to address the issue. No official findings have been released.

The statewide survey included 1,291 public school teachers drawn randomly from TEA's 2020 roster of teachers. Among those teachers who seriously thought about leaving the profession, 68% updated their resumes, while about one-third applied for another job.

"This isn't just teachers not feeling satisfied," research associate Victoria Wang told The Morning News. "They're actively taking steps to leave the classroom."

The foundation is named for the CEO of H-E-B, the largest privately held employer in Texas. Its goal is "pursuing a more equitable and prosperous future for all Texans," according to its website.

Abbott: Electric grid safe this fall

The state's electric grid should have no problem handling power demand this fall, Gov. Greg Abbott said after meeting with members of the Electric Reliability Council of Texas and the Public Utility Commission. A joint meeting was held last week to discuss the issue, although typically there are few challenges to the grid during autumn and spring because of decreased demand.

The new forecast by ERCOT predicts plenty of power available in October and November, despite planned shutdowns by a number of Texas power plants for scheduled maintenance.

"The State of Texas continues to monitor the reliability of our electric grid, and I thank ERCOT and PUC for their hard work to implement bipartisan reforms we passed last year and for their proactive leadership to ensure our grid is stronger than ever before," Abbott said.

The grid faced unprecedented demand this summer with triple-digit temperatures across most of the state for weeks on end.

Updated COVID-19 boosters shipping to state

The third booster vaccine for COVID-19 is shipping to health-care providers across the state this week, the Texas Department of State Health Services reported. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has allocated about 900,000 doses of the updated boosters to Texas. That figure includes 502,5000 doses of the Pfizer vaccine and 192,800 doses of the Moderna vaccine available for order by health-care providers. Another 200,000 or so doses will be available through large retail pharmacies, such as

H-E-B, CVS, Walgreens and Walmart. The so-called "bivalent" vaccines

no longer experiencing drought. Severe drought remains prevalent around the San Antonio and Midland-Odessa areas and eastward to the Abilene region.

Voter registration deadline is **Oct. 11**

Eligible Texans who plan to vote in the Nov. 8 general election must be registered by Oct. 11, according to Texas Secretary of State John Scott. While voter registration in Texas is county based, Texans can make sure they're registered by visiting the secretary of state's Am I Registered portal: tinyurl. com/4wcn4b9x.

Early voting runs from Oct. 24 to Nov. 4. A hotly contested governor's race between incumbent Republican Greg Abbott and Democratic challenger Beto O' Rourke is at the top of the ballot. Other statewide races



differ from earlier versions in that they protect against both the original strain of COVID-19 and the Omicron variant that has been responsible for more than 99% of the COVID cases in Texas in the past month, according to DSHS.

People can get the updated booster if it has been at least two months since they received the original vaccine or one of the previously offered boosters.

COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations drop

The number of new COVID-19 cases reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University during the past week dropped to 49,326, down about 10% from the previous week, with 133 new deaths reported, also a decrease. DSHS reported 2,440 lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations, just slightly lower than the previous week.

The proportions don't have to be exact. Some people don't like cilantro and it can be left out. You can make a large batch of Pinto and heat and serve during the week.

A traditional breakfast consists of Gallo Pinto, corn tortillas, an egg, and grilled plantains. Tropical fruit is optional. When served at dinner, a skillet grilled chicken thigh or breast is sometimes included. Salsa Lizano and hot sauce on the side and Costa Rican coffee are other options.

Cook your own batch and think of it as a regular addition to you family's diet. We have.

Celebrate Hispanic Heritage month by celebrating Costa Rica's independence and democratic way of life.

That we could be such a happy people! Pura Vida!

the current rate of 57 cents per \$100 and a return to the rate that was in place from 2016 through 2020.

The 2021 increase was reported as being due to additional fire department personnel.

Trail presentation

Larry Colvin, President of the Weatherford Mountain Bike Club (WMBC), made a trails presentation to the council. Colvin, who is also the senior designer for civil, landscape, and trails for Baird, Hampton & Brown engineering consultants in Weatherford, was instrumental in the design and implementation of the Parks of Aledo Trail system. He has been designing a comprehensive single-track trail plan for the City of Willow Park for more than a year.

In addition, Colvin has also been in contact and involved with the surrounding cities of Annetta, North Annetta, Aledo, Hudson Oaks, and Weatherford, as well as several Parker County officials. His plan is to connect all of his proposed trails, those of other cities, and ones existing into one connecting trail system

Trails (EPCoT). "The great thing about these trails is everybody can take advantage of them," Colvin said,

he has named East Parker County

noting that they can be used for walking, running, hiking, biking, and even walking a dog.

He has been working with Willow Park Mayor Pro Tem Lea Young on getting a contract submitted for the update of the trail map in the Parks and Trails Master Plan of Willow Park, along with cost estimates for the final design and construction of all Willow Park trails.

EPCoT is a

collaboration to create a hike-andbike route utilizing public roadways, existing and proposed paved trails and dedicated bike lanes, to connect downtown Aledo

with Lake Weatherford. The EPCoT Trail proposes to connect existing mountain bike trail networks in Aledo (The Pit Kids' Skills Area and Trail, along with the Parks of Aledo Trails) and in Weatherford (Quanah Hill). Additionally, the City of Willow Park and the WMBC have created a concept mountain bike trail map that proposes upwards

of nine miles of new single-track trails.

The goal of EPCoT will be to create an all-weather road bike route that will connect the existing and proposed mountain bike trailheads to one another.

Colvin added another possibility for the trails.

"I think having a Willow Park Marathon would be cool," he said with a grin. "I've never been accused of not thinking big."

Fort Worth pledges \$15 million for Juneteenth Museum

The Fort Worth City Council unanimously approved a resolution Tuesday pledging \$15 million to the development of the National Juneteenth Museum in the city's Historic Southside neighborhood.

The contribution will only be made once the balance of the \$70 million project is raised.

Architectural renderings of the National Juneteenth Museum show a building with a dramatic roofline that reflects the gables of the shotgun-style homes in the Historic Southside neighborhood where it will be located.

The building's design, and that of three adjacent residential buildings in the development planned for the Evans and Rosedale corridor, was unveiled during a recent City Council work session.

Jarred Howard, principal with Sable Brands, the project's developer, said the museum was designed by the New York office of Denmark-based Bjarke Ingels Group. It is the same architecture firm that designed Google's Northern California headquarters.

The design also draws on the design of the Juneteenth Star featured on the official Juneteenth flag, Howard said.

In the making for several years, the project was formally announced in December 2021. The museum will be on the second level of a two-story building. The lower level will feature a restaurant, business incubator, 250seat amphitheater and storefronts. The three adjacent residential buildings will have 55 residences.

"Literally and figuratively, it was designed to be a beacon of light in an area that has been dark for a very long time," said Howard, who grew up in Fort Worth's Stop Six neighborhood. "It's time for the revitalization of the Historic Southside. Our hope is that the city will embrace it."

The national museum will complement those in the Cultural District and become a global tourist destination, he said.


Construction could begin by year's end or in the first quarter of 2023. A grand opening is planned for mid-2025.

Fort Worth resident and activist Opal Lee is the impetus behind the Juneteenth federal holiday. Juneteenth had been celebrated in Texas for many years to commemorate June 19, 1895, when Texas slaves were freed following the Civil War.

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
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

"And I hope that through Lincoln's journey, he brings people back to their faith, and just reminds us all how fortunate we are to have our able and willing bodies and every day is a blessing. So I just hope that he

is motivated and uplifted by the parade today. That was my entire thought the whole time. And I I'm just overwhelmed with gratitude."

He has since traveled the world


and won countless competitions

Bearcats look to keep Hornets winless

They say death and taxes are life's only two certainties. However, if you ask the folks in Azle they might add one other item to that list.

The Aledo Bearcats defeating the Azle Hornets - and soundly - has become as sure a thing as a mid-afternoon in July in Texas is going to be sizzling. In fact, in their past six meetings the games have been about as close as going to Amarillo by way of Houston.

Dating to 2008, the Bearcats have outscored the Hornets 332-10 in their last half dozen get-togethers. In all, Aledo leads the series 13-2, including winning their only playoff meeting in 2004, 48-35.

And this season the Hornets come into Friday's District 3-5A Division I game at Bearcat Stadium still looking for their first win, coming off a 63-14 humbling at home to Denton Ryan last Friday. In fact, Azle has been outscored 190-55 in its three losses.

"I really thought Azle would be better," Bearcats head coach Tim Buchanan said. "But we really don't talk about the other team that much. We talk about ourselves, what we need to do to get better.

"You cannot control your opponent. You can only control how good or bad you play."

The Bearcats played their best football of the season on Sept. 8 as they traveled to Justin Northwest and won 49-20 behind 148 yards rushing and four touchdowns from Hawk Patrick-Daniels. Starting quarterback Hauss Hejny and backup Hayden Brant each threw for touchdowns and wide receiver Jalen Pope caught six passes for 94 yards and a TD.

In all, seven different players caught a pass for Aledo and five ran the ball to go along with the twin play at QB. The defense, led by Jayton Owens with eight tackles (one for a loss) and a fumble recovery, recovered three fumbles.

And on special teams, Austin Keith's only punt of the evening went for 63 yards.

Following the first 0-2 start of his head coaching career, Buchanan had a message for his team before their trip to Northwest.

"I told the kids we need to go have fun," he said.

And now?

Just have fun

"They're relaxed, having some fun, coaches are having more fun," he added.

Of course, life is more enjoyable with a win, and the Bearcats are hoping to keep the good feelings going Friday against an Azle squad

that could use a few smiles of its own.

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

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

Before the game, several supporters of the athletic program gathered at midfield and pulled back a pair of tarpaulins to unveil the TCA logo at midfield. That brought a few tears to some eyes, as did seeing numerous former players back for a visit.

"It's a come-to-fruition kind of thing," said TCA assistant boys basketball coach Dayton Sheridan. "To go from Aledo Middle School to Godley to here, right down from our own school, it's nice to look around and have this thing now."

School board member Bert Thompson, who led the campaign for the new facilities, said, "I've already cried three times today, that's why I've got my glasses on. When we ask God for things, and he gives us those things, we have to thank him."

Thompson said he was excited he arrived at the stadium at sunup for last-minute preparations before the big unveiling. "I got here at about 6:15. I couldn't sleep. I was picking some weeds and whatever else I could find to try and make things as perfect as they could be," he said. "This is going to be great for our community, and Willow Park has been so accommodating."

Even the opposing team and fans seemed excited about the evening.

"It's going to be so cool for our boys to play on this new field. I'm so happy for the folks at Trinity that they have this," said Dallas Christian Home Educators manager Avery Countryman.

And though there are still some finishing touches to be made, for example, visiting bleachers — the home side seats around 1,000 — the evening was like unwrapping a new present for the TCA faithful. And for future Eagles, well, they are definitely exciting and anxiously awaiting their turn.


"I like the beautiful turf, the way the sun shines on it," said fourth-grader Jace Shaw, who plays youth football.


