## **Witness** recalls seeing fatal accident

Pedestrian struck in early evening hours Sunday attempting to cross I-20 on foot

Early Sunday evening on Jan. 1, a man was killed in a fatal accident near the FM 1187 exit off of Interstate 20 near Aledo. He was apparently trying to cross the interstate on foot.

While Fort Worth police, who were handling the situation, had yet to release a report to the public at press time, Aledo resident Brian Rav and his brother Justin, witnessed the event and Brian told The Community News details of the tragic accident.


Brian said he and Justin had turned onto I-20 heading east to get something to eat near Camp Bowie. They weren't on the highway long when the accident occurred.

"We merged onto the highway and were going about 75. We were in the right lane at this time. About 25 seconds after merging on the highway, my brother Justin, noticed the man crossing the road from right to left," Brian recalled. "The lady who struck the man with her car, a white Hyundai Elantra, was in the middle lane approximately 150 feet in front of us. She apparently didn't see the man crossing and struck him with the front left side of her car.

"I saw the man fly into the air a good 10 feet then hit the pavement on the far left lane, almost into the median."

Brian said the lady in the Hyundai immediately stopped and they stopped behind her. Justin got out to see if he could help and Brian quickly got on the phone and called 911.

"The lady was in emotional distress and was in disbelief that she, in fact, hit a person," Brian said. "After getting off the

"His, I believe, left leg was severed a little above the knee ... We waited for the police and the ambulance to arrive on scene and gave our statements."

Efforts to gather more information from the Fort Worth Police Department were unsuccessful.

# Animal rescue group plans to build one of state's largest sanctuaries in Aledo

To combat the overwhelming population of abandoned animals in Texas, one rescue operation is breaking ground on a facility that will be one of the state's largest animal rescue sanctuaries.

Saving Hope Animal Rescue, founded in 2017, works to rescue, rehabilitate and find homes for animals suffering from abuse. neglect and abandonment in Tarrant County and across the

The new sanctuary is expected to open in early 2023 and will be a one-stop-shop in Aledo - just west of Fort Worth. The property will be 14.8 acres and is projected to cost \$2 million, according to a press release.

The blueprints lay out a multitude of amenities, including intake housing, a veterinary clinic, puppy pods for nursing mothers, a senior sanctuary for older dogs to live out the rest of their days, an educational barn, and an adoption center.

"We're looking to do all of that in the long term," said Saving Hope Rescue founder Lauren Anton. "But right now it is just baby steps with the first pieces opening in the spring."

The sanctuary is necessary, in part, because of the high numbers of pets abandoned on the streets when their owners returned to in-person work after pandemic restrictions were lifted.

"When COVID hit, it was a booming time in adoptions for us because everyone was at home alone and wanted that companionship," said Saving Hope Rescue director Laura Grice.

Almost three years after the start of the pandemic, many pet owners don't want the responsibility of having a pet at home, she said.

"You add the strain of the economy and inflation, and pets are an additional financial expense," Grice said. "I think a lot of people are struggling to afford what they need for an animal and feel like they should bring their pet to the shelter."

In 2022, the rescue operation took in 1,664 dogs and 1,022 cats from other shelters or surrenders. Saving Hope takes more animals from Fort Worth's animal control department than any other organization.

Saving Hope works to save as many "Code Red" animals from Fort Worth Animal Care & Control as it can. These animals are at risk of being euthanized if not adopted. The new sanctuary aims to create an immediate temporary holding space so these animals aren't put down.

The rest of the animals come from rural areas, other shelters, owner surrenders, strays and abuse cases. In 2022, the number of animals surrendered by breeders became much more common because of the economy and the





## Feds investigating meltdown at Southwest Airlines

Massive flight cancellations by Southwest Airlines during the Christmas holiday week are prompting the federal government to look into why thousands of travelers were left stranded across the country, along with huge piles of luggage in airports served by the beleaguered airline.

Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg said his agency would examine what caused Southwest's widespread cancellations, which began as a massive polar storm gripped much of the country a few days before Christmas. The airline was able to resume normal operations on Friday as another holiday weekend approached. The airline canceled more than 15,700 flights since Dec. 22, according to The Dallas Morning News. Cancellations by other airlines were a fraction of that amount, according to published reports.

"Because what we're seeing right now, from the system and the flights themselves to the inability to reach anybody on a customer service phone line, it is just completely unacceptable," Buttigieg told CBS early Wednesday. The Senate Commerce Committee also plans to investigate.

Southwest does not use the hub-and-spoke system relied upon by other major carriers, instead relying on a point-to-point system. That means even where planes were available, often crews and pilots were stranded in other cities.

#### **RRC launches probe into Atmos** service issues

The Texas Railroad Commission has launched an investigation of Atmos Energy's gas distribution system, which left some Texans without heat during freezing weather just before Christmas. The company reported low gas pressure in cities across North and Central Texas, leaving some customers without heat. On Dec. 23, the Texas Tribune reported, Atmos asked its 2 million Texas customers to conserve gas use by lowering thermostats, and not using gas fireplaces and any gas-powered appliances.

Gov. Greg Abbott signed a letter ordering the railroad commission and the Texas attorney general's office to investigate Atmos Energy's "failure to prepare for the

winter weather event last week. "Leading up to and during the winter event, State of Texas agencies worked around the clock to mobilize resources and assist utilities in any way possible. At no time did Atmos Energy request assistance... It is apparent that Atmos Energy acted irresponsibly and was unprepared for the event," the letter said in part.

#### Abbott pushes back on migrant bus criticism

Abbott has drawn criticism after a bus from Texas dropped off more than 100 migrants in freezing weather near Vice President Kamala Harris' official residence in Washington, D.C.

An Austin American-Statesman report noted the state has bused nearly 16,000 migrants to so-called sanctuary cities. Abbott tweeted a breakdown of how many migrants have been bused to cities outside of Texas.

Thus far, 8,900 have been sent to Washington; 4,900 to New York City; more than 1,500 to Chicago; and more than 630 to Philadelphia. The governor has maintained in the past that the migrants have given permission to be bused North. The White House has called the move "a cruel, dangerous, and shameful stunt."

"We're providing relief to local communities overwhelmed by President Biden's open border policies," Abbott said.

The U.S. Supreme Court has so far stopped the Biden administration from eliminating Title 42, a federal rule enacted during by the Trump administration during the COVID-19 pandemic to allow the U.S. to return asylum-seeking migrants to Mexico or their country of origin.

#### **TPWD opposes listing prairie** chicken as endangered

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has reiterated its opposition to a decision by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to list the lesser prairie chicken as endangered in some areas and threatened in others, citing "tremendous" voluntary collaboration with private landowners and industry to conserve the chicken's habitat.

The federal designation will take place in January. It primarily affects Panhandle counties where the lesser prairie chicken is found.

"This decision jeopardizes decades of voluntary conservation efforts, increases regulatory burden and does not assure recovery of the species," David, Yoskowitz, TPWD executive director, said.

#### \$54 million in career, technical education grants

The Texas Workforce Commission has announced 152 grants totaling more than \$54 million to various public community, state and technical colleges, as well as school district and charter schools across the state. The grants will be used to buy equipment to establish or expand programs that offer Texas students the opportunity to earn licenses, certificates, or post-secondary degrees in fields such as nursing, welding, automotive repair and dentistry.

"It's important to identify high-demand jobs, but it's critical to proactively commit resources to ensure Texans are ready to meet those workforce needs," said TWC Chairman

Brvan Daniel.

#### **COVID-19 cases remain** steadyin state

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas during the past week remained steady at 30,033, with 102 new deaths reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at

Johns Hopkins University. The number of lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations rose slightly to 2,581, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.



# Former Bearcats had a feeling this season would be special for Frogs

Three former Aledo Bearcats who know a lot about winning championships could be on the verge of capturing another as members of the TCU Horned Frogs football team.

The Horned Frogs (13-1), ranked No. 3 in the nation, will face No. 1 Georgia (14-0) in the national championship game at 6:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 9, at SoFi Stadium in Los Angeles on ESPN.

The Frogs reached the title game with a 51-45 semifinal victory against No. 2 Michigan (13-1) in the Fiesta Bowl Saturday afternoon. That same night, defending national champion Georgia punched its ticket to the finals with 42-41 win over No. 4 Ohio State (11-2).

The trio of seniors from Aledo, Wes Harris and his brother Wyatt, along with Colt Ellison, are hoping to join Alabama running back Jase McClellan, as the only former Bearcats to win both a state championship and a national title. McClellan helped the Crimson Tide win the 2020 national championship when he was a freshman.

Aledo Athletic Director Steve Wood, who coached each of them to state championships during his five years as head coach of the Bearcats, said there was a sense of something special even before the season began. It came up during a round of golf with Wyatt and Colt.

"There was a breath of fresh air, they were excited and ready," Wood recalled. "Of course, nobody saw this coming, but here they are and they are very deserving."

Sonny Dykes' first season as head coach of the Horned Frogs has, without question, been unforgettable. It would also be a most memorable end to each of their college football careers.

Wes Harris has started all 14 games this

season on the offensive line, helping anchor an offense that averages around 475 yards and over 41 points per game. He also blocks for the Heisman Trophy runner-up, quarterback Max Duggen.

Wyatt Harris, a middle linebacker, has played in six games this season. Ellison, a defensive end, has seen action in four.

Tim Buchanan coached Wes Harris in 2013 on a team that is the only one in history at any level to score more than 1,000 points in a season, going 16-0. Wood coached him

to championships in 2014, going 15-1, and a perfect 16-0 in 2016.

Wood was Aledo's head coach in both state title seasons for Wyatt Harris and Ellison in 2016 and 2018, going a combined 32-0 in those seasons. They were also state runners-up in 2017.

Buchanan said he sent the trio a text congratulating them on being a part of history as members of the first team from Texas to qualify for the College Football Playoffs. He added that he told them, "Now go and win the darn thing."

"It doesn't surprise me they're in this position. I'm happy for them," Wood said. "They put a lot of work in, they always have.

"You want them on your side. As a coach I was glad they were wearing my colors."

#### **Moss Making Trips**

Among those making the journey to Glendale, Arizona, for the Fiesta Bowl was Willow Park Mayor Doyle Moss. In fact, he and his wife Linda are going to be on the road for some time as the are now on their way to Los Angeles.

"We got back to Texas in 2006 and bought TCU season tickets and have had them now for years," Moss said. "We've been Frog fans, Bearcat fans, Longhorn fans (Linda attended the University of Texas). I'm so glad this is happening for TCU, they deserve it."

Moss reflected on the last time TCU was in a high profile game. It wasn't quite this caliber, but it was at that point perhaps the biggest win in Horned Frogs history as they defeated Wisconsin 21-19 in the 2011 Rose Bowl to finish No. 2 in the nation.

"We regretted not going to the Rose Bowl," he said. "We're not missing this one or the next if they get there."



A regional semifinals sweep of Abilene Wylie gave the Ladycats softball team 22 consecutive victories and moves them one step away from a return trip to state.


