# **Business** license for gun sales approved

Generally, as it relates to the issues coming before the Aledo City Council, members see eye-to-eye. It's a rarity for members of the Aledo City Council to vote in an oppositional way. That is especially true as it relates to situations in which passions become inflamed leading up to the vote.

While instances like that are the exception rather than the rule, that was certainly the situation at hand when the council met for their regular meeting on Thursday, Jan. 25. On the docket for the meeting were plans to discuss and vote on the potential approval of a business license for a C-2 Commercial license for Aledo Arms and Ammo owner Thomas Sadin.

Sadin acquired his Federal Firearms License (FFL) two years ago and began selling firearms, ammunition, and accessories parttime in hopes of opening a brick and mortar location in the future within the Aledo city limits. With his customer base around 200 people, including members of the Aledo ISD Police Department and Fort Worth Police Department, Sadin began working on securing a location for his business.

On Thursday, Sadin made his pitch to the council in hopes of getting approved to do business at 108 Jearl Street. As part of the presentation, a rendering of the layout for the shop was provided. The graphic displayed the sales floor, virtual reality gun range, and gun vaults where the firearms will be stored after business hours.

There will not be a live-fire gun range on site.

Council members Nelson Rawls and Shawna Ford expressed concerns around the possibility of someone being able to access a firearm through the shop and using the weapon for malicious purposes. Over several minutes, Sadin spoke to the security measures he plans to put into place in the shop, as well as discussing the stringent federal

Councilman and Mayor Pro Tem Rawls appeared to have his concerns assuaged during the discussion. Councilwoman Ford, however, was not satisfied.

# **Costco highlights more growth coming**

The Tuesday, Jan. 23 meeting of the Weatherford City Council was all about future growth for the city and its citizens. Over the past few years, several new businesses have come to call Weatherford home and they have thrived and become part of the city's landscape.

There was a full agenda at this meeting and it was all about adding to that landscape.

Highlighting the evening was the council approving a Chapter 380 Economic Development Agreement with Costco. # Oncor introduces new substation

Council approves changes to commercial sewer rate calculation

A new way to calculate commercial sewer rates in Hudson Oaks could net the city an approximate 7 percent increase in revenue after those changes were approved at the Jan. 24 city council meeting.

The change in the ordinance does not affect residential customers.

Hayden Brodowsky, Hudson Oaks Director of Operations, said the city uses a winter averaging method to calculate sewer rates for the year. That means usage in November, December and January determines what is billed for the remainder of the year. That works well for residential customers. However, commercial customers often have two water meters - one for domestic and one for irrigation - which Brodowsky said reduces the need for winter averages.

"When the rates were last amended in 2008, the commercial landscape was much different than it is today," Brodowsky told council members.

Currently, a business that thrives in the winter months could actually be penalized in the summer and vice versa by using the winter averaging and the city essentially pays the difference.

Citing numbers and examples of several actual businesses in Hudson Oaks without using their names, Brodowsky showed the difference in what the current bill is and what it would look like when the new rate is calculated.

"In most instances, many customers will see a decrease in their annual billing," he added, explaining that conversations with the local businesses have been ongoing and most see the rate change as positive.

"It has created instances where the businesses even evaluated what they were doing and found ways to conserve and use water more efficiently."



"It's no secret that Weatherford and Parker County are growing at an unprecedented rate, and with that comes opportunities," Mayor Paul Paschall said. "When we look at growth, we seek valuable development that will enhance the quality of life for our residents, and the addition of Costco accomplishes that by bringing quality jobs, a wonderful amenity, and an excellent community partner."

The addition of Costco to the community is expected to bring around 200 new jobs to the area.

Paschall also noted that Costco's decision to expand into Weatherford will have a positive economic impact, generating valuable opportunity for quality businesses and retailers, particularly at the I-20 and Center Point Road quadrant, where Costco will be located.

to the background check process, and asking about potential gun safety training for customers.

Joey Weaver, a neighbor of Sadin, also came to the podium to address the council on behalf of the business owner. Weaver gave a ringing endorsement of Sadin as a neighbor, friend, and a business owner.

In spite of all efforts to win her over, when it came time to vote to approve the business license for Aledo Arms and Ammo, Ford stood

alone as the only "nay" vote. With the rest of the Council voting in the affirmative, the motion passed, granting a C-2 license to Aledo Arms and Ammo.

"I'm very relieved," Sadin said after the vote. "This has been an ongoing process since about November. We already started demo and everything else we can before this was approved. If the vote would've come back unapproved, I'd be in a pretty bad position [financially] right now."

Also at the meeting, Oncor Area Manager Michael Dimas provided members with an update on a new energy substation - called Bell Mountain - that is expected to be online by May. Once it's switched on, it will alleviate the load on current substations and provide 85 percent of the energy needed to area residents.

"This will improve power quality by a lot," Dimas said. "It



will also help in inclement weather and allow us to get residents back up and running faster."

Fitzpatrick noted that he was pleased that the recent cold snap and wind event did not affect local power. Dimas agreed and added that unless a pole is knocked down or something of that nature, crews may not have to be dispatched to get residents back online should an outage

### Also at the meeting:

# District receives comprehensive financial report

### All favorable

For the first time since 2016, Weatherford ISD conducted a Comprehensive Financial Audit with the help of Snow Garrett Williams and were presented with the results at its Jan. 22 meeting.

Kathy Williams, Certified Public Accountant and partner at SGW, provided a synopsis of the findings and gave trustees the overall "seal of approval."

The more than 100-page report was for the fiscal year that ended Aug. 31, 2023.

Highlighting assets versus liabilities and the district's income statement, among other items, Williams said all was "favorable."

The audit is conducted using generally accepted accounting standards and is required by the Texas Education Agency. It must be presented and voted on within 120 days of the close of the fiscal

Several board members, including Brian Catlin, Adam Feriend and Greg Shaw, who were part of the committee that met and worked with Lindsey and Rick Kline from SGW, commented on the process and thanked staff for their hard work.

"It is just a great reflection of Additionally, board being intentional," Feriend said of the district's ability to have the fund balance that it does. "We are in a very good place."

All added that the consistency and familiarity with SGW helped make things go smoothly during the tediousness of the audit.

"We sincerely appreciate our relationship with the district," Williams

Now that it's approved, a copy of the audit is available on the Weatherford ISD website.

During a report from the Custodial Services Department, staff was recognized for keeping the district's facilities clean and helping to contribute to the health and wellbeing of students and staff.

It was noted that Weatherford ISD has a total of 1.702 million square feet of building space with a total custodian of 55 custodians. That averages out to be one custodian per 30,000 square feet.

Board President Mike Guest praised the custodians for always being the ones there after an event, cleaning up and ensuring everything is in order for the next day. He said the community benefits from their

- Approved equipment purchases for the Child Nutrition program. In the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the Child Nutrition program increased their fund balance due to a temporary increase in the federal reimbursement rate. Due to requirements by the Texas Department of Agriculture, school districts must have an action plan to spend any excess funds that exceed three months average operating expenses. Since WISD exceeded that average, and increased participation in 2022-2023, there was a surplus of approximately \$975,000 that had to be spent.
- Approved the purchase of 141 Dell laptops for teacher use at a cost of \$125,081. These laptops will replace older ones that can either no longer be updated or are in need of service. Once replaced, the used laptops will either be used for spare parts, repurposed for students or used as loaners.
- Ordered an election notice for board member Place 1 and Place 2 in May. This action must be done 60 days in advance and will be canceled if not needed.

# Standoff at border continues between state, feds

A standoff at an Eagle Pass park continues as the Department of Homeland Security has sent a second letter to Gov. Greg Abbott demanding access to the Rio Grande park that is now under state control.

Abbott contends the state has the right to defend itself from what he called "record-smashing levels of illegal immigration," The Dallas Morning News reported. The U.S. Supreme Court ruled last week that the Border Patrol can resume cutting or removing razor wire that the state installed to deter migrants.

Citing that ruling, DHS sent a second letter demanding the state give Border Patrol agents "full access to the Shelby Park area currently obstructed by Texas."

A DPS spokesman said the state is installing more razor wire along the riverbank. U.S. Rep. Joaquin Castro, D-San Antonio, has urged President Joe Biden to federalize the Texas National Guard if the state defies the Supreme Court ruling.

### Judge rejects Paxton's motion to block deposition

A Travis County judge again blocked a motion by Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton to stop a deposition in a wrongful termination lawsuit brought by former top aides in his office, the Austin American-Statesman reported. The deposition is scheduled for Feb. 1. The four aides went to the FBI to complain about the embat-

aides were subsequently fired and filed suit in 2020.

Earlier in January, Paxton tried to end the matter by saying he would no longer contest the facts of the case and accept whatever judgment the court handed down, though he continued to deny any wrongdoing. He condemned the judge's latest ruling, saying Travis County Judge Jan Soifer was "recklessly disregarding legal precedent, abusing the litigation system, and displaying shocking bias."

Before Paxton filed his latest motion attempting to avoid testifying, both the state 3rd Court of Appeals and the Texas Supreme Court rejected his earlier appeals.

Meanwhile, four months after the Senate voted to acquit Paxton in his impeachment trial, which stemmed from an investigation into a proposed settlement of the whistleblower lawsuit, a senator that voted to acquit is accusing Paxton of possibly misleading the Senate during that trial. He urged the Senate to consider reopening the Paxton's impeachment.

State Sen. Drew Springer, R-Muenster, said Paxton's decision not to contest the facts of the whistleblower lawsuit point to his culpability. Paxton "cannot admit guilt while claiming innocence," Springer wrote in a post on X. Springer had previous announced plans to retire from the Senate.

### State delays vote on proposed land swap with SpaceX

Heat from conservation groups prompted Texas Parks and Wildlife commissioners to delay a proposed land swap with SpaceX. The proposal would have given the space exploration company 43 acres of Boca Chica State Park land in exchange for 477 acres near the Laguna Atascosa National Wildlife Refuge, The News reported. Groups, including the Sierra Club and Save RGV, urged commissiontled attorney general's actions in ers to delay the vote to allow the

proposal, which will be revisited in late March.

Environmental groups sued the Federal Aviation Administration last year over its approval of the expansion of billionaire Elon Musk's SpaceX's rocket-launch operations. The suit was filed after the company's Starship exploded during a launch and hurled debris thousands of feet into the air. They have also expressed concern for possible loss of wildlife and habitat since the launch site is within miles of the state park and wildlife refuge.

### **Record number of Texans enroll in ACA**

More Texans than ever have signed up for health care coverage under the Affordable Care Act for 2024, according to federal health data released last week and reported by the Texas Tribune. The number of Texans in ACA programs, which offer inexpensive or free health care coverage, rose 37% to nearly 3.5 million - or 1 in 9 residents.

National enrollment is at record highs as well, with more than 16.3 million people signed up for plans under ACA. That is double the number of Americans signing up for ACA plans since it was launched in 2014.

"The clear takeaway is that Texans want coverage that is affordable and comprehensive, and when you make sure they have that — and it's easy to know about, and it's easy to get signed up they sign up in droves," said Stacey Pogue, a health care policy analyst.

Texas continues to lead the nation in the number of uninsured residents, with nearly 5 million Texans living without health insurance coverage. That's nearly double the national average.

### **DSHS** launches new tools to track respiratory viruses

a respiratory virus dashboard that shows trends in the three major respiratory illnesses most likely to cause serious illnesses, hospitalizations, and deaths -COVID-19, influenza and RSV.

"Those data points demonstrate the diseases' most severe effects on people, communities and the health care system," said DSHS Commissioner Jennifer Shuford. "The dashboard provides a near real-time look at conditions, so people can make informed decisions on precautions for themselves and their families, and health care professionals can make recommendations to their patients."

### Former PUC director is now chairman

The former executive director of the Public Utility Commission was sworn in last week as chairman of the commission. Thomas Gleeson, who has worked at the PUC for 15 years, most recently as the agency's executive director, was appointed to the commission by Abbott in mid-January.

"As a long-time employee of the PUCT, I'm deeply familiar with the duties and responsibilities of the agency. Even more importantly, as a husband, dad, and ratepayer, I know how the decisions we make here impact the daily lives and finances of Texas families," Gleeson said.

The PUC regulates the state's electric, telecommunications, water and sewer

utilities. It was founded in 1975.

# A Coach Who Did it Right

In a perfect world, coaches, parents and participants would rightly refer to sports aspirants as "student athletes."

Today, however, this often is not the case. For many--in both high school and college--reference to "student athletes" is an oxymoron, as far apart as the east is from the west.

The best coaches--at all levels--first are teachers in the noblest sense, imparting life lessons first and sports second. I've known several who "got it right." One was the late Paul Stueckler, head basketball coach at Midland Lee High School, 1961-1990. His zeal for teaching was unbelievable, work ethic unquestioned and passion for coaching unsurpassed.

Son of a Lutheran minister, Paul wasn't afraid of challenges. First, he took on coaching all sports at tiny Presidio, TX, High School in 1954. He was there for a year, followed by six more at El Paso Austin High School before he dared to introduce basketball to young men at Midland Lee High School upon its opening.

Introduced basketball? During most of Stueckler's years there, football was king. One guy--claiming Lee's district to be the "little Southwest Conference"--recognized only two sports: football and spring training. At Lee, Stueckler won six district championships and made the play-offs 13 times. In 1975, his LHS Rebels took Houston Kashmere to three overtimes before losing to the eventual champions who were undefeated the previous season. With more than 700 career wins, he was Texas' fourth-winningest basketball coach.

Stueckler's heritage included a strong work ethic, and he never let go. A graduate of Concordia High School in Austin, he favored

playing football and baseball. For coaching, though, he chose basketball after his first year. While in Presidio, by the way, they played on a dirt court, but old-timers remember that he and his players cobbled together a wooden, "make-do" floor.

Son David experienced his dad's firm direction as a basketball player in 1977 and 1978. "He kept the gym warm for workouts and warmer for games," he recalls. Unforgettable are drills of rope-climbing, fingertip pushups and lots of running.

Though animated and vocal, Paul never resorted to profanity. Armed with motivational stories and jokes, he grew serious when Hobbs, NM, High School was mentioned. Coached by legendary Ralph Tasker, the Eagles were the scourge of New Mexico, avoided by their non-district foes. Stueckler scheduled Hobbs regularly, however, holding his own in most games and winning some.

He was more than resourceful. During games, he spoke reminders into a tape recorder, playing them back at halftime. Against Houston Kashmere in the 1975 semi-finals, Paul was certain that his lads would be uptight. So, he showed up in a tuxedo, finally losing to the state champions in three overtimes.

They asked him to help coach at Midland College following retirement at Lee, thus delaying plans to retire to Alabama, where he had enjoyed childhood visits that included much fishing. (There weren't many fishing holes around Midland.) After four years and hindered by a hip replacement, he and his wife, Gay, retired to Lillian, AL, where he planned to spend blissful days on his Perdido Bay fishing boat.

When word got out about his Lillian retirement, he was recruited once again to "help out" at Pensacola Junior College. Finally, health concerns caused him and Gay to return to Texas. Awaiting him, though, was one final assignment, this time at Collin College. Including parttime roles, he coached for 51 years, passing away in 2017 at age 84.

Both David and sister Laura Seale are grateful for strong parental guidance. "He had a high standard for character and an insanely high commitment to the work ethic. No cheating, foul words or facades were allowed," Laura remembers. "I'm in education, too, and learned from Dad to get inside kids' heads to teach them." David, also a University of Texas gradu-

ate, has served the Linbeck Group, a Texasbased commercial construction company, for 42 years, rising through the



ranks to CEO 12 years ago. Dr. Newbury, longtime university

While the spotlight was on the Bearcats football team that finished 16-0 and won the Class 5A Division





Dr. Susan Bohn has been the district's superintendent for six years. This was her fifth championship celebration.

"This opportunity on the field is doubled by our accomplishments in the classroom," she noted.

Bohn's statement was backed up by the recent Texas High School Coaches Association Academic All-State honors. Nineteen student athletes from Aledo earned this accolade for fall sports, including 13 from football, two from team tennis, one from volleyball and three cross country.

Not so coincidentally, while football was winning state, the cross country girls team finished second at state and the boys also qualified as a team, while volleyball and team tennis both advanced deep into the postseason.

If history repeats, many more such honors await athletes from the winter and spring sports.

Bohn also praised parents for their involvement in their children's success.

"Our parents circle around them," she said. "They feed them, prepare them, make sure they're ready to come to school."

Bearcats head coach Robby Jones took the microphone after the recognitions and offered thanks to those in attendance and the entire community. Jones, who came to Aledo in 2003, has been around for 11 celebrations now -10 after he became the offensive coordinator in 2009 and now one as the head coach. The only one he was not a part of was their first title in 1998.

"We have great community support here in Aledo. You guys didn't have to come out, but you did to support the kids," he said. "It's a whole community.

That's what I love about this place. I wouldn't want to be anywhere but Aledo."

There are no dead animal heads decorating the walls of this coiffeur man cave, but there is an attractive collection of guitars you are welcome to take down and strum a tune on.

Having guitars close at hand is also convenient for Michael to work on this week's service as the music worship leader at Grace Meadows Church in Weatherford.







Ray Guillory has a lot of football to play for the Aledo Bearcats, but it seems he has decided where his next destination will be after he finishes his high school career. He has committed to become a University of Texas Longhorn, according to a report from Dave Campbell's Texas Football.

Guillory is a sophomore set for graduation from Aledo in 2026. Though he missed the state championship game with an injury, he played a pivotal role in Aledo's advance to a state-record 12th championship and a 16-0 season in 2023.



In their previous two meetings this season, Brewer has dominated. When the two teams met in the Moritz Classic back in December, the Bears took home the first-place trophy with an 11-point win. The first district matchup at Brewer back on January 5, the Bears decimated Aledo, winning by 19.

After coming off an upset victory over Saginaw the week before, Aledo showed up on Tuesday with a chip on their shoulder. Determined to prevail on their home court, the Bearcat defense set the tone for the home team.

Typical of their history against each other, Brewer managed to take an early 12-9 lead in the first quarter. But, in the second quarter Aledo's defense found its rhythm.

Aledo head coach JD Robinson stresses to his defense the importance of keeping their eye on man or ball. On Tuesday night the Bearcat defense did a spectacular job of that. Against a talented, athletic offense,

the Bearcats managed to stay in front of the Bears, cover their gaps, and stay between the ball and the basket.

Aledo denied the Bears free looks at the basket all night, especially in high-percentage areas in the post. Even when Brewer worked their way down low near the goal, shots were heavily contested keeping scoring at a premium.

As the Bearcat defense frustrated the Bears at one end of the floor, it also gave Aledo confidence at the other end of the floor. The Bearcats appeared relaxed as their offense flowed without the pressure of having to go shot-for-shot.

Early in the second quarter Jack Sawyer gave the Bearcats their first lead of the game, 13-11, with a short jumper in the paint. A seesaw battle ensued as the two teams traded opportunities retaking the lead until the 5:03 mark when Sawyer gathered a rebound and scored on a second-chance opportunity to make it 15-14.

From there the Bearcats began to put distance between themselves and Brewer. Sawyer once again scored down in the post to give Aledo a seven-point lead with time running out in the first half, but the Bears sank a mid-court shot at the buzzer to make it a 25-21 affair at the break.

Coming out of the break, Aledo picked up right where they left off. Joaquin Pacheco drowned a three-pointer to open the third quarter to put the Bearcats up 28-21. On their next possession, Jackson Todd knocked down a jumper from the free-throw line to extend the Aledo lead out to nine points, forcing the Bears to take a timeout.

Aledo's guards became heavily invested in the scoring in the third quarter, as Pacheco, Todd, and Owen Peterson combined for 10 of the Bearcats 14 third-quarter points. By the time the buzzer sounded to close the frame, the Bearcats held an 11-point advantage heading into the fourth quarter, 39-28.

There's a scene in the 2000 movie, The Replacements, where quarterback Shane Falco, played by Keanu Reeves talks about his fear of quicksand. Falco explains the quicksand he's referring to is not literal, but an illustration of when

something goes wrong in a game, then another, and another until seemingly everything that could go wrong eventually does.

The Bearcats fell into quicksand in the fourth quarter.

Out of desperation, Brewer switched up their defensive strategy to press the home team.

The pressure quickly led to a pair of turnovers with fastbreak scoring opportunities. Fouls by the Bearcats on those fastbreaks sent the Bears to the free-throw line

where they were perfect from the stripe in the fourth quarter.

Less than two minutes into the quarter, Aledo's 11-point lead vanished as Robinson was forced to call a timeout with 6:06 remaining and his team up by just a single bucket, 39-37.

Following the timeout, both clubs fell into a scoring drought for several minutes. That changed Julian Perez finished off a fastbreak opportunity with a layup to tie the game at 39-all with 4:15 left to go. From there, the Bears went on a 12-6 run to close out the final four

tory in dramatic fashion.

'We just collapsed," Robinson said after the game. "We turned the ball over too much. We weren't physical enough, or mentally tough enough there at the end. We needed to keep the ball in the middle of the



OF THE ALEDO MUNICIPAL CODE TO PROVIDE REGULATIONS FOR GOVERNING WORK PERFORMED IN PUBLIC RIGHTS-OF-WAY: PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE IS CUMULATIVE: PROVIDING A PENALTY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

### **SECTION 5.**

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for all violations involving zoning, fire safety, or public health and sanitation, including dumping or refuse, and shall be fined Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for all other violations of this Ordinance. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

### **SECTION 8.**

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law, and it is so ordained.





# Brewer rallies to best host Bearcats

### Postgame chaos from visitors followed

The District 5-5A matchup on Tuesday, Jan. 30, between the Aledo Bearcats and Brewer ended up being the game of almosts. Leading by 11 points heading into the fourth quarter, the Bearcats almost pulled out an improbable win over a district-leading Brewer club they've not beaten in several seasons.


