Old Weatherford Road location provides breathing room for county services

Elected officials and well wishers joined with the East Parker County Chamber of Commerce to hold a ribbon cutting at the new East Parker County Sub Courthouse on Tuesday, May 16.

The facility, located at 16600 Old Weatherford Road (just to the south of the Morningstar development), houses an office of the Parker County Tax Assessor-Collector, the Pct. 4 Constable, and the Pct. 4 Justice of the Peace. Vehicle registrations can be handled at the new office both through in-person visits and by way of a drive-thru window.

The building's functions relocated from the old Brookshire's building on the north side of I-20 in Willow Park.

County Judge Pat Deen said the new sub courthouse was a step in the right direction, as it is owned by the county. The county was paying rent at the previous location.

In addition to a courtroom for Justice of the Peace Pct. 4 Tim

Mendolia, the building has a jury room with an adjacent office for a deputy, a meeting room for attorneys and a room that can serve as an office for a station deputy.

The land for the facility was donated to the county by the Morningstar development.

The Tax Assessor-Collector office is open from weekdays. Auto registration is open from 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., but closed from 12-1 for lunch. Title hours are from 8 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The Justice of the Peace office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, but closed from 12-1 for lunch.

inappropriate behavior with a 19-year-old legislative aide. Slaton, R-Royce City, was found to have had sexual intercourse with the aide, who works in his office, and to have supplied alcohol to an underaged person on at least three occasions, the *Statesman* reported.

Slaton resigned the day before the vote to expel him but would have remained an officeholder and been paid until a successor was elected through a special election.

"Expulsion of a member of this body is rare," House Speaker Dade Phelan said. "Mr. Slaton's predatory behavior merits such a consequence. I am proud of my colleagues for holding each of us accountable."

Slaton is the first House member to be expelled since 1927, according to the *Statesman*.

Texans enjoy a cooler-than-average April

The state enjoyed somewhat cooler temperatures in April than in years past, according to Dr. Mark Wentzel, a hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board. The eastern half of the state experienced

above-average rainfall, though drought conditions persisted in the central part of the state, from Laredo to the Panhandle. with half the state, East and coastal Texas, experiencing well-above-average rainfall, while the other half, West Texas and the Panhandle, received well-below-normal precipitation," Wentzel wrote.

Drought conditions dropped 12 percentage points compared to the end of March, with 55% of the state now under drought. The arrival of the El Niño weather system by fall is forecast to bring above-average rainfall to the state and lead to widespread drought relief by the end of 2023.

Eight more counties added to disaster declaration

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has added eight more Texas counties to a disaster declaration after an early February ice storm caused considerable damage across wide swaths of the state, Gov. Greg Abbott announced last week.

"This update will help support ongoing recovery efforts in Texas communities impacted by Winter Storm Mara in February," Abbott said.

> The eight added to the 13 already approved by FEMA are Falls, Hopkins, Red River, Anderson, Gillespie, Kerr, Kimble and Limestone counties. The counties are now eligible for federal funding for debris removal

and repairs to infrastructure.

House considers modified version of Senate voucher bill

An 80-page version of the Senate's school voucher proposal is now before the House education committee, the Texas Tribune reported. This version would cut the number of students eligible for the program, modify the state's standardized testing program, and eliminate the Senate bill's restriction on teaching about gender and sexual orientation.

A move to get the bill quickly out of committee failed after state Rep. Ernest Bailes, R-Shepherd, questioned why the committee wanted to move forward without holding a public hearing.

"You're trying to bring an 80-page substitution to this body and force a vote without thoughtful deliberation," Bailes said. House committees have until May 20 to vote on Senate bills to advance them to the full floor.

The Senate version of the bill would give parents who opt out of the public school system up to \$8,000 in taxpayer money to pay for a child's private schooling and related educational expenses, such as textbooks or tutoring.

Casino bill dies; sports betting advances

The bid to bring casino gambling to Texas is again officially dead, the Texas Tribune reported.

"Members, I do know when it's time to fold 'em," state Rep. Charlie Geren, R-Fort Worth, said Friday as he postponed consideration of House Joint Resolution 155 until Jan. 12, 2027. A related bill sponsored by state Rep. John Kuempel, R-Seguin, was also postponed until after the session.

A separate bill to legalize online sports betting barely made it out of the House. Both measures required a two-thirds majority to be put on the ballot as proposed constitutional amendments. The Tribune reported that bill faces long odds in the Senate, where Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, the presiding officer, has said his chamber does not have enough votes to pass it.

It's official. Fort Hood, named for a high-ranking Confederate officer in the Civil War, has been renamed Fort Cavazos, in honor of native Texan Richard E. Cavazos, the country's first Hispanic fourstar general.

Fort Cavazos is the Army's largest armored, active-duty military installation, according to a report in the *Austin American-Statesman*. It is one of nine that are being renamed around the country, based on recommendations from a naming committee commissioned by Congress to remove the names, symbols and displays that honor the Confederacy.

Cavazos was widely decorated for his service during the Korean and Vietnam wars, receiving two Distinguished Service Cross medals during his military career. He died in 2017 at 88.

<u>GuestColumn</u> Texas takes giant leap forward on flying vehicles

It might sound like science fiction, but the first highway for flying vehicles is already being developed in the skies over Alliance Airport north of Fort Worth. And an air corridor for flying taxis and ambulances could be a reality within the next three to five years.

Texas lawmakers have taken note and have made bold steps this legislative session to ensure the state's continued leadership in the development of flying vehicle technology through passage of legislation to help guide the growth of this emerging hightech field. Their work came to fruition late last week when Senate Bill 2144 by state Sen. Tan Parker,

R-Flower Mound, and spon-
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by Gov. Greg Abbott.Th

The legislation establishes the Advanced Air Mobility Advisory Committee to address implementation of flying vehicle technology. It builds on efforts begun two years ago on urban air mobility.

What is advanced air mobility? SB 2144 defines the term as "an aviation transportation system that uses a highly automated

aircraft, manned or unmanned, to transport passengers or cargo at lower altitudes."

Flying vehicles might seem exotic, but they're as Texan as the pickup truck. NASA began collaborating with the Texas-born Vertical Flight Society nearly 10 years ago to explore opportunities in this evolving field. SB 2144 takes further steps to ensure Texas will be on track to be a leader in this trillion-dollar industry.

This legislation aims to power a coordinated push in this nascent flying vehicle technology — from private aerospace leaders like Boeing to government agencies like NASA to higher ed institutions like the University of Texas at Austin and Texas A&M University.

In addition, SB 2144 would coordinate efforts by the state's workforce and education agen-

> cies to ensure Texans have the skills they would need to work in the air mobility industry.

The creation of an advisory panel on air mobility will help shepherd the development of these cutting-edge technologies. While this represents just the first steps, they are important ones. If this is to become a giant leap forward for all Texans, our leaders must continue to look for innovative ways to push the air mobility industry forward in the years and decades to come.

Weatherford College earns first World Series berth

Next stop: Grand Junction By Crystal Woerly Weatherford College

For the first time in school history,

Weatherford College will play for a national championship in baseball. The Coyotes (50-9) outlasted New Mexico Junior College 15-13 to win the Region V

Tournament championship on Tuesday at Roger Williams Ballpark. WC earned a berth in the 10-team NJCAA Division I World Series, known as the JUCO World Series, in Grand Junction, Colorado, happening May 27 to June 3.

Weatherford is ranked No. 5 in the country; New Mexico is No. 9. It was WC's 18th consecutive win.

When the game began Monday night, Weatherford built a 10-1 lead by the bottom of the fourth inning. But New Mexico had a six-run outburst in the fifth and sixth innings.

WC had a 12-8 lead in the bottom of the seventh when the game was delayed due to lightning in the area. The contest was postponed until Tuesday afternoon.

Weatherford quickly tacked on three runs when play resumed, giving the Coyotes a 15-8 lead.

But New Mexico wasn't done. The Thunderbirds put five more runs on the board in the top of the ninth inning. The Coyotes got the final out and the celebration ensued for the team's first regional title.

Robin Villeneuve continued to produce at the plate, going 3-for-3 with three doubles, three RBI and three runs scored. Jack Clark was 2-for-3 with two runs. Jack Arthur and Josh Zapata each hit home runs.

Charlie Giese got the hard-earned win on the mound, scattering nine hits over five and two-thirds innings Monday. Giese gave up five earned runs and two walks

while striking out four.

In a century of living, Jean Buford has clearly seen a lot.

But even she was overwhelmed by the turnout for her 100th birthday party Thursday, May 11, at the Parker County Senior Center. A crowd of about 200 in attendance joined the Webster Brothers (Don and John) in singing happy birthday, among other activities to show their love for their favorite centenarian, who hit the century mark the next day.

"I'm overcome. You just don't know how much I appreciate this," Jean told the crowd. "Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!"

Jean is generally considered an inspiration for anyone who knows her. She lives by herself, still drives, goes to church each Sunday, and she volunteers at nursing facilities and enjoys coming to the Senior Center regularly for fellowship.

"My license is good for one more year," Jean said. "I have a 2002 Buick and it doesn't even have 40,000 miles on it."

Then, she added with a laugh, "I don't intend to buy another."

Judging from the love that was in the room, odds are a collection could be taken up to get Jean a new car if she changed her mind.

The day's activities also included a proclamation from Weatherford Mayor Paul Paschall, a reading of a letter from Governor Greg Abbott, and the presentation of a flag from State Senator Phil King's office.

And for anyone who might think Jean is frail at her age, Jennifer Bledsoe, Director of Operations for Parker County Committee on Aging, told a story indicating otherwise. She said Jean fell recently and it was suggested she go to the hospital for stitches, to which Jean replied, "I "When you grew up in the depression, you ate meat loaf," Jean said.

Many came forward to have their picture taken with Jean, who was presented with a crown. It's the second time in a month she's been crowned as she was also the queen at the recent Senior Prom at the Parker County Sheriff's Posse Event Center.

A group of students from Weatherford Christian School dressed up as Rosie the Riveter in her honor. Among the many accomplishments in her life, Jean was a World War II Navy WAVE. A couple of the many well-wishing posters hanging up in the Senior Center referred to her as the "Original Rosie the Riveter."

"She's become very dear to me. She went to (Texas) Tech and I did as well, so we started with that in common," said her good friend and Senior Center volunteer Mendy Billingsley. "She's a beautiful person. I've never met anyone else like her and I'm sure I never will again. She's just Jean."

Sheri Matherley, a new volunteer at the Senior Center, only recently met Jean but said the immediately made a strong impact on her life.

"She's a great inspiration. Something really neat is my son, who turns 19 tomorrow, shares her birthday," she said.

A special surprise for Jean was the arrival of her daughter Annie Stephenson and son-in-law J.D. Stephenson.

"My kids weren't supposed to be here until Friday," said an excited Jean. "I'm ecstatic. I knew they (Senior Center) were going to do a little something, but not this!"

Jo Saunders, also a Senior Center volunteer, has known Jean for a couple years. She said Jean is the epitome of getting everyone you can out of life for as long as you can.

"She doesn't sit home like a lot of people when they are aging. She's involved. She gets out," Saunders said. "She appreciates life."

A special highlight was when the Webster Brothers dedicated the hymn "How Great Thou Art" to Jean and the audience joined in singing.

"I think Jean is an inspiration and an example of God's blessings in our lives," Don Webster said. "We are honored to be able to celebrate her 100th birthday."

One way or another, Braylon Mahanay is going to play his final round as an Aledo Bearcat golfer next Tuesday, May 23. In fitting Aledo fashion it will be at the Class 5A State Tournament on the White Wing Golf Club in Georgetown.

It's not quite the ending Mahanay was hoping for as he's competing solo, his team coming up just shy of a return visit at last month's Region 1 Tournament in Lubbock. That inspires Mahanay even more to finish strong to honor his longtime teammates and friends.

"Yeah, we're not going as a team, and I wish we were," he

said. "But I thought if I could make it to state one last time to play for a state title that would be a great way to end my career here."

Mahanay qualified as a medalist for state after tying for third at the regional tournament. He bested the legendary West Texas winds at the Rawls Golf Course to make his return to Georgetown and another course he knows well.

"We all know how hard the Rawls Course was," Mahanay said. "This course is challenging in a different way, though.

"I know the holes visually. It's not long, but it's pretty tight. You've got to hit it straight."

White Wing can be described as deceptively challenging. Bearcats coach Brian Mourning noted that it forces golfers to play smart – which is something Mahanay does well.

"Braylon's going to be Braylon. He has an even keel attitude that serves him well," Mourning said. "He's the anchor of this guy's team. He doesn't get frustrated."

Last season Mahanay tied for 38th individually at state with rounds of 80 and 77. That experience, along with playing in a state preview at White Wing in March, give him added confidence this season, he said.

"At the beginning of the season I was playing pretty good, but the preview, the Bearcat Brawl, district, Rawls and now, I am feeling really great about my game," he said.

Though he'll only be a Bearcat in heart and spirit after this season, Mahanay isn't going far. He has committed to play for Weatherford College next season.

"They're a top 20 Juco (junior college) in the state, and they're close to home also," he said. "And coach (Jesse) Speirs is a great guy. I'm going to enjoy playing for him."

Mourning added, "I look for him to go to Weatherford College, play great, and then finish elsewhere playing for a larger program. He has a lot of great golf ahead of him - and a lot in life. He's just an all-around great young man."

As for saying farewell to his golfing days at Aledo and friends/teammates, some of whom he said he's known since



kindergarten, Mahanay said, "I've definitely been thinking about it. It's definitely bittersweet. But it's time for the next chapter. Hopefully we can close this one in a big way."

Former Bearcat draws praise from manager

From the time they first pick up a bat and a ball, just about every young baseball player dreams of the opportunity to play in the Major Leagues with their family and friends cheering them on from the stands.

For Aledo's Cody Bradford, that dream became a reality on Monday night as he took the mound for the American League West Division-leading Texas Rangers in the series opener at Globe Life Field against the National League East-leading Atlanta Braves.

While his first big league start didn't go as he hoped, the lanky left-hander displayed a fearless tenacity, even while facing some of the best hitters the game has to offer.

"He was ok," Rangers manager Bruce Bochy said after the game. "I think it's fair to say he made some mistakes, especially with his off-speed pitches. We had trouble keeping the ball in the ballpark tonight. He wasn't giving up a lot of hits, but the ones he gave up did some damage.

It's tough to debut against this club. But, he battled. He gave us five innings. It's always good to get your first start. He'll learn from this."

Bradford's trial by fire started with the first batter he faced. Before the first official pitch was thrown, the lefty hurler was sweating like a preacher at a tent revival in August. Ronald Acuna Jr. led off the game for the Braves in the midst of an MVP-caliber year through the first month of the season. Bradford took Acuna to a full count, but missed just a touch high with the 3-2 changeup away to lead off the game with a walk.

With the defense aligned to cover the right side of the infield, Bradford was able to get Matt Olsen to chop a grounder to Josh Jung for the 5-to-6-to-3 double play

that helped the rookie get out of the first unscathed.

Bradford started off the second inning picking up the first major league strikeout of his career on a 2-2 fastball on the outer half that Marcell Ozuna couldn't catch up with.

The next pitch he threw ended up being a slider down over the middle of the plate that Kevin Pillar sent sailing 411 feet into the bullpen to make it a 2-0 game.

As the lineup turned over at the top of the order later in the second inning with a runner on second and two outs, Acuna channeled his inner Tiger Woods to hit a two-run golf shot off a breaking ball below the zone that landed in the second deck 454 feet away as the Braves went up 4-0.

A credit to his grit in light of the towering shot sent out to the fans in their previous encounter, when Acuna stepped in the box in the top of the fifth. Bradford went right after him. With a runner on, Bradford sat Acuna down looking for the first out of the inning.

In total, Bradford threw five complete innings surrendering six runs on seven hits while walking a pair and striking out three Braves.

"A debut is never an easy time, because I'm sure [Bradford's] got the nerves going," Bochy surmised. "Especially against a good team. At times he executed his pitches very well. At times it just got away from him. When you're facing a team like [the Braves], you're probably not going to get away with too many mistakes."

The Rangers called up Bradford for a spot start on Monday in order to give the rest of the rotation an extra day of rest following a lengthy road trip. Bradford has now been sent back to Round Rock, where he was named the Pacific Coast League's Player of the Month for April. There is some speculation he may return to the big leagues before the All-Star break in July if he is able to return to form back in Triple-A.

with consistency, but it is a strength of Taylor's," Aledo pole vault coach John Rhodes said. "She is not the tallest or the fastest athlete but she brings her best every time. I'm really excited to see what she can do as a senior."

St. Peters concluded her season with the second-best throw of her career - a season that might not have been were it not for her determination. She had knee surgery in early 2023, but she fought back to get a medal after narrowly missing with fourth-place finishes in the shot put and discus as a sophomore.

"For her to go through what she went through and get back here and get on that podium — is nothing short of amazing," Pinkerton. "I am so proud of her and she is an inspiration to many."

St. Peters had the best throw of her career at regionals, and it was the top qualifying throw for state. She threw 47-5.75.

In a surprise upset, Serena Ramirez slipped past top-seeded St. Peters and second seed Madeleine Fey of Midlothian to win state with a throw of 48-7.75. Fey was second at 47-10.

Brandenburg clipped almost a full second off her previous best time of 2:14.21. In fact, she was in contention to medal herself, sitting in second place with 200 meters to go.

"Her inner motivation is unbelievable," Pinkerton said. "Now, Sofia has been here. She knows what it's like. She knows the procedures. I'm expecting great things of her in the years to come.

Bearcats fall to Burleson

Playoff run comes to an end

The Aledo Bearcats' baseball season came to an end on Friday, May 12, at the Depot in Cleburne.

Burleson swept Aledo out of the Class 5A playoffs with back-to-back wins in the area (second round) series by scores of 8-4 and 10-4, respectively.

After putting away Trimble Tech in the bi-district round of the playoffs, Aledo head baseball coach Chad Barry said the series with Burleson would be night and day different than the one-sided affair with the Bulldogs. Although the Bearcats' record over the Elks in the second round of playoff baseball has been one of prolonged success, having dismissed Burleson from the playoffs each of the last two seasons, Barry cautioned his club to the formidable nature of their familiar foe.

Entering the series, the Bearcats (23-12) had managed to put their game all together in the weeks leading up to the playoffs as they locked down the top seed in District 5-5A. For much of the season as they struggled to find consistency with their approach at the plate, running the bases well, and avoiding the occasional defensive blunder, quality pitching was the aspect their game on which they were able to rely.

That was not the case for the series with Burleson (25-6).

Over the two-game series, Aledo pitchers struggled with their command early in counts, forcing them to pitch from behind. In Thursday's

series opener the Elks amassed 13 hits in the seven-inning affair. In Game 2 on Friday, the Bearcats issued nine free passes onto the bases while simultaneously giving up eight hits as Burleson batters once again found themselves in favorable counts often throughout the game. In total, Aledo walked 15 hitters in 14 innings of play over the two games.

"You can't do things like that in the playoffs and expect to live long," Barry said after Game 2.

"We walked six [on Thursday]. We walked nine [on Friday]. You can't do that with teams like [Burleson] that can really swing the bat."

Down a game in the best-ofthree series, Aledo started off the home half of Game 2 aggressively. Brooks Dwinell reached base on a one-out fielding error by the Elks' third baseman. He was quickly joined on the base path by Trace Mazon, who doubled to left to put both Bearcats in scoring position with the cleanup spot in the order coming to the plate.

Andrew Cambre did exactly what the cleanup batter is supposed to do. The senior designated hitter sent a shot right back up the box into center that cleared the bases as both Dwinell and Mazon came around to score.

In recent history, games between Aledo and Burleson have been dog-

fights where no lead is ever safe. That certainly held true on Friday. After Aledo went up 2-0 in the bottom of the first, the Elks fired right back in the top of the second to go up by a score of 3-2.
