Bradford improves in third bigleague start

Former Bearcat has solid outing at home

Former Aledo Bearcat Cody Bradford made the third spot start of his career as a major league pitcher, and his second at Globe Life Field, on Tuesday, June 13 against the visiting Los Angeles Angels.

Bradford stepped in on short rest, having last pitched for Triple-A Round Rock on Friday, June 9 where he threw eight solid innings to improve his record to 8-1 on the season.

On Tuesday, he was given the arduous task of facing the Angels, third in the American League West - which the Rangers lead - who defeated the Rangers 9-6 in 12 innings the night before. Bradford ended the night without a decision to his credit, despite putting together his best performance in The Show thus far.

The lefty threw 4.1 innings. He gave up just a single earned run on a pair of hits while striking out three Angels and walking just one, including his final out of the night when he struck out Mickey Moniak looking on a four-seamer down and in to lead off the fifth inning.

The Rangers held a 2-1 lead when Bradford exited the game. However, the Angels rallied for three runs in the sixth and again in the top of the ninth to pull out the 7-3 win in Arlington.

"I thought our pitching was pretty good," Rangers manager Bruce Bochy said after the game. "Bradford, what a job he did! [We] had to limit his pitches, going on early rest."

Filling in for Jon Gray, who is dealing with a blister on his throwing hand, Bradford's ERA in the big leagues fell from 7.20 to 5.65 following Tuesday's stellar performance. The 25-year-old continues to improve with each opportunity. For now he will return to Round Rock to make his next scheduled start later on in the week.

Franklin named new chief of police

Daniel Franklin promoted to police chief after interim

In a decision that surprised even Daniel Franklin, the Willow Park City Council came out of executive session Tuesday, June 13, and announced they were promoting Franklin to the position of police chief. He had held the job on an interim basis since Carrie Ellis retired and left the area in late March.

Many considered Franklin the front runner and figured he'd end up getting the position - but not for a little while longer.

"Last I heard they were scheduling interviews for a couple weeks," Franklin said. "It's all pretty much still a shock.

"I'm grateful the council and mayor had faith in me to continue to run the department."

Franklin also previously had the title of interim chief in Jacksonville, where he was on the force for 20 years before coming to Willow Park in 2018 as assistant chief.

"We had some quality candidates, but the continuity, I think, is important," Willow Park Mayor Doyle Moss said. "He's stepped up. He's very qualified, very professional, has good communication with his patrolmen and staff.

"Everybody felt like he was the best guy. It was unanimous."

Central figure in Paxton case charged

The Austin real estate developer who is at the heart of Attorney General Ken Paxton's impeachment was arraigned on eight federal charges Friday, the AustinAmerican-Statesman reported. Nate Paul was arrested by the FBI on Thursday.

Paul, 36, has been accused of providing financial benefits to the attorney general, who in exchange intervened in several legal issues involving Paul. That connection led in part to the Texas House impeaching Paxton on May 27. He now awaits a trial sometime this summer in the Senate.

The federal charges allege Paul made false statements to financial institutions in Texas, Connecticut, New York and Ireland that underreported his total liabilities and overreported his cash, influencing lenders' decisions to loan him money to buy commercial properties.

Meanwhile, Tony Buzbee, the Houston attorney hired to represent Paxton, said his client was the victim of a "kangaroo court," according to the Texas Tribune. Buzbee, who is leading Paxton's legal team, predicted Paxton "will never be convicted by the Senate. Not on this evidence. Not with this record. The fact is these allegations are completely untrue."

Paxton has been temporarily removed from office, with former Texas secretary of state John Scott appointed as interim attorney general.

State fights to seize former state park land

Commissioners with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department voted unanimously Saturday to pursue eminent domain claims to acquire property that once was Fairfield Lake State Park.

The move came amid increasing acrimony between state officials and Todd Interests, the new owners of the land in Freestone County. Todd Interests recently purchased the land that had been leased to the state for the past half-century.

Shawn Todd, the company's founder and CEO, told The Dallas Morning News the state had engaged in "intimidation" in an attempt to block his family's company from acquiring the 5,000-acre tract from energy company Vistra. The state made a \$25 million offer to buy Todd Interests out of its contract in mid-May, according to The News.

Arch "Beaver" Aplin III, chair of the nine-member commission, said the legal maneuver is an effort to save and expand a "beloved state park."

At least three measures concerning condemning the park land in order to acquire it failed to pass in the last legislative session. The park averaged 80,000 visitors annually, according to TPWD.

New \$321.3 billion budget sent to Abbott

Texas comptroller Glenn Hegar has certified that the recently passed \$321.3 billion, two-year state budget is balanced. The budget legislation is the only task required of lawmakers by the Texas Constitution, the Texas Tribune reported. That means Gov. Greg Abbott can now review the 1,115page document and potentially veto certain items that do not meet his approval. The deadline to do so is June 18.

Abbott's line-item veto authority only applies to the state budget. The 2024-2025 budget allocates tax money toward tax cuts, broadband internet expansion, border security and raises for state employees, to name a few items. It does not provide increased pay for teachers. Although \$4 billion

has been set aside to increase teacher salaries and public-school funding, that will occur only if the Legislature acts separately to create a private school voucher program. Legislation for that failed in the regular legislative session but likely will be considered again in a special session later this year.

Jackson named interim chair of PUC

Kathleen Jackson, recently confirmed to the Public Utility of Commission by the Texas Senate, has been named interim chair by Abbott. That follows the resignation of chair Peter Lake, who will remain on the PUC until July 1. He joined the PUC in April 2021 in the wake of the major failure of the electric service after Winter Storm Uri the previous

February. "I'm honored and humbled by Governor Abbott's trust and confidence in me to lead the Public Utility Commission at this very important time for the

agency and for Texas,"

Jackson said.

Abundant rain in the Panhandle and much of Central Texas has eased drought conditions for much of those areas, according to Dr. Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board. The end of May saw the ninth consecutive weekly decrease in areas of the state affected by the drought. Less than 1 percent of the state is now listed as suffering from severe drought. That's the least since March 2022.

A total of 34% of the state is listed in any type of drought condition, compared to 78% a year ago. The arrival of an El Niño weather pattern should bring a cooler, wetter autumn and winter, forecasters


With a record 55 Fortune 500 companies headquartered in Texas, the state continues to lead the nation, Abbott announced.

- Culvert upsizing on El Chico Channel and at Surrey Lane.

for \$731,035. In all, the council has approved certificates of obligation not to exceed \$4.25 million for the entire project. The 20-year payback plan of just over \$6 million is two-fold, with the drainage coming from fees the city has been collecting

from residents since October

The channel and culvert of 2021 to fund storm drainage improvements and the street repairs coming from the city's interest and sinking fund (a savings account that, in most instances, requires monthly deposits to be set aside only for payment of debt service.

Certificates of obligation are similar to general obligation bonds, except that they do not require voter approval before they are issued. Certificates of obligation are also guaranteed by the city's taxation power.

Dog Days of Summer

With the "dog" days of summer right around the corner, it is important to remember that our four-legged friends rely on us to help them keep cool.

City of Weatherford Municipal/ Community Services Director, Dustin Deel, said there are a number of precautions people can take that will prevent their fur babies from suffering when the temperatures rise.

"The Texas heat can be awful," Deel said. "So you always want to make sure that you keep your pets hydrated. If you're outside, take frequent breaks while walking or just playing with them, especially if they're playing outside for a long time. It's a must that they've got to have shade to be able to get out of that sun and then I would also suggest, for dogs that have the shorter noses, like pugs, boxers, etc., they're the dogs with the highest risk for heat exhaustion and stroke. They really don't need to be out in the heat that long."

Deel said there are a couple of other steps pet owners should take that can really make a difference.

"It never hurts to go out and kind of gauge the temperature periodically with the asphalt or cement, because it will burn their feet," Deel said. "We see this all the time. And I will see the dogs riding in the back of the pickup trucks on a metal bed,

which is not only illegal, but also can hurt them. It makes my feet hurt just thinking about it."

Deel said there is also a common misconception among some pet owners that can prove fatal with dogs in particular.

"People think that they can leave the windows cracked in their car whenever they go to stores with their pets," Deel said. "Please don't do that. It is too hot to leave them in the car even for a few minutes, because it may seem like it's nice enough weather outside at 75 degrees, but it can get up to about 100 degrees in a car in a very short time. We see dogs die every summer because of it, so please don't do it."

Barn cat program

The shelter also offers a Barn Cat program, where they spay and vaccinate cats and give them away for free so they can live out their natural lives "hunting rodents and snakes, and helping people with their barns," Deel said.

Shelter objective/services

The Weatherford Parker County Animal Shelter's main objectives are to reunite lost pets with their owners and to re-home animals that do not have owners.

The shelter offers a variety of other services, and one of the more touching adoption stories Deel

remembers involved a woman who had been diagnosed with a treatable form of cancer who decided to make an adoption.

"It was just her and her husband and she came in and adopted two puppies from us," Deel said. "She had no children, and those puppies basically became her children. They helped her through cancer. After she beat cancer, her husband had a tumble and hit his head and ended up passing away on the spot. Fast forward about four years and the cancer came back and this time it was terminal. She had to make the very

difficult decision to surrender her two beloved pets. In that situation, she wanted the two adopted together, because they were a bonded pair."

Deel personally took on the project and worked with her try to find the right home for her dogs.

"It happened, but it took about a week and a half because it's always so hard to find bonded pets a new

home," Deel said. "You're looking for somebody who's going to adopt not just one, but two animals. We just so happened to find a lady who had two dogs and both had died. She waited about a year and was looking for a dog, but whenever she heard the story about the

two dogs that were there she elected to adopt both of them."

Deel said he could tell they were going to a nice home because the owner had gotten them both their own bed and had a hole cut in her spare bedroom so the dogs could have indoor and outdoor access.

"So I got to call the lady who had decided to surrender her pets and tell her that we found the perfect home for her dogs and how they were going to be spoiled and all that kind of stuff,"Deel said. "I'm telling you truly, it was the next day that the lady passed away. She was holding on until those pets, it gives me chills every time I think about it, but she was holding on until those pets found a new home."

Deel said adopting a rescue animal is a compassionate and affordable act.

"People need to surrender their pets for a variety of reasons and really adopting is giving a pet a second chance," Deel said. "That's what it

> boils down to. When you adopt an animal from our shelter you're getting an animal that's already been spayed, it's already been neutered and vaccinated. It's going to have all of its core vaccinations, it's going to be micro-chipped and it's liter-

ally just really ready to be loved. That's like a \$500 value compared to buying a puppy at some Walmart parking lot.

"And so many people don't realize how much it costs to get all of those things. This free puppy you get from a neighbor or a friend is not really free. Quite frankly, a lot of times the animals that are sheltered are already potty trained, and they know some basic behavioral skills. We have a lot to offer really for a low cost. It's a great deal."

A former Aledo Bearcat and his college team are among the final eight standing as the College World Series gets underway in Omaha, Nebraska this weekend.

Max Lucas, who is in his first season with Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, Oklahoma as an infielder, has helped the Golden Eagles (51-12) to their first CWS appearance since 1978. Back then the team was known as the Titans and played as an independent, whereas now they compete in the Summit League, ironically, along with the University of Omaha.



Former Bearcat vaults at **NCAA Nationals**

Former Aledo Bearcat pole vaulter Zach Davis has been named a second-team NCAA Division I All-American in track and field for the Texas A&M Aggies following his final college performance at the NCAA

National Championships in Austin. Davis, a senior, is no stranger to Mike A. Myers Stadium at the University of Texas, having won 5A state championships there in 2018 and 2019. This time, on Thursday, June 8, he cleared 17 feet, 4.5 inches to

place 15th. Davis then attempted but missed all three tries at 17-10.5, which is higher than his personal best of 17-9.5 at the Texas Tech Red Raider Open during the 2023 indoor season. It's the seventh-best indoor vault in Texas A&M history.

During the outdoor season, Davis vaulted 17-8.5 for third place at the SEC Championships, the 10th best outdoor vault ever in school history.

Also in the 2023 outdoor season, Davis won the Island Relays

Bahamas, the Victor Lopez Classic at Rice University and the Florida Relays. He was second at the Trojan Invitational at USC and at the LSU Alumni Gold Meet, along with a bronze medal for third at the Mt. SAC Relays in Walnut, California.

He qualified for the NCAA Championships by placing 11th at the NCAA West Regionals in Sacramento, California, also with a vault of 17-4.5.

In the 2023 indoor season he won the Tiger Paw Invitational at Clemson. He was also second at the Texas Tech Red Raider open and at the Arkansas Invitational (among collegians), along with fourth at the Razorback Invitational at the University of Arkansas and fifth at the New Mexico Collegiate Classic.

He was also third in the SEC Indoor Championships, again clearing 17-4.5.



AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ALEDO, TEXAS, AMENDING SUBSECTION 23.4.2, "SWIMMING POOLS," OF SUBSECTION 23.4, "MISCELLANEOUS DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS" OF SECTION 23, "USE OF LAND AND BUILDINGS (TABLES)/REGULATIONS," OF ORDINANCE NO. B-2008-3, THE CITY OF ALEDO ZONING ORDINANCE, BY AMENDING THE SETBACK REQUIREMENTS FOR SWIMMING POOLS; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE BE CUMULATIVE OF ALL ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING A PENALTY CLAUSE: PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION: AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

SECTION 3. **PENATLY CLAUSE**

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with, or who resists the enforcement of, any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined as provided in Section 1-10 of the City Code of Ordinances for each offense. 

APPLICATION. City of Hudson Oaks, 210 Hudson Oaks Drive, Hudson Oaks, Texas 76087, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for proposed Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. WQ0016323001 (EPA I.D. No. TX0144363) to authorize the discharge of treated wastewater at a volume not to exceed an annual average flow of 1,190,000 gallons per day. The domestic wastewater treatment facility will be located approximately 1,150 feet west of the intersection of Clearview Court and Trinity River Drive, in Parker County, Texas 76087. The discharge route will be from the plant site via pipe to South Fork Trinity River, thence to Clear Fork Trinity River Below Lake Weatherford. TCEQ received this application on March 31, 2023. The permit application will be available for viewing and copying at City of Hudson Oaks City Hall, 210 Hudson Oaks Drive, Hudson Oaks, Texas prior to the date this notice is published in the newspaper. After technical review of the application is complete, the Executive Director may prepare a draft permit and will issue a preliminary decision on the application. Notice of the Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the county-wide mailing list and to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the deadline for submitting public comments.

PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting on this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments, and the Executive Director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period and, the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period.

"I'm very excited for Max and the Oral Roberts team and staff. It's extremely hard to get there, so it's a testament to their hard work and commitment to each other and the team first mentality," Aledo coach Chad Barry said. "I wish them all the best."

Lucas, a transfer from Panola College in Carthage, has played in a dozen games this season, including four starts. He has a .346 batting average with a pair of doubles and two runs batted in.

The Golden Eagles won the Summit League with a 23-1 record. At one point they were 10-8 and have since gone 41-4.

The Golden Eagles are only the third team to qualify for the CWS after entering a four-team regional as the No. 4 seed. They hope to duplicate the accomplishment of Cal State Fullerton in 2008 when they won the national championship after being a fourth seed at regionals and not go the way of Stonybrook in 2012 when they went 0-2 in the CWS.

Regional in Oklahoma, sweeping three games. They defeated No. 11 Oklahoma State 6-4, Washington 15-12 and Dallas Baptist 6-5.

ORU won the Oregon Super Regional, rallying back to defeat the Oregon Ducks in three

games. In the first game they were part of the largest comeback in NCAA Super Regionals history as the Ducks overcame an 8-0 deficit to win 9-8. In Game 2, it was the Eagles who came back to win 8-7 with two runs in the bottom of the

ninth after they trailed 7-4 in the seventh.

In the third game, ORU won 11-6.

The Eagles will be facing another of the nation's hottest teams in TCU. The Horned Frogs have won 19 of 21 since they once stood 23-20 and were in danger

of missing the postseason altogether.

TCU has a 26-19 all-time series advantage against ORU, including a 3-1 win last season in the College Station Regional. However, they are 3-3 in their six postseason meetings.

This will be TCU's sixth CWS appearance since 2010, when they finished third. The Horned Frogs also went in 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017, finishing third again in their last appearance.

TCU qualified for the CWS after sweeping No. 14 Indiana

State 4-1 and 6-4 last weekend in Fort Worth in their super regional matchup, a series that was actually scheduled to be in Terre Haute, Indiana before it had to be switched due to hotel logistics. ISU was hosting the Indiana State Special Olympics.

The previous weekend TCU swept through the Fayetteville Regional, which included wins of 20-5 and 12-4 over No. 3 Arkansas.

Joining ORU and TCU in Omaha will be No. 2 Florida (50-15) and No. 7 Virginia (50-13) in one bracket, while the other bracket will feature No. 1 Wake Forest (52-10), No. 8 Stanford (43-17), No. 5 LSU (48-15) and Tennessee (42-19).

The winners of the two brackets will meet in a best-of-three series June 24-26 to determine the national champion. The CWS is set to be broadcast on ESPN, with the two bracket finals broadcast

site yet to be determined, though it will be in the ESPN family, including ESPN+ and ESPNU

Almost two in CWS

Aledo came close to having two former Bearcats participating in Omaha. Outfielder Max Belyeau and the Texas Longhorns (42-22) lost the third game of their best-of-three series to Stanford in Palo Alto, California in heartbreaking fashion Monday.

The Longhorns overcame a 6-3 deficit to tie the game, only to have the Cardinal win 7-6 with a run in the bottom of the ninth after Texas outfielders lost sight of the ball in the lights. The ball dropped in for a walkoff hit.

Belyeau played in 15 games this season, starting four. He batted .300 with a double and two RBI.
