Bailey Ranch Road renovation set to begin

Construction will start about Jan. 23

Staff Reports

The process to smooth out that bumpy ride down Bailey Ranch Road is set to begin — along with the inevitable complications that come from the renovation of a well-trafficked roadway.

The City of Aledo spent the earlier part of this year patching the western end of the road, but the area between FM 1187 and Champions Drive is due for a complete do-over.

The Aledo City Council awarded the construction project to Nu-Way Construction, LLC at an early December Council meeting.

The project is complicated by the fact that a housing development, major senior living center, fire station, businesses, Aledo High School and Daniel Ninth Grade Campus, and a preschool all utilize the roadway.

The \$3.2 million project is set to begin on or around Monday, Jan. 23, and will be accomplished in phases over 10 months, plus construction of a new sidewalk on the south side once road construction is complete.

Phase one was originally anticipated to be a brief, full roadway shutdown between Champions and Creekview Terrace. However, that work will now be incorporated into Phase Two, which will require

a shutdown of only the northern include enough roadway surface or westbound side of the roadway. Eastbound traffic on the south side will remain unaffected.

Phase two is estimated to take about six months and will include rebuilding the northern half of the roadway. During Phase Two, traffic will be eastbound only in order to ensure that the fire station's emergency responders have quick, convenient access to FM 1187. This rebuild of the north side will

to accommodate two-way traffic in later phases.

Phase three shifts to rebuilding the southern portion and will take about two months. There will be two-way traffic during phase three, allowing better access to the schools, neighborhoods, and businesses.

Phase four will also take about two months and will involve roadwork at the intersection of

Champions and Point Vista Drives, rebuilding a quarter of the intersection at a time to minimize impacts.

Key features of the new roadway will include a narrowed, two-lane configuration; hatched or striped median; left-turn lanes at roadway intersections and major driveways; right-turn lane at schools' eastern driveway; thicker 8-inch pavement with 8-inch lime subgrade; and

2,450). In the District 60 State Representative race between Glenn Rogers and Mike Olcott, many votes that were not counted until the next day following

the election narrowed that gap to around 300 votes, so Olcott requested a hand recount in Parker County. He also requested recounts in Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties.

The Ladycats' magical softball season ended in the Class 5A state semifinals as Georgetown won 3-2 in eight innings. Neither team scored until Aledo went up 1-0 in the bottom of the sixth, Georgetown took a 2-1 lead in the top of the seventh and the Ladycats tied the game in the bottom of the seventh. Aledo ended the season with a 33-3 record and a second consecutive state tournament appearance after finishing as runner-up in 2021.

In one of the most unforgettable (or perhaps they'd rather forget) ends to a season, the Bearcats' baseball campaign came to a close as they dropped two of three games in a best-of-three series against Mansfield Legacy in the 5A Region I final. Legacy rallied to win the opening game 8-5 in eight innings on Friday night, followed by Aledo's 12-4

Nelson appointed Secretary of State

Governor Greg Abbott officially appointed Jane Nelson to serve as the 115th Texas Secretary of State on Thursday,

Upon the filing of her official appointment, Nelson issued the following statement:

"I am deeply honored to continue my career as a public servant as Texas Secretary of State, and am grateful for the confidence Governor Abbott has placed in me to serve in this critical new role. As Secretary of State, I hope to continue safeguarding the integrity of our state's elections and enhance transparency so that all Texas voters can have confidence in fair, accurate elections across each of our 254 counties. I also look forward to working with our many international partners - including our largest trading partner, Mexico - to enhance Texas' position on the global stage and continue building our reputation as a global economic powerhouse."

Nelson will be formally sworn in by Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Nathan L. Hecht on Saturday, Jan. 7.

The Texas Secretary of State serves as the state's chief election officer; provides a repository for official, business and commercial records; publishes rules and regulations; and commissions notaries public. In addition, the secretary serves as senior advisor and liaison to the governor for Texas Border and Mexican Affairs, and serves as Chief International Protocol Officer for Texas. The secretary is one of six state officials named by the Texas Constitution to form the Executive Department of the State. The first Secretary of the Republic of Texas was Stephen F. Austin.

About Jane Nelson

Jane Nelson was appointed the 115th Texas Secretary of State by Governor Greg Abbott on Jan. 5, 2023.

Secretary Nelson is a businesswoman and former teacher who served two terms on the State Board of Education and 30 years as a state senator representing north Texas.

The first woman in Texas legislative history to chair a standing budget-writing committee, Secretary Nelson was chair



of the Senate Finance Committee for four sessions. She was a member of the Senate State Affairs Committee, which oversees election policy, for eight sessions. She served as chair of the Sunset Advisory Commission, the Nominations Committee, the Select Committee on Cybersecurity and the Senate Health & Human Services Committee. She was also a member of the Legislative Budget Board, the Legislative Audit Committee, and the Privacy Protection Advisory Council.


In addition to writing four balanced state budgets, Secretary Nelson has a long list of accomplishments, including establishing the Cancer Research & Prevention Institute of Texas (CPRIT), reforming medical liability, achieving tax relief, overhauling the foster care system, expanding access to mental health care, and passing more than 30 bills to protect victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking.

Her work has been recognized with dozens of awards, including from the American Medical Association, American Cancer Society, Texas Association of Business, Texas Council on Family Violence, CASA, Texas Hospital Association, Big Brothers & Big Sisters, Texas PTA, Texas Retired Teachers Association, the Women's Health Coalition and many others. She has a 100%

voting record in support of Texas small businesses.

Secretary Nelson and her husband, J. Michael Nelson, owned and operated an aircraft component manufacturing company in Denton County. They have five children and 12 grandchildren.

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ORDINANCE NO. 2022-170

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ALEDO, TEXAS, AMENDING SUBSECTION 26.5, "RESTAURANT OR CAFETERIA WITH DRIVE-IN SERVICE OR DRIVE-THROUGH," OF SECTION 26, "SPECIFIC USE PERMIT (SUP)," OF ORDINANCE NO. 2020-31, THE CITY OF ALEDO **ZONING ORDINANCE, BY EXPANDING THE SUP REQUIREMENT** TO ALL PROPERTIES THAT FRONT FM 1187, FM 5, CHAMPIONS DRIVE AND BAILEY RANCH ROAD, AND TO PROHIBIT RESTAURANT DRIVE-THROUGH QUEUE LANES FROM BEING LOCATED BETWEEN THE BUILDING AND THE PRIMARY STREET FRONTAGE; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE BE CUMULATIVE OF ALL ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS **CLAUSE; PROVIDING A PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION;** AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

SECTION 5. **PENALTY CLAUSE**

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with, or who resists the enforcement of, any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined as provided in Section 1-10 of the City Code of Ordinances for each offense. Each day any such violation or violations exist shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such.

SECTION 7. **EFFECTIVE DATE**

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage as provided by law, and it is so ordained.



Taxpayers with complex returns are advised to seek paid tax assistance. People who are interested in seeking help from the AARP Tax-Aide volunteers should bring the following items with them when they come in:

- Copy of last year's income tax return;
- W-2 forms from each employer;
- Unemployment compensation forms;
- SSA-1099 form if they were paid Social Security Benefits;
- All 1099 forms (1099-INT, 1099-DIV, 1099-B, etc.) showing interest and/or Dividends

and documentation showing original purchase price of assets sold;

- 1099-misc showing any miscellaneous income;
- 1099-R form if they received a pension or annuity;
- All forms indicating federal income tax paid;
- Dependent care provider information (name, employer ID number or social security number and address);
- Health care documents such as form 1095-A, 1095-B or 1095-C.
- A list of expenses and charitable donations if itemizing deductions;

The Willow Park **City Council** voted to post notice of issuing certificates of obligation not to exceed \$4.25 million to address the



city's drainage issues. The city has been collecting drainage fees since October of 2021 for this issue, with the fees reflected in the residents' utility bills.

JULY 1

Representatives from Population and Survey Analysts (PASA) laid out to the aledo ISD board what their estimates tell them is coming to the district in the next five to 10 years at a workshop on Monday, June 27.

The demographers said Aledo ISD's student population has grown every year since 2008, but the rates of growth are

increasing as well. The growth will only accelerate in the future based on numbers provided to the board by Angela Fritz, a demographer with PASA.

"So, by fall 2026 you guys can have an enrollment of 11,700 students is what we're projecting and by fall 2031 a possible enrollment at 17,564," Fritz said.

The Aledo City Council voted to approve a development agreement that will allow for the voluntary annexation of 238 acres of Dean Ranch into the city, opening the door for development according to Aledo community standards.

Parker County Judge Pat Deen signed an emergency declaration banning fireworks use in Parker

Capital Highlights

What to expect in legislative session

The 2023 Texas legislative session opened Jan. 10, with property taxes, gun control, and the power grid expected to be among the top issues on the agenda.

The Texas Standard talked to political journalists Niki Griswold of the Austin American-Statesman and James Barragàn of the Texas Tribune to see what might be upcoming.

Griswold predicts the "so-called culture war issue" could take center stage, with a number of bills already filed regarding the rights of transgender children and their parents, as well as battles over what books should be made available to children in the classroom and libraries.

Barragàn said the state's predicted \$27 billion surplus will attract a number of factions wanting a piece of that action. Gov. Greg Abbott has called for about half the surplus to be spent on property tax relief, while House Speaker Dade Phelan is pushing for more spending on infrastructure.

Griswold pointed out that Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick wields considerable power in the Legislature and is keenly interested in more fixes to the state's electric grid.

The regular session will last 140 days, as set by the state constitution.

Ag agency: Climate change threatens food supply

A new report released last week by the Texas Department of Agriculture concluded climate change is a potential threat to the state's food supply and could produce food insecurity. The report comes after a historic drought decimated crops and forced ranchers to sell the highest number of livestock in more than a decade.

The Texas Tribune reported the food access study, published by TDA and the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, noted that "climate instability is strongly associated with water quality, soil degradation, droughts, fires, floods, and other environmental disasters."

The report was submitted to the Legislature on Dec. 31 and points to other factors that make it harder for Texans to access and afford food, such as wages not keeping up with inflation and lack of access to food in rural areas.

"The important takeaway here is that there are significant gaps that need to be addressed between what researchers calculate to be a living wage in Texas, the wages that Texans are actually receiving, and many of the poverty thresholds that determine eligibility for assistance programs," the report says.


Abbott calls for action on ankle monitor violations

Abbott last week sent a letter to legislative leaders calling for legislation to create criminal penalties for parolees who cut off their ankle monitors.

That action comes in the wake of an October incident in which parolee Nestor Hernandez was charged with pulling a handgun and killing two hospital employees while visiting his girlfriend and their newborn child at Methodist Hospital

in Dallas. He was shot by a Methodist Hospital police officer but survived and is now being held without bond on capital murder charges.

A few weeks later another parolee, Zeric Jackson, was accused of fatally shooting a man at his former girlfriend's Dallas apartment.



Currently, there are no criminal penalties for a parolee cutting off an ankle monitor.

Beware of online phone scams

The Texas Department of Insurance is urging Texans, especially older adults, to beware of both phone and online scams. In 2021, more than 6,700 Texans 60 and older reported losing more than \$159 million to fraudsters, TDI reports.

Some common scams:

- A caller offers to fix a non-existent computer problem or to renew a software or security subscription that does not actually exist.
- A caller purports to be a grandchild calling from another country and needing hundreds of dollars quickly.
- A call or email that says you have won a sweepstakes or lottery but requires you to pay thousands of dollars in bogus fees in order to claim the larger prize.
- Someone adopts a fake identity to gain affection and confidence, in hopes of eventually building a relationship that enable the scammer to steal money.

Emergency SNAP benefits again extended

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has again provided the state with more than \$344.1 million in emergency Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program food benefits for the month of January, benefitting about 1.6 million Texas households

The funds are distributed by the Texas Health and Human Services Commission. Each SNAP household will receive at least \$95 in emergency allotments in addition to its regular allotment.

Since April 2020, the federal government has provided more than \$9.3 billion in benefits to Texans through SNAP.

"We know these benefits will help families start 2023 with healthy and nutritious foods," said Texas HHS Access and Eligibility Services Deputy Executive Commissioner Wayne Salter.

RRC unveils interactive map of orphaned wells

Using federal infrastructure funding, the Texas ilroad Commission has launched an interactive map of orphan wells that have been plugged or are scheduled to be plugged.

The RRC received a \$25 million initial grant in 2022 from the U.S. Department of the Interior as part of the federal infrastructure act. So far, 128 orphan wells have been plugged, with plans to plug about 800 more abandoned wells by the end of the fiscal year.



COVID-19 cases rise in past week

The number of new COVID-19 cases in the past week in Texas rose to 39,019, with 131 deaths reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. The number of lab-confirmed COVID-19 patients hospitalized in the state

also rose to 3,445, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

State Representative Update

Defending our local schools

As I watched schools from my current and new districts (Albany, Aledo, and Brock) at the UIL High School Football state championships at AT&T Stadium surrounded by 40,000 fans, parents, teachers, and students, one recurring sight truly inspired me — players taking a knee to pray.

Public schools and teachers are under attack more than ever. The 88th legislative session will be the most challenging in Texas history as some politicians seek to defund public schools, privatize education, and make school board elections hyper-partisan. The hatred and vitriol seems to have no bounds.

Michael Quinn Sullivan, the publisher of Texas Scorecard, tweeted last January that public education is a "babysitting" service offered at the convenience of government employees. "Public education in Texas is about employing otherwise unemployable adults, not educating kids," he tweeted. Jonathan Stickland who heads up the Defend Texas Liberty PAC tweeted recently, "If you love your kids, you will do everything possible to keep them out of government (public) schools."

The billionaire financiers of these groups, such as Tim Dunn and Faris Wilks, have long advocated for privatization of public schools. Former gubernatorial candidate, Don Huffines recently referred to public schools as "underperforming woke schools."

Recently, I listened to the Perrin FFA Ag Issues contest team as they prepared for the state contest. The public speaking skills and poise exhibited by these FFA young people demonstrates the impact of a quality public education experience.

I also attended events to support Palo Pinto County youth that show livestock. These young people represent a bright future for our local communities, state and nation. Leadership development and respect for others are core principles of FFA programs in public schools.

At the Capitol in November, I welcomed the award-winning Santo High School Marching band for a capitol tour and it was incredible to interact with these talented students.

In December, while watching several high school playoff and state championship games there was nothing "woke" about the competition, patriotism, and community pride I witnessed. It was absolutely uplifting to watch the Brock Eagles and their opposing team come together in the middle of the field after the game for a moment of silence and prayer. Then I watched the Aledo Bearcats win their 11th state championship. Coach Tim Buchanan and his staff, the Bearcat Regiment, Bearcat cheerleaders, Bearcats dance team, parents, fans and the great community of Aledo all contributed!

These are not "woke" public schools. Branding all public schools as "woke" or as "a babysitting service" with a broad brush is, quite frankly, a lie. Politicians or pundits without a real message simply attack with venom and hate.

Article 7, Section 1 of the Texas Constitution requires the Texas Legislature to maintain a system of free public schools for all Texans. My goal for the 88th legislative session, which starts January 10, is to support and help improve our Texas public schools.

"Pot shots" aimed at our public schools by politicians and political operatives to score points with their radical

base is not productive and does not represent Texas ideals. More than five million Texas public school students, over one thousand districts and 400,000 teachers and staff deserve better.



Response to Hamlin collapse showed us life is greater than any game

I've covered a lot of football games in

Never did I think I would see a player die on the field. But I did on Monday, Jan.

Thank goodness Damar Hamlin did not stay that way long. He was resuscitated, but spent several days with us all concerned whether he'd live or die before taking a turn for the better.

He was making a tackle, something he'd done countless times in his life. Then, suddenly he fell backwards onto the turf. Just like that he went from being a mighty gladiator playing the toughest sport in America to someone who could not breathe on his

The prayers of myself and many others across the nation and the world continue to go out to him. While he is making what has been labeled as a "remarkable recovery," his future remains in limbo.

From everything I've heard about the 24-year-old Hamlin he is a fine young man, a charitable young man. He started an annual toy drive for children in 2020, shortly after finishing his college career at Pitt.

In his second season as a defensive back for the Buffalo Bills he was living the dream of many youngsters, getting paid lots of money to play the game he loves the most on the world's biggest stage, the NFL.

Now, those dreams have turned into question marks.

I'm glad the NFL opted not to finish the game. I've no doubt they would have continued that night had not more compassionate heads and hearts prevailed. In fact, the original announcement was that the players and coaches would have five minutes before resuming play, and it wasn't until more than an hour later that the game was officially postponed.

Thank goodness the Buffalo Bills and Cincinnati Bengals players and coaches said in unison, "No. Not happening."

Without players and coaches, you can't have a game. Kudos to them for putting compassion and human life ahead of touchdowns and field goals.

The ridiculousness of paying the worst player in the league more than most of us will make in a lifetime still exists, as does an ordinary family having to skip making a car payment to see a game in Jerry Jones' stadium.

But so does something else. The unity shown by both teams following the tragedy renews an optimism that pro athletes are not just spoiled millionaires. They have a brotherhood that exceeds even the most lucrative contract and it was on full display that night and even after, as several players followed the Hamlin family to the hospital in support of Damar.

Despite Monday, this season was fabulous for Horned Frogs and faithful

Monday night's 65-7 loss by the TCU Horned Frogs to the Georgia Bulldogs in college football's national championship game must have brought back some painful memories for longtime Horned Frogs faithful.

There's no getting around it, that was the one of the worst beatdowns in TCU history. Some have compared it to the likes of Texas' 81-16 dismantling of the Frogs in Fort Worth in 1974.

Stop right there. Quite simply, there is no comparing these Horned Frogs with those teams from the dismal days. That was a time when any chance anyone from TCU had of seeing a national championship decided up close was by purchasing a ticket.

Monday's outcome does not change the fact that this was a magical season for the Horned Frogs. A couple of notable folks from Aledo with longtime ties to TCU were around the Horned Frogs in the days when a handful of wins would have been considered a great season.

Mike Dry's father, F.A. Dry, was the TCU coach from 1977-82. Coming on the heels of arguably the worst coach in Horned Frogs history, Jim Shoffner, who was 2-31 in three seasons, F.A. didn't have much of a foundation. Though there was some progress in the team's competitiveness, F.A.'s record was 12-51-3 in six seasons.

F.A. is now 91. What happened during his time and this season must seem like a trip to another galaxy.

"When my dad got there and I transferred there, the infrastructure wasn't there." Mike said. "TCU would be competitive and

wait for something bad to happen. Now, look at that Baylor game (a field goal as time ran out for a 29-28 win). That was crazy."

1979-81. He transferred from Tulsa, where his dad coached before taking over the Horned Frogs. F.A. proved he could win at Tulsa, going 31-18-1 in four and a half seasons leading the Golden Hurricane.

"TCU ruined his coaching career," Mike said, though just like his son, F.A. remains a fan and even made the trip to Los Angeles to see Monday's game with Mike.

F.A. never had another head coaching gig after his time at TCU, though he did work as an assistant for nine years at Baylor after.

Mike credits legendary Horned Frogs coach Gary Patterson for "stabilizing the program."

"He was like a business entrepreneur going against a Fortune 500 company," Mike said of Patterson, who was also there cheering on his former team.

Mike's nephew, Matt Panfill, was a safety when he played high

school ball at North Crowley. Patterson moved him to defensive end and by the time he graduated he went from 195 to 245 pounds and was a three-time all-conference selection.

"Who would have thought that? That's what I mean by resourceful," Mike said.

Mike is the president and founder of Athletic Performance Ranch near Aledo. He works with all sorts of athletes and he said many are now giving TCU an even closer look than before.

"A lot of our kids have TCU on their radar where they didn't before," he said. "Also, what they've done with their social media has

Of course, nothing is more attractive than winning. And, in spite of what happened Monday, TCU's program is, without question, a winner.

The current rules involving the transfer portal and name/image/ likeness also appear to be helping the Horned Frogs.

"If the NIL money is there, why not come to Fort Worth? We can compete for a national championship here. We can get exposure here," Mike said.

Former Miss Texas enioved season

Gloria Gilbert Barron, Miss Texas 1982 and a 1985 TCU graduate, made a record with former TCU head football coach Jim Wacker entitled "I Was Purple When Purple Wasn't Cool" when Wacker was leading the program.

She's still purple and purple is very cool these days, especially in the Fort Worth area. But she remembers the dismal days, when the team was 14-27-4 during her time at the school.

"It was exciting to go to the games, but we didn't win," she said. "But everybody kept going and the team kept on trying. And we never stopped dreaming."

In her final year at TCU, the Horned Frogs appeared to turn a corner as Wacker led them to an 8-4 record in his second season at the helm. They started the next season 3-0, but recruiting violations led to Wacker dismissing All-American running back Kenneth Davis and five others from the team. They finished 3-8 and did not have another winning season under Wacker.

And while Monday night didn't turn out like Barron and her fellow TCU faithful were hoping for, she remains faithful and optimistic that a national championship is out there for her team.

"I don't think Horned Frog fans ever give up," she said.

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
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

Brewer sinks buzzer beater to best Bearcats

Losing is never easy, but some losses sting more than others.

That was the case on Friday, Jan. 6, when the visiting Brewer Bears managed to sink a last-second shot to steal the win from the Bearcats on their home court in a tightly contested 38-36 contest.

Following a strong defensive stand that lasted 1:11, the Bearcats regained possession with 26 seconds left in regulation before immediately calling a timeout with the score tied at 36-all. After a quick strategy meeting, play resumed with the Bearcats inbounding the ball on the far end of the floor. Aledo raced across half court to begin setting up their offense for one final attempt at closing out the game.

Point guard Ulises Garcia dribbled around the right side of the perimeter before handing it off to Exavier Anderson. Anderson returned the ball to the top of the key before passing off to Drew Clock. Clock moved to his left, dribbling the ball a pair of times before Brewer's Julian Perez forced a turnover for the Bears.

Perez quickly found Carron Gibson with the outlet pass as Gibson raced down the floor with Aledo's Brandon Fields in hot pursuit. Gibson threw up the left-handed layup over Fields' outstretched arms before crashing to the hardwood below. The ball played off the glass, falling through the hoop just as time expired.

"A game like that, every possession matters," Bearcats head coach JD Robinson said after the game. "We've got to value every possession. When every possession is that monumental, you've got to take care of it. We can't turn the ball over."

Brewer operated with great deliberation on the offensive end of the floor throughout the contest, resulting in few scoring opportunities for both clubs. Any time the Bearcats transitioned from

man defense into zone, the Bears were content to melt the clock away just inside midcourt. Multiple times during the contest Brewer was able to burn more than a minute off the clock before attempting a single shot.

"That's the way they play every game," Robinson said of Brewer's offensive philosophy during a post-game interview. "We knew what it would be. It's hard to speed it up when they want to slow it down"


