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WEATHERFORD ISD **Tustees receive** transportation, construction updates

Meeting started with special 9/11 commemoration

On a day when America pauses and remembers the lives lost on 9/11, the Weatherford ISD Board of Trustees did the same prior to its meeting Monday, Sept. 11.

The Weatherford Kanga Singers, led by choir director Abigail Weaver, gathered to sing the National Anthem for those in attendance, and the board then honored its School Resource and Community Service Officers, the Weatherford Fire and Police Departments and first responders.

"Because of these [departments and officers] right here, we are the safest school district in the state," Board president Mike Guest said. "When you take your kids to school, the biggest fear is that they are away from you and you can't protect them anymore. We never have that [fear] here."

Guest went on to say that many agencies contact Weatherford ISD to follow its safety plan because of its success.

Shortly after, Cynthia Ortiz, the Parker County Relations Officer, introduced Chris Bosco, Group Manager with Freese and Nichols, who gave trustees a look at the details of the Parker County Transportation Bond and future plans.

The county is seeking \$130 million to improve safety and traffic congestion and commissioners recently called for an election to be placed on the November ballot.

Aledo filmmaker takes overall look

Both sides important to Bill McAdams' stories

For Bill McAdams, Jr., it's important to tell both sides of a story.

The local actor/writer/director decided to write and direct his most recent film based on an incident that reminded him that division and tribalism are still alive and well. Bully High, in a nutshell, is the story of a Muslim exchange student who gets bullied at her new high school because she wears a hijab, a head covering worn in public by some Muslim women. McAdams, 53, said a painful episode from his personal life was the inspiration for the film. "About four years ago I started dating an Egyptian girl," McAdams said. "We hit it off. She was Muslim and had her ways. She didn't drink, and she lived off the land. And I started adapting to the way she was and didn't drink for a whole year. "We just kind of hit it off. We started liking each other more and more and I told my family. They said 'you can't marry a non-Christian.' It kind of took me aback, because I was like, 'But she's good for me. We're having fun and it's all healthy.' But there was a stigma against that."



"We are always looking for opportunities to partner with entities and advance projects to get more state and federal funds coming to Parker County," Bosco said.

Many of what is being considered and planned for is the expansion of I-20, reconstruction and addition of off-ramps, and dedicated turn lanes on farm-tomarket roads throughout the county.

"There has been an uptick in accidents on [those roads]," Bosco said. "Parker County grew over 34 percent from 2010-2022 and is ranked sixth in the U.S."

Of interest to the district is the extension of FM 730 by Mary Martin Elementary School to make it more of an urban road. Also of interest is additional ramp access near Weatherford High School and Bethel Road.

Bosco said there are 32 total projects and when asked if there was a timeline on when some of these could be completed, the timeline varied from as little as five years to as long as 10.

McAdams said the experience shook him to the core and also led to an understanding of the types of attitudes and preconceptions that can lay the groundwork for bullying. "After that happened, I told

her about it, just to be honest with

her, and it kind of put a dent in our relationship," McAdams said. "Things just kind of fell off the table, and it was hard. She's an executive producer on the movie, and we still talk, but it was tough.

"It just kind of took me down the road of bullying. She said she had been bullied because of the color of her skin. I was like 'Wow, people still bully each other for the color of their skin?""

McAdams said in California, three out of four Muslim women are bullied for wearing the hijab, which is intended to promote modesty.

He said it was an eye-opening experience and one he felt that needed to be addressed.

"It was a big subject to tackle because I didn't think it was that big of a deal," McAdams said. "But then I started seeing that, like, one out of four bullies were teachers, so adults were bullying children, that kind of pissed me off. But I have to say that this is not just a movie about a Muslim girl, or a racist or a Christian.

"It's a movie about love and acceptance and forgiveness, and I'm just trying to open the eyes of the people that live in the box. Just take a step outside and meet someone who is not just like you. You don't have to agree on everything, but you can learn from other cultures."

Penchant for Learning

A review of his directorial history reveals that McAdams, Jr. has a penchant for such movies.

"All my films are clash cultures," McAdams said. "Gallows Road, I clash the blacks and the whites. Jose Canseco: The Truth Hurts is about a Cuban baseball player who gets blackballed for telling the truth... I

just think we can learn from each other, and I guess my advice is to step outside your comfort zone and say hello to someone that doesn't look like you. You never know what is going on with them and how you can help each other."

McAdams sat in on the premier of Bully High at the Film Alley Weatherford, an experience the Aledo man described as "surreal," and then stood at the door on the way out to gauge reactions.

"They walked past me and said, 'Oh, you're the racist guy — I hope you're not like that in real life," McAdams said. "But I got the chance to talk to them and everyone that I talked to enjoyed the film. Not only does it have a strong message, but it is also entertaining, which I have to do. It has to be entertaining. That's my job as a writer/director."

McAdams used several local actors and crew members in Bully High as well and said it was a decision he did not regret.

"They are strong people," McAdams said. "Caroline Stella (producer) went to Aledo High School. Taylor Jabara is an unbelievable actor from Plano, and my producer is from Fort Worth, and her name is Therese Moncrief. And then Brent Anderson, who is the cow milk (Lactaid) guy, plays the principal. He was in My All-American and he's an incredible actor. So the talent here is great." McAdams moved to Texas in 2012 and formed the Aledo Film Group, saying he has been welcomed warmly in his Parker County community.

Deeply Personal

With Bully High, McAdams opens up on a deeply personal level about several issues and hopes that viewers leave with a couple of things in mind.

"I don't want to tell people how to think or feel," McAdams said. "I think that's anti-film. You just throw it out there and people grab onto what they want to talk about.

"This was the first time in 40 years, for instance, that I talked about being molested. I gave it to Taylor Jabara, who plays the mean girl, the bully in the movie. Because I always questioned why the bully was mean. And we never kind of go there, because we always just think, ah, they don't need help. But they need the most help of all.

"I think that's where the story can kind of hit home is to reach

out to the person that you think doesn't need it. I think that person is the one that needs the hug and needs to talk. Violence is



not the answer. We need to start talking. You've got to ask questions to get the conversation going without judgement."

Bully High worth a look and listen

Movie has strong message of understanding By Rick Mauch Community News

Movies aren't just about visuals. When the message is good, it's just as important to listen.

Such is the case with the latest production from Bill McAdams Jr. and the Aledo Film Group, *Bully High*.

The idea for the movie seems to stem from a message of tolerance and understanding. As McAdams told our writer John English, it is important to look at all sides of an issue, sometimes what seems like prejudice comes from a deeper place.

The movie certainly does not justify prejudice and stresses the importance of turning away from it, but it does help provide an understanding that can subsequently lead to helping solve the problem.

The plot features a teenage Muslim girl named Maryam (played by Aneesha Madhok), an exchange student at a school in California who is bullied for wearing a hijab. She simply wants to fit in with her new classmates, and does with many, particularly her new boyfriend, Zack Walker (Cedric Begley).

However, there are those who seize the opportunity to focus on bigotry. Things get extremely complicated when the bullying isn't only done by other students. Zack's father, Bob Walker (played by McAdams), is intolerant of Muslims, having lost his wife in the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

Despite this, Maryam's popularity at school grows because of her likable personality. She's even presented as a homecoming queen candidate, which brings out the wrath of three-time reigning homecoming queen winner (a bit of a stretch in reality, you have to admit) Scarlet Smith (Taylor Jabara), who has some dark secrets of her own she's dealing with.

Maryam's case is one many young members of the Muslim community face. They were not even yet born when 9/11 happened and many are in this country because their families were also disgusted with actions such as the terrorist attacks on that day.

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Capital Highlights Paxton acquitted on all impeachment counts

to wildfires in Texas, more than 1,400 firefighters from 38 states and territories have arrived this year to help with response, the *Texas Tribune* reported. The number of wildfires that the Texas A&M Forest Service responded to in July and August skyrocketed to 163 in July and 501 in August, far above the average since 2005 of 103 in July and 151 in August.

"Drought development and the number of consecutive 100plus degree days has contributed to critically dry vegetation across much of the state, which is supportive of wildfire activity," said Erin O'Connor, program specialist for the Texas A&M Forest Service. "With current conditions, we have wildfires that are more complex and show extreme fire behavior, hold heat longer and require more time and effort to suppress."

As of Sunday, the service reported six active wildfires, most of which are nearly contained. Recent rainfall has lowered the state fire level from 4 to 3.

There are currently 215 counties with burn bans in place. Luckily, widespread rainfall in the Hill Country, North and East Texas and much of the Rolling Plains is reducing the risk.

TEA delays release of 2023 accountability ratings

The Texas Education Agency is delaying the release of A-F district and campus accountability ratings for about one month. The ratings were to be released on Sept. 28. The postponement allows for re-examination of "the baseline data used in the calculation of progress to ensure ratings reflect the most appropriate goals for students," the news release said.

The delay is a result of further study being made into the impact of the pandemic on student progress. "Maintaining high expectations helps guide our efforts to improve student learning and support," said Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath. "The A-F system is designed to properly reflect how well our schools are meeting those high expectations, and the adjustments we are making this year will ensure it continues to serve as a tool for parents and educators to help our students."

New COVID-19 boosters now available

A new vaccine booster for COVID-19 is now largely available, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is recommending all people over the age of six months get the new shots as the number of new COVID cases and hospitalizations increase across the state, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported.

"There's a lot of thought that COVID is over, but...we've seen over the last few weeks an increase in cases, hospitalizations and death," said Dr. Brian Metzger, medical director of infectious diseases at St. David's HealthCare in Austin. "While it's not nearly what we were seeing, ... there's still a significant burden of illness. We can't ignore it."

The CDC noted the immunity garnered from the original vaccination, like other seasonal illnesses such as the flu, wanes over time. After a year, the antibodies produced by the vaccine "have waned enough that you really aren't protected to where you were before," Metzger told the *Statesman*.

August was fourth hottest and driest on record

This comes as no surprise to those of us living through it, but August in Texas was the hottest and driest in Texas since records began being kept in 1895, according to Andrew Weinberg, geoscientist with the Texas Water Development Board.

At the end of the month 76% of the state was in drought, up 27 percentage points from the end of July. Storage in the state's water supply reservoirs is about 69% of capacity, more than 13 percentage points below normal for this time of year.

The hopeful news is that El Niño weather conditions should bring cooler and wetter weather to the state this fall and winter. That should ease drought conditions across the state before the end of the year.

Lost Maples ranked as having best fall foliage

The leaves will begin to change in coming weeks, and the *Statesman* reports a Central Texas natural area has been ranked as having the best fall foliage in the country. Lost Maples Natural Area in Vanderpool, about two hours northwest of San Antonio, garnered the top spot from *New York Travel Guides*, a digital travel publication.

Lost Maples boasts 2,000 acres filled with bigtooth maple trees, which display brilliant colors most autumns. It also features 10 miles of hiking and 30 campsites with water and electricity. Park officials recommend visitors reserve passes online to guarantee entry.

Ken Paxton has been reinstated as Texas Attorney General after the Texas Senate on Saturday acquitted him of charges of bribery and misuse of office. Only two Republican senators joined the 12 Democrats in voting to convict him of some of the 16 charges heard by the Senate, with four other charges dismissed by the Senate, *The Dallas Morning News* reported.

"Today, the truth prevailed," Paxton said in a statement issued immediately after the verdict. "The truth could not be buried by mudslinging politicians or their powerful benefactors."

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presided over the impeachment trial, scolded the House for voting overwhelmingly for impeachment of the embattled attorney general in late May. House Speaker Dade Phelan responded that Patrick was "confessing his bias."

"The inescapable conclusion is that today's outcome appears to have been orchestrated from the start, cheating the people of Texas of justice," Phelan said.

Paxton is not out of legal hot water yet. He faces a trial in March on an eight-year-old indictment for securities fraud. He is also the focus of a federal probe into his relationship with developer Nate Paul that led to some of the impeachment charges.

Down from the Cross...

Randy Brooks, who portrayed Jesus in "The Promise" more than 6,000 times, is nearing the 60-year mark in Christian ministry. But, he still has "the look"--the kind that causes head-scratching when vaguely familiar faces are seen.

Randy was cast in the role in 1989, when the award-winning musical began its 34-year run at Glen Rose's Texas Amphitheater. He later appeared for years in Branson, MO, at a New York City church and numerous performances internationally before he ended the role when COVID arrived in 2020.

Long-haired since the mid-1970s, he now is free to leave his gray hair au natural, unlike most performance years when it was dyed to hide premature graying. Had one of the founding producers of the Glen Rose production not spotted Randy in a hair salon in 1989, he might never have been featured in "The Promise.".

"Can you sing?" she asked. Having been a pianist/vocalist since junior high, he quickly answered, not knowing that the producer was looking for a blueeyed, long-haired man to play Jesus. Then age 36, Randy--his commitment to God already strongly in place--signed on, the course of his life to be forever changed.

He sang Word-produced songs such as "Closer than a Heartbeat," "It is Written" and "Shalom." Randy says he writhed and winced with imaginary pain on the cross, but never came close to portraying Jesus' actual suffering. He remembers the challenge of holding onto nails, and contorting his body to a 45-degree angle. (On the cross for 20 minutes at each performance, his total time there amounted to 83 24-hour days.).

Producers were never worried about his lacking both theological and theatrical training or changing his mannerisms. He sounded "way too southern," however, so he underwent speech training to sound less so!

Throughout his career, Randy has been closely identified with gospel music, but he and his brother Bill also performed throughout the nation for corporate groups, including Amway and American Airlines. Randy also hooked up with the Stamps Quartet, which provided vocal back-up for Elvis Presley.

He also was music director on 58 episodes of TV's "Country Crossroads," and--with the Brooks Brothers Band--was named "Entertainer of the Year" in Texas for six consecutive years by the Johnnie High Country Music Revue Association, and twice honored in Branson as the "Male Entertainer of the Year.".

<u>Guest Column</u> Crossing the Bridge: Look out for Trolls

In Norse mythology, beings described as Trolls dwelled in isolated areas of rocks, mountains or caves and were not friendly to humans. When my children were young, I enjoyed reading them the Norwegian fairy tale, "Three Billy Goats Gruff." The "mean ole Troll" in the story would hide under a bridge, waiting for his prey. He elicited a great deal of fear from my children. They would ask, "Daddy, are Trolls real?" "Why are they so mean?" "Don't let a Troll get me, Daddy."

By far, the most common use of the word Troll today is in relation to internet users who exist for the sole purpose of causing upset. In internet parlance, a Troll is defined as a person who posts inflammatory, insulting, abusive or off-topic messages in an online community. They appropriately take their name from the horrible Trolls of fairy tales. When you least expect it, such as while checking Twitter (now X), like an innocent Billy Goat crossing a bridge, Trolls pop up from their lair (dank hole/parents' basement) to try and ruin your day.

Trolls are characterized by distinct personality traits, including psychopathy, Machiavellianism, narcissism and sadism.

To appeal to ordinary citizens, Trolls say that elected officials are all "corrupt." They paint any political proceeding as a "sham." Name-calling (RINO, liberal, globalist, etc.) and lying are common practices among political Trolls. They reinforce distrust in all public institutions and leaders and work to make their audience feel helpless and hopeless. Often,

In 2020, Randy returned to Texas, where he continues to perform, largely at churches, retirement centers and at various other venues. "My body told me it was time to

slow down, so I have," Randy said. He feels that he has kept numerous providential appointments in his life including a recent visit to

his life, including a recent visit to Shipshewana, IN, where his brother Bill is emcee in the tiny Amish/ Mennonite community's two theaters.

With three shows left to perform, Randy was helping Bill move household furniture. A large mirror slipped, seriously cutting Randy's right hand between his wrist and thumb. Fifteen stitches were needed to close the wound, but let's not race ahead.

The nearest hospital was 12 miles away, so Bill took Randy to his doctor's office. Blood gushing, Randy learned that it was the doctor's day off.

Coming through the back door, however, was the doctor, who lives 20 miles away in Goshen.

"I had this strong feeling that I should come to the office," he said. Providence again, right?.

Realizing that Randy had sustained a serious injury, the doctor initially suggested calling an ambulance to take him to a hospital.

Then, he remembered treating numerous victims of roadway accidents during his Indianapolis internship.

He expertly completed the treatment. Randy, claimed to be "good as new," performed the same evening and at the two closing shows the next day.

"I don't solicit engagements, but enough still come to me," particularly with Shiloh Road, a southern gospel quartet in the Metroplex. "I'll serve the Lord until I can't."

Ever the "people person," he now drives for UberEats between gigs. He hears numerous comments about his "Jesus look," and smiles.

"God is good, now and forever," he said. "With Him, I'm ready for whatever comes next." Amen.



In the movie, Maryam's mother was also killed in a terrorist attack. Yet, somehow, she is able to turn away from hatred and embrace the good in the world - even hoping to make a difference as a TV reporter in her career aspirations.

Doing so while wearing a hijab, which she notes is a symbol of modesty and strong beliefs. It should also be noted there is a difference between a hijab and a burqa, which covers the entire body and face, leaving only a slight opening for eyes.

People have a right to wear whatever they feel and to worship as they wish. The movie drives this point home in a smooth way without going over the top in its imagery, yet making clear that bigotry of any kind is painful, and that it often comes from a source of hurt.

The movie also addresses other forms of hurtful behavior, such as a young girl being physically abused by a neighbor, and a classmate of Maryam's being rejected by her parents after coming out as gay. I would have liked to have seen both of these subplots come to more of a complete resolution, but they are nonetheless impactful.

Then there's Zack, who was very young when his mother died. Though, with the movie set in modern times, you'll have to look past the math not totally adding up.

Bob's missing his late wife has led him to drink and barely hang onto his own life, much less being there for his son. Zack notes that he has grown up without a mother - and for the most part without a father.

Through it all, though, there is a solid message of understanding and growth, from both the violator and the violated - a message our world could make a concerted effort to do more of. To do this requires looking at things from not only our own point of view, but also from the other side - perhaps the biggest challenge of all.

There is an overhanging spiritual message, but not one that hammers the viewer over the head. It is more along the lines of Jesus' greatest message of all, love each other as our father in Heaven loves us.

At around an hour and a half, the movie is a comfortable length. 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

After feeling dissatisfied with their offensive performance against Northwest in Week 3, the Bearcats made a statement with their 50-7 mauling of Azle's hosting Hornets on Friday, September 15.

"I felt like we had a good week of preparation this week," Aledo head coach Robbie Jones said after the game. "Our kids didn't like how we played last week, so they prepared a lot better during the week, and that showed during the first half of the football game."

It took just two plays and 37 seconds for Aledo (4-0 overall, 2-0 in District 5-5A) to put the Hornets on notice. On the second offensive snap of the game, Raycine Guillory broke off a 60-yard run to put the Bearcats on the board with their first touchdown of the night. Hawk Patrick-Daniels completed the twopoint conversion with a 2-yard trot into the end zone as the visiting Bearcats took a very early 8-0 lead.

Azle's defense had no answer for the Bearcats' offense in the first quarter as Aledo found paydirt in each of its first four possessions.

The Bearcats' second possession wasn't much longer. It took all of 1:10 and three plays before Hauss Hejny connected with Trace Clarkson for a 51-yard pitch-andcatch to put the Bearcats up by 14. After Cole Crawford's extra point attempt sailed through the uprights, Aledo held a 15-0 lead less than four minutes into the game.

After the Bearcat defense halted Azle's attempt to convert a fourth-and-1 from their own 41-vard-line on their ensuing possession, Aledo took over on downs

with 6:52 remaining in the first quarter. Hejny connected with Colton McCoy on a pair of 17-yard pass plays during the six-play drive that was capped off with Patrick-Daniels powering his way across the goal line from 2 yards out. Crawford once again tacked on the extra point as the visiting team really began to pull away, 22-0, with just less than five minutes remaining in the first quarter.

On their fourth drive of the game, the Bearcats were more methodical. Their longest drive of the game to that point took nine plays and little more than three minutes before Guillory did what he does best, breaking another big run on his way to the end zone. Guillory's 24-yard scamper coupled with Crawford's extra point

had the Bearcats up 29-0 on the scoreboard with 36 seconds left in the first quarter.

Guillory carried the ball just five times in the game, but picked up 107 yards and a pair of touchdowns in spite of limited touches.

Midway through the second quarter Aledo's offense got back to work after being kept off the scoreboard in their previous drive. Hejny connected with McCoy in the middle of the field for another score, this time from 46 yards out, concluding the three-play drive. Crawford's extra point put Aledo up 36-0 with 5:25 remaining in the first half.

Aledo took possession for their final time in the first half with 2:22 left on the clock. Five plays later Hejny found Clarkson once again

Crawford's extra point put Aledo up by 43 heading into the break.

The Hejny-Clarkson connection has been unstoppable all season long. Friday in Azle was no exception. Hejny called Clarkson's number five times in the game, combining for 146 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

In total, Hejny went 14-of-17 through the air for 290 yards, three touchdowns, and no interceptions. He completed 82% of his passes and finished the game with a 162.4 passer rating.

On the other side of the ball, Aledo's starting defense was

Former Bearcat shines in loss

Fowler-Nicolosi leads near upset **By Rick Mauch** Community News

Former Aledo Bearcat quarterback Brayden Fowler-Nicolosi is used to big moments, such as when he led Aledo to a Class 5A Division II state championship in 2020.

And he was clearly not intimidated when he took to the biggest stage of his career this past Saturday night in Boulder, Colorado. Fowler-Nicolosi led the Colorado State Rams to a near upset of the No. 19 University of Colorado Buffaloes in a nationally televised game on ESPN before the Buffaloes prevailed in double overtime 43-35.

Fowler-Nicolosi completed 34 of 47 passes for 367 yards with three touchdowns and three interceptions. One of the interceptions came on a desperation throw into the end zone in the second overtime and another resulted in an 80-yard return for a TD after the Rams had driven deep into Colorado territory.

Fowler-Nicolosi held his own with heralded Buffs quarterback Shedeur Sanders, a Heisman Trophy Candidate, who was 38-of-47 for 348 yards with four TD and one interception. The Aledo alum had the Rams (0-2) in prime position for the upset as they led 28-17 in the fourth quarter before the Buffs staged a late rally.

Fowler-Nicolosi also answered a Buffs touchdown on their first possession of the first overtime by throwing his third TD pass of the night.

"I stayed up until 1:30. I was invested in it. You take away those penalties against Colorado State and it's a different story," Aledo head coach Robby Jones said.

Jones was the offensive coordinator when Fowler-Nicolosi was quarterbacking the Bearcats.

Jones was referencing a plethora of penalties - particularly personal fouls - that negated some great plays by Fowler-Nicolosi and the Rams. This included him running in for a touchdown in the second overtime.

"I sent him a text the next day and told him I was proud of him," Jones said. "They went to-to-toe with a top-20 team."

The game was the second college start for

Fowler-Nicolosi. As a freshman he offs, falling 33-28 to eventual state started and played the entire game against Nevada last season in a 17-14 victory, completing 11 of 22 passes for 78 yards with two interceptions.

He finished his freshman season completing 17 of 37 passes for 194 yards with two TD and one interception. His first college touchdown was to a familiar target, Tory Horton, against Middle Tennessee State in a 34-19 loss.

Fowler-Nicolosi and Horton connected 16 times against Colorado for 133 yards and a touchdown.

Fowler-Nicolosi came into the game against Washington State in the season opener following an injury to Rams starting quarterback Clay Millen. Fowler-Nicolosi completed 13 of 20 passes for 210 yards with two TD and one interception in a 50-24 loss to the No. 21 Cougars.

For the season Fowler-Nicolosi has completed 47 of 67 passes (70%) for 577 yards with five touchdowns and four interceptions.



Aledo, Fowler-At Nicolosi, who moved in from California, led the Bearcats to a 12-1 record and a berth in the third round of the Class 5A Division II play-

SECTION 4.

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the providisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for all violations involving zoning, fire, safety, or public health and sanitation, including dumping or refuse, and shall be fined Five hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for all violations of this Ordinance. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

EDDELMAN SURVEY, CITY OF aledo, parker county, texas, CURRENTLY ZONED AS r-1 (single family residential district) TO pd C-1 (PLANNED DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT) WITH C-1 COMMERCIAL DISTRICT USES; PROVIDING FOR THE AMENDMENT OF THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP TO REFLECT SUCH CHANGES; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE CUMULATIVE OF ALL ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A PENALTY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE, PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION IN THE OFFICIAL NEWSPAPER; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

SECTION 8. SEVERABILITY

It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this Ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this Ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this Ordinance of any such unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section.

SECTION 10. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law, and it is so ordained. PASSED AND APPROVED ON THIS 27th DAY OF JULY, 2023.

Aledo faces Rough Riders

Bearcats host first homecoming at **Buchanan Stadium** By Rick Mauch

As the Aledo Bearcats reach the midpoint of the 2023 football season they will return home to face Saginaw (0-4, 0-2) for homecoming.

It will be the first homecoming in the stadium now named after the legendary coach who was part of so many homecomings with the Bearcats. Now it is his handpicked successor, Robby Jones, who will be on the sidelines as the head coach in Tim Buchanan Stadium.

"It's my first time as head coach at homecoming, first homecoming at Tim Buchanan Stadium, and we got the Steve Wood sign up (on the fieldhouse), a lot of firsts," Jones said. "Those guys are going to have their names up their for a long time and it is well deserved. I'm honored to know them and to have worked with both."

Of course, Jones is no stranger to the stadium, having been Buchanan's assistant for two decades before taking the helm. He was the offensive coordinator since 2009.

The Bearcats (4-0, 2-0 in District 3-5A Division I) will host a Saginaw team (0-4, 0-2) that has, to put it mildly, struggled in recent seasons. The Rough Riders are 2-31 since 2020 after reaching the playoffs with a 7-4 record in 2019.

In fact, in the three seasons prior to 2019 the Rough Riders were 5-25.

In other words, life has basically not been good for the Rough Riders and their faithful for quite some time. Their most recent setback was 40 at home to Denton Ryan on Friday, Sept. 15.

On that same night, the Bearcats were decimating Azle 50-7 on the Hornets' own turf. It was the 113th consecutive district victory for Aledo dating to the 2007 season.

But Jones believes this year's version of the Rough Riders is better than last season's and there is more than meets the eye.

"It's not like they're a horrific football team," he said. "They started out against Denton Ryan forcing them into a three-and-out

a big thing. This year was no exception as fans lined the side of the streets for the floats and festivities, which included Bearcats players and coaches at the lead.

"I'm going to say that's one of the biggest crowds we've had at a homecoming parade," Jones said. "They were lined from the beginning of the ninth grade (campus) all around the high school. There were so many little kids there."

There is still plenty to come with homecoming activities, including the crowning of the queen at halftime of Friday's game.

Coming together

For the first time this season the offense and defense played a complete game in Aledo's win at Azle, Jones said. The offense hung a half a hundred on the Hornets and the defense clamped down on them like no other time this season.

"It was good to see both sides of the ball playing so well," Jones said. "But that's what we expect from our guys. It's the first time this year they've both played the way they are capable of playing."

In the first two games of the season the offense grabbed the spotlight as the Bearcats outscored their opponents 98-80. In the past two weeks, the defense has risen up and they have outscored their opponents 88-20.

Go-to-guy


Every quarterback has a go-to guy, such as Patrick Mahomes and Travis Kelce or Dak Prescott and CeeDee Lamb. For Aledo quarterback Hauss Hejny that player was Jalen Pope in 2022.

And this season it appears to be becoming wide receiver Trace Clarkson. He leads all receivers with 18 catches for 335 yards and three touchdowns.

This past week Clarkson hauled in five passes for 146 yards, including a pair of Hejny touchdowns.

"They've established a familiarity and they work well together," Jones said. "It's kind of like Jalen last year and you saw how that worked out."

Hejny was the MVP of the state championship game, a 52-14

Good luck charm

In the five seasons the Bearcats have defeated the Rough Riders Aledo has a combined record of 71-5. The Bearcats have also won three state championships and played for another in those seasons.

In 2009, 2016 and last season the Bearcats won state titles after downing Saginaw in the regular season. They finished second in 2017.

The only time Aledo did not reach a state final after a win over Saginaw in the regular season was 2008. They finished 11-1 and reached the second round of the postseason.

The Ladycat offense runs so efficiently because it runs through Reding.



Lowe blocked six shots from Azle attackers to lead the way for Aledo, as she's done for much of the season.




