Early voting under way in local-level elections

Early voting began Monday for local-area elections in preparation for the main voting day on May 6.

The biggest item for most voters in east Parker County is the Aledo Independent School District's \$123,800,000 bond proposal. The proposal was recommended to the school board by a committee of area residents who studied the facility needs of the rapidly-growing school district.

The only other proposition decision for area voters concerns Emergency Services District No. 1 annexation of the City of Sanctuary.

In terms of choosing representatives to local government bodies, all voters in Parker County will choose between Doug Dowd and Scott Butler.

Other local area races are shown below. The race that will appear on any given ballot depend on where the voter lives.

Rock of stability

Next elementary school to be named for Lynn McKinney By Randy Keck

It was a combination of tears and smiles when the Aledo ISD Board of Trustees voted unanimously to name the district's next elementary school after Deputy Superintendent Lynn McKinney at a special meeting on Thursday, April 20.

McKinney has announced her retirement at the end of the school year.

McKinney, who began teaching in the Aledo ISD 37 years ago at the elementary level, became the principal at Aledo High School in 1990 before moving into administration in 1999.

The administration worked to keep the board meeting a secret from McKinney while at the same time adhering to open meeting laws that require notice to be posted.

Superintendent Dr. Susan Bohn opened with comments about the purpose of the meeting, saying one of the projects in the upcoming bond proposal is building elementary school number seven.

Board member Forrest Collins then moved that, upon her retirement, elementary

number seven be named for McKinney.

"You know how much you personally mean to me. And I know how much you personally mean to so many people in this community," Collins said to McKinney. Editor's note: This is the second in a two-part series highlighting the growth of the Aledo ISD throughout its history.

In 1996, the district opened a third campus location south on FM 5. The newest building would separate seventh and eighth grades from the high school building, creating Aledo's first middle school, and providing more classroom space for high school.

Even with these changes, temporary buildings were utilized for high school classes. An increase in younger students put a strain on Aledo Primary School. Third grade was moved to Aledo Intermediate School, leaving only kindergarten through second grade at the northern campus. Grades three through five were at Aledo Intermediate School. Students in sixth grade through eighth attended the new Aledo Middle School.

As the school district prepared for the new millennium, the community passed a 1998 bond that would forever change the configuration of Aledo ISD. Included in the bond proposal was a fourth campus location that would be home to a brand-new Aledo High School designed to accommodate

same property.

The old high school would be converted to a junior high facility housing seventh and eighth grades. A reconfigured middle school would house fifth and sixth grades. A new elementary school would be built in a new development in the southern part of the district. The Aledo Primary and Intermediate campuses would be converted to full, independent elementary schools for grades pre-kindergarten to fourth grade.

For the first time in the district's history, students in the same grade would be split between three different elementary schools. It was during this process that the school board officially adopted the names of the schools we know today. At a January 17, 2000 school board meeting, Aledo Primary became Coder Elementary, Aledo Intermediate became Vandagriff Elementary, the new elementary school in the Deer Creek area would open as Stuard Elementary, and the Middle School would become McAnally Intermediate School.

By 2003, the plan put in place with the passing of the 1998 bond was complete. Coder, Stuard, and Vandagriff Elementary Schools

spanned grades pre-kindergarten to fourth. McAnally Intermediate housed grades five and six. Aledo Middle School was home to seventh- and eighth-graders. Aledo High School was in its new home on Bailey Ranch Road.

More bonds

It did, however, require the passage of Proposition No. 1 on a 2001 bond to complete all the projects because of inflation, construction delays, and unforeseen costs not included in initial estimates.

Three other propositions failed in that election, including athletic fields for the new high school, a new stadium, and funds for future growth. As a result, outside athletic competitions continued at the facilities on the old campus serving Aledo Middle School.

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PARKER COUNTY ESD 1 officially breaks ground on new fire training center

Parker County has seen tremendous growth come to the area in recent years with significantly more planned for the near future. With growth comes change.

For Parker County Emergency Services District No. 1, the best thing they can do about all this change is to ensure they're prepared to deal with it when it matters most.

With that in mind, on Friday, April 21, ESD 1 broke ground on a state-of-the-art training facility that will be housed at 1439 Farmer Road. The 15,000 square-foot structure will allow the department to train in realworld scenarios that are presently lacking in many facilities in neighboring counties.

"The biggest thing that is going to set this apart is our ability to

burn Class A fuels, like wood and normal combustible products that generate smoke," said Battalion Chief Charlie Dall. "A lot of the adjoining counties around us have flammable liquid products. They don't put off the smoke. Modern fire behavior or contemporary fire dynamics that we are experiencing in the real-world setting is a lot of petrochemical products that makes fire burn with a higher heat release and, more notably, a lot of smoke. By creating an environment that can replicate that is going to set this apart from the other training facilities in the area.'

Training in the same conditions the firemen will likely encounter during an emergency call means a decrease in loss of life and loss of property.

"By having the fuel packages that we use, our suppression tactics will be more realistic," Dall expounded. "And by having purpose-built props that replicate actual floor plans we see, it will provide us a better means of practicing and learning victim removal and victim search techniques."

Plans for the facility will include space to replicate multiple types of facilities for the firefighters to train in ranging from standard family dwellings to warehouses. One of the hopes

> is this facility will allow other departments from around the state to come train alongside members of ESD 1 to improve their skills while making an investment in the local economy at the same time.

AHS exchange student fan of Bearcats and new country

Elena Aresi's face lights up as soon as she hears the words "the Aledo football team."

The Italy native is an exchange student at Aledo High School this year, and following a season where her adopted school's team won the 5A-Division I state championship, Aresi is now a certifiable devotee of Bearcat Nation.

"From the first game I really fell in love with it," Aresi said. "I didn't know anything, so I started asking questions to my host family about the sport, and then I kind of got obsessed with it. Now I love American football. All the games were so much fun - the home games, the playoffs and all the way to state. I lost my voice, but it was amazing."

Gina Davis, Aresi's host mother during her stay in the United States, could not agree more.

"My husband is a huge sports fan and he has taken her to every sporting event we have," Davis said. "She went to the Mavericks, and she went to the Rangers and she went to a tennis tournament that was here. But when she said she is obsessed with the Aledo football team, that is not an understatement. She was probably their biggest fan."

The AHS junior has even memorized the Bearcat roster.

Adjusting to differences

Aresi, 17, grew up in the city of Milan and came to the U.S. in August of 2022 to spend her junior year abroad and expand her horizons a bit.

"I wanted to learn English and find out what Texas is all about," Aresi said. "I wanted to learn about your culture."

And what has she learned?

"It's a lot different from my life in Italy," Aresi said. "Italy is completely different. We don't have any sports in high school. The food is different, and people here are nicer than they are in Italy. And then we have smaller cars, and we don't have the rodeo

transportation in Italy," Aresi said. "And I walked a lot. But I can't walk anywhere here. And then one of the conditions of doing this is that I can't drive, and I don't have a license. So I have to rely on my host family to take me everywhere, and that's different."

But the Davis family does not mind, and Aresi has traveled extensively with her host family throughout her stay.

One of Aresi's biggest objectives in studying abroad this school year was to improve her English, and Davis said she has certainly accomplished that goal.

"I think it's improved quite a bit," Davis said. "Her vocabulary has always been extremely impressive. The students have to do a language test before they come and she scored high on that. She has been studying English throughout her time in school, and so when she got here she was using some words that typical 17-year olds from the United States don't use. She spoke really slowly

at first when she got here, and now she speaks almost as fast in English as she does in Italian."

Aresi said that in Milan, her typical day usually involved walking to school with her friends, coming home and making some pasta in the early afternoon.

The school day

is not as long in Italy and students do not eat at school.

Aresi would then go to the gym and maybe into town to hang out with her friends.

There are no extra-curricular activities in Italian schools, and while that makes for a shorter day than in American Schools, Aresi sees the virtues of both.

"I like how American Schools are organized with the extracurricular stuff," Aresi said. "But I don't like eating alone at my house. So they both have their pros and cons, but I would say the American School day is way more fun."

Picturing America in her mind

Aresi admits that while some of her ideas of what America would be like before her visit were pretty accurate, others were a little bit different than reality.

"I watched a lot of movies like 'High School Musical,"' Aresi said. "I thought people would be dancing and singing, but that didn't happen. I had expectations about prom, and I'm really excited about it and all of the sports. I wanted to travel a lot, and we have done that. But I always knew that I was going to have a great time here."

Aresi was allowed to participate in extracurricular activities and decided to join the yearbook staff.

One of the things she has enjoyed the most about her visit is the Aledo community itself.

> "It's been really welcoming," Aresi said. "The school has helped me a lot to make new friends. And I like that it's a small town, and I've gotten to meet a lot of people. It's a lot different than a big city. I have a lot of special people here that I'm going to miss, my friends and host family and just the community. There is so much spirit, and I love the school."

Elena Aresi Davis said this is her family's first exchange student and said it could not have gone better.

> "It's been a fantastic experience," Davis said. "We're all glad we did it. She has joined with our family and participated in everything, and she's 100 percent in on any new thing that we want to do or place we go to eat. She is all in. It's also given us a chance to go back to do a lot of the

Senate, House begin budget reconciliation process

The Texas Senate unanimously approved a \$308 billion twoyear budget last week, the Austin American-Statesman reported. The next step is to reconcile that budget with one passed earlier by the Texas House.

The Senate's budget funds \$10 billion in electric grid reforms, provides pay raises to state employees, and devotes more than half of its budget to funding education.

"Over the next few weeks, I will be working with my colleagues in the Senate and the House to reach a consensus on the differences between the two chambers, and I look forward to sending the final appropriations bill to Gov. (Greg) Abbott before the legislative session ends," state Sen. Joan Huffman, R- Houston said in a statement. Huffman chairs the finance committee.

The main difference in the two budgets is in how to provide property tax relief. The House version dedicates \$17.3 billion to cutting the annual amount a home's appraisal can increase, from 10% to 5%. The Senate budget allocates \$16.5 billion for property tax relief by increasing the homestead exemption from \$40,000 to \$70,000, with added breaks for homeowners 65 and older.

Medicaid expansion for new moms possible The Texas House has passed a

bill that allows low-income moms to stay on Medicaid for a full year after childbirth. The Texas Tribune reported that is a marked increase from current practice, in which postpartum Medicaid expires two months after birth in Texas. The bill has widespread support, including from Gov Greg Abbott and more than 170 groups in the state across the political spectrum. However, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presides over the Senate, has not publicly stated his position on the measure. Texas has the largest uninsured population in the country, with nearly 1 in 5 Texans lacking health insurance, the Tribune reported. "As I have said before, it is essential that the Texas Read this House makes meaningstory online ful progress this year on

better supporting mothers and children in the state — and that starts with extending health coverage for new moms to a full year," House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, said previously when outlining his priorities for the legislative session.

Bill bans 'sexually explicit' books in school libraries

The Texas House last week passed a preliminary measure that requires vendors to assign a rating to books with sexual content before selling them to school districts, The Dallas Morning News reported. The measure requires one more vote in the House before heading to the Senate, where it is likely to pass.

"This bill is about radically sexual content in the hands of unaccompanied children in public school libraries," state Rep. Jared Patterson, R-Frisco, the bill's sponsor, said from the House floor Thursday.

Opponents to the measure are concerned it would lead to books about LGBTQ people being banned from libraries. About a dozen people with the Texas Freedom Network held a read-in on the Capitol rotunda's floor as the bill was being debated.

State Rep. Venton Jones, D-Dallas, is one of eight openly LGBTQ legislators. He said the bill would hurt children who grow up feeling out of place because of their sexual orientation.

"I remember going to my school library looking for books when healthy conversations with my loved ones were not always available or always comfortable," Jones said. "What I was looking for was materials that spoke to me and for stories of the people who came before me."

'Lights out' across Texas helps birds migrate

The annual migration of birds through Texas to northern breeding grounds has begun, and Texans are urged to help by turning off outdoor lights at night from now through May 12, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Bird mortalities are associated with light pollution, which disorients our winged friends. One of every three birds migrating through the United States comes through Texas in the spring and fall – nearly 2 billion in total, according to TPWD.

Texans can help by:

- Turning off all nonessential lights from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. during this migration period.
- Not using landscape lighting to illuminate trees or gardens where birds may be resting.
- Aim security and safety lighting downward.
- In commercial buildings, ensuring custodial work is done by 11 p.m., and lights are turned off.

Children, teachers, and community are worth the investment

A new Political Action Committee (PAC) has recently formed to oppose the Aledo ISD Bond proposed by a group of 49 community members — your neighbors, friends, and fellow taxpayers. The group calls themselves "Concerned Parents of Aledo ISD PAC" and you may see some information from them in your mailbox.

I, too, am a concerned parent of Aledo ISD. That is what convicted me to get involved and find solutions. My family moved here in 2016, and I voted against the 2017 Bond out of concern for taxes, debt, and construction costs. Why? Because that is what someone told me. Someone at church convinced me that if we voted no, then the district would be forced to come back with a smaller, better bond package. Apparently, Aledo had a history of bonds failing before they passed, but my no vote did not change what was needed for the kids in the district. Growth was obviously an issue, and as a newer resident contributing to the "problem," I wanted to be part of the solution.

In 2019, I volunteered for the Bearcat Growth Committee and became intimately engaged in the district's demographic projections, finances, debt management practices, and facility deficits. I quickly learned what was shared with me prior to the 2017 Bond did not paint a complete or accurate picture of Aledo ISD and the challenges the district faced in preparing for the future.

As it turned out, after every failed bond election since 2001, the major projects included in the next bond that passed were at a higher price than originally proposed! Delaying projects had cost the taxpayers more money, put more capacity stress on the district's educational infrastructure, and placed our teachers in the difficult position of educating our kids in less than ideal circumstances (large class sizes, shared resources, aging facilities).

The 2019 Bond went a long way in getting the district "caught up" with facility capacity and providing a similar experience for all students regardless of the campus they attended. Growth has continued as was projected.

The time has arrived once again to decide about our children's educational future, but this concerned parent of Aledo ISD is worried that voters may once again receive information that does not present a complete or accurate picture of the

challenges facing our school district and the solutions proposed.

As a co-chair of the current Aledo Growth Committee that put together the

posal, I can attest that the concerns for taxes, debt, and construction

cation research appear likely as two bills have passed the House, the Statesman reported. One measure changes the name of the National Research University Fund to the Texas University Fund, while another proposes a constitutional amendment to enact the bill and allocate \$3.5 billion to the fund.

Both bills were filed by state Rep. Greg Bonnen, R-Friendswood.

"This is a transformative piece of legislation that will allow Texas for generations to come to be the

intellectual capital of the world," Bonnen said last week. "It changes the eligibility requirements for access to this fund, and it does so in a merit-based approach and in an approach that, as other universities grow

As projected, growth in the area continued in the early 2000s. A 2005 bond provided funding to address the growth. A fourth elementary school (McCall) was added north of I-20, classrooms were added to Coder and Stuard Elementary Schools, and the Aledo Learning Center was constructed to offer more opportunities for high school students. In a second proposition, funding was approved for athletic facilities on the new high school campus, including Bearcat Stadium.

By 2008, Aledo ISD had four elementary schools serving kindergarten to fifth grade, a sixth-grade-only intermediate school, a middle school for seventh and eighth graders, and a high school that was just starting to feel the impact from enrollment growth previously addressed at the elementary levels.

Included in the literature from the 1998 Bond that set a new path for Aledo ISD was the recognition of a future choice for the community to make regarding high school:

"When this new facility reaches capacity, the school board and community will face two possibilities: (1) add classrooms to create a 5A high school of 2,000 students, or (2) create a second 4A high school. That decision will need review in eight to ten years."

In 2008, that decision time had arrived. A 2008 bond provided the funding for the Daniel Ninth Grade campus. Rather than build a second high school, the community at the time decided to expand the current high school campus to its current capacity, creating room to grow into a high school that

would meet the state's highest enrollment classification for UIL competitions.

Ninth-graders moved into their own facility, but utilized the adjacent high school building for some classes and special programs. This is still the case today.

Reconfiguring

Continued growth required some grade level reconfiguration at the elementary school level. Although a 2015 bond approved the construction of a new elementary school, it would not be open for two more years. Fifth-graders joined the sixth-graders at McAnally Intermediate campus between 2015-2017 to accommodate a growing elementary school population.

By 2017, kindergarten enrollment had surpassed 400students(422)forthefirst time as the district opened its fifth elementary school, Walsh Elementary School. Intermediate McAnally returned to sixth grade only as the five elementary schools once again welcomed kindergarten through fifth grade. Coder Elementary remained the only school providing pre-kindergarten classes.

anticipated, more rooftops produced more students, placing more strain on the educational infrastructure in Aledo ISD. More classroom space was

As

needed for elementary school children. Aledo Middle School was experiencing the double trouble of student overcrowding and a deteriorating building. A 2019 bond provided the funding to address both elementary and middle school capacity concerns while

securing the continued lifespan of aging buildings.

With these funds, a sixth elementary school (Annetta) opened in 2021, a second middle school (McAnally) opened in 2022, Aledo Middle School was significantly renovated to nearly a brand new campus with added capacity, Vandagriff Elementary had a new, larger home at the renovated former intermediate school campus, pre-K was moved from Coder Elementary to add classroom space, and an Early Childhood Academy now occupies the space of old Vandagriff Elementary housing all district pre-K students and a daycare for district employees.

The 1955 high school building was retired and torn down after serving students for more than 67 years.

As the community approaches the 100-year anniversary of a "bold commitment to education and investment in their children," reflect for a minute on when you and your family entered this timeline of growth. For the past century, our community has embraced new families moving to the area and welcomed new generations of existing residents as their families grew. We

have all contributed to the growth of this area in some way, and the community has always responded by taking care of the next generation. Special thanks to

Lynn McKinney for her commitment to our children over her many years of service in Aledo ISD and for helping piece together part of our community's history. Also, thank you to Ben McCarthy for keeping history alive through his Facebook group, Backroads of Aledo.
