DEA urges parents to be cautious

This October and through the Fall Festivals and Halloween Festivities, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), and the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) is teaming up with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service's Watch UR BAC program to spread awareness on the fentanyl epidemic spreading across our state.

The Drug Enforcement Administration warns the public of the alarming increase in the lethality and availability of fake prescription pills containing fentanyl and methamphetamine. International and domestic criminal drug networks are mass-producing fake pills, falsely marketing them as legitimate prescription pills, and killing unsuspecting Texans. These counterfeit pills are easy to purchase, widely available, and often contain deadly doses of fentanyl. Pills purchased outside of a licensed pharmacy are illegal, dangerous, and potentially lethal. These risks include overdose, forming new addictions, and traffic related crashes due to impairment.

Over the Halloween holiday and festivities, it is especially important that parents stay informed on this epidemic. One of these most prevalent trends currently involves rainbow-colored pills that have been laced with fentanyl and designed to attract younger kids.

We know friends and families will be especially excited

The U.S. Drug Enforcement Association (DEA) is urging parents to be aware of rainbow fentanyl, a deathly opioid that drug traffickers are using to "drive addiction amongst kids and young adults," DEA administrator Anne Milgram said in a statement. Rainbow fentanyl is a drug in the form of a pill or powder that is brightly colored to look like candy and appeal to children and young people. Rainbow fentanyl is also being produced in blocks that resemble sidewalk chalk. This is dangerous as a child could

"She influenced me when she was supposed to be influencing my daughter," Barron said with a laugh.

Upbringing

Leta never misses an opportunity to reflect on her upbringing and the structured environment that she has often said helped make her the success she became. She recalled how every day she and her sisters had to pull 50 pounds of cotton before dinner.

"My basketball girls can never complain about how hard I worked them," she said, then reflecting on a time when

<u>Capital Highlights</u> Early voting begins Oct. 24

Early voting in the Nov. 8 general election begins Oct. 24 and runs through Nov. 4. Applications for voting by mail must be received by Oct. 28, according to the secretary of state's office.

Texans are eligible to vote by mail if they are 65 or older; sick or disabled; are expected to give birth within three weeks of Election Day; will be absent from the county where they vote during early voting and on Election Day; or are in jail but otherwise eligible.

If voting by mail, Texans are urged to carefully read the instructions before putting their ballot in the mail. More than 12% of mail-in ballots were rejected in the March primary for not complying with tighter voting regulations enacted in the last legislative session, according to kut.org.

Meanwhile, the latest poll shows the race between Gov. Greg Abbott and Beto O' Rourke



has tightened since the Sept. 30 debate between the two, the Corpus Christi Caller Times reported. The latest poll by Marist College shows Abbott's lead has dropped to four

percentage points.

As the race hits the homestretch, O' Rourke reports having slightly more cash on hand in the latest threemonth reporting period, which ended Sept. 29. He also out-raised Abbott by a slight margin during the same period.

EPA sued over pollution from Texas coal plants

plants are meeting approved emission standards.

The Austin American-Statesman reported the suit was filed last week after the EPA missed a deadline to stop the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality from exempting the coal plants from regulations limiting particulate matter emissions.

An attorney with one of the groups, the Environmental Integrity Project, said the groups have been challenging the TCEQ exemptions since 2010.

"Essentially, Texas has these emission limits for particulate matter," Clark-Leach told the American-Statesman. "Particulate matter is soot, it's the black stuff you see coming out of smokestacks. It's a bad idea if you've got people living nearby to emit in excess of those limits."

The EPA's website says that exposure to particulate matter can be harmful and is linked to lung and heart issues. Since being exempted by TCEQ in 2010, the plants have increased emissions as much as 33-fold. However, four of the plants have in recent years either switched to natural gas or shut down completely.

Drought conditions expected to return

A warmer and drier September and the continued presence of La Nina conditions mean drought conditions are likely to return to the parts of Texas that got some relief in August, according to Dr. Mark Wentzel, a hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board.

At the end of September, drought conditions covered 61% of the state, Wentzel wrote, which was down 15 percentage points from the end of August.

However, the National Weather Service expects a third straight fall and winter of La Niña conditions, meaning below-average rain and above-average temperatures across Texas during the fall and early winter. Those conditions are expected to

they were late to a game because they had to finish work first.

"He (the coach) knew we weren't out getting in trouble, that we were working," she said.

Before she was a coach, Leta was an outstanding basketball player. In back-to-back years (1953-54 and 1954-55) she led the Granbury Lady Pirates to a berth in the state championship game.

She credits much of her playing ability to her father putting up a basketball goal - and where he put it.

"He put it up in the chicken pen. It made all of us good rebounders," she said, drawing a laugh from the crowd.

Along with being a great coach, Leta was a great English teacher. She was named the Walt Disney National Teacher of the Year in 1993.

One of her pet peeves as a teacher? Reciting the pledge of allegiance.

"Don't pause after 'One nation.' People will say 'One nation,' take a deep breath, but that's not right," she explained. "You say it straight through, One nation under God, with no pause."

Before becoming a teacher, Leta was a counselor, a trait she carried throughout her career, helping her players learn much more than making baskets. She recalled the moment she decided to move from that to teaching, when she told a young girl her father loved her. with a cheery, "Hello Rick! You bet, I can talk about Leta for a week." And indeed we did proceed to

have a lengthy conversation about one of both of our favorite persons.

"He wouldn't say, 'Have a good day.' He'd say, 'You go make it a good day," Leta said was part of her favorite memories of Wooden. "I taught that to all my students. You have to work at it."

She spoke almost in tears of her late husband David, who passed away in 2018 after 62 years of marriage. Together they raised three daughters who went on to great success of their own. Daughter Linda is also a retired high school basketball coach who is alongside her mother in the Texas High School Basketball Hall of Fame.

"He (David) was one of the best people on God's green earth. He was a really good administrator because he was so kind," Leta said. "He'd never raise his voice to a teacher."

And when it came to her retiring, she recalled this conversation with him.

"I told David if we get beat today I'm going to hang it up. He said, 'Let me get a piece of paper and write this down," she remembered with a chuckle.

Always finding humor

Leta has always known how to

the previously mentioned Wooden to Dr. Ben Carson to all-time great former University of Tennessee women's basketball coach the late Pat Summitt and many more.

Leta reminisced on some advice from Summitt, who spent her latter days battling Alzheimer's.

"Take coconut oil. You may not like coconut oil, but hold your nose and take it," Leta said, adding in her typical fashion with a laugh. "I'd go eat cow manure if it would help."

Possible movie

As the interview neared a close, Leta revealed news of a possible movie about her life. She said possible leads are Oscar winners Sandra Bullock as her (though Bullock is thinking of retiring to spend more time with her children) and Matthew McConaughey as David.

Personally, should Bullock withdraw, I could see Jessica Chastain in the role of Leta.


Leta said a group came down from Oklahoma City and did some preliminary shooting. "They told me I need to get an entertainment lawyer," she said.

Leta is already the subject of a major documentary film titled "It's All in the Game: The Leta Andrews Story." It's narrated by Hall of Famer Bill Walton.

Leta said the girl lifted her skirt to show the top of her legs, which were battered and bruised, saying, "Mrs. Andrews, you call that love?"

"These kids tell everything to teachers, so you'd better be careful around the house," Leta said. "Being kind isn't always easy or convenient, but it has the ability to change everything."

Legendary friends

Leta was great friends with another legend, the late UCLA men's basketball coach John Wooden. I had heard that he screened all his calls — which I found to be true. However, when I was leaving a message, all I had to say was that I was calling about Leta. Immediately, he picked up shock folks also. She recalled one time when she was driving the team bus back from Fort Worth and they passed through Whiskey Flats (aka Wheatland) on Highway 377.

Leta pulled the bus over next to a topless bar to the surprise of the team. When one of the girls asked why, Leta said with a straight face, "I don't have any Christmas money. I'm going to go in and work here for a little bit."

While she didn't go in, she did hide out for a few minutes, continuing the joke.

"The next day girls were saying, 'Mrs. Andrews worked at this topless bar," which, of course, Leta quickly clarified, noting the joke was actually on her.

Friends everywhere

Mention Leta's name anywhere in this big ol' United States and odds are someone has met her or knows of her reputation. She's good friends with so many, from it first screened — in Granbury, of course.

In overtime

As for what lies ahead, expect Leta to keep inspiring and entertaining. As she told a coach in the audience who asked, she does not watch games thinking she might have called a play better — but she does catch as many Granbury Lady Pirate games as she can.

Her grandson Sawyer, who is now a freshman at the University of Texas, gave her inspiration when he was younger that she said she is now seeing to fruition. After asking her about how long she expects to live, he told her, "Don't worry grandmother, you'll go into overtime."

"I guess I've gone into overtime," Leta said.

And here's hoping it's still a long time before the final buzzer sounds.

easily mistake this fentanyl block for a piece of sidewalk chalk.

Ahead of Halloween, local authorities are warning parents to keep a close eye on trick-or-treat baskets, as just two milligrams of fentanyl, which is equal to 10-15 grains of table salt, is considered a lethal dose, per the DEA. Any candy-looking substance will get a lot of attention as Halloween nears, so parents should be on the lookout and kids should be reminded never to eat unpackaged candy without having parents inspect it first.

The bottom line is this: Never accept any candy, pills, or other substances you believe to be tampered with or laced with fentanyl because One Pill Can Kill!

Avian flu shows up in backyard poultry flock

The highly contagious avian influenza was recently detected in a backyard poultry flock in Dallas County, prompting health experts to recommend owners of domestic birds to limit all unnecessary contact with wild birds. The virus is easily transmitted not just by actual contact but through contaminated equipment, clothing, and even shoes of caretakers.

Symptoms include diarrhea, incoordination, lethargy, coughing, sneezing and sudden death, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Game bird hunters are urged to wear gloves when disposing of carcasses, and disinfecting tools with a bleach solution. Those who find birds who have signs consistent with avian influenza should contact

COVID-19 cases drop sightly





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

Aledo traveling to anticipated game against Denton Ryan

Game circled on calendars for months

In February, when the University Interscholastic League did its biennial realignment and placed powerhouses Aledo and Denton Ryan in the same football district, the date Oct. 21 was immediately circled on a lot of calendars.

And now that date is almost here as the Bearcats travel to Denton to face the Raiders in the long-antici-

pated showdown that could decide the District 3-5A Division I championship. If Aledo wins, the Bearcats clinch the top seed in the league. If Ryan wins, the district will likely end in a three-way tie and seeding for the postseason will be determined by a tiebreaker.

"Big and fast," was Aledo coach Tim Buchanan's response when asked to describe Ryan. "And they are very big and very fast. Our kids ran against them in track last season, they know exactly what those guys are capable of.

"We saw them up close. You don't try to outrun them."

Head-to-head-to-head

One way some folks are quick to measure competition is by common opponents. In this case, Ryan lost 23-16 at Burleson Centennial on Oct.

7 and Aledo won 64-21 at Centennial this past Friday.

However, in the game against Centennial, Raiders quarterback K.M. Davis left early in the game with an injury and star running back Kalib Hicks likewise got injured. Early indications are that Davis will play this week, while Hicks is doubtful.

Tie-breaking procedure

Buchanan said the district's tie-breaking procedure is based on points system capped at 18 points. So, as it stands currently, Aledo leads

> with a plus-18 based on its lopsided win at Centennial. Centennial is second at plus-7 with its win over Rvan and Ryan is at zero.

Therefore, Ryan would have to defeat Aledo by 18 points to move into a tie in

the points system. If that happens, Ryan will be the No. 1 seed by virtue of their head-to-head victory against the Bearcats.

Of course, as mentioned previously, a Bearcats victory makes it all a moot point. It would also secure a 15th consecutive district championship for Aledo.

Record streak once again on line

The Bearcats have won 109 consecutive district games dating to the 2007 season. While many thought the streak was in jeopardy last week

in Burleson, the Bearcats made short work of Centennial.

Now, the streak will once again be challenged against Ryan, which had its own 62-game district winning streak ended the week before last by Centennial.

Rare deficit

It's rare that an opponent has a winning record against the Bearcats, but Ryan does. In fact, the Bearcats have not beaten the Raiders.

Now, the teams have only played twice, and both were playoff meetings. Ryan defeated Aledo 34-27 in the 2002 state quarterfinals en route to a state championship. They repeated the accomplishment a year later, winning 17-0, on their way to a state runner-up finish.

There's a real possibility the two could wind up meeting twice this season as both are expected to make deep playoff runs and would be in the same bracket.

Teams of the decade and more

The Bearcats and Raiders have combined for a 347-42 record since 2009, the season the Bearcats moved into a completely different stratosphere from -- though they were pretty darned good already, including a state championship in 1998.

Since 2009 Aledo has a record of 190-14, including this season. They've won nine state titles in that span and finished second another time.

In that same span, Ryan is 155-28 with a state championship in 2020.

In all, the teams have combined for 13 state championships (Aledo 10, Ryan 3) and 19 state finals appearances (Aledo 12, Ryan 7) in their history.

State rankings

The Bearcats moved up another spot to No. 4 in Class 5A Division I in this week's state rankings from Dave Campbell's Texas Football. Also, MaxPreps has the Bearcats No.



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

Domination with a capital D!

Bearcats make short work of Spartans in district showdown **By Rick Mauch**

Hauss Hejny passed the biggest test of his career as Aledo's starting quarterback in dominating fashion.

He also ran past defenders like they were statues in leading the Bearcats to a 64-21 thrashing of previously unbeaten Burleson

Centennial on the Spartan's own turf Friday night.

Hejny was involved in an unofficial 444 yards of offense, along with six touchdowns. He completed 12 of 13 passes for 269 yards and four TD while rushing 12 times for 175 yards and two more scores.

"He made some plays a lot of other quarterbacks couldn't make," Aledo head coach Tim Buchanan said of Hejny, a junior who moved from receiver this season and won the starting job.

With the win, the Bearcats are alone atop the District 3-5A Division I standings with a 6-0 record (6-2 overall). They came into the game ranked third in the state by MaxPreps and fifth by Dave Campbell's.

Centennial is now 4-1 in district (6-1 overall). The Spartans were fourth in MaxPreps and sixth in Dave Campbell's.

Aledo now travels to Denton Ryan (4-1 district, 4-2 overall) Friday, Oct. 21, where a victory would wrap up the league's top seed for the postseason. The Bearcats have already clinched a playoff berth for a 26th consecutive season.

A Ryan victory would likely throw the final district standings

into a three-way tie as Centennial defeated the Raiders in Burleson on Oct. 7. However, based on their margin of victory against the Spartans, the Bearcats are in good shape to win such a tie barring a blowout loss to Ryan.

Aledo scored on nine of

12 possessions. The Bearcats' longest scoring drive was six plays, the game's first possession, which was capped by a 43-yard touchdown pass from Hejny to Jalen Pope, who caught seven passes for 111 yards.

"This whole year we have just gotten better and better. We knew we were underdogs, but we were extremely confident that if we just focused on what we can control and stayed disciplined we could beat this team," Hejny said. "I am surprised we hung 64 on them. I thought it was going to be a four-quarter game."

Then he added of the upcoming trip to Ryan, "We're just going to keep that same mindset. We can't underestimate what they're capable of."

The Bearcats will take a state-record 109-game district winning streak into Denton. Hejny and none of the other Bearcats were even in school yet when Aledo last lost a league contest in 2007.

The other Bearcat scoring drives against Centennial, in order, were:

- Two plays, 17 seconds, a 75-yard run by Hejny.
- Five plays, 2:14, 32-yard pass from Hejny to J. Pope.
- Two plays, 14 seconds, 52-yard run by Hejny.
- One play, nine seconds, 47-yard pass from Hejny to Gavin Olenjack.

- Two plays, 43 seconds, 76-yard pass from Hejny to Olenjack.
- Three plays, 1:25, 16-yard run by Dahvon Keys.
- Five plays, 1:48, 7-yard run by Hawk Patrick-Daniels.
- Three plays, 1:58, 14-yard run by Ryan Cox.

The Bearcats had the ball for little more than 17 minutes, while Centennial had it for a little less than 31 minutes.

Hejny also connected with J. Pope on a two-point conversion, while Boston Epley hit Carson Dempsey with a two-point pass. Cole Crawford was true on six of seven extra-point kicks.

The game turned in the second quarter as the Bearcats defense limited the Spartans offense to 10 yards and no points while amassing 146 yards and two scores for a 28-14 halftime lead. The Spartans had run almost at will on their first two possessions, scoring on both as they utilized the triple-option to perfection with 14 running plays and a single pass.


"Our guys got used to the speed of the game," Buchanan said. "We took the quarterback away. (Ansel) Din-Mbuh, (Bryon) Wheeler and the defensive line totally dominated."

After gaining 141 yards in the first quarter, the Spartans were limited to 167 for the final three.

The Bearcats defense registered two sacks and 10 tackles for loss. A key sack came late in the first half with the Spartans down 21-14 and attempting a pass on fourth-and-11 at the Aledo 32. It resulted in a 16-yard loss that set the Bearcats up at their own 48, after which Hejny broke loose for his second long touchdown two plays later.

"That's when we really started playing with more confidence," Buchanan said. "That was a huge sequence."

The Bearcats also forced three fumbles, recovering two and turning both into touchdowns. Special teams also capitalized on a kickoff that bounced among several Spartans and was not Turn to FOOTBALL, page B7

Third-down conversions critical

The Bearcats have had success converting third downs this season. For example, they were 3-for-5 at Centennial.

"That's key to winning. It's frustrating to an opponent and you control the ball," Buchanan said. "And you keep your defense from staying on the field so much."

In contrast, Aledo has done a good job of holding opponents on third and fourth downs. Centennial was 5-for-13 on third down and 1-for-3 on fourth downs.
