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New highend golf community planned on Kelly Road

Avanzada Golf & Ranch Club part of larger master-planned community

Last week Avanzada Golf & Ranch Club announced the development of a new 1,100-acre high-end golf community at the intersection of Hwy. 377 and Kelly Road in Parker County.

The new golf course community is being referred to as the "crown jewel" of the larger 2,400-acre master-planned Kelly Ranch Estates.

The entire development lies within the boundary of the Aledo ISD.

Avanzada's founder is PGA Tour veteran JJ Henry, who will work with award-winning golf course architect Jim Lipe, considered one of the best golf course architects in the industry. Henry's inspiration for the name "Avanzada" came from the history of Fort Worth, once known as "Trinity Outpost." "Avanzada" is the Spanish word for "outpost."

Henry's partner in Avanzada is Fort Worth native and developer Bubba Vann. Vann, like Henry, is a TCU graduate and successful entrepreneur and developer of the renowned South Padre Island Golf Club.

Both men feel in a sense that they are coming home.

"I went to school here at TCU in the mid '90s — I started here in '93," Henry said. "I worked my way up; I was a college player of the year in '98. And in essence for the last 25 years I've been playing in the PGA Tour."

Henry met his wife at school, and they live locally.

"I'm a little bit in that transition — I'll be 48 in April, and these guys are getting younger and I'm getting older. For the latter part of 25 years, I've basically been a part of these these high-end golf communities, golf courses, clubhouses, amenities, and I just thought at some point, it'd be really nice, with the right group and the vision and the attention to detail, to be able to create that vision with the right team in place. Avanzada will allow me to incorporate the best things I have seen and experienced during my PGA Tour career."

Henry has a team of experienced professionals to bring the vision to reality, beginning with Vann, who still owns South Padre Island Golf Club, but who is also happy to return to the area. Vann played golf at the

Latest starship in animated series named for the city

Local Star Trekkers were thrilled to learn that Aledo has now entered the Star Trek Universe via the latest fully-automated Starfleet ship in the new Texas Class, the U.S.S. Aledo. The Aledo was unveiled on Oct. 20, when "Trusted Sources," the ninth episode of season three of *Star Trek: Lower Decks* was streamed on Paramount+.

Lower Decks is one of the latest Star Trek series, and the first animated series in the franchise since the 1970s. It is also the first Star Trek series classified as a comedy. It follows the adventures of the low-ranking

crew of the Starship Cerritos, a California Class ship.

The series began in 2020 and has received numerous award nominations, including one Primetime Emmy nomination. It is among the IMDbPro Top 200 Most Popular TV Titles 2020-2021, and recently Paramount+announced a fourth season is in the works.

Aledo Growth Committee welcomes public to upcoming meeting

Aledo continues to be a community experiencing rapid growth. One of the key issues a growing community inevitably faces is ensuring the local school district can stay out in front of the growth to keep schools from becoming overwhelmed by the perpetual influx of new students.

With that in mind, the Aledo Growth Committee has met nearly a dozen times since its inception in August. The committee has spent more than 25 hours studying data related to enrollment trends within the district, facility needs, instructional priorities, and the district's financial standing just to name a few topics of discussion.

Now, the committee is prepared to host the community at meetings on Dec. 6 and Dec. 8. Both meetings will be at the Aledo ISD Administration Building. The meetings will begin at 5:30 both nights.

"Our goal is to give a short presentation to the community members who want to come to show the progress and the work of the committee to date," said AGC co-chair Dan Reilley. "Then to facilitate some small group discussions with members of the committee clustered with members of the community to ask what other information they need and what ideas do they have?"

The committee plans to meet once more prior to opening the doors to the community in order to line out the framework of the Dec. 6 and 8 meetings. Reilley mentioned the committee plans to walk the members of the community through a brief presentation to ensure everyone in attendance is up to speed on all the pertinent data the committee has worked with.

"It is imperative for the community to be engaged and informed on our growth and how we best answer that growth," Reilley said.

The committee, comprised of more than 50 members of the Aledo community, with the help of various experts brought in to aid the committee in making the most informed decisions possible, have identified several needs Aledo ISD will face in the near future.

"Right now, I would tell you that the consensus of our committee is, our first need in the immediate future is more capacity at the elementary

But what was the inspiration for the U.S.S. Aledo?

The writer of the episode, Ben M. Waller, answered that question.

Waller, who has been with the series since its inception, was the moving force behind the name.

"At the start of season three, we knew that we wanted to be building towards the reveal of like a Texas Class of ships," Waller told *The Community News.* "The philosophy behind the ships in our show is the ships that might have been overlooked by the big flashier ships in Starfleet like the Enterprises and the Voyagers."

In the California Class of ships that originally populated the series, Waller said ships named after other California cities (in addition to Cerritos) have moved in and out of the show.

"But we knew we wanted to have a Texas class. And at the beginning of every season, our showrunner Mike McMahon will decide who's going to do which episode. So he'll say, 'you you write this episode, you write this episode,' and he assigns them at the beginning."

All the writers then work together to come up with story lines for each episode.

"At the start of season three, with the Texas class coming out, I immediately knew what city I'd name it, why I'd name it that, and I just prayed that I would get assigned the episode where the Texas class flagship was finally revealed, because I wanted it to be the Aledo," Waller said. "I was assigned the ninth episode. And as I was watching everyone start to write their episodes, I was reading the drafts as

they came in. And I was like, 'please don't reveal the ship, please don't reveal the ship.' And we finally got to my episode, and we started to talk."

McMahon decided Waller's episode would be the one to reveal the

"So I went home. I wrote it up, I threw the Aledo references in there as much as I could,

there as much as I could, because my wife and her family are actually from Aledo and I wanted to include it as a little bit of a heartfelt tribute to them."

Waller's wife is Vicky Papa, who graduated from Aledo High School in 2003.

Waller's inclusion of Aledo references in his episode was not yet a done deal, however.

McMahon liked Waller's draft, "but the thing with writing TV is it goes through about 100 people before it finally gets to the air," Waller said. "And the whole

time I'm thinking, 'I don't know if they're going to know Aledo or I don't know if it's going to fit what they're looking for in terms of the philosophy behind the way we name our ships.' And every time it went to a new draft, I kept checking them

because there'd be the producer's draft, the studio draft, the network draft, the first animatic drafts, so on and so forth.

"Because it's animation, it just keeps getting revised every time and every time the Aledo name was in there. And I was so glad that when we finally went to sound mix, I got to go to Warner Brothers Studios and sit on the scoring stage there to watch them add the music in. And the Aledo name was still on the ship at that point. So I was like, 'I did it! My wife knew about it, but her extended family didn't know and so when the episode came out, it was it was a pretty nice moment for for me to pull that off."

In addition to Star Trek: Lower Decks, Waller's writing credits include the TV series Relationship Goals and RocketJump: The Show.

Waller grew up in Florida.

I think I started writing because I wasn't that great at anything else," he said. "I always pursued TV and film in high school. I learned that all the televisions in the high school were networked to one DVD player. So as long as I burned something

onto a DVD, I could make sure every TV saw it. And I kind of became like my own news network."

Waller spent a year of high school programming his news show.

"That just sparked a real interest in me for it. And I went out to Los Angeles to USC, in the film school there. And once I graduated, I already had a few jobs. And I just kept at it until I finally could become a writer for television. That was always the goal."

He started on YouTube and made a new video every week. YouTube wasn't mainstream back in 2011, but he had good success.

Waller then made one of the first original series for Netflix.

"And then I just knew that there was a ceiling there. And so I made the jump over to television, and I just didn't look back," he said.

The U.S.S. Aledo's overall appearance on the series was brief, but in the Star Trek universe, nothing is final.

school level," Reilley stated. "We knew that during the last bond. The projections back then were showing that elementary school number seven would more than likely need to be on the ground by 2025. The newest demographic projections confirm that."

While the committee has met several times leading up to the open meetings next week, Reilley stressed the importance of community feedback and ideas before the committee moves forward with its recommendation to

the Board of Trustees.

"Our goal on Monday is to come up with some sort of framework – we might not have a complete package built – but at least our priority list

will be identified with some loose numbers associated with that," said Reilley. "Then we can go to the community and say, 'Here's what we've been working on. Here's the process we took. Here's the demographic information. Here's where we're leaning. What are your thoughts? What are we missing? Is there anything else we need to consider before we go to the Board with a recommendation in February?"

Following the community meetings in December, the committee will meet two to three times in January if necessary to finalize its recommendations for the Board of Trustees. The first recommendation the AGC plans to present to the board is a long-

range facility master plan to meet the ISD's enrollment needs for the future. The second recommendation will be a bond proposal for a potential special election in the spring.

Trustees approve purchase process for 19 acres on Champions Drive

The Aledo ISD Board of Trustees unanimously voted to empower Superintendent Dr. Susan Bohn to enter into a contract to purchase about 19.5 acres of land on Champions Drive at a special meeting on Monday, Nov. 28.

The land is on the west side

of Champions Drive and stretches from Bailey Ranch Road to Buchanan Drive.

According to background information presented to the board, the school district made an offer on the property, stating "The District is

stating "The District is currently seeking real property sites within the district to purchase for future school facilities."

"The Administration has determined that it is in the best interest of the District to purchase the tract," Bohn said at the special school board meeting.

The property is adjacent to the property that contains Aledo High School and the Don R. Daniel Ninth Grade Campus.

"Aledo ISD is working to purchase the Bailey Ranch 19.5acre property to provide the district options as we

plan for future growth," Superintendent Dr. Susan Bohn told *The Community News*. "Since it is contiguous to our current property and can be accessed via the marquee drive east of Daniel Ninth Grade

Campus and also via Champions drive, it offers us flexibility for future facilities."


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
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

D3 level before transferring to TCU, and later moved into real estate. He worked alongside Landmark, which built some of the premiere golf courses in the country.

"I started out as a home builder working alongside them and learned the business and then I was able to become the developer of South Padre Island Golf Club, which I still own today," Vann said. "And so when JJ and I started talking about two and a half years ago, I moved my family up here. I always wanted to get back to Fort Worth being a TCU grad. And so we put our heads together."

Vann said he had a great deal of admiration for Henry.

"When I was blowing and going early in my career in 2006, this guy was playing on a Ryder Cup, you know, best 12 Americans in the world. And so obviously somebody that I held in highest regard being a golfer, the way he always lived his life and his character, and so we decided to put this together. We searched high and low to find the right piece of dir, and I like to think that God designed this golf course."

Course designer Lipe is a longtime Jack Nicklaus associate whose task will be to design a golf course that challenges the better golfers while also providing an enjoyable experience for beginners.

"The property at Avanzada will allow Jim and me to design a great golf course, one of the best in Texas," Henry said. "As a famous architect once said, 'The best golf courses are built by God.' Avanzada has been blessed with mature hardwoods, 200 feet of elevation changes, rolling hills, long views, and half a mile of water frontage from Bear Creek. I am excited to bring my vision for golf and a new healthy lifestyle community to Parker County. I look for-

ward to making Avanzada my new home."

Additionally, Mike Sheridan, who has also worked with Nicklaus, will be involved from the master-plan point of view. Also

involved in the project are private banker Gilbert Little, and Justin Hammond and Gilbert Eagle, who will handle the real estate side.

The Big Picture

Avanzada Golf & Ranch club rests within the heart of the new Kelly Ranch development. The 2,400-acre master-planned development will encompass three new communities, Rio Vista at Kelly Ranch, La Dorada at Kelly Ranch, and Avanzada Golf & Ranch Club.

Lots in the 100-acre Rio Vista Phase I are already being developed.

Kelly Ranch will also take advantage of nearly 1.5 miles of Highway 377 frontage with luxury retail

shopping, restaurants, and entertainment with its 65 acre "Shops at Avanzada" development. Along with the resort feel brought by retail shopping and a champion golf course, Kelly Ranch will feature all of the necessary development needed for a day-to-day life. New grocery store, medical office buildings, Aledo ISD school sites, and class A business offices will be located along the eastern most border of the development at the cross roads of Highway 377 and Kelly Road.

The residential portion of Avanzada will be a high-end gated community. Dirt will start turning on the residential portion in January, and the golf course will begin work in late spring, with a target date of fall 2024 to begin golfing.

Vann said the first step is to cut the lanes for the fairways.

"We need to make sure the golf course fits the way we want. We took this piece of property, we found the best 18 golf holes, and then we built around them," Vann said of the course plans. "A lot of guys are like, 'oh, we got to cram it in over here.' We took the best 18 golf holes - it's about the golf. Golf is the flagship service."

"This won't be a golf course where you're worried about hitting into somebody's back yard," Henry added. "The setbacks for both the golf course and the home sites are such where we probably won't have a single out of bounds on the entire course."

Henry painted a picture of his vision for the course and home sites.

"The unique thing, if you're familiar with Bear Creek, is in spots it goes up to 50 feet wide, beautiful limestone cliff lines that get up, six, seven stories high in points. So, to catalog that unique feature from a golf perspective here in our area is something that we're excited to be able to work into the the architecture and the the layout of the golf course," Henry said. "The golf course footprint itself will be down low in and around the creek among a lot of the hardwoods. We have almost 200 feet elevation change from our western boundary down to Bear Creek — some beautiful vistas of even downtown Fort Worth — we'll

have a lot of those long Texas views and you'll have the real estate up high, the golf down low so you'll have a lot of unique features."

Lots will begin at \$290,000 and go to about \$850,000 in the first phase, but later phases will have lots priced at up to \$2.5 million.

Community atmosphere

Henry and Vann said they value family. Henry's first exposure to golf was being a caddy for his dad, and his son was his caddy at one point on the PGA tour.

His son has turned out to be quite a golfer himself, and will go to the university of Oklahoma next year on a golf scholarship.

"The great thing about golf, the great thing about community and the uniqueness is all the honesty, the integrity, the sportsmanship," Henry said. "We want this to be a center spot and a place in town that everybody can be proud of and say 'hey, yeah, that's part of our town — that's part of our community."

"Golf is a big part of my family as well. My wife played college golf at the University of Texas," Vann said. "I'm in the golf business. "We're passionate about the game, and about building something that we'll be proud to play."

Both men plan to have homes in the Avanzada community.

The annual Marcia Walters Memorial Thanksgiving Trot again saw more than 1,000 people turn out on a drizzly Thanksgiving morning to bring sunshine to a local family.

The annual one mile and 5K runs raised a record \$109,000 for the LeBaron family of Aledo.

Carter LeBaron, 13, is being treated for T-cell acute lymphoblastic leukemia, and funds raised will help with hospital and medical expenses, and supplement lost income.

The Nov. 24 race was the 11th annual such event that has helped local families who are experiencing catastrophic medical crises.

Changes urged in funding community colleges

A report submitted to state leaders ahead of the 88th legislative session's opening in January urges lawmakers to develop "an innovative new model" to fund community colleges.

The Texas Commission on Community College Finance, established last year by the Legislature and consisting of 12 lawmakers, business leaders, and community college leaders, offered three sets of recommendations for supporting the state's strategic plan for higher education:

- Reward community colleges for positive student outcomes
- Increase affordability and financial aid
- Increase capacity at colleges to meet changing workforce

"We need a funding model for our 50 community college districts that is bold, strategic, and fully aligned with our emerging workforce needs," said Woody Hunt, a member of the commission and longtime business leader.


The commission also recommended the state make community colleges more affordable by increasing financial aid provided by the state, more aid for dual-credit courses, and supporting work-based educational opportunities, such as internships and apprenticeships.

Under the state's current system for funding community colleges, most revenue comes from tuition and property taxes levied by the college district. The state also contributes some funding.

New power grid market draws skeptics

The state Public Utility Commission is proposing an untested structure for the state's power grid after legislators ordered its overhaul in the wake of the 2021 winter storm. The Dallas Morning *News* reported the proposed

"performance credit mechanism," or PCM, "offers power producers a financial reward to have their plants available during times when Texans are consuming the most energy."

The federal government has approved a request by Gov. Greg Abbott for disaster aid for a dozen Northeast Texas counties hit by severe weather and tornadoes earlier this month.

The U.S. Small Business Administration granted access to its loan program to businesses and residents in Lamar, Morris, Bowie, Camp, Cass, Delta, Fannin, Franklin, Marion, Red River, Titus, and Upshur

"Northeast Texas residents and business owners will now have access to critical financial support as they rebuild, repair, and recover from the physical damage and economic injury caused by this storm system," Abbott said.

Search and rescue drone program proves useful

wardens with the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department has helped to find two missing persons recently and assisted in the arrest of a man in East Texas wanted in a shooting and assault. Game warden Michael Hummert responded to a report of an elderly man who had gone missing the night of Nov. 3.

"The setting sun prevented us from locating him through usual means," Hummert said. "The thermal drone picks up body heat, which is necessary to locate someone at night. With the cold creeping in, it was imperative to find him quickly."

The Erath County sheriff's department used cell phone

> records to determine a general location. Hummert mapped out a search area and located the man with the drone using a thermal scan and led to deputies to the location. A similar

situation occurred nine days later in Bell County. Hummert again used his drone to locate the missing person.

Heading farther east, another TPWD drone operator, Doug Williams, was called to assist authorities searching for a suspect who shot at and assaulted two people, then fled into the woods. Using another thermal drone, Williams found the suspect hiding in the brush during freezing weather. He was arrested and later treated for hypothermia.

"Empowering our division with the drone program in cooperation with Gear Up for Game Wardens donations creates a lifeline where there wasn't," said TPWD's Lt. Matthew Bridgefarmer. "Game warden drone operators arrive first on scene to locate lost boaters and hikers. We search in the aftermath of natural disasters. At the end of the day, this program saves lives."

No COVID-19 vaccine mandates for students


Abbott has told the Texas Education Agency and school superintendents that the COVID-19 vaccine cannot be mandated as part of school entry requirements. This overrides a recommendation from the Centers for Disease Control that added the vaccine to immunization schedules for adults and school-aged children.

"Regardless of what the CDC may suggest, in Texas, the COVID-19 vaccine remains vol-The use of drones by game untary. Texas schools shall not require students to receive the COVID-19 vaccine for any reason," Abbott's letter to TEA and school chiefs said.

COVID-19 cases decrease across state

The number of new cases of COVID-19 reported in Texas during the past week dropped to 9,836, with 40 deaths reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. Hospitalizations rose to 1,259 lab-confirmed COVID-19 patients in Texas, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.



Bearcats, Spartans meet for another round

It's been a month and a half since the Aledo Bearcats went into Burleson and spanked the Centennial Spartans 64-21.

That is the lone loss on the Spartans' (12-1) otherwise perfect season, the best season in program history, to be exact. That win, followed by a 35-21 win at Denton Ryan the following week on Oct. 21 propelled the Bearcats (11-2) to their 15th consecutive district championship.

Now, in order to continue their quest for an 11th state championship, the Bearcats are going to have to defeat the Spartans again, this time on neutral ground Saturday at 2 p.m. at The Star in Frisco.

Aledo coach Tim Buchanan is making it clear, however, that folks should not expect another blowout — something he's been stressing to his players all week.

"You have to remind them that Centennial has continued to improve. They're a better football team now. They used their loss to us to get better," Buchanan said. "Coach (Kyle) Gellar did a good job of rallying the troops.

"They did with their loss what we did with our two to start the season. They've learned and improved."

The Bearcats have won 11 straight since opening the season with a 24-17 loss at Dallas Parish Episcopal and a 44-14 home loss to Denton Guyer. Those teams have a combined record of 24-1 and are still in their respective playoffs (TAPPS DIvision I and 6A Division II).

The first meeting with Centennial was something of a "coming out" party for Aledo quarterback Hauss Hejny. While he showed steady

improvement all season, he burst through for 448 yards of offense and six touchdowns that night, completing 13 of 14 passes for 272 yards and four touchdowns, along with rushing 12 times for 176 yards and two more touchdowns.

"He gained a lot of confidence throwing the football. The biggest thing was letting things happen instead of trying to make things happen," Buchanan said of Hejny. "Same with his running. He's learned to run smart."

The Bearcats had four scoring drives that lasted one or two plays and took up less than 45 seconds — including three of less than 20 seconds. Aledo had the ball for 17 minutes compared to 31 for Centennial.

"The ball bounced our way a lot in that game," Buchanan said. "They are a good football team. They are not 43 points worse than us."

The game was tied at 14 after the first quarter before the Aledo defense adjusted to force the Spartans to throw more. The result was a change from Centennial having 141 yards in the opening quarter to just 161 over the next three, while Aledo racked up 537 total yards.

"If they are able to stay within their gameplan, they are very dangerous. I think they are better than Midlothian," Buchanan said.

The Spartans' offense is similar to Midlothian's. Aledo rallied in the fourth quarter to defeat the Panthers 27-21 last week in Midlothian, while Centennial downed upset-minded Abilene 24-14.

Perfect in rematches

This will be the sixth time since 2009 that Aledo will meet in the postseason an opponent they faced in the regular season. They are 5-0 in the previous meetings, including

3-0 against Stephenville and 1-0 against both Saginaw Boswell and Mansfield Legacy.

In 2009 they defeated Stephenville both in the regular season (20-16) and in the area round (26-23). In 2010 they downed the Yellowjackets to open the season (20-3) and again in the state quarterfinals (18-10). In 2011 they avenged a season-opening 48-47 loss to Stephenville with a 33-0 win again in the state quarterfinals.

In 2016 Aledo ended the regular season with a 49-24 win over Boswell, followed by a 42-14 win in the state

Aledo wrestlers shine in meets

Aledo wrestlers came home with plenty of honors at both the varsity and junior varsity level in tournaments recently.

The varsity boys and girls competed in the Talon Tournament in Haslet. The Bearcats were highlighted with a first-place finish by Collin Chaney in the 285-pound division, while Brice Bohn and Chad Thomas were each third at 106 and 120 pounds, respectively. 

Morris first from TCU to compete at NCAA meet since 2016

Former Aledo standout Gracie Morris wrapped up her first cross country season at TCU by competing in the NCAA Championships this past Saturday on the Oklahoma State University course in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

Morris clocked a time of 20 minutes, 52.4 seconds in the 6K race to place 142nd in the field of 254. She is the first TCU runner to qualify for the NCAA Championships since Brenley Goertzen in 2016.

Morris qualified for nationals after finishing second at the NCAA South Central Regional on Nov. 11. She matched the highest individual finish ever for a TCU female at the meet, joining Mary Kinyanjui in 2003

Morris's time of 20:17.1 at regionals was more than a minute ahead of

her previous best time of 21:37.5 that placed her 11th at the Big 12 Championships.

After transferring to TCU prior to the 2021-22 indoor track season, Morris broke the school record for the mile with a 4:40.81 for fourth at the Big 12 Indoor Championships. In the spring she placed fourth at the Big 12 Outdoor Championships and qualified for the NCAA Meet in the 1500-meter.

She holds TCU track records in the 800 (2:05.38) and 1500 (4:14.59).

At Aledo, Morris was fifth at state cross country as a freshman, third as a sophomore and second as a senior. She did not compete in 2018 because of an injury. In track she won state in the 800 and was second in the 1600 as a freshman and was fifth in the state in the 1600 as a junior.

Roberson sets another record at TISCA meet

Led by another record-setting day by sophomore Haley Roberson, Aledo had eight athletes compete at the Texas Interscholastic Swim Coaches Association North Zone invitational Nov. 18-19 at Debbie Weems Natatorium in Mansfield.

Roberson bested her own record in the 500-yard freestyle with a time of 5 minutes, 14.51 seconds to place fourth overall. Roberson also competed in the 200 freestyle, placing ninth with a time of 1:56.77.

Also posting a pair of top-10 finishes was senior Sam Ogden, who was eighth in the boys 100 freestyle, clocking 49.86 seconds, along with a 10th-place time of 55.50 in the 100 backstroke.

Advancing to finals for the boys were senior Tanner Howse, 20th in 200 freestyle, 1:54.63 and 18th in 100 butterfly, 57.08; and junior Porter Lane, 22nd in 100 butterfly, 57.93.

Sophomore Corah Satterfield was 21st in the 100 butterfly with a 1:07.48.

Also qualifying for individual

events but not reaching the finals were sophomore Victoria Crews (100 freestyle) and freshman Natalie Hutson (100 backstroke). Competing on relays were Ogden,

Lane, Howse and Kyle Scharlow for the boys, along with Hutson, Roberson, Satterfield and Crews for the girls.

The girls medley relay finished 15th in preliminaries. The boys free-style relay placed 16th overall.

Sophomore Avery Faulkner and junior Hunter Gregory were relay alternates.

quarterfinals. In 2017, the Bearcats topped Legacy 24-3 in the regular season and again in the state semifinals, 28-21.

In each of the five seasons in which they've had a rematch in the playoffs the Bearcats advanced to the state championship game - winning four and finishing second in 2017.

What a difference a game makes

Take the Aledo loss out of Centennial's season statistics and there is a significant difference in their stats — particularly on defense.

Bearcats come from behind to defeat Midlothian

Fourth quarter touchdowns take down Panthers

The Aledo Bearcats took another big step on their journey toward what they hope will be another trip to the state championship by defeating Midlothian 27-21 on Friday, Nov. 25, at Midlothian ISD Stadium.

Aledo took the opening kickoff and wasted no time getting to the end zone on their first possession.

A squib kickoff by Midlothian landed at the Aledo 32 where Kaydon Finley pounced on it.

A quick pass to Hawk Patrick-Daniels picked up 8, and a screen pass to Jalen Pope picked up another 11, putting Aledo in Midlothian territory at the 49.

Quarterback Hauss Hejny picked up another 19-yard chunk on a keeper, and three plays later Aledo found itself with a fourth down with a half yard to go at about the 20. A defensive offside penalty against Midlothian moved the ball to the 14, and from there Patrick-Daniels carried the ball to the end zone for Aledo's first score.

The 10-play drive consumed about four-and-a-half minutes.

Midlothian found some success on the ground on their first possession, taking the ball from their 25 to the Aledo 28 in seven plays and a penalty against the Bearcats.

Bearcats Carson Dempsey and Andrew Pankhurst took some wind out of the Panthers' sail when they sacked the Midlothian quarterback. The Aledo defense shut down the Panthers on the next play, and with a 4th and 11 at the 34, Midlothian opted to go for a first down.

The Panthers attempted a double-reverse-pass which fell incomplete, and the Bearcats had the ball back at their 34. A penalty pushed them back to the 29, but that only added to Hejny's 71-yard touchdown run up the middle, giving Aledo a 14-0 lead with less than two minutes left in the first

It appeared that Midlothian's next drive might be stymied when, on a second-down play, Jake Gillespie tackled the Midlothian quarterback in the backfield. It was all for naught as the Bearcats were called for offsides.

As the second quarter began, Midlothian broke for a 46-yard run and took the ball to the Bearcat 3-yard line before scoring on the next play, pulling within a touchdown at 14-7.

Aledo had a tough time moving the ball on the next drive, and Midlothian took the ball at their own 27 following a Bearcat punt.

Midlothian also had trouble moving the ball, and on a 4th and 3 at their 45 tried a reverse.

Defensive end Lawson Moore was having none of that, and Aledo took over at the Midlothian

The Bearcats marched all the way down to the Midlothian 3-yard line, but a missed field goal gave Midlothian back the ball, and four pays later they were back in the end zone to knot the score at

Second half

Aledo kicked off to begin the second half, and the Bearcat defense held the Panthers to a three-and-out. A botched fake punt play, resulting in a penalty against Midlothian, gave Aledo the ball only 15 yards from the

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

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

Tough Panther defense and a penalty left Aledo with a fourth down. The Bearcats lined up for a field goal, but tried a play that worked for them last year, with a pitch back to kicker Clay Murador, who took off toward the end zone. Unfortunately for the Bearcats, he was tackled at the 11-yard line, giving the ball back to Midlothian.

The Panthers put together a 13-play drive which, in addition to eating up most of the third quarter, ended in a Panther touchdown, and Aledo found itself on the short end of the score for the first time, 21-14.

On the next possession Patrick-Daniels broke free for a big gain, but a penalty called the play back, and the drive ended with a punt.

Midlothian picked up 14 yards on the next play and then let the clock run out for the third quarter.

Following a Midlothian punt, Aledo took the ball at its own 21. Patrick-Daniels broke through for a 34-vard pickup, and then on a 4th and 5 play, Hejny connected with Jalen Pope on a long pass that took the ball to the Midlothian 18. From there, Patrick-Daniels found a big hole and ran the ball to the end zone.

The extra point tied the score at 21 with 8:13 left in the game.

A touchdown can change the momentum of a football game, but what happened next probably broke the momentum in Aledo's favor for the rest of the game.

Following the touchdown, Aledo kicked off and the deep man for Midlothian opted to field the ball at the goal line. He bobbled the ball, and was crushed by the Aledo oncoming defense at the 3-yard line.

The Bearcat defense held for three plays, and Midlothian had to punt from its own end zone, giving the Bearcats the ball at the Midlothian 41-yard line.

On a third-and-10 play from the 41, Hejny hit Jalen Pope on the sideline at the 29 for a first down, but a facemask penalty pushed the Bearcats back 15 yards.

On a third-and-23, Hejny found Cap Mooney at the 20-yard line.

The next play, on fourth-andone, the Bearcats snapped the ball directly to Davhon Keys, who rushed up the right side of the line for a touchdown.

With less than three minutes to play, the rest of the game was not without drama, as the missed extra point on Keys' touchdown only put the Bearcats up by six, and the Midlothian

offense had shown during the game it could put together drives on the ground.

The defense ended up stopping Midlothian when it counted most, and the Bearcats walk away with a regional semifinal victory of 27-21 against a tenacious Midlothian

Keys reflected on the directsnap touchdown after the game.

"The play was designed to go left," Keys said. "Pre snap, it looked like it was crowded. He snapped the ball, I looked left and I started to panic. I happened to glance right. I

saw it was wide open. The linemen collapsed their guys, and I took off. I saw one dude, made a miss, and then got into the end zone, and it was the best moment of my life."
