Mural honors local history, agriculture ties

Installed at ag science building at AHS

The Philip W. Bradford Agriculture Science Building at Aledo High School sports a striking new exterior addition this week after installation of a mural by department students.

The mural's development came about as the result of efforts by the school's Future Farmers of America (FFA) chapter. Every year, the chapter participates in a program called the National Chapter Award Program.

Krysti Kelley, Agriculture Science Instructor and FFA Advisor, said the chapter must complete 15 activities related to three categories: Growing Leadership, Building Our Community, and Agricultural Advocacy.

Each of those categories has a student committee to work toward completion of those activities.

Kelley, who is also the Aledo ISD Business, Industry and STEM Department Chair, said

one of the activity categories is called Agricultural Advocacy.

"This is really just trying to teach students how to promote agriculture within their community," Kelley said. "Last summer, we sat

down with our officer team and they thought up the mural. They wanted to put an image in town that helped reinforce people's understanding of the agricultural roots of Aledo, and help them also see the current commodities that we produce — that was the vision and the reasoning for the mural."

Hispanic Texans likely largest demographic group

The U.S. Census Bureau released its latest estimate, which indicates Hispanic residents in Texas make up more of the state's population than white residents. The new population figures from the American Community Survey indicate Hispanic Texans comprise 40.2% of the state's population last year, while non-Hispanic white Texans made up 39.4%, as reported in the Texas Tribune.

The estimates, from July 2021, are not considered official but reflect trends that demographers have been tracking for years. Hispanics accounted for nearly half of the state's population increase of 4 million residents since 2010. Census figures indicate almost half of Texas residents under the age of 18 are Hispanic.

The survey showed that Hispanic residents are more than twice as likely as white resident to live below the poverty line. The median income for a white household last vear was \$81,235, compared to \$54,857 for a Hispanic household.

More than 10,000 migrants bused elsewhere

With Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis grabbing headlines by flying migrants from Texas

to Martha's Vineyard, Gov. Greg Abbott's office announced that is has now bused more than 10,000 migrants to what he terms "sanctuary cities" such as Washington, D.C., New York, and Chicago. Last week, at Abbott's behest, two buses of migrants from Texas were dropped off outside Vice President

Kamala Harris' residence at the United States Naval Observatory in the nation's capital.

Abbott has long criticized the Biden administration's approach to migrants seeking asylum in the United States, and Texas has boosted border security funding by \$4 billion. Biden last week said the administration has a process to deal with migrants at the border.

"Republicans are playing politics with human beings, using them as props. What they're doing is simply wrong," he said at a gala for the Congressional Hispanic Caucus, according to Politico.

Disaster assistance approved after North Texas flooding

The U.S. Small Business Administration has approved Abbott's request for disaster assistance for seven North Texas counties affected by flooding last month. As much as 10 inches of rain fell in the Dallas area in late August, causing widespread damage to businesses and homes.

Counties included in the disaster declaration are Dallas, Collin, Denton, Ellis, Kaufman, Rockwall, and Tarrant. Applicants can download applications and get further information at disasterloanassistance.sba.

'Moderate' deer hunting season predicted

Biologists with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are predicting a moderate season for deer hunters, with archery season kicking off on Oct. 1.

"Overall, 2022 year is expected to be good in terms of harvest numbers and opportunities, so don't let the chance to spend time afield with family, friends and fellow hunters pass you by," said Alan Cain with TPWD.

The statewide drought, while now largely in remission, has adversely affected natural forage for deer in late summer, especially in the central, south, and western parts of the state, according to Cain. Wildfires caused significant habitat loss, but those areas are quickly rejuvenating, especially with the recent rains.

"Where fires have occurred, there's been new grass and weed growth providing some much-needed nutrition and cover for deer," Cain said. "Although habitat conditions have improved immensely with recent rains, the timing was a bit late to have any meaningful influence on antler quality."

TABC busts 131 retailers for underage alcohol sales

A statewide sting of alcohol retailers in college towns across Texas netted 131 retailers accused of selling alcohol to minors. The effort by the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission coincided with the start of the college fall semester. Minor-aged volunteers under the supervision of undercover TABC agents attempted to buy alcohol from

> licensed retailers at 1,131 locations. They found a total of 131 violations, or 14% of the locations visited.

> Businesses cited for selling booze to a minor could face civil fines and possible suspension of their liquor license. Individual employees would face misdemeanor charges as well.



While new cases of COVID-19 cases continue to wane, with 36.856 reported in Texas by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University in the past week, along with 144 deaths, parking lot pop-up vaccine sites are taking place at select Walmart locations across Texas until Sept. 25.


Updated booster vaccines from Pfizer and Moderna address the newer variants, according to officials with the Texas Department of State Health Services.

"Vaccination remains our most important tool in the fight against severe illness and death from COVID-19," said DSHS Commissioner Dr. John Hellerstedt. "And the new bivalent vaccines promise an even more effective and safe protection from Omicron variants, which continue to be the leading cause of COVID-19 illness in Texas and across the U.S."

DSHS reported 2.161 lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations as of Sunday, down slightly from the previous week.

TOTS introduces new theatre classes



Annetta Elementary School to be included in Exhibit of School Architecture

The Texas Association of School Administrators and Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) have announced that Annetta Elementary School will be among 55 projects included in the 2022-23 Exhibit of School Architecture.

This exhibit of new and renovated Texas school facilities includes projects from 36 school districts and two colleges that were submitted by 16 architectural firms. Annetta Elementary School was designed by PBK Architects.

Eligible projects are newly constructed or renovated public education facilities completed in the past five years and not previously submitted in this annual exhibit.

The Exhibit of School Architecture awards are given at the discretion of a 12-member jury, which includes four school board members, four school administrators, and four members from the Association for Learning Environments (A4LE) Southern Region. The

juried exhibit awarded Stars of Distinction for Excellence to 34 projects in one or more of the following six areas: design, value, innovation, community, planning, and school transformation.

The Annetta campus was recognized under the "innovation" category.

Former Bearcat found ticket to happy life

From the time he was in the seventh grade, Jay King knew he wanted a career in radio.

The Aledo High School alum is now board operator and host of "The Ticket Top 10" at 1310/96.7 FM The Ticket, one of the most popular radio stations in the Metroplex.

He's also proof of the old adage "once a Bearcat, always a Bearcat." He moved with his family to Aledo from Wylie during his middle school years and said Aledo is still the place he calls home.

"I love it there," King said. "I never had any bad experiences or anything like that, and it was a great place to grow up. I made a lot of close relationships with people."

King made the most of his teenage years in his adopted city, playing basketball and baseball for a time at Aledo High School, as well as the trombone in the marching band. But it was a different pursuit that really helped him the most in cultivating and honing his budding radio talent.

"I joined the yearbook because I wanted to do something kind of like journalism," King said. "I knew I wanted to get into that field. And so the yearbook teacher, Cheryl Posey, let me take pictures, she helped me get involved with sort of laying out pages and things like that. I had never even met her until I enrolled in her class, and she opened me up to it and helped me get started in doing what I wanted to do."

King, 26, said that even before he arrived in Aledo, radio programs held a special place in his heart.

"In seventh grade, I knew that's what I was going to do," King said. "My granddad and I listened to old radio shows like 'War of the Worlds' and 'Amos and Andy' and so forth. I thought they were even cooler than television."

Following graduation from Aledo High School, King attended Weatherford College and transferred eventually Southeastern Oklahoma State.

He has worked as intern with Cumulus Media and the "Wake Up With The Wolf" show on KPLX, and as a station manager at KSSU, U92 FM in Durant, Oklahoma.

But even with all the experience he was gaining, something was still missing.

"Sports radio was my biggest dream," King said. "That's where I wanted to be because it's a mixture

of the two things I love. I was willing to do anything in radio to get there,

no matter what." While King stopped playing football in middle school, the Aledo High School football team definitely helped inspire his passion for sports journalism.

"It always helps when your team is as good as they are," King said. "And it makes you a little more passionate, because you have a product that's like 'oh man!' The opportunities they get, where they're playing, the caliber of teams they are playing, the high profile, great teams — it was awesome. No offense to the small schools, but a team that's got a lot of opportunities like that was really cool to see."

King's show, "The Ticket Top 10" is described by the station's web site (https://www.theticket.com/ shows/the-ticket-top-10/) as "a replay, regurgitation and review of the station's best hot sports opinion discussions, hilarious funny bits and wheels-off-the-cuff moments that you may have missed the first time around."

King said he was humbled to be given the chance to host his show at the age of 26, something that just happened this past June.

"It's not like I talk a whole, whole bunch," King said. "I listen to the ticket almost the whole day, and I work with the producers and pull the best segments from the show, handing them down. Then I edit it down to a certain hour-and-ahalf or two-hour format and then I do a little voice track over it like, 'Hey, listen to The Musers broadcast Monday morning, you know, stuff like that."

King also runs the board when the Stars season starts up, and said the best part of his job is that often he forgets it really is a job.

story online "I've never gone to work thinking, 'man I'm going to work," King said. "I'm like, 'I'm getting paid to watch the team that's on TV right now. I'm getting paid to be on a broadcast that's going out and entertaining people.'

"It's brought me a lot of joy when times are tough or when things suck. I just go and turn on a game and turn off my brain and listen to what's happening. Listening to people talk or being a part of a conversation — being a part of a friend's group and stuff is what I love. So I don't ever go to work."

King said he tries to get back to Aledo as often as possible to stay connected with family and friends, and said his ultimate career objective is definitely within reach, but not necessarily something he is in a rush to obtain.

"Everyone says they want to be an on-air host and things like that," King said. "That's the goal.


That's the big thing. So, of course, that would be cool. I would love to do something like that, but just even being involved now in the way that I am, I thought that would be something longer-term, or that I would have gotten later on, so this is all pretty much a

dream right now.

"She helped us rework it into the image that we now have," Kelley said. "She was able to incorporate everything the students found on research, even give us a couple of ideas, and then bring it into an image that's going to be super eye appealing.

"It was such a big blessing for her to help us in that way, and we're really grateful for it."

The postcard concept was Voight's idea after she researched murals in other towns.

The Aledo FFA was was chosen for the activity as one of the top-10 in the nation in the Agriculture Advocacy program.

Two local FFA students, Jacob Ellerbusch and Kaylee Hopkins, spoke at the mural's unveiling on Sept. 21, and they will repeat their presentation in an interview with a panel of judges on the chapter's behalf on Tuesday.

"We'll find out next Wednesday if we make top three, and if we do, they will interview in Indianapolis, Indiana in October, and share with another panel to see if we will become the national champions," Kelley said.

The installation and unveiling

The installation of the 200pound mural, which was painted on treated plywood and then treated with a weather-resistant sealant, was another can-do project of the AHS ag students. On Tuesday, Sept. 20, they gathered in the ag building and, as a have become housing developgroup, figured out how to lift it ments and industrial buildings. as a group and carry it outside, turn it back on its side, and then realize that a trailer needed to be backed into place for them to stand on to raise the mural to its place.

Lumber rails had been attached to the building, and the mural has matching rails on the back which allowed it to

sit in place once it was raised into position. From here, it was a matter of centering and then permanently attaching it to the building.

On Wednesday, a group of school officials and spectators gathered for the unveiling of the mural.

Ellerbusch and Hopkins spoke of the mural and its significance.

Hopkins spoke of the metaphor that "a picture is worth 1,000 words."

"Aledo FFA brought this metaphor to life," Ellerbusch said. "The Aledo community is located just outside the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex. It has deep roots in agriculture. Our community is known for cattle production, boasts being the ranch horse capital of the world, and is home to the Parker County Peach Festival."

"However, this historically agricultural community has become more suburban over the last 10 years," Hopkins added. "Many of our agricultural farms Our community is losing sight of its agricultural roots, and many have no idea of the agricultural significance in our county."

Hopkins said the overall message greets visitors to Aledo.

"The 'A' of Aledo represents the traditional farms in our community that helped form our town," Hopkins said. "The 'L' highlights cattle production, as 65 different cattle ranches have been the heart and soul of our town since its founding."

"In the heart of Aledo, there's a feed and grain company called Bryant Grain. Next to this mill is a railroad that carries many agricultural commodities and is known as the famous Aledo train. Both of these elements are depicted in the letter 'E," Ellerbusch added. "Parker County is home to the Parker County Peach Festival. Our county produces many peaches. And this is our contribution to the agriculture in the state of Texas and is honored in the letter 'D."

"The letter O is also an homage to the farms and ranches that formed our community," Hopkins said. "It displays the brands of the five major cattle ranches in Aledo. Finally, the horse and rider represent the significance of ranch horses at Parker County. Our county is known as the ranch horse capital of the world. And we wanted to honor this distinction."

The letters "FFA" are filled with icons of the national FFA organization: the owl, the corn with the plow and the rising sun, and the eagle.

Bearcats to scrap with Rough Riders in Saginaw

Winless opponent has faced stiff opposition

To say it has been a rough season for the Saginaw Rough Riders would be, well, a rough comment and that's saying the least.

The Rough Riders are off to an 0-4 start (0-2 in District 3-5A Division I) and have been outscored 201-23. They've been shut out three times and have yet to score in district losses to Burleson Centennial (65-0) and Denton Ryan (56-0).

And it's not going to be any easier this week as the Rough Riders will host the Aledo Bearcats, who are going in a completely opposite direction following back-to-back season-opening losses for the first time since 1991. The Bearcats are 2-2 overall and 2-0 in district after convincing wins at Northwest (49-20) and at home against winless Azle (55-20).

Meanwhile, Saginaw has not won since the opening game of the 2021 season, having dropped 13 straight and 23 of their past 24.

But Bearcats coach Tim Buchanan noted the four teams that have defeated Saginaw (they also faced Boswell and Fort Worth Northside in pre-district) are a combined 13-1. Buchanan knows a thing or two about playing a tough schedule as his team dropped pre-district

contests at Dallas Parish Episcopal (24-17) and at home to Denton Guyer (44-14).

"They're better than people think they are," Buchanan said of Saginaw. "They are really good in the defensive backfield. We're going to have to

work to throw the ball on them."

However, given that the Rough Riders are surrendering 234 yards per game on the ground and the Bearcats have one of the top running backs in the North Texas area in junior Hawk Patrick-Daniels (64 carries, 562 yards, 7 TD), just how much that secondary will be tested is a question. Daniels is coming off is expected to be back this week.



a 282-yard, three-touchdown game against Azle.

Also, Daniels did not become the starting tailback until the second game. In the season opener at Parish Episcopal he carried just once for three yards.

Earning his spot

the team's leading tackler, junior linebacker Ky Howington, sidelined last week, a new standout emerged on the varsity defense. Sophomore linebacker Ben McElree was called up from the junior varsity and responded with a

team-leading 13 tackles, including two for a loss, with a fumble recovery that led to a touchdown.

"He worked his way to the varsity," Buchanan said. "Anytime you move a JV linebacker up and he's going to be a starter there's a question mark, but he was really good."

Buchanan said Howington

The Bearcats remained No. 7 in this week's state rankings from Dave Campbell's Texas Football and the Associated Press. Also from the district, Denton Ryan moved up a spot from No. 4 to No. 3.

The two teams that have defeated Aledo are also state-ranked. Parish Episcopal is No. 1 among private schools and Guyer is No. 6 in 6A.

"The guys played well in the Bart Granger, finishing 18th out Invitational in 1997, a name that


of 52 teams in a very stacked field," said first-year coach Brian Mourning. "Jett Moore (70-74-76) and Braylon Mahanay



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
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

Bearcats blast Azle again to stay unbeaten in district

Patrick-Daniels rushes for almost 300 yards

Johnathan Gray is the new running backs coach at his alma mater this season. Earlier in the week, the Aledo legendary running back and national record holder had high praise for Bearcat junior Hawk Patrick-Daniels.

"Hawk is a great runner. I'm really proud of what he's doing this season," Gray said.

Patrick-Daniels continued to prove his coach right and must have brought some sweet memories to Gray Friday night as he ran up and down the field at will against Azle in a 55-20 Aledo victory over the visiting Hornets. He finished the night with an unofficial 294 yards on just 24 carries, also scoring three touchdowns.

"I wanna go beyond with my team, go back to the state championship, but I can't do anything without my offensive line," Patrick-Daniels said. "I've got to give credit to my offensive line.

"I do feel like it's coming together, better as a team, as a family."

Patrick-Daniels carried one time for three yards in a season-opening loss at Dallas Parish Episcopal. In Week two, however, he became the spotlight back and has now rushed for a total of 574 yards and seven touchdowns on just 65 carries, an average of almost nine yards per carry.

"He did a good job of being in the right spot. The O-line did a good job of moving them (defenders) and he did a great job of finding the holes," Aledo head coach Tim Buchanan said of Patrick-Daniels.

With the victory, the Bearcats evened their season record at 2-2. More important, Buchanan noted, they remained undefeated in District 3-5A Division I. Azle is still looking for its first win at 0-4 and 0-2 in league play.

Aledo continued its dominance over the Hornets in their series, winning for the eighth consecutive game and having outscored Azle 387-30 in the past seven meetings. The Bearcats lead the all-time series 14-2.

"We're back to .500, but the main thing is we are 2-0 in district," said the coach whose team has won a state-record 105 district games dating to the 2007 season.

Patrick-Daniels had TD runs of 28, 32 and 38 yards. His first two scores gave the Bearcats a quick 13-0 lead less than four minutes into the game.

Then, after the Hornets silenced the crowd with a 72-yard touchdown pass by quarterback Jay Jones to Tyler Landon, Patrick-Daniels got them roaring again with his third touchdown just more than two minutes later for a 20-7 lead.

By halftime the Bearcats led 34-7 as running back Caleb Pope scored on a 13-vard run and Kaydon Finley caught a 14-yard pass from quarterback Hauss Heiny. Pope would add second-half touchdowns of one and five yards and Finley would catch a second TD, this time from backup QB Brant Hayden for 46 yards.

In all, the Bearcats amassed an official 572 yards of offense, of which 416 came on the ground. In fact, they averaged more than 10 yards on their 43 carries and had 14 rushing plays of 10 or more yards, with 11 coming from Patrick-Daniels.

Pope finished with 43 yards on seven carries. Also, Ryan Cox rushed three times for 37 yards and Ryan Morton had three carries for 34 yards..

Hejny was 8-for-17 passing for 95 yards with the aforementioned TD and an interception, along with rushing for 15 yards on three attempts. Hayden was 2-for-2 for 61 yards with the TD.

Finley led the receiving corps with four catches for 97 yards, while tight end Tyson Timms had three catches

for 38 yards. Zach Reynolds hauled in two for 15 and Austin Keith caught one for six.

The Aledo run defense limited Azle to just 125 yards on 35 carries. Also, despite passing for 193 yards, Jones felt pressure numerous times from Bearcat defenders.

The Aledo defense was led by linebacker Ben McElree, who recovered a fumble at the Azle 14-yard line to set up a touchdown. He led the Bearcats with 13 tackles, including two for a

Other defensive standouts for the Bearcats were Dahvon Keys (9 tackles, 1 for a loss), safety Jake Gillespie (8 tackles) and tackle Ansel Din-Mbuh (6 tackles, 1 for a loss, forced fumble). Defensive tackle Bryon Wheeler registered two tackles for a loss, while cornerback Chris Johnson, defensive end Lawson Moore and linebacker



The Ladycats will next compete in the District 5-5A Preview Oct. 11 at Sugar Tree Golf Course in Lipan.



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
