#### **Anti-bond PACs short** on information

The future facilities available for education in the Aledo Independent School District lie in the hands of voters who will decide the fate of a \$128 million bond issue on Saturday, May 6. Early voting ended May 2.

Residents who live in the school district have received conflicting messages from at least two, and maybe three, political action committees (PACs) during the course of the campaign.

Due to the importance of the issue, The Community News reached out to the various committees to see if more information could be gleaned from those supporting and those opposing the bond.

Political Action Committee finance reports were due to be filed with the Texas Ethics Commission on April 28.

In terms of tracking the source of funds used by the competing PACs, the pro-bond PAC, Bearcats Supporting Greatness 2023, reported contributions of \$1,530 from 33 donors and a loan of \$2,928.18.

All contributors to the pro-bond PAC showed addresses in Aledo, Weatherford, and Fort Worth. The treasurer was listed as Peter R. Healey of Aledo.

Healy told *The Community News* he provided the loan to the group in order to purchase "Vote Yes!" signage.

"I incurred that cost personally because I purchased the signs prior to any fundraising," Healy said. "Adding more context, those signs were purchased from Aledo Branding Company as we also try to support local business in this effort."

One of the PACs opposing the bond, Concerned Parents of Aledo ISD, had not filed its contributor report as of press time.


The Texas Ethics Commission PAC database shows the address of the treasurer of the Concerned Parents of Aledo to be the same address as Pale Horse Strategies, LLC, a political consulting firm whose registered agent is former Texas State Representative Jonathan Stickland.

The treasurer of the Concerned Parents PAC is listed as William Taylor, but no contact information is provided. Neither is telephone or email information listed in open records on how to contact Pale Horse Strategies.

The Community News visited the website of the Concerned Parents of Aledo, but that website did not provide any contact information.

## City's connection with FW water now permanent

#### Land swap with Weatherford approved

The temporary water supply connection between the City of Willow Park and Fort Worth is no more.

"We went on the Fort Worth permanent connection as of 11 a.m. today," Willow Park Public Works Director Michelle Guelker told the city council at its meeting on Tuesday, April 25.

"As of tonight, we will probably start pumping and taking water fulltime," she added.

The supply from Fort Worth will work in conjunction with Willow Park's own 25 wells.

Guelker noted that the line which will also connect Hudson Oaks is in the final stages and should be completed in the next few weeks. She said when that is finished Hudson Oaks will be able to start turning on its pumps as well.

As to how much water the cities can draw from Fort Worth, Guelker said, "We have up to 3.5 million gallons (per day) we can take, but I don't think either of us are anywhere close to being big enough to use that."

She added, however, that during peak times, such as in the summer, up to 1.5 millions gallons per day has been used in the past.

"People love their green grass," she

One council member asked what effect the combination of Fort Worth water and water from the Willow Park wells will have on water hardness. Guelker said, "We'll probably let it run for a while, let it blend with our existing wells and then test it."

Willow Park previously had a couple of temporary agreements with Fort Worth that allowed them to use up to a million gallons per day, Guelker said. The first temporary agreement was in the late summer of 2021 until October of that year, and again in April to October of 2022.

This time, however, the water flow will remain on, something that greatly pleases Willow Park Mayor Doyle Moss, whose campaign in 2017 included this very topic.

"When I knocked on doors, water was a priority," Moss said. "I remember summers in '18 and '19 when our water person would call and we'd be almost out of water. We started working on this in 2017 and here we are turning the switch. I could not be happier."

#### **Council approves** land swap

What was a discussion became a reality as Willow Park city leaders followed what Weatherford did a couple weeks earlier and signed an agreement to swap some land and adjust boundaries. The city council approved the land exchange at its Tuesday meeting.

The adjustments will take place between the extraterritorial jurisdiction of both cities. Extraterritorial jurisdiction is the legal ability of a government to exercise authority beyond its normal boundaries.

## House OKs \$4.5 billion for teacher pay raises

The Texas House Thursday, April 27, passed two education-related bills, one that allocates \$4.5 billion for teacher pay raises and another to increase the annual per-student base funding from \$6,160 to \$6,300 - a 2.3% increase.

The Austin American-Statesman reported the bill would create minimum salaries for teachers ranging from \$35,000 to \$63,000 depending on experience and level of education. It would also increase funding for special education and fine arts.

Some education advocates worry the per-student funding is insufficient to keep up with inflation, which has grown by 17% in the last four years, the Statesman

The bill also creates a method to adjust the per-student funding for inflation every other year, starting in 2025.

#### **Voters may decide** fate of broadband expansion

Voters could decide whether the state should invest \$5 billion to expand internet availability if a bill passed last week by the Texas House makes it through the Senate. House Bill 9, sponsored by state Rep. Trent Ashby, R-Lufkin, would create the Texas Broadband Infrastructure Fund, the Texas Tribune reported.

"This bill will have a measurable impact on each one of your districts," Ashby said last week on the House floor. "No matter whether they be urban, suburban, or rural."

Nearly 7 million Texans do not have reliable broadband service, a fact hammered home during the pandemic, when connectivity often was crucial for schools and people trying to work from home. However, state Comptroller Glenn Hegar said in March that

it would take closer to \$10 billion to get all Texans connected.

The state is also expected to receive federal dollars for broadband expansion out of the infrastructure package passed by Congress in 2021, though it is unknown how much Texas will receive out of the \$42.45 billion allocated for broadband expansion. The state will need to match one-fourth of whatever it receives from the federal government.

#### \$200 annual fee for EV owners goes to Abbott

A bill requiring electrical vehicle owners to pay a \$200 annual fee to the state has passed both chambers and sent to Gov. Greg Abbott, *The Dallas Morning News* reported. Backers of the bill say the higher vehicle registration fees are needed because EV owners don't pay fuel taxes built into the price of fuel and used to fund the state's highway system. The state fuel tax on both gasoline and diesel is 20 cents per gallon.

Opponents of the bill say it would slow the expansion of EVs in the state, which pollute less than vehicles using carbon-based fuels. They also note the fuel tax funds just 29% of what is spent on Texas highways.

"The primary cause of the road funding shortfall in Texas has nothing to do with EVs, but rather with the fact that Texas has not increased their gas tax since 1991," Dylan Jaff, sustainability policy analyst with Consumer Reports, said in a memo.

#### Fentanyl test strip bill stalls in Senate

A bipartisan effort to decriminalize the use of fentanyl test strips has stalled in a Texas Senate committee after passing the Texas House with near unanimous report, The Morning News reported. The bill also has the backing of Abbott.

State Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, chairs the criminal justice committee. He said some members fear making the test strips legal would lead to more people feeling confident about using dangerous drugs.

Fentanyl is often mixed with more expensive drugs such as heroin, leading to thousands of fatal overdoses, including more than 5,000 in Texas from July 2021 to July 2022.

"It's just illogical, but there's a belief by some members that it might safeguard the use," Whitmire said.

The testing strips are currently treated as drug paraphernalia. The strips are used to test for the presence of fentanyl in other drugs.

#### **Bill calls for armed** officers at all schools

A bill that would require school districts to place at least one armed officer on each campus has passed the Texas House, the Statesman reported. The measure comes almost a year after a gunman killed 19 children and two teachers in a mass shooting in Uvalde last May.

Any officer or school employee would have to complete handgun safety training. The measure also requires at least one audit for intruder detection each year in all districts. The state would provide at least \$100 per student and \$15,000 per campus to maintain and improve school safety.

State Sen. Roland Gutierrez, D-San Antonio, has filed several gun control measures in that chamber that have yet to receive a hearing. Gutierrez represents Uvalde and says more needs to be done besides the House measure.

"Let me be very clear: I'm for anything that's going to make our schools safer," Gutierrez said in the Statesman story. "But the

three things that is going to really make our schools safer is extreme risk protective orders, you take guns out of the hands of the mentally ill, Florida did it, it worked; raising the age limit, take guns, AR-15's out of (the hands of) 18-, 19- and 20-year-olds, Florida did it, it worked; closing the gun show loophole and universal background checks."

#### **Disaster declaration** partially approved

President Joe Biden has partially approved the state's request for a major disaster declaration for counties affected by an ice storm in late January.

The original request included 23 counties, but 13 were given access to funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency - Bastrop, Blanco, Burleson, Burnet, Hays, Henderson, Kendall, Lee, Leon, Milam, Robertson, Travis and Williamson.

The ice storm damaged millions of trees, particularly in the Austin area, and caused widespread power outages throughout Central Texas. A total of 350,000 people in Texas were without power at some point, according to Spectrum News 1.

Willow Park will gain 702 acres along the south side of White Settlement Road and another 20 acres along the south side of Crown Road. Meanwhile, Willow Park will give Weatherford 365 acres on the north side of White Settlement Road in the exchange.

Not much development has taken place on these sites. However, given the continued growth of both cities — Weatherford being the largest in Parker County and Willow Park the second largest — that will not likely remain the case.

"It's better for development, better for the city," City Manager Bryan Grimes said. "It gives you a better idea of how you want your city to grow."

Willow Park city officials stressed that this is not an annexation.

## Wastewater treatment facility


The council voted to approve platting a tract of almost nine acres located on J.D. Towles Drive as the Willow Park Water Reclamation Area. It will be the home of the new public wastewater treatment facility.

The new plant is north of Interstate 20 near Crown Point Boulevard, not far from the new site of Willow Park Baptist Church. It's only a few hundred yards from the current location on the north end of the new Crown Point Development.

The city and WPBC agreed to a land swap, with the church getting property where the current treatment plant sits for development.

Also concerning the new wastewater treatment plant, it was reported in the public works report by Guelker:

- A bid request was published in the previous week's issue of *The Community News*.
- A pre-bid meeting was scheduled for 10 a.m. on May 4 at City Hall.



- Several plan sets have been picked up by prospective bidders.
- The effluent line construction meeting was held on April 10 with notice to proceed issued at the same time.

Once underway, construction is expected to be 365 days with an anticipated completion date in mid-July 2024. The lease of the existing wastewater plant will expire in August 2024.

## New home now permanent

After discussing in executive session, the council returned to open forum and approved moving ahead with the purchase of the new city hall at 120 El Chico Tr. At a meeting on April 3 the council voted unanimously to announce the approval of the issuance of certificates of obligation in the amount of \$8.5 million for the purchase, renovating, improving and equipping the building.

Along with housing city officials and council, the building will serve as public safety facilities, judicial facilities, a city hall, and municipal facilities for administrative offices for city departments.

Grimes had previously said that the cost to lease the building annually is about \$200,000, which would be around \$6 million over the span of 30 years. Also, there are two other tenants in the building, Sylvan Learning Center and McKnight Title. Should they decide to stay for the remainder of their respective leases, one ends in July of 2026 and the other in December of 2026. Grimes said those leases bring in around \$100,000 annually.

ort City officials and staff moved into the building in January, originally signing a 30-month lease for the approximately 8,700 square feet of space, almost triple the 3,189 the amount they had in their previous home of many years.

home of many years.

As for when the building will officially be theirs, Grimes noted that there are still some official procedures and paperwork that has to be done, but that it should all be in place by the summer.

"Official, official, here's the keys to your new house July 1," he said.

#### **Nolte Addition**

Council approved the platting of approximately 30 acres south of East Bankhead Highway. The owner, Barbara Nolte, noted the subdivision of the five lots in the first block is intended for partial sale.

Council also approved an additional 15 foot right-of-way dedication on East Bankhead Highway for future expansion to 90 foot minor arterial road, based on the city's thoroughfare plan.

Four of the lots have three frame homes and two mobile homes on them, with the fifth lot having two stock tanks and cattle.

"It was just one parcel, now they're subdividing it into five," clarified Planning and Development Director Toni Fisher.

#### **Quarterly police report**

Interim Police Chief Daniel Franklin presented the department's quarterly report, which included:

- Establishing the first school resource officer at Trinity Christian Academy.
- Redesigning and equipping administrative Tahoes, recently receiving two Ford Explorer Interceptors.
- Recently hiring a cadet in Weatherford Police Academy who will graduate in May to begin full-time officer process, leaving one unfilled position that has been posted online.
- Ordering 20 new Glock 47 weapons to replace older weapons that Glock is no longer producing, ordering 20 red dot pistol optics, ordering new holsters to accommodate the new weapons and optics.
- The new Citizens Police Academy had a record high attendance of 13.

- Installing the department's first license plate reader system.
- Applying for and receiving Texas
  Department of Transportation
  STEP (Selective Traffic
  Enforcement Program) grants,
  successfully deploying two grant
  waves with future deployment of
  Click It or Ticket and Operation
  Slow Down.
- Being active with Weatherford High School's internship program, receiving positive feedback from the instructor at Weatherford School District.
- Continued compliance with Texas Police Chief's Best Practice Standards.
- Continued engagement in the community, including active Facebook engagement, patrol walk-throughs and talks with residents at the Preserve apartment complex, continued participation and hosting of car seat safety checks, hosting three blood drives for American Red Cross, Sergeant Jaclin Ramirez was voted in as a chairperson to represent Parker County in the Cook's and Safe Kids group related to child passenger seat safety.
- Corporal Quincy Hamilton is currently attending drug recognition expert training. There are only approximately 350 drug recognition experts in the state of Texas.

#### **Street improvements**

Council received an update from City Engineer Gretchen Vasquez on the city's street improvements. The project is 25% complete and consists of removing and replacing approximately 36,500 square yards of existing asphalt pavement with concrete paving and replacing approximately 18,600 square yards of asphalt pavement with 2-inch hot mix asphalt concrete.

The family plans to hold a private memorial.







As part of his closing remarks Tuesday, Grimes said citizens should expect a decrease in taxes in the next fiscal year.

"As we start putting our budget together we will see a significant tax decrease," he said. "I don't want to commit to a number now."

The decrease will come about as a result of the annexation of the city's fire department by Parker County **Emergency Services District** 1. That freed up approximately \$1.4 million in the city's annual budget that was previously going to support the fire department.

Hoffman said more than 250 folks showed up for the free event at McCall Elementary School that included a dog costume contest and a weenie dog race. "It was the best attended event I've seen since I've been with the city," Hoffman said.

They are active members of Aledo United Methodist Church. Julie has also served on the school board since May of 2017, though when her second term is up in May she will step aside as she is not running again.



Though he retired from competitive drag boat racing four decades ago, Marvin Savage still loves to be around them, to reminisce, and generally take in all he can without actually getting behind the wheel and going almost 200 mph.

Five years ago Savage started an annual race boat reunion at his farm in Weatherford. Speed boat enthusiasts from all over the United States come to partake in all things boat racing.

And yes, you are welcome also as the event is open to the public beginning at 10 a.m. on Saturday.

Marvin Savage Farm is located at 2100 Greenwood Rd. Admission is free.

"I was the only one in my family that wanted to go fast," Savage said with a smile. "Someone told me I couldn't drive a race boat. So I built a boat and won the first race I entered."

Savage was clocked at 107 mph in that first race. Before retiring in 1983 he would win the National Drag

championship in 1978. In 1983 he was clocked at speeds of 163, 164, 167 and 167, retiring after that season.

In 2021 Savage was inducted into the Drag Boat Racing Hall of Fame.

Ironically, Savage, who grew up in Brock, did not like racing boats at first when his friend Elmer Youngblood asked him to participate following Savage's return from the military. Then came a challenge he couldn't ignore.

Savage not only proved the naysayers wrong, he did so in championship fashion.

Saturday's event will include a barbecue lunch with soft drinks and lots of conversation about boats and racing, Savage said. Featured visitors will include about five folks who have been inducted the Drag Boat Racing Hall of

Boat Association high points Fame and two more who will be inducted this October.

> Also, there will be another racer from Weatherford, Mike McGraw, who has set some records in a top fuel jet boat.

Kevin Kinsley, who has reached more than 300 mph in a drag race car and 273 in a drag race boat, will also be on hand.

"This is from a standstill start to 1,000 feet," Savage said.

Mary Rife, the only woman ever to reach a speed of more than 200 mph in a drag race boat, will also be on hand.

Marvin Savage Farm should be familiar in equestrian circles. In 2016 he and a partner started an English riding competition that went international. Though he retired from that in 2016, he kept the farm for trainers and students.

This weekend, however, the horses have to understand the focus will be on boats.

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

## St. Peters, Campbell set personal records

Aledo will once again be well represented in Austin come mid-May. The Bearcats will have seven competitors and the Ladycats will have three at the Class 5A State Track and Field Meet at the University of Texas May 11-13.

They qualified by finishing in the top two of their respective events at this past weekend's Region 2 Meet in Lubbock.

Lauren St. Peters will make a second consecutive trip to Austin. The junior set a personal record in winning the shot put with a throw of 45 feet, 05.75 inches. She placed fourth at state in the event last year, as well as taking fourth in the discus, though she did not qualify in the latter this year.

Also returning is junior pole vaulter Taylor Hindman, who placed second at regionals with a clearance of 11-09. She tied for seventh at state last season with teammate Maggie Kilburn, who was fourth at regionals this season.

The other Ladycat advancing is freshman Sofia Brandenburg. She was second in the 800-meter run, clocking a 2:15.19.

"We had a really good showing at the Regional Meet. I'm very proud of how these girls train hard and compete," Ladycats coach Mike Pinkerton said. "We have three girls going to the state meet, and I believe that all three have a tremendous shot of making the podium. We will be working hard in preparation, and will be ready for state!"

Qualifying individually for the Bearcats was junior pole vaulter Brad Campbell, who cleared a personal-best 15-03 for second place at regionals.

"Brad had a great meet at regionals, had several great attempts at his PR bar. He should have a great chance to medal at state, too," Bearcats coach Andrew Clark said.

Joining him will be two relays for the Bearcats. The quartet of Hawk Patrick-Daniels, Aven Lawrence, Jaden Allen, and Hauss Hejny took second in the 800 relay with a school-record time of 1:26.30. Lawrence and Hejny joined

Former Aledo Bearcat Chuck Filiaga has earned a chance to shine at the highest level of football there is.

Filiaga signed a three-year free agent contract with the Green Bay Packers on Monday, May 1. The deal is reported to be worth \$2,695,000. It breaks down into \$750,000 this year, \$915,000 in 2024 and \$1,030,000 in 2025.

Filiaga, 6-foot-6 and 321 pounds, joins a short list of former Bearcats to sign with an NFL team. The most

recent was another offensive lineman, Kyle Hix, who signed with the New England Patriots in 2011 after a standout career at the University of Texas. His career was cut short by injuries and he was released in 2013.

for Aledo in 2016, helping them go 16-0 and win a state championship.

"I'm happy for him. He's worked hard. He's a good young man, a team guy. He's very deserving of this opportunity.

"I remember he'd come in every day and say 'Hi, coach I love you.' Just a fantastic guy."

Filiaga spent five seasons at the University of Michigan (2017-21) before playing one season at the University of Minnesota (2022). He appeared in 39 games with 11 starts (eight at left guard and three at right guard) for the Wolverines and started all 13 games he played at right guard for the Gophers.

In 2022, Filiaga blocked for an offense

that rushed for 2,698 vards and 33 touchdowns. He helped pave the way for Minnesota to gain 679 vards of offense, third most in school history, against Western Illinois in a 62-10 victory.

Filiaga wrapped up his college career by helping the Gophers defeat Syracuse 28-20 in the Pinstripe Bowl. Minnesota finished with a 9-4 record.

Filiaga was also named third-team All-Big Ten by the league's coaches in 2022.

Filiaga helped Michigan to a 12-2 record and a College Football Playoff semifinals berth in 2021 before falling to national champion Georgia in the semifinals, 34-11.


At Aledo, Filiaga helped the Bearcats to a 16-0 record and the Class 5A Division II state championship in 2016. As a senior, he led an offensive line that helped the offense produce 3,851 yards through the air and 4,656 yards on the ground, blocking for two 1,000-yard rushers, Jase McLellan (now at Alabama) and Michael Jordan. He was a member of the PrepStar Top 150 Dream Team and was named first-team All-USA Texas as a senior.

"I'm really excited for Chuck and wish him the best at Green Bay," said former Aledo head coach Tim Buchanan, who was the athletic director when Filiaga played.

"He has to go out and make it happen now, but I believe he has a good chance," Wood said. "And I sure am rooting for him."



## Bearcats rough up Rider in regular season finale

#### Bi-district set against Trimble **Tech**

After struggling to be consistent throughout the first half of districts, Aledo's figured it out at the perfect time. Winners of five straight District 5-5A games, the Bearcats (21-10 overall, 9-3 in districts) put an exclamation point on their 2023 regular season campaign with a 4-1 home victory over Wichita Falls Rider on Saturday, April

"We've been preaching the need to be consistent all vear," said Bearcat head coach Chad Barry. "We seem to have found it in the last couple of weeks. This time of year, you need to be playing your best baseball. You need to be building to your potential and have some momentum going into the playoffs. I feel like we've accomplished that over the last two weeks."

Aledo's primary area of concern with a lack of consistency for much of the season has been at the plate. Too often early in district play Bearcat hitters tried to do too much with a single swing of the bat.

"We've been trying to get the kids to buy into what we want to do," Barry said. "Yeah, everybody wants to see you hit a home run, and that's

great. But home runs are not going to be what we hang our hat on. We're going to hit singles up the middle. Our gap-to-gap approach is what is going to carry us offensively. I've felt like over the last couple of weeks we've done a really good job overall up-and-down the lineup of hitting to the right-center alley and the left-center alley. It seems like it's kind of started to come together for us lately. This is the right time for that to happen."

Since Aledo's district win streak started back on March 14, the Bearcats have outscored opponents 38-11. The lone home run for the Bearcats in that span, an inside-theparker, came when the streak began against Northwest as Trace Mazon motored around the bases after hitting a deep fly to right field that accounted for a pair of runs.

The other 36 runs the Bearcats have scored in the last five district games have been the result of plate discipline, taking what opposing pitchers have given them in terms of walks, and stringing together hits in run-scoring opportunities.

"We've started to realize when we quit trying to yank everything down the line, we're having a lot more success through the lineup," Barry said. "We're a lot tougher outs. And now

because we've got guys on base. Pitchers are having to challenge us more."

The trio of doubles collected by Andrew Cambre, Ryan Jones, and Mazon during the matchup against Rider are prime examples of what happens when pitchers are forced to challenge quality hitting, as Barry alluded to. Those opportunities start with players like Brooks Burdine drawing a nine-pitch walk in one inning after having bunted for singles on two different occasions earlier in the game.

Doing whatever it takes to manufacture runs is one thing. But dependable pitching and fundamentally-sound defense have turned the Bearcats into a true triple-threat heading into the playoffs. With the top seed in the district already locked down regardless of whether Aledo won or lost to Rider, Barry threw three different pitchers across seven innings.

"The result of [Saturday's] game had no bearing on our finish in district," he stated. "It was just a pride thing. We felt like we had a couple kids who needed to get back on the mound, and hadn't been on the mound a whole lot in the last week or so. We needed to get them some

work. We felt like with the district race already wrapped up, this was an opportunity to do that against a good-hitting ball club."

Luke Saunders closed the door on Rider as he collected a game-high five strikeouts in two innings of work.

Now the Bearcats turn their focus to the playoffs. The first order of business is a best-of-three, bi-district series against Trimble Tech (11-15)
