Residents voice concerns over water bills

House packed at council meeting

The house was packed at the Aledo Community Center during the regular city council meeting on Thursday, Oct. 26. Numerous residents like Susan Nicholl took the opportunity to voice their concerns directly to their city representatives, while others let their presence echo their support.

For several months as the city has been transitioning to a new AMI (advanced metering infrastructure) water-metering system, residents have voiced concerns related to everything from billing practices to disagreements related to the quantity of water used during billing cycles. Enough residents have brought their concerns before Mayor Nick Stanley, City Manager Noah Simon, and the rest of the council, that the city has sought out an independent company to do a

Council approves new hotel

Boutique, not a chain

At its meeting on Oct. 23 the Weatherford City Council approved a conditional use permit for a new hotel to be located at 117 College Ave.

The unique hotel, which will sit on about a half-acre tract of land, is a 16-room boutique hotel made of shipping containers. It will be similar to the Middleton Hotel in Graham, which was built by the same developers, Matt Hughes and Griffin Phillips.

"The City of Weatherford has been very welcoming," Hughes said. "Growing up, I spent a lot of time in Weatherford. I have two sisters that still live there and I have seen how the town has grown."

Highlights of the new hotel will include premium linens in each room, along with custom artwork throughout and an in-ground swimming pool

The site will also include an upscale restaurant and bar, featuring craft cocktails, beer, coffee, espresso, small plates and live music.

Council reacts to new state rules

Amends subdivision ordinance

In response to legislation passed by the Texas Legislature in June, the Hudson Oaks City Council held a public hearing and subsequently amended certain sections of its subdivision ordinance at its meeting

House Bill 3699 further clarifies previous "shot clock" regulations set in place to prevent cities from delaying or denying developers' plats until certain requirements have been met.

Rob Allibon, Hudson Oaks City Attorney, explained that the passing of the bill set into motion changes that need to be made in order for Hudson Oaks to be compliant, while giving a brief background of the initial HB3167 that passed in late 2019.

"Cities had to amend ordinances regarding timing for plat approval - referred to as the shot clock," he

The clock gave cities 30 days to accept, review and approve, approve with conditions or deny a plat. The timeline started from when an application was filed with a municipality. If no action is taken prior to the 30 days ending, a plat then becomes automatically approved.

Initially, the language in the bill was vague enough that it left many cities interpreting the meaning of what a "filed" application was. Some considered it to be when all of the required paperwork was submitted, meaning anything from surveys, traffic studies, etc. had to be turned in prior to it being accepted by a city and starting the clock. Others thought it was at the time the fee was paid and an application was rendered.

Hudson Oaks amended its processes and ordinances to reflect the changes, but some issues were still created with the timing of certain plats that needed to be brought before city council for approval since public notices are required. HB 3699 fixes that problem as it gives staff the ability to sign off on the plat without it needing to be approved by council.

"Essentially, plats cannot be denied unless there are technical requirements not being met, meaning it is more of a ministerial act and city council would only be rubber stamping the required approval," said Hayden Brodowsky, Hudson Oaks Director of Operations.

He added that zoning requests are not affected and will still be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Mayor Tom Fitzpatrick opened the public hearing, but no-one spoke and he then immediately closed the hearing. Council then approved the changes to the ordinance.

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
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



Abbott, House deadlocked over school choice, teacher pay

Gov. Gregg Abbott and the Texas House are at loggerheads over which will come first - vouchers for parents to pay for private school tuition, or funneling more money to public schools, The Dallas Morning *News* reported.

The House wants money for teacher bonuses and a revamp of public-school accountability passed at the same time as Abbott's proposed education savings accounts, often referred to as ESAs. The governor insists the House first pass a voucher program. A version of his voucher program has already passed the Senate. The Legislature can't consider increased school funding or teacher bonuses unless Abbott adds it to the special session agenda.

This third special session ends by Nov. 7, though Abbott has indicated he would call another one if this one ends without a decision on vouchers.

"I think there is still significant opposition to any school finance bill that includes an ESA," Rep. Drew Darby, R-San Angelo, told the Texas Tribune. "I'm comfortable we have enough like-minded rural Republicans, and urban Republicans, to stand against that in numbers sufficient to defeat it."

Abbott has dismissed the House's compromise proposal, House Bill 1, which would create a limited voucher program while increasing spending on public education, calling it "insufficient."

House passes three border security bills

The House passed a trio of bills that increase border wall

funding, increase the penalty for border deterrence efforts, leaving smuggling migrants, and allow state and local police to arrest migrants living illegally in the state, The News reported. The votes came last week after a lengthy heated discussion among Democratic and Republican lawmakers.

The anti-smuggling bill has already passed the Senate and now heads to Abbott's desk, while the other two bills are going to the Senate.

Rep. Victoria Neave Criado, D-Dallas, who chairs the Mexican American Legislative Caucus, said the plan would undercut the U.S. Constitution so that the state could "flex its muscle with the power that it does not have," according to The News.

Democrats unsuccessfully tried to change the bill by filing nearly four dozen amendments. Rep. Cody Harris, R-Palestine, filed a successful motion to limit amendments, which led to a confrontation between him and Rep. Armando Walle, D-Houston.

"This is an emotional issue," Walle said in a statement late Wednesday evening. "This affects my family and puts so many families like mine at risk."

Paxton sues over razor wire being cut

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton is suing the Biden administration, claiming Border Patrol agents are illegally destroying state property by cutting through concertina wire placed by the state on the banks of the

The state has spent \$11 million in the past three years placing 70,000 rolls of the wire along the Texas-Mexico border, according to the Teras Tribune

Rio Grande to deter ille-

gal immigration.

"By cutting Texas's concertina wire, the federal government has not only illegally destroyed property owned by the State of Texas; it has also disrupted the State's

gaps in Texas's border barriers and damaging Texas's ability to effectively deter illegal entry into Texas," the attorney general's office said in a statement.

The Department of Homeland Security, under which the Border Patrol operates, said it doesn't respond to pending litigation.



High court to hear case of judge's refusal to marry gay couples

The Texas Supreme Court last week heard oral arguments in a case to decide whether a Waco justice of the peace can legally refuse to perform samesex wedding ceremonies, kut. org reported. McLennan County Justice of the Peace Dianne Hensley has refused to perform those ceremonies, saying it violates her Christian beliefs and is protected under the state's religious freedom laws.

The State Commission on Judicial Conduct in 2019 issued a warning to Hensley for her refusal. Lower courts have dismissed her claims against the commission.

Initially, Hensley declined to officiate any wedding ceremonies after the landmark U.S. Supreme Court in 2015. She began performing weddings again the following year, but only for straight couples.



The greater Houston area has Utility Commission of Texas approved a proposal to add 621 to the four existing area codes - 281, 346, 713 and 832. The area was expected to run out of new phone numbers using the existing area codes by 2025.

The new code is expected to meet demand for new numbers for another nine years. Houston's first area code, 713, was created in 1947 as one of the original four codes assigned to Texas.

Record \$345 million approved for pedestrian, bike projects

The Texas Transportation Commission has approved more than \$345 million for new sidewalks, bikeways and other types of mobility infrastructure for 83 projects across the states.

"This is a major investment in communities across the state that will help make it safer and easier to get around on foot or a bike," Texas Transportation Commissioner Robert "Robie" Vaughn said.

The state has seen pedestrian and bicyclist fatalities rise nearly 30% over the past five years. Two dozen of the projects will go in areas with a high pedestrian crash record.

Early voting ends Friday; election Tuesday

Early voting for the Nov. 7 general election ends on Friday. Voters will decide the fate of 14 proposed state constitutional amendments, including items dealing with property tax cuts and increasing pay for retired teachers. In addition, municipal and school board races are being held across the state, as well as school, city, and county bond elections.

Contact your county's election office to see what is on the ballot where you are registered.

complete audit of the metering and billing practices within Aledo.

To advance that process forward, Simon made a recommendation to the council during Thursday's meeting for the city to contract Brio Consulting to run the audit. Upon the Council's unanimous approval, Simon moved forward with the agreement for Brio Consulting to complete a full audit of the metering practices. The project is expected to last 120 days and begin promptly once the agreement with the City is in place.

"The main thing I'm looking for in the audit with Brio coming in is to really go through the utility billing process, go through our systems, evaluate the meters that are in the ground currently that are the old meters, and evaluate the new AMI meters that are already in the ground," stated Stanley. "What I'm looking for, and what I'm hopeful for in direct-

ing the city manager and city staff to hire Brio and implement this audit, is to bring a level of transparency. We look for every area that we can improve on."

In terms of transparency, Stanley announced a plan to have a committee of citizen volunteers to work alongside Brio to review their findings on a regular basis throughout the entirety of the audit process. Nicholl, a resident of the Parks of Aledo and a community member who has already been involved in bringing concerns before the mayor, has agreed to head up the volunteer committee.

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



Keys has poetic style By Rick Mauch

If you see Davhon Keys lost in thought, he might be contemplating the best way to get around an opponent's offensive line.

Or the Aledo Bearcats senior linebacker could be thinking about which line will work best in a poem he is writing.

Yes, one of the most fierce defensive high school football players in America loves poetry. He's written over 100 since he started at age 12.

"I write purely for fun and if I'm bored," Keys said. "It's just something I started doing and realized I like, so I've just been doing it ever since. It's very relaxing."


As for what kind of poetry he writes, Keys said, "It all just depends on the day. I like to explore. And if I'm not feeling it, I'll look up a poem and mimic a certain style."

While it might seem a contradiction for a guy who excels at tackling opposing players to have such a sensitive side, it also ironically makes sense. After all, watching Keys utilize his skills on a football field is, in its own way, sort of poetic.

Finding football

Keys started playing football at age 7. He connected with the sport after trying out a variety, saying, "Football really stuck. I liked the teamwork, competitiveness, and once I realized I was really good at it I loved playing as much as I could."

Once his coaches found out he was good, they also want-

It wasn't until his sophomore year of high school that Keys was moved to linebacker, a position that was completely new to him.

"It was odd. I didn't know all the details, but I knew I was an athlete," he said. "After our spring scrimmage (leading into his sophomore year) I realized I could play the position and play it well.

"It was just natural to me, all the small details I was able to pick up on quickly."

Aledo defensive coordinator Brad McCone called Keys "one of the most outstanding young men I have coached in 31 years."

"We needed a weak side linebacker his sophomore year and the decision was based on his phys-

> icality and speed," McCone explained the move. "His knowledge of our defense is incredible. He is like having a coach on the field." Keys said his time playing running back helped him make the transition from

> Keys, an all-state selection at linebacker, still plays running back from time to time. In fact, he scored two crutouchdowns in a 25-19 victory against Denton Ryan on Oct. 20 to clinch the program's 16th straight district championship.

He's also defense, having scored a touchdown in each of his three varsity seasons. Earlier this season he returned an interception for a touchdown in a 50-35 win over Dallas Parish Episcopal - a game in which he had two interceptions.

He's even scored on special teams, returning a blocked extra point attempt for two points in a 48-45 victory against Denton Guyer in the season's second game.

College/graduating early

Keys' next journey will take him to the Southeast Conference as he has received a scholarship offer to play for LSU. In fact, he plans to graduate early from Aledo and start attending classes in Baton Rouge come January.

"Ever since my freshman year my goal was to graduate early. I was ahead on all my classes," he said.

Keys has a 4.0 grade point average and began receiving college credits as early as eighth grade. He plans to major in computer engineering.


"I've always been interested in computers. I love the math part of engineering," he said.

Keys chose LSU after many offers, including last season's national runner-up TCU, perennial powerhouse Alabama - and recently

Keys' intelligence also allows him to absorb many details about his position and the game in general. That, McCone said, enhances his opportunity to succeed in college.

"His potential at the next level is bright due to his work ethic and knowledge of the game," he said. "I can't say enough good things about this young man. I enjoy every minute I get to coach him."

Nearing the end

However his senior season with the Bearcats ends, Keys will soon be leaving Aledo for the next chapter in his life. He said he's given that some thought and is taking some great memories with him.

"I'll definitely miss my friends and coaches. We've gone through a lot together," he said. "We've gotten up at the crack of dawn together for practice, worked hard together and had great success together.

"I have made some great friends and memories."

And if he leaves with another state championship, well, there's some poetic justice to that - and it would defi-

nitely be something

to write about.







The new boutique hotel coming to Weatherford is patterned after the Middleton Hotel in Graham, which is made from shipping containers.






Aledo seeking dual state success

Boys and girls competing together for first time

When it comes to athletics at Aledo High School, it's hard to find an accomplishment that hasn't happened

However, coach Mike Pinkerton and his cross country program appear to have done just that. When his Ladycats and Bearcats take to the course at Old Settlers Park in Round Rock on Friday, Nov. 3, it is believed to be the first time ever that both the boys and girls have advanced complete teams to the elite event.

"That has been our goal all season – to get both teams to state. The way these kids have been working, I am not surprised," Pinkerton said. "They have achieved their goals up to this point, and are working hard for a strong finish to the season."

The Ladycats won the Class 5A Region I Meet at Mae Simmons Park in Lubbock while the boys finished fourth to earn their berth. This came on the heels of both teams once again winning district.

Ladycats

The Ladycats' team victory at regionals was also the first time the girls won a regional championship. They were led by freshman Micah Neal, who ran the 5-kilometer course in a time of 18 minutes, 11 seconds.

"It's really exciting that we're all going," Neal said of the girls and boys competing at state. "We've really bonded over the course of the season."

As for herself, Neal improved by 53 seconds from her district championship time. She said her success in her first varsity season is credited to "a lot of pushing my body to the limit."

Neal is one of three Ladycats who comes into the state meet ranked in the top 40 runners in the state in Class 5A. She is 29th with her time of 18:02.5 at the Southlake Carroll Invitational, while sophomore Madison Larsen's time of 17:33.1 in that same meet has her ranked 22nd and sophomore Molly Garrison's clocking of 18:21.8 in the Chile Pepper Festival at the

The end was never in doubt throughout the match against



More girls joining varsity program

After a successful first two seasons from his wrestling program, Aledo coach Austin Stockon is set for - you guessed it - even more.

In the debut season of 2021-22, the Bearcats wasted no time in getting a state qualifier as Anson Din-Mbuh got there. Last season Chad Thomas became the first Bearcat to win a match at state, and was joined by then freshman Brice Bohn, an alternate in the 106-pound division.

Bohn, who was fifth at regionals, is back and is expected to compete in the 113 weight class this season.

Also, in their inaugural season Aledo had eight competitors place at district. That number increased to a dozen this past season.

"I am excited with the growth we have had. I credit a lot of this to the hard work the kids are putting in as well as the help of our local club, Texas Elite," Stockon said. "This is an amazing facility, and

they are helping our kids develop so much more quickly than they would otherwise.'

Other top returners for the Bearcats are senior Kyle Scharlow (150 weight class) and junior Sam Belyeau (165). Though neither placed at district, Stockon said he is excited about each for the coming season.

Also, sophomore Brady Powell (175) had an undefeated junior varsity season and "is going to make waves this year," Stockon said.

Newcomers for the boys who could make a quick impact include freshman Oliver Tatro (126) and senior Ethan Siklosi (175), a transfer from Weatherford.

Stockon said Tatro "is coming in with some wrestling experience and will make a great addition to the team." Of Siklosi, he noted, "He had a great season over there and I look forward to him ending his high school career with us."

Concerning the girls program, Stockon continued, "We have added a ton of girls to our program due to our middle school program last year. A bunch of these girls participated there or are going from other athletic sports."

Leading returners the Ladycats are senior Rilei Blankenship (145), along with juniors Avery Kernan (107) and Kyra Wright (126), all regional qualifiers. Other key returners are sophomore Serafina Ceron (120), who was seventh at district, with juniors Arianne Mathias (138)

> and Baillie Sessom (185), all whom Stockon said are "showing signs of a great season."

Also, Stockon said Jordan Clift Sr. (114) came out to wrestle this year. As a junior, she swam and ran cross

country, plus she has a solid base in Jiu Jitsu.

"I look for her to help us out tremendously," he said.

PREDISTRICT/DISTRICT

Stockon noted that once again his wrestlers will be competing in some tough tournaments, including Arlington, Eaton, Colleyville and Chisholm Trail.

"These are all great 6A program schools, and we will be able to see good opponents from both 5A and 6A schools," he said.

"Our district is always pretty competitive. Azle always puts out a good lineup, as well as the schools coming from Lubbock. Springtown has quite a bit of returners this year, so I look for them to be pretty strong as well."

And about the region? Aledo competes in one of, if not the hardest region in 5A. Six of the top 20 teams at the state tournament came from the region, including the first-place team (Amarillo)

"I am super excited about this group. We are young, but have a bunch of hungry wrestlers who are willing to put in the work to be great," Stockon said. "I am also super excited at the young wrestlers we have coming up sixth grade through eighth grade. We have some kids who are winning youth state and coming to us with a ton of experience."

Aledo opens the season on Tuesday, Nov. 7 at Chisholm Trail. Their first tournament is Nov. 10-11 at the Arlington Invitational.

Both now run for TCU and Gracie reached the NCAA Championships individually last

Isaac Hernandez also qualified for state individually for the Bearcats in 2020.

and 2023, while the Ladycats have qualified in 2022 and 2023.

"It is all about the kids," Pinkerton said. "They have instilled an amazing work ethic in themselves, and push each other to get better."

The best team performance was a sixth-place finish by the Bearcats in 2019.

Peaking at the right time

This season the Ladycats won meets at Birdville, the Cowtown Challenge, the Texas A&M Invitational before district and regional. The boys won the Cowtown Challenge, along with district.

Pinkerton believes the plan is once again working as his athletes are running their best when it counts most.

"Absolutely. We have geared our workouts to be at peak performance for the post-district meets," he said. "These kids are ready, and they all have the heart and desire to perform well."

And they are familiar with the second consecutive Team-wise, the Bearcats have course, having run on it at the McNeil 14th in the state on the strength of now reached state in 2019, 2021 Invitational in late September.




