Council approves assistance

\$3.5 million from TWDB

When the Aledo City Council had its regularly scheduled meeting on Thursday, Dec. 7, a big announcement several months in the making was on the docket. City Manager Noah Simon confirmed the city is receiving \$3.5 million in financial assistance from the Texas Water Development Board that will be used to fund construction of the wastewater collection project.

Aledo's population growth over the past few decades has meant necessary upgrades to the infrastructure across the city. Two pieces of infrastructure sorely needing an upgrade are the Old Tunnel Lift Station and the Clear Fork Interceptor.

With the cost of construction continuing to rise since the pandemic of 2020, coupled with the growing demand on the wastewater system, the city could not hold off on these projects any longer.

In January of 2023, Aledo began the multi-million-dollar project to increase the capacity of the wastewater collection system at the Old Tunnel Lift Station and complete the Clear Fork Interceptor Sewer project.

That project was completed in August of 2023. What hung in the balance was whether or not the city would qualify for funding from the TWDB.

With the TWDB scheduled to meet last week, Simon picked up the phone to find out if the application from Aledo would be on the schedule for the meeting. When the answer he got wasn't the one he wanted, or the one the city of Aledo needed, he spent the next several hours on the phone pleading his case to get the application added to the board's to-do list.

His determination proved worthwhile, as the board added Aledo's application to the agenda for the meeting. Shortly after the city was notified the funding was approved.

The \$3.5 million will come from the TWDB's Clean Water Revolving Fund. Getting approval for the financial assistance will save the City of Aledo approximately \$567,000 in interest payments over the life of the loan initially used to fund the project, according to a press release by the TWDB.

Council approves city hall beautification

Old city hall to be torn down

In an effort to beautify the frontage of city hall with landscaping and increase the parking area, the Willow Park City Council, at its meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 12, approved the hiring of Dorothy Witmeyer of Westwood Professional Services, Inc. (previously Pacheco Koch).

"That's the company that did our Cross Timbers Park, so we're very familiar with her work," Willow Park Planning and Development Director Toni Fisher told the council.

Council voted to hire Witmeyer and her company for \$88,600. This includes \$72,600 for civil engineering and architectural services, along with \$16,000 for the optional services of a utility plan, electrical engineering and structuring.

Funds for the project are available within those appropriated for the improvements to city hall upon its purchase earlier this year.

Fisher said the work will include projects such as landscaping, parking and a monument sign.

So long old hall

Council voted to authorize city staff to accept bids to demolish the building at 516 Ranch House Road. It was the longtime home of city hall and city offices for decades before the move was made to the new location, 120 El Chico Tr., in January of 2023.

There had been some discussion as to what to do with the old building, but it has been declared unsuitable to be repaired without significant costs. There are numerous code violations, most notably fire and electrical.

"This is going to come as a shock to no one, but the building is in complete disrepair," City Manager Bryan Grimes said. "By and large the building needs to be demolished."

Grimes stressed, however, that the property on which the building sits will not be sold. Also, the parking lot connected to it is used for the park next door.

Planning and Development report

Fisher presented the council with a Planning and Development department report. Highlights included: **Projects completed within this quarter:**

- Canvas of Willow Park town home community with 110 residential rental units.
- The Village of Willow Park apartment community with 58 residential rental units. Ownership of the complex has also recently changed.
- Sally Watkins Realty.

Board approves new HVAC equipment for Ninth Grade Center

Tours GRIT before meeting

Prior to the start of the last Weatherford ISD school board meeting of the year on Monday, Dec. 11, trustees got the chance to see progress on the new Grizzard Regional Institute of Technology (GRIT) building and also bid a fond farewell to administrative assistant Lisa Wulfjen.

Wulfjen, who also serves as the board's secretary, is retiring after being with the district for 19 years.

During the tour of GRIT, board members learned that more than 250 students have already signed up for classes next fall. Construction on the building is expected to be completed on time and within budget.

New chiller

Due to an unexpected issue with the chiller tower over the Thanksgiving break at the Ninth Grade Center, board members approved the purchase of a new chiller at a cost of \$143,450.

Superintendent Beau Rees said that the old unit rusted out after 26 years and that while maintenance has been keeping it together, it is

leaking "badly" and can no longer be repaired for long-term use.

No timeline is known for when a new unit might be installed, but depending on lead times for the equipment, Rees said it is possible work could be done during the summer if received early enough.

He added that maintenance can keep the existing unit limping along until then.

Crockett whiteboards

Also in bad shape are the whiteboards at Crockett Elementary School. Rees said the boards are in "awful"

Board discusses management of Canyon West

The Weatherford College Board of Trustees discussed management service options for Canyon West Golf Course at their December meeting Thursday afternoon.

Four companies submitted proposals that meet the college's specifications to manage the golf course. The lowest-priced proposal came from Touchstone Golf, the only Texas-owned company in the group, and is the recommendation of the selection committee.

Dr. Andra Cantrell, executive vice president for financial and administrative services, said the committee selected Touchstone based on their 18 years of experience managing 39 golf courses and their references, which include the municipal golf course in Fredericksburg that has seen significant growth since working with the company.

Following an executive session, the board authorized President Tod Allen Farmer or his designee to enter contract negotiations with Touchstone Golf.

"As Jesse [Speirs, WC's golf coach,] said, it's hard to get a tee time anywhere in Fort Worth when you want it, so they're going to come this direction," Cantrell said. "That course is going to grow, and we want it to grow in the right direction."

In other business, the board:

- Approved the minutes of the Nov. 9 meeting.
- Approved the financial reports ending Nov. 30.
- Approved the quarterly investment report.

Capital Highlights

Legal challenges to amendments appear quashed

A half-dozen lawsuits challenging the 13 approved Texas constitutional amendments appear to be dead in the water, *The Dallas Morning News* reported. The secretary of state's office last week declared the propositions approved and now a part of the Texas Constitution, while Gov. Greg Abbott canvassed the election and certified the results. One proposition that would have raised the retirement age of judges was rejected by voters.

In addition, the Texas attorney general's office said the lawsuits had improper "citation and return of service." The plaintiffs are unable to correction those citations because the election results have been certified.

The six nearly identical lawsuits claimed the state used uncertified polling machines that exposed the election to voter fraud, and the plaintiffs called for the courts to throw out the Nov. 7 results and hold a new election using paper ballots only, *The News* reported.

The suits threatened to delay voter-approved property tax cuts and a raise in retired teachers' pensions.

Abbott enters primary battle fray, mum on fifth special session

The Texas Legislature's fourth special session ended last week with the House and Senate still at loggerheads over Abbott's push to allow the use of taxpayer money to pay for private

school costs, commonly known as school vouchers. Last month, 21 House Republicans joined with Democrats to remove the voucher provision from a broad education bill that did not pass both chambers.

Abbott is sticking to his promise to endorse primary challengers to House Republicans who voted against the voucher plan, the *Texas Tribune* reported. With the holiday season underway, it appears unlikely there will be another special session this year, but Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick said he believed the best day to come back for another session "would be Feb. 5, 30 days before the election."

The impasse means legislation to increase public school funding, provide teacher bonuses and hike funding for school safety measures also died on the vine.

State halts efforts to take Fairfield Lake property

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has ceased its efforts to seize a 5,000-acre tract of private land that once included a state park and adjoins Fairfield Lake, *The News* reported. A private developer purchased the property from a utility company for about \$103 million last June and plans to close Fairfield Lake State Park were announced. The land for the park had been leased from Vistra Corp., the utility company for 50 years.

Todd Interests, the developer, plans to build luxury homes with a golf course, restaurants and shops, as well as access to a private air strip. Less than two weeks after the developer bought the property, the state

voted to condemn the land using eminent domain.

A judge-appointed commission of three Freestone County residents put the fair market value of the property at \$418.3 million - more than four times what the developer paid for it. Fairfield Lake is considered the largest privately owned lake in the state and possibly the nation, *The News* reported.

State seeks public input on broadband internet plan

The Texas Broadband Development Office is soliciting input from the public on the proposed Texas Digital Opportunity Plan, which seeks to improve and expand broadband access across the state. Almost 7 million Texans lack access to high-speed internet, or nearly 25% of residents.

"Access to reliable, high-speed internet as a means of advancing education, training, employment opportunities, healthcare, and delivery of essential services is critical to the future of our state," said Glenn Hegar, comptroller.

Through Jan. 5 of next year, Texans can give their opinions on the plan by visiting broadbandfortexas.com/tdop.

The newly created broadband office is partnering with chambers of commerce, the Texas Workforce Commission, industry associations and elected officials to highlight the importance of access to high-speed internet in today's digital world.

injured employees in the state's workers' compensation system dropped considerably from 2012 through 2022. Total health care costs dropped 30%, from \$1.15 billion in 2012 to \$812 million last year, while the total number of claims dropped 20% during the same period, from 319,000 to 256,000.

Hospital costs also dropped 20% in that decade, while the costs for professional services – such as physicians – was down 26%, from \$657 million to \$483 million.

The report used administrative data reported by insurance carriers for the 10-year period. The costs were not adjusted for inflation, which would have made the decrease in costs even greater.

PUC approves new price protections during power emergencies

The Public Utility Commission has implemented a new Emergency Pricing Program that limits consumer exposure to high wholesale electricity prices during power emergencies, as occurred during Winter Storm Uri in February 2021.

"Implementing the Emergency Pricing Program provides another layer of financial protection for Texas consumers and will ensure their electricity bills remain affordable even when conditions are tight in the ERCOT system," Thomas Gleeson, PUC executive director, said.

The new program comes after passage of Senate Bill 3 during the last regular legislative session.

"This is a key part of our ongoing work to ensure electric reliability for Texans at a reasonable cost," Gleeson added.

condition due to age and that teachers are having to cover the boards with regular paper and write on that instead.

After receiving quotes on replacing, resurfacing or refurbishing, the most cost-effective solution is to resurface the existing boards with new magnetic panels at a cost of \$59,122. Trustees unanimously approved the purchase.

Calendar approved

Additionally, the board approved the 2024-2025 District Calendar. Stakeholders were previously presented several options and the first option was recommended by 60 percent of those who reviewed it.

Rees said the calendar meets all criteria and includes 75,600 minutes of instruction time, the 187 work days for staff that is required by the state and is similar to this year's calendar with a full week off for Thanksgiving.

Additionally, board members:

- Approved the purchase of 300 new Blue Belles uniforms at a cost of \$96,900. Black has been removed from all the uniforms, new hats and winter jackets are silver and most pieces can be used interchangeably. The last time uniforms were purchased was approximately 11 years ago.
 - Approved the 2024-2025 Budget Development Calendar. Unlike in years past, Rees noted that there will be only one meeting in June, none in July and three in August.
 - Agreed to remain part of the Region 10 Education Service Center Multi-Region Purchasing Cooperative Interlocal Agreement for Child Nutrition Services. The agreement allows WISD better pricing on food items and the like.
- The WISD board meets again on Jan. 22.

Dress up the Holidays with Succulent Plants

Many people are opting for more natural elements in their holiday displays and those that easily blend with their home décor. Popular succulent plants fit this trend whether decorating your home, setting a festive table, or giving as a gift. You and your guests will enjoy the easy care of succulents and the beauty they provide beyond the holidays.

Small-scale cacti and succulents provide a multitude of opportunities for use in holiday celebrations. Just select containers that complement, but don't overpower their charm.

Use them to dress up the table by making them into place cards for your guests. Plant individual succulents in a small clay pot and set one by each place setting. Include the guest's name or holiday wish on a plant tag set in the pot or written on the container. Send them home with your guests to enjoy for months to come.

Repurpose holiday mugs, champagne glasses, bottles and other items into succulent planters. Fill whatever container you choose with a well-drained cacti and succulent

mix and display it on beverage or serving tables and trays. Just be careful not to overwater since the container you choose may lack drainage holes.

Empty wine bottles also make fun planters to display any time of the year. You will need to cut a large opening or several smaller holes into the side of the wine bottle or you may opt to buy one that is pre-cut. Fill the bottle with a cacti and succulent mix. The wine bottle planter can be displayed on its side but needs support to prevent it from rolling off the table. One simple method uses two corks and strong wire to create a cradle for your bottle garden. You can also plant just the bottom of the wine bottle and stand it up for a different look. Or consider drilling several holes in the side of the bottle. Plant small succulents in the holes. Secure the plants in place with a bit of sphagnum moss or glue if needed to hold the plants in place once the bottle is set upright.

Create a centerpiece for gatherings by planting them in a shallow container. Their unique shapes and colors blend nicely with any décor. Or display individual potted

specimens in the container to enjoy throughout the evening. When the party is over, each guest can pick a plant to take home.

You won't need much space to enjoy the subtle colors and dramatic forms of these drought-tolerant plants. Skip the seasonal greenery and use succulents to dress up candle displays. Create a terrarium of succulents using any clear glass container with an open top or lid set ajar. Succulents do not thrive in the humid conditions of closed containers.

Take it one step further and create a succulent tree. Fill a cone-shaped wire frame with moist sphagnum moss. Use cuttings or small plants to cover the frame. You may need to expand the opening to fit the roots through the wires and into the moss.

Include the name and care directions when sending plants home with guests. This makes it easier for the recipient to keep their gift thriving once it arrives home. Suggest they keep it near a sunny window where temperatures are a bit cooler and free of hot and cold air drafts.

Water succulents thoroughly and only when the soil is dry. Pour

off any excess water that collects in the saucer. Avoid overwatering plants growing in containers that lack drainage holes. As the days lengthen and the light intensity increases, the plants will need more frequent watering. Fertilize once or twice during the time the plants are actively growing.

Be sure to keep a few succulents for yourself. A succulent centerpiece is a great addition to any gathering at any time of the year.



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

Bearcats staying in 5A

It was close, by 8 students

The Aledo Bearcats and Ladycats narrowly avoided moving up in classification when the University Interscholastic League announced its enrollment cutoff numbers Friday morning, Dec. 8.

For the next two years, at least, Aledo will remain in Class 5A. The cutoff for Class 6A is a minimum of 2,275 students and Aledo High School reported 2,267 to the UIL.

The Bearcats will also continue to compete in Class 5A Division I in football. They won the championship at that level in 2022 and are in the semifinals this season.

Brock moving up to 4A

The Eagles and Lady Eagles will be moving up come the fall of 2024. Brock turned in an enrollment of 624 and the cutoff for 4A is a minimum of 545 and a maximum of 1,314.

The Eagles football team, coached by former Aledo assistant Billy Mathis, will be playing in 4A Division II.

- Weatherford: Enrollment 2,493, will remain in 6A.
- Azle: Enrollment 2,174, will remain in 5A, DI for football.
- Springtown: Enrollment 1,134, will remain in 4A, DI for football.

Bearcats going for 12th state title

Outrun Jackrabbits for 29th straight win

In any sport a simple rule is: it's impossible to make up a deficit if you don't have the ball.

So it was in the third quarter Friday at Midlothian Multi-Purpose Stadium as the Aledo Bearcats controlled the ball for almost 11 and a half minutes of the 12-minute period. Already holding a 15-point lead at the intermission, they simply wore down Forney en route to a 43-7 victory in their Class 5A Division I state semifinal football contest.

The victory, the Bearcats' (15-0) 29th consecutive dating to the third game of the 2022 season, sends them into their 12th state final since 2009. They will face Comal Smithson Valley (14-1) at 7 p.m. Friday night, Dec. 15, at AT&T Stadium in Arlington.


The Rangers defeated Brownsville Veterans Memorial (12-3) 49-21 to reach their first state final since 2004 and are looking for their first state championship. Aledo is seeking its 12th overall and 11th since 2009, the most of any high school in Texas.

"We ate up the clock going into the wind and that was big," Aledo head coach Robby Jones said. "We did it with the ground game. We talked to the receivers and told them the game called for us to run the ball. They're team players. They understood and want to do whatever it takes to win."

The Bearcats ran 21 offensive plays in the third quarter compared to four for the Jackrabbits (13-2). Quarterback Hauss Hejny threw twice, completing a 45-yard pass to Tyson Timms that set up the third of Davhon Keys' four rushing touchdowns, a 1-yard run.

Jumping out early - again

Of course, it wasn't as if the Bearcats were in jeopardy as they had controlled most of the first half, leading 22-7 at halftime. After forcing a punt they went 46 yards in just four plays, capped by Hawk Patrick-Daniels' 13-yard scoring run, his first of two TD on the night.

The Bearcats went for two points after the first touchdown, with Hejny running the ball in for an 8-0 lead.

"When they lined up the way they did it was a gimme, especially with a runner like Hauss," Jones said, explaining that doing so can have a psychological effect on an opponent.

"At some point they were going to have to make that up if they had kept scoring with us," he said.

Of course, that was a moot point. Keys made the score 15-0 on a 1-yard touchdown and added a 6-yard score in the second quarter.

Another giant showing by Keys

Keys reached the end zone from 16 yards out in the fourth quarter to cap the night's scoring. Running out of what is called the Raider formation, a form of Wildcat package in which he is in the backfield, he now has 16 rushing touchdowns this season, 11 of which have come in the postseason.

But Keys, who has signed to play linebacker - his usual stand-out position - at LSU next season, also had a standout special teams moment. He blocked Forney's second punt of the night, giving Aledo the ball at the Jackrabbits' 22-yard line, ultimately setting up his own touchdown two plays later.

Big night for special teams

Along with blocking a punt, for a second straight week the Bearcats recovered a fumbled squib kickoff that bounced off an opponent. This happened Friday after their first TD of the third quarter when the ball ricocheted off a Forney player only to be recovered by Jake Gillespie at the Jackrabbits' 29. Five plays later Patrick-Daniels scored from a yard out to make the score 36-7.

Jones said the squib kick is regularly worked on in practice because, well, "You never know what's going to happen. You've got to be ready to jump on a loose ball and we were!"

Hawk and Hauss lead running game

In last season's run to state Patrick-Daniels and Hejny led the Aledo running attack. They did so again Friday as Patrick-Daniels accounted for 185 yards on 27 carries and Hejny gained 125 on 15 totes.

Regular starting running back Ray Guillory was sidelined with a knee injury he aggravated early in a 56-21 Region I final win over Abilene. He has now missed four games and remains questionable for the state championship game.

However, Patrick-Daniels, who moved to wide receiver at the start of this season, has done a more than admirable job returning to running back. After this game he is approaching 800 yards with a dozen TD rushing (and three receiving).

"I'm glad to see Hawk do this," Jones said. "He was the one back there when we won it all last season."

Moritz Classic

Bearcats take second

The name of the game this early in the season is all about getting game experience so the team is peaking as district play starts in a couple of weeks. For Aledo's varsity Bearcats, a second-place finish in their own Moritz Classic over the weekend is a great indicator this young squad is on the right path.

Aledo made it through the first two rounds of the tournament with wins over Liberty Christian and Richland before making it to the championship game against the District 5-5A defending champion Brewer Bears. Returning all five starters from last season immediately makes Brewer the team to beat in the district again this year.

Despite losing to the Bears 51-40 in the championship game, Aledo head coach, JD Robinson felt good about how his young team handled their business against such a stalwart opponent.

"We did some good things," Robinson expressed. "I was telling our guys, that's a valuable experience getting to play arguably the best team in our league outside of districts. That's good experience for us. [Brewer] did what they always do. They're so well coached. They're so disciplined.

"They're tough to take the ball from and stay in front of. They're just good in every facet of the game. They get a lead, and it's hard to catch back up because they're so disciplined. It was good for our guys to get to feel that and figure out what we've got to do to get to that point."

Brewer started off the game utilizing their deliberate pace of play on the offensive end of the floor. The Bears pushed the ball into the paint before kicking it back out behind the three-point line multiple times as they melted large chunks of time off the clock before attempting a shot. Ball movement and patience prevailed as the visiting club waited for Aledo to make their defensive transitions a touch too late, creating open scoring opportunities for Brewer to take advantage of. Their strategy worked as designed early in the contest, as Brewer went up 7-0 before Aledo got on the board.

Once the Bearcats finally scored their first bucket of the game with 4:49 left in the first after Kaden LoBaugh laid in a high-percentage shot from the post, Aledo worked frantically to keep the Bears within striking distance. Minutes later LoBaugh hit a three-pointer from the top of the key to cut the Brewer lead to a single possession with 1:14 left in the first with the score at 11-9.

Two points ended up being the closest Aledo would get in the remainder of the game. By the time the first quarter ended, the Bearcats trailed by four. In the second quarter the Bears managed to increase their lead to six heading into halftime as they outpaced the home team, 12-10.

Coming out of the break leading 25-19, Brewer turned up the pressure at both ends of the floor. The Bearcats struggled to get shots on goal to fall in their favor on one end

of the floor while the Bears seemed to be able to get nearly every shot they took to tickle the twine. The visiting club outscored Aledo 19-10 in the third frame as they enjoyed a comfortable 15-point lead with just a quarter of play standing between Brewer and a championship trophy.

"I thought early on we made some good runs," Robinson noted. "Defensively, we've got to make adjustments against them. We can't give up the baseline, or they'll pick us apart. We did that today. We've got to do a better job of that."

As time wound down, desperation and frustration began to take root for Aledo's young team, particularly with first-year varsity guard Joaquin Pacheco. Pacheco harnessed that frustration, turning it into points on the board as he put up all seven of his points for the contest in the final 3:17. While the Bearcats came up short of a comeback, led by Pacheco's late effort,

Aledo had its most productive quarter of the game in the final stanza, scoring 11 points down the stretch.

"We did some good things," said Robinson. "Playing inside-out is going to be good for us. I think we have an advantage inside when we've got two bigs on the floor versus their one. We're going to have to be smarter when we throw the ball inside to try to get shots on goal. It was a positive experience, but we've got to be a lot better."

One of the bright spots for the Bearcats in the game, in spite of the loss, was the vast improvement at the free throw line. Aledo's struggled at the line most of the season so far. However, in the championship game they were a perfect 6-for-6, with Jack Sawyer knocking down all five of his opportunities from the charity stripe.

"We just gotta lock in, stand up there, and knock them down. There's no secret to it. I don't know

of any free throw coaches," Robinson joked. "You've just got to stand up there and knock shots down. We're going to get better."

Going for a dozen

Bearcats look to expand historical list of titles

Robby Jones is certainly no stranger to records and history. And now, as a head coach, he and his Aledo Bearcats are primed to add another chapter into the record books.

Jones is poised to become the first head coach in Aledo football history to finish his first season with a 16-0 record. He would join the now retired Steve Wood as the only coaches at the school to win a state championship in his first season at the helm.

Wood accomplished the feat in 2014.

"By the way, it would be my 11th state championship," Jones said with a smile after the Bearcats (15-0) defeated Forney 43-7 to reach the championship game Friday, Dec. 15 against Smithson Valley (14-1) at 7 p.m. at AT&T Stadium in Arlington.

The Rangers defeated Brownsville Veterans Memorial 49-21 to reach the final, a game they led at one time 49-0.

Jones, of course, is referring to having 10 championships after becoming the offensive coordinator in 2009. In fact, his 2013 team holds a distinct record as the only team ever at any level to score more than 1,000 points in a season.

"We started in January preparing for this game," Jones said. "As we get deeper and deeper (in the playoffs) we put together complete games, be great in all three phases.

"I told the team 'You've got one more game to be better than last week. We've got to finish off the good year we've had.'"

As for what the Rangers bring to the table, Jones noted, "They've got a system in place and they run it to perfection. They have highly intelligent kids, lots of 4.0s and 3.8s. It's almost like going against a Katy type offense, and that play action pass game they have is very dangerous.

"I also noticed how tall and long they looked. They have some seriously good athletes."

A cool dozen

As for the team, the Bearcats are going for a 12th state title. They already own the state record with 11 and the closest to them are Carthage, Katy, and Richland Springs with nine each.

The Bearcats won their first of eight state championships under Tim Buchanan in 1998, followed by titles in 2009, 2010, 2011, 2013, 2019, 2020 and 2022. Wood won championships in 2014, 2016 and 2018.

Another repeat at stake

The Bearcats have won consecutive championships on three previous occasions, including being the only team in Texas history to three-peat twice. They won three in a row in 2009-11 and 2018-20, along with back-to-back in 2013-14.

In fact, since 2006, no freshman class at Aledo High School has graduated without celebrating a state championship.

Sweet 16

The Bearcats have gone 16-0 four previous times, in 2010, 2013, 2016 and 2018. They are tied for third in the state and nation as the program with the most 16-0 seasons in their history, trailing only Southlake Carroll with eight and Celina with five.

Other programs that have gone 16-0 four times include Katy, Stephenville and Charlotte, N.C. Independence.

The Bearcats came close to already having a fifth perfect season in 2017 before dropping the state championship game to College Station 20-19.

Pair of legends

While Jones is new as a head coach, there's no questioning that he gained legendary status as an offensive coordinator. Six of his offenses rank among the top 62 highest scoring of all time nationally.

Smithson Valley is led by Larry Hill, a member of the Texas High School Coaches Association Hall of Honor - which also honored Buchanan this past summer. Hill has won more than 300 games in his career.

This will be Hill's fourth time to lead the Rangers to a state final, though they've yet to win a state championship. In 2001 they lost the 4A Division I final to Denton Ryan, followed by losses in the 2002 and 2004 5A Division II final to Southlake Carroll.

"Larry Hill's been here in Aledo. He talked with our coaches," Jones said. "His kids are going to be well-coached and do things the right way.

"He's in the Hall of Honor while he's still coaching. That's something special. I have lots of respect for him."

Another high-scoring season

The Bearcats are on the cusp of having yet another team move into the top 100 highest scoring offenses of all time. With 746 points through 15 games, they are averaging 50 points per game when rounded up.

If they match their season average, they will finish with 796 points, which would move them into a tie for 85th all-time. If they score 29 or more it will put them in the top 100 all-time.

The Bearcats' offensive coordinator this season is Joe Ryan Williams.

"I had all the confidence in the world Joe would do a great job running the offense," Jones said. "If I didn't, I'd be head coach and offensive coordinator. 'Joe's done a great job and I figured he would.'"

Head-to-head

For the second time in three weeks the Bearcats will be facing an opponent they have never played in their history. Two weeks ago they disposed of Abilene in a first-time matchup, 56-21, which was also the first meeting ever between two teams that combined for 18 state titles.

Offenses

The Bearcats are averaging 49.8 points per game overall this season and 46.6 in the postseason. Twice they have topped the 70-point mark, one other time they hit 60 and five other times they scored at least 50 in a game, including twice in the playoffs.

The Rangers are averaging 39.3 points overall and 33.4 in the postseason. They scored over 60 once and topped 50 points twice, but not in the playoffs.

The Bearcats are rushing for around 263 yards per game and passing for around 201. The Rangers are averaging about 158 passing yards and are capable of piling up yardage on the ground, as evidenced by picking up more than 275 in their 31-24 come-from-behind win over A&M Consolidated in the state quarterfinals.

Defenses

Aledo is surrendering 16.4 points through all 15 games and 20.0 in its five playoff games. They have posted three shutouts and held six opponents to a touchdown or less - including twice in the postseason.

The Rangers are giving up an average of 13.4 points all season, but 21.6 per game in the playoffs. They have a pair of shutouts and have held five opponents to seven points or less, though they have yet to do so in the postseason.

The Bearcats are surrendering 112 yards per game rushing and 131 through the air. No defensive yardage stats were available for Smithson Valley.

Milestones

Aledo quarterback Hauss Hejny is one passing yard and 51 rushing yards away from posting a 2,500-yard passing/1,000 rushing-yard season. It would be his second consecutive season to surpass 1,000 yards rushing as he finished with 1,276 and 15 TD in 2022, along with passing for 2,092 yards and 20 TD.

This season, Hejny has already accounted for more TD than last season with 37 total. He's rushed for a dozen and thrown for 25.

With 891 yards receiving on 46 catches, Trace Clarkson has a chance to catch 50 passes and go over 1,000 yards receiving with a big game in the state final.

Defensively, linebacker Davhon Keys is one tackle away from posting 100 once again.

Win streaks

The Bearcats have won 29 straight games dating to the third game of the 2022 season. It is tied for the second longest streak in team history, only behind the 31 straight in 2016-17.

The Rangers are a pair of points from also being undefeated this season and have won 14 straight. They lost their season opener to San Antonio Reagan, 17-16, a squad that went on to finish 11-1.

Close calls

Aledo has had anything but a close call in the playoffs, but the Bearcats did have a couple in the

regular season. They rallied to win 48-45 at Class 6A playoff qualifier Denton Guyer and scored late to defeat district foe Denton Ryan, which reached the second round of the 5A Division I playoffs.



In the second round they escaped Magnolia West 20-17, then they defeated College Station 26-21 in the third round and rallied to top A&M Consolidated 31-24 in the Region III final.

Staying put next two years

Both Aledo and Smithson Valley will remain in Class 5A Division I, at least until 2026. AHS reported an enrollment of 2,267 students and SVHS turned in 2,075.

Bob McKinley, Weatherford College's longtime athletic director and women's basketball coach, reached the 1,000 wins plateau as the Lady Coyotes defeated Paris Junior College Friday night at the Betty Jo Graber Athletic Center, 89-84.

McKinley is one of only five coaches in the history of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) to reach

1,000 victories in men's or women's basketball. He is also the winningest active NJCAA Division I basketball coach in the nation.

"The first thing I thought of is all of the special people that I've had play and the memories that it brings back," he said a few minutes after the final buzzer Friday. "Tonight, this is got to be the most special time ever."

As of Friday, McKinley has a career record of 1,000 wins and

522 losses since joining the WC coaching staff in 1977. He is a member of the NJCAA Women's Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame and is a 12-time Coach of the Year awardee from the Northern Texas Junior College Athletic Conference.

Under McKinley, the Lady Coyotes have earned 16 conference championships, five regional championships, five

national tournament appearances and one NJCAA Final Four appearance. 20 NJCAA All-America honorees have played for the WC coach.

The Bearcats ended the night with 441 yards of offense, of which 356 came on the ground.

"We thought they'd come out in a three (man) front, but they came out in a four front, so we had to adjust," offensive lineman Cody Cartwright said.

As a result, Forney's defense was frustrated all night. While they did register one sack, they also surrendered 20 running plays of 6 or more yards, including a dozen of more than 10 yards.

Stout defense again

A team doesn't reach the state final without a good defense, but for a second straight game the Bearcats clamped down on an opponent - especially their running game. A week after holding Abilene to minus 2 rushing yards, they held the Jackrabbits to 80 yards on 23 carries.

Heralded Forney running back Javian Osborne came into the game with almost 2,200 yards and 37 rushing TD. The Bearcats limited him to 49 yards on 13 carries, with 22 of those coming on the Jackrabbits' lone touchdown.

"They're playing lights out, the way they expect our defense to play," Jones said. "The last 15 years we've added an explosive offense. It's a great combination."

The Bearcats also forced three turnovers via interceptions by Ky Howington, Jaden Allen and Kamron McCoy-Burnside.

Defensive ends Carson Dempsey and Cooper Cyphers, along with defensive tackle Jacob McIntire each had a sack.

"I have to give it all to coach (defensive coordinator Brad) McCone," Cyphers said. "When we saw they couldn't run, we knew we could be unstoppable on offense."

Over a third of Forney's runs ended in a loss of yardage or zero gain. They also had two pass completions for zero yards and one for a loss.

Long time, no see

This was the first time Aledo and Forney have played in almost two decades. It was also their first meeting in the playoffs.

The teams met in predistrict play from 2000-05, with Aledo winning four of the six games. The average score was 16-10 in Aledo's favor.

In fact, the last time the teams played, Midlothian Multi-Purpose Stadium was a year away from opening. Friday's win kept the Bearcats unbeaten in the facility.

Another new foe awaits

For a second time in this postseason the Bearcats will face a team for the first time in their history. Two weeks ago it was Abilene. This time it will be Spring

Branch Smithson Valley, led by Texas High School Coaches Association Hall of Honor coach Larry Hill, who has more than 300 victories.

While reaching the state final is as familiar to the Bearcats as snow is in Minnesota, this is the Rangers third state final. Along with 2004, they reached in 2001 and 2002.

District opener

Ladycats drop Rider

With the preseason portion of the 2023-24 varsity hoops schedule officially in the record books, the Aledo Ladycats opened the District 5-5A portion of the schedule with a 51-37 win over visiting Wichita Falls Rider on Tuesday, Dec. 12.

“Obviously, I feel good because it was a win, but it definitely pointed out some things that we need to work on,” Ladycats head coach Nikki Hyles said after the game. “Our inexperience showed a little bit with the type of defense that they had. It wasn’t like they put crazy pressure on us. We just made bad decisions. We’ll go back and look at that on film and we’ll get better from that.”

“We’ve got a lot of great kids. They don’t wanna make mistakes and they don’t wanna do the wrong thing. So, we gotta show them the things that we would like to see and what they should do in the situations on film. Then we’ll get back in practice and re-create the same situation. Every team in the district is going to see this film, so we’re going to see it again,” she added.

After posting a dominant opening quarter where they went up 12-4, Aledo (12-7 overall) went shot-for-shot with the Lady Raiders in the second and third stanzas. Rider’s physically aggressive style of play caught the young Ladycats off guard, resulting in errant passes that turned into scoring



opportunities at the other end of the floor for the Lady Raiders.

While they struggled to maintain possession of the ball in the second and third quarters, Aledo’s youth-laden squad held their own on the home end of the floor. Wichita Falls Rider managed to close the gap on the scoreboard in the middle frames, but only ever so slightly.

Leading 36-30 as the fourth quarter got underway, Aledo posted their best eight minutes of the game to outpace the Lady Raiders, 15-7. The final offensive sprint by Aledo made an emphatic statement about the competitiveness of this team as their first district game came to a close.

The Lady Raiders opened the fourth quarter with a three-pointer just 40 seconds into the stanza to cut the lead to 36-33.

Elizabeth Griffin set up shop in three-point land near the Aledo bench on the ensuing possession. The Ladycats worked the ball around the perimeter, beating the defensive shift by just enough to give Griffin an open look at the basket before she buried a three-pointer of her own with 6:52 left in the game to push the lead back to six points, 39-33.

From there, a pair of trips to the charity stripe in a row for Aledo increased the lead for the home team. Natalie Anderson took a good foul that sent her to the hardwood where she slid into the wall. The padding on the wall did its job, as she popped up from the floor unscathed and went 1-for-2 from the charity stripe.

On the next possession, the Lady Raiders were called for a technical foul. Griffin knocked down both shots from the line to make it a 42-33 affair with just under five-and-a-half minutes remaining.

From there, Kinley Elms led the Ladycat offense to close out the night and send Rider home with a loss to go along with their long bus ride back to Wichita Falls. Elms dominated down in the paint, scoring seven of her eight points on the night in the final 4:52 of the contest.

“We had a great preseason,” Hyles said. “We played a lot of really tough teams to prepare us for this. I feel like we’re doing a good job. But, we just can’t be satisfied with being okay. We just gotta keep getting better. That’s what’s great about these kids. These kids, they’ve got that drive to get better, and they want to do the right thing. They want to get better. That’s the best thing about it, is they want to get better.”

With the Bearcats playing in the football 5A state championship at AT&T Stadium on Friday, the Ladycats’ hoops matchup against Northwest has been rescheduled for Saturday, Dec. 16 in Justin. Tipoff for that matchup with the Lady Texans is slated for 10:15 a.m.
