Mayors' food drive underway

Food collections for Center of Hope continue through October

The annual Mayors' Food Drive is underway for Parker County Center of Hope to feed struggling families and runs through Oct 31.

'The Parker County Mayors' Food Drive is the Center's largest food drive," CEO Staci Markwardt said. "Over the summer,

the need for food increased nearly 70% and with the number of families asking for assistance growing every day, this food drive could not have come at a better time."



The food drive was started by Willow Park Mayor Doyle Moss 15 years

ago in Parker County. This year 3,500 bags have been distributed to churches, businesses, and mayors to fill with food items.

Throughout the fifteen years, more than 130,000 pounds of food have been collected for Parker County Center of Hope through this food drive.

When asked why he chose Center of Hope to donate to, Moss said, "We're not just giving them groceries, Center of Hope gives them a hand up. It's like they are teaching them to fish."

Moss started food drives long before he moved back to Texas in 2006. He and his wife moved from Florida, where they ran food drives for hurricane victims. They took food, water, and other needed items to hurricane victims in the Florida panhandle. When they moved back to Texas, they wanted to get involved and do something similar to what they had done in Florida. They saw a need in Parker County and wanted to help and chose Parker County Center of Hope as their partner.

"I don't know of too many organizations that go the extra mile like Center of Hope does," Moss said. "They offer classes and give students the tools needed to get a job or go to college." Bags for the Mayors' Food Drive are filled with non-perishable food items, such as beans, pastas, peanut butter, jelly, canned meats, fruits and vegetables, and toiletries for struggling families. Representatives of the Center of Hope said "If you feel God calling you to give, donations can be taken directly to the Parker County Center of Hope at 1318 Clear Lake Road in Weatherford Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 3 p.m." Parker County Center of Hope is a Christ-centered ministry offering crisis assistance such as daily meals in the dining room, groceries, counseling, and financial assistance for utilities, dental, and medical needs. In addition, Center of Hope provides long-term solutions out of poverty through its adult education and career development program. The Center is located at 1318 Clear Lake Rd and is open Monday -Thursday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Seely lives with his mother, Michelle, in the Yes mobile home community of Aledo. Robert, 33, was born with Spina Bifida, a condition in which a baby's spinal cord does not develop properly.

Robert is now in a wheelchair, but it wasn't always so. As a young adult he lived on his own and maneuvered on crutches. But in 2016 he had a massive stroke and has been in a wheelchair ever since.

Robert's movement was restricted because the home didn't have a ramp.

On Sunday, Sept. 25, the Rev. Troy Miklos from The Summit in Aledo, representatives from the Center of Hope, friends, and volunteers gathered to bless and celebrate a newly-completed wheelchair ram for Robert.

Miklos explained how the ramp came about. In partnership with the Center of Hope, The Summit has participated in Camp Hope each each of the past 12 years in the Yes community. About two summers

but the onset of COVID 19 pushed back the plans and preparation for a ramp. Because of the slope, the ramp was going to be challenging.

Craig Brown was retired from a business of designing specialty staircases, and he designed the ramp. The original plan was that volunteers from The Summit would build the ramp in pieces behind their church, but then Miklos had health issues that prevented that from happening.

Miklos took to social media to see if he could find someone to build the ramp, but this was during the post-COVID building boom and he couldn't find any takers.

"And so it wasn't until construction kind of took a burp earlier this year that I saw Joshua Hope recommended for something. He was the first one I called," Miklos said. "What better name to have! He's a neat guy Christian."

that Angel's eagerness for growing and learning as a student and a person is evident each day in her classroom."



Capital Highlights **State sends resources** to Florida

Texas has deployed state resources to Florida to assist in response and recovery efforts in the aftermath of the devastation caused last week by Hurricane Ian, one of the most powerful storms to hit the

United States in the past decade.

"Texans understand the urgency of hurricane disaster response and recovery efforts, and our state is swiftly sending more support and resources to Florida as they continue responding to Hurricane Ian," Gov. Greg Abbott said.

The Texas Division of Emergency Personnel has sent more than 80 people to Florida, including nearly two dozen firefighters. In addition, more than 1,000 workers from Texas electricity providers were deployed to Florida to assist in restoring power.

Court: Paxton can't prosecute election crimes

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals stuck with an earlier ruling that Attorney General Ken Paxton does not have the power on his own to investigate and prosecute suspected election crimes. The Austin American-Statesman reported the court turned down Paxton's request to reverse a December ruling which struck down a 1985 law giving the attorney general that authority.

That ruling by the court, which consists of all Republicans, said the 1985 law violated the state's separation of powers doctrine, since it gave the attorney general's office, which is in the executive branch, prosecution authority reserved for members of the judicial branch - district and county attorneys.

Paxton sharply criticized the ruling, the Statesman reported.

"The CCA's shameful decision means

the benefits of that moisture have started to wane, and we are, once again, observing dry conditions across the state that are resulting in increased wildfire activity."

Nine out of 10 wildfires in the state are caused by human activity. Residents are urged to wait on conducting any outdoor burning until conditions improve, even if your county is not under a burn ban. A total of 95 Texas counties are still under a burn ban.

New cable barrier saving lives

Motorists on Texas highways likely have noticed the addition of cable barriers along medians that prevent vehicles from

veering into opposite lanes of traffic. Those barriers are saving lives, according to the Texas Department of Transportation.

A review of four TxDOT districts where 130 miles of new cable barriers were installed - in Lufkin, Pharr, Waco and Fort Worth - showed the barriers have been hit and repaired 242 times since 2019.

"I'm going to assume that each of those 242 strikes was a potential fatality had that cable barrier not been there," Commissioner Laura Ryan said.

The agency has completed 88 "Road to Safety" projects in the state, with 120 more now under construction. The efforts seem to have had a beneficial effect, with 84 fewer traffic fatalities reported in Texas from January to August. The state also saw a 9% drop in distracted driving deaths, and an 18% decrease in work zone fatalities.

PUC expands weather prep rules

The Public Utility Commission has expanded weather preparation rules for electricity generators and transmission utilities in hopes of ensuring the reliability of the power grid during summer and winter severe weather events.

"Reliability drives every decision we make when it comes to grid operations," said Public Utility Commission Chairman Peter Lake. "The grid has to be ready for any weather condition, from extreme heat to extreme cold."

Under the new rules, the state is divided into 10 geographically distinct areas in which minimum and maximum temperatures are set under which power generators must prove their ability to continue operating.

Aledo Growth Committee is addressing future needs of the district

A teacher, a preacher, and a lawyer were seated next to each other at a table. At 53 members strong, the Aledo Growth Committee (AGC) is comprised

The I&S tax rate funds selfless large capital improvements for the district and cannot be used for the district's operating expenditures (teacher salaries, utilities, fuel, supplies). Contrary to what some of us thought, our I&S tax rate (\$0.425) is one of the lowest in the area in fastgrowth districts like Aledo ISD.

Wildfires once again on the rise in state

Dry weather and low humidity have once again increased the prevalence of wildfires in multiple areas of the state, after a rainy respite in mid-to-late August. However, the rain has largely left the state once again. Texas A&M Forest Service firefighters responded to nearly 80 wildfires in the past week, with two still active Sunday in Young and Angelina counties. Both were nearly completely contained.

"The 2022 fire season has been significant for the state of Texas, as state and local firefighters have responded to more than 9,800 wildfires," said Wes Moorehead, Texas A&M Forest Service Fire Chief. "The state received beneficial rainfall mid- to late-August, which helped to significantly slow the operational tempo for wildland firefighters. However,

COVID-19 cases continue to drop

The number of new COVID-19 cases reported in Texas during the past week was again down slightly, with 22,006 new cases reported along with 123 deaths, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. The Texas Department of State Health Services reported 1,654 lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations as of Sunday, down slightly from the previous week.

Since the pandemic began in early 2020, the state has reported nearly 8 million confirmed cases and 90,885 deaths. Just under 64% of the state's population is fully vaccinated.

While some coaches might be wary of the distractions of homecoming week, Aledo's Tim Buchanan isn't among them.

"There's not a player out there that wants to lose homecoming," Buchanan said. "Honestly, Senior Night is harder to prepare for. You have to alter your pregame (for all the seniors to be honored). Homecoming, you might have a little longer halftime. Really, homecoming is not that big a distraction."

Knight notches another record in tourney

Former Aledo Ladycat golfer Chevenne Knight now has a pair of records at the Old American Golf Club in The Colony.

In the final round of this past weekend's Ascendant Volunteers of America Classic on the LPGA Tour, Knight posted an 8-under-par 63. It matches the lowest score ever recorded in the tournament and vaulted her from 21st to a tie for fifth in the final standings.

"It was nice to finish the tournament with a great round on Sunday. I feel like I've been playing well as of late - but nice for it to all come together," Knight said.

Knight finished the tournament at 11 under par 273.

Lilia Vu also shot a 63 on the final day but did not finish as high as Knight in the standings. The other 63s shot in the tournament were by Dori Carter in 2017, Stephanie Meadow in 2019,

and Jin Young Ko last year. In her rookie year on the LPGA Tour, Knight won this

tournament in record fashion. She shot an 18-under-par 266 over four days, the lowest score in tournament history. Her rounds were 66, 67, 67, 66 as she became the first female

player from the University of Alabama to win on the LPGA Tour.

"I have a lot of great memories at Old American. I've played the course a lot and the course fits my game well," she said.

In her record-tying round Sunday, Knight made the turn after nine holes at 5-under-par 30. She birdied holes 1-3, along with No. 6 and 8. On the back nine she birdied No. 14, 15 and 17 for a 3-under 33.

Perhaps her best shot of the day, however, was on the final hole. She chipped in to save par and salvage her share of the record.

While she has yet to win a tournament this year, Knight is enjoying a good season on the tour. She has three top-five finishes and two more inside the top 12.

> "I've had a really solid year. Made every cut in all the majors. I've focused on what I need to do to play well. Process over result has been my mentality," Knight said.

After winning back-to-back individual state golf championships for Aledo in 2014-15, Knight went

on to great success at the University of Alabama. She was a three-time All-American and the 2017 Southeast Conference Player of the Year. She, along with the aforementioned Meadow and Camilla Lennarth, are the only Crimson Tide female golfers to earn first-team All-SEC honors three straight years.

Knight finished fourth in her final NCAA Championships for Alabama in 2018, opting to forego her senior year of eligibility and turn pro. She led the Crimson Tide to a runner-up team finish, their highest finish since winning the national title in 2012.

Knight tied for fourth in the NCAA Championships as a freshman and tied for 10th as a sophomore.

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

Bearcats gain confidence after big win against The Colony

Three quick scores in the first quarter set tone for 52-7 win

Confidence.

Beyond just a blow-out win on their home field in front of a capacity crowd, Aledo's young Bearcat football team came away with more confidence following their 52-7 shellacking of the visiting Cougars from The Colony High School on Friday.

"Those first two losses, they were really draining to our confidence," said junior starting quarterback Hauss Hejny. "Our coaches have been working on us about keeping humble; working day-in and day-out; focusing on us and not listening to the outside noise. Being able to rack up some points on this team, who barely lost to Denton Ryan last week, definitely gave us some confidence that we are a good football team, and we can win some big-time games."

Aledo improved to 4-0 in district play with the win over The Colony on Friday night, and 4-2 overall in the 2022 gridiron campaign.

Hejny had one of his personal best performances to date against the visiting Cougars. The young signal-caller completed 75-percent of his passes on the night going 8-of-12 for 267 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

As efficient as he was in the passing game, Hejny was just as effective in the Bearcat rushing attack. He added two rushing touchdowns to his highlight reel on eight carries while amassing 77 yards on the ground.

When asked about the development of his first year starting quarterback, Coach Tim Buchanan said, "Every game he gets better. That's all you can ask of any high school kid, especially a young kid like him. He just continues to get better every game, and you can't ask for anything else."

The Bearcats wasted little time putting The Colony in a bad way. Aledo's defense came out strong forcing the Cougars into an early three-and-out situation on the first possession of the game. A quick sack coupled with a near interception forced The Colony to punt the ball away from their own 20. A botched punt sailed out of bounds at the Cougars 47-yard line giving Aledo a short field in their first possession.

Following an incomplete pass on the first play from scrimmage for the Bearcats, the offense chipped away with small gains the next two plays bringing up a fourth-and-three situation, potentially giving the Cougars the ball back with no damage done.

Aledo's offense stayed on the field, however, attempting to convert the short yardage to keep the drive alive. Hejny took the shotgun snap, faked the handoff on the option before tucking the ball, making his way around the weak side of the defense as his offensive line sealed the edge. From there a couple shifty moves on a pair of would-be tacklers gave him room to run as he scampered across the goal line from 40 yards out to put the Bearcats on the board. Cole Crawford's extra point sailed through the uprights to make it a 7-0 affair less than three minutes into the contest.

Big plays and quick scores were a common theme for the Bearcats

in the first half. On Aledo's ensuing possession Hajny connected with wide receiver Gavin Olenjack on a 33-yard pitch-and-catch that put the Cougar defense on its heels. Eight plays later Davhon Keys found paydirt on a one-yard run that put the home team on top 14-0 with 3:14 left in the first following Crawford's extra point kick.

The third Bearcat possession of the night lasted just 14 seconds, but ended the same as the first two. A wide receiver screen pass to Jalen Pope from Aledo's own 33-yard line ended up going all the way after he broke a pair of tackles along the visiting sideline. A foot race ensued with Pope crossing the goal line ahead of a swarm of Cougar defenders for the third Bearcat touchdown of the night.

The Bearcats kept the pedal to the metal in the second quarter as they added three more scores before the end of the first half.

When play resumed in the Kaydon Finley made a gorgeous second half Hejny and Finley connected on one more big play that


