Aledo ISD names new principal

Street will lead new Lynn McKinney **Elementary School**

Aledo ISD has named Heather

Street as principal at the new Lynn McKinney Elementary School, AISD's seventh, that will open in the fall of 2024. McKinney Elementary

is being built as a part of the Aledo Bond

program that passed in May of 2023; it is the largest single project in the 2023 bond program.

Street has been the principal at Walsh Elementary School in Aledo ISD since 2021. Prior to that, she was an assistant principal and International Baccalaureate curriculum coordinator at Bright Academy in the Frisco ISD from 2018 to 2021. Street was an assistant principal at Vandagriff Elementary School in Aledo ISD from 2015 to 2018 and also a districtwide behavioral intervention specialist for AISD from 2014 to 2015. She worked for the Fort Worth ISD from 2006 to 2014 as a district lead behavioral specialist (2009-2014) and as a fifth grade math and science teacher at Luella

Merrett and Western Hills elementary schools (2006-2009).

"We are excited to have Mrs. Street open Lynn McKinney Elementary and also that she will continue to be a valued part of our Bearcat Leadership team," Superintendent Dr. Susan Bohn said. "While I know it will be hard for her to step away from Walsh at the end of this school year, we are grateful that she came to us to express interest in this opportunity to grow her leadership through the opening of this new campus."

Street has a Bachelor of Science from Texas Christian University and a master's in Education from Tarleton State University. Previously, Street was a Teacher of the Year at Western Hills Elementary (2007-2008) and also at Luella Merrett Elementary (2008-2009), and she was nominated for Aledo ISD's IDEA award in 2016, 2017 and 2018 and for the Aledo ISD Don Daniel Administrator of the Year award in 2016 and 2017.

"The chance to open a new school - especially one named after Mrs. McKinney - is an opportunity I couldn't pass up," Street said. "I am thrilled to be given this opportunity and can't wait to build an incredible community of McKinney Elementary Bearcats next school year!

"I am so proud of what we have built together and accomplished at Walsh, and I can't wait to see the continued success of the students and staff at Walsh," Street said.

Budgetary concerns weigh heavy

Primary election looms

After months of discussion and pleas to Aledo's state representatives in Austin for school funding, the reality of the monetary burden facing Aledo ISD and schools across the state loomed as a dark cloud over the Aledo ISD Board Feb. 19.

"Because schools across the state didn't get additional funding from the state legislature in 2023, it's very serious," warned Aledo superintendent Dr. Susan Bohn. "I've told the staff - and I've talked to every single one of them - to say that I would love to tell you that we're going to take care of it all up here, that they don't have to

Council approves billboard contract

Now, whether going east or west, whatever message is posted on the billboard near Willow Park City Hall, you can be sure it has the city's seal of approval.

That's because it came from the city, which now has control over both sides of the billboard.

Following up on previous action in which they leased the eastbound side of the billboard, at its meeting on Feb. 13 city council approved leasing the westbound side as well after Lamar Advertising Company informed them the prior occupants were not going to renew their lease. It was originally believed the lease on the eastbound side would be extended by the now former

Nextlink: Council authorized Mayor Roberts to sign a lease agreement with Nextlink to be the city's internet provider.

Rowls makes Aledo history

First black councilman

Legacy.

It's a word we don't use much anymore, but it's something the ancients thought of incessantly.

Perhaps it's something we all should think of more. After all, we'll all leave one.

Choosing to leave a legacy of purpose and accomplishment has the ability to fill posterity with confidence and guide them as they strive to etch out a positive legacy of their own. A life lived haphazardly or destructively can often leave generations yet unborn to carry the burden of disappointment and shame.

Nelson Rowls has sought to live his life as an example from the time he was a young man - an example to his children, an example to his future grandchildren, and an example to any young people in need of one as they seek their own path in life.

He's a man who is intentional about the example he lives out for others to see. He is also a man who cares deeply for the legacy he will one day leave behind.

More than his own legacy

He doesn't just care about his own legacy. He cares about the legacy of Aledo as well.

Making news headlines around the DFW metroplex and across the Lone Star State is nothing new for Aledo. Bearcat football's prowess is known far and wide. But in April 2021, Aledo made national news for all the wrong reasons.

A group of students at the Daniel Ninth Grade center decided one fateful evening to host a "slave auction" on Snapchat where their peers could "bid" on several

of their black classmates. It was a terrible act that undermined the humanity of those students who were victimized by the horrendous actions of a few of their classmates, for sure.

While that event was not the reason Rowls ultimately decided to throw his hat in the ring for city council in 2022, it certainly was a reason.

"I remember saying at the time, 'The actions of a few, young teenagers is not how Aledo is," Rowls recounted. "One reason I wanted to get involved is because I don't want people to put a slant on our city like that. Our city is not what the actions of a few immature teenagers did one night at the computer.

"I think me being an African American, sitting on the park board and getting elected as a city councilman, that should show people - not just in Parker County and Tarrant County and all around - that isn't the case. I like my city. I want to be here forever. I just don't want people thinking that's what we're about, because it's not."

Historical vote

When the time came months later, Rowls' name appeared on the ballot for city council in this small, yet proud North Texas town. In May of 2022 when all the ballots had been collected and all the votes tallied, he became the first black city councilman in Aledo history. Then, last July he made history again when he was unanimously named the first black mayor pro tem in Aledo by his fellow council members.

"Nelson and I were elected at the same time to serve the City of Aledo and it has been a pleasure to work with him throughout the years," Mayor Nick Stanley extolled. "Nelson's election to city

council in May of 2022 and later mayor pro tem in July of 2023 was a historical occasion as he was the first African American to hold a place on the Aledo City Council.

"I believe diversity creates an environment that encourages success, and I was glad to see this diversity achieved in our last city council election. Nelson is a true pillar of this community who embodies positivity and is a dedicated public servant who takes the time to support the city we both call home and the people who live here. He and I both value the 'Aledo Way of Life', which puts family, friends, neighbors, and our city's rich history first. I look forward to continuing in service with him to bring only the best to our residents and visitors," Stanley continued.

Life before

While Rowls isn't a native Aledoan, he is a local. Born and raised in Fort Worth by his mother, he's spent the majority of his life right here in the Metroplex. After graduating from high school in Fort Worth, Nelson headed a couple hours east in pursuit of

Willow Springs Cemetery

African American burial ground rich in history

The struggle for equal treatment for all people continues, but there was a time segregation was once not only the norm in the U.S., but also the law.

In many places, African Americans were told where they could and could not sit, eat, work, live, and even where to be laid to rest.

A fence separates the east and west portions of Willow Springs Cemetery in Willow Park at the northeast corner of FM 5 Mikus Road and the I-20 service road. The barrier separates white and black families, and it is this smaller African American section where some rich Parker County history lies.

Parker County settlers established Elm Grove Methodist Church in 1854, a white congregation in present day south Willow Park. The cemetery was an offshoot of the church. The building is long gone, but the cemetery and its history remains.

A Texas Historical Commission marker stands sentinel at the grave site of freed slave Lawson D. Gratz. It recognizes his service in the Civil War as a first sergeant in the 114th U.S. Colored Infantry, his involvement in the battles of Petersburg and Richmond, Virginia and his presence at the Appomattox Courthouse to witness the surrender of General Robert E. Lee.

Name change

After his service in the Civil War, Gratz continued with the 10th U.S. Cavalry and served until 1872. He, his wife Rosa, and nine children moved from Albany, Texas to Annetta in 1892.

Joe Gratts, who heads volunteer upkeep in the black section of

the cemetery, explained the original Gratz family name came from slave owner Benjamin Gratz. It was misspelled Grats when the soldier joined the 10th Cavalry, which was not uncommon in handwritten records in those days. The extra T unexplicably appeared in the family name later.

Gratts found an 1897 record declaring owner David Yeary sold the property for \$50. The deed reads, "To the colored citizens of the Annetta community for the purpose of giving a place for the burial of their dead."

Search continues for the burial site of another of his ancestors, Lewis Swan, who Gratts believes is lost in Willow Springs Cemetery.

"My great great grandfather, Lewis Swan, started buying in Annetta and donated five acres to the black community for a church, which was also used as school for the kids during the week and then church on Sundays," Gratts said.

Swan School

In time, the school burned, Swan died, and the land changed hands.

Federal judge appears skeptical of new border law

A federal judge is expected to rule quickly on the constitutionality of a Texas law about to go into effect that institutes new state penalties for illegal border crossings. During a hearing last week, U.S. District Judge David Ezra said he had concerns that other states would follow Texas' lead in creating their own immigration laws – a power given exclusively to the federal government under the U.S. Constitution.

The Austin American-Statesman reported the U.S. Justice Department sued the state over the law set to go into effect next month. It would allow any law enforcement official in the state to arrest someone here illegally, with mandatory sentences of between six months and 20 years.

An attorney with the Texas attorney general's office argued the state's immigration law should be seen as necessary because of increased illegal immigration. Ezra questioned the ramifications of Texas setting a precedent for other states to reject federal authority and create their own immigration laws.

"I will try to get my decision out as quickly as I possibly can," he said, noting that however he rules, it will be appealed.

Paxton, Cornyn trade barbs over aid bill

U.S. Sen. John Cornyn and Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton escalated their feud last week, after Cornyn backed a \$95 billion aid package to Ukraine, Israel and Taiwan, The Dallas Morning News reported. Paxton on social media blasted Cornyn, with the senator responding that the embattled attorney general should mind his own business - specifically his pending securities fraud trial.

"Unbelievable that @ JohnCornvn would stav up all night to defend other countries borders, but not America," Paxton posted on X, formerly

Twitter. Cornyn quickly responded.

"Ken, your criminal defense lawyers are calling to suggest you spend less time pushing Russian propaganda and more time defending longstanding felony charges against you in Houston, as well as ongoing federal grand jury proceedings in San Antonio that will probably result in further criminal charges," he wrote on X.

Painfully slow rollout of broadband feared

Texas is due to receive \$3.3 billion in federal funds for expanding broadband internet, but internet providers in rural areas are worried the money won't be used efficiently to improve high-speed connections for the 7 million residents now lacking that resource.

The Texas Tribune reported a relatively new state office is trying to build a staff to oversee the work, noting earlier federal funding programs have seen limited success because many companies underestimated the costs to install broadband in sparsely populated areas.

"We want to make sure that there's a responsible allocation of these dollars," said Rusty Moore, COO of Big Bend Telephone Company in Alpine. "We've been very vocal about where the challenges are."

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act signed by President Joe Biden in 2021 provides \$42.5 billion nationwide for broadband access and aims to connect 2.5 million households in Texas. Texas received the largest portion of the funds and created the Broadband Development Office to manage disbursement of its

Democrats propose bill to connect Texas to national grids

Two Democratic members of the U.S. House of Representatives plan to introduce legislation that would require the Electric Reliability Council of Texas to connect to major electric grids outside of Texas, the Houston Chronicle reported.. The measure, sponsored by Rep. Greg Casar, D- Texas, and Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, D-N.Y., said Texans would save money, avoid blackouts, and help fight the climate crisis since Texas leads the nation in clean energy production.

"Over 10 million Texans needlessly lost power, hundreds of people died, and there were these mass power outages that we all knew could have been avoided," Casar said in a news conference last week, referring to the February 2021 winter storm.

Nearly all of Texas is served by the state's stand-alone grid system, except for parts of East Texas, El Paso and the upper Panhandle.

Nonmedical vaccine exemptions at record **levels**

Vaccine exemptions for nonmedical reasons hit record levels among Texas schoolchildren last year, the Chronicle reported, with 3.24% of Texas kindergarteners receiving an exemption "for reasons of conscience," according to the Texas Department of State Health Services. That's almost double the rate from 10 years ago.

The exemptions are part of the "post-pandemic momentum behind anti-vaccine messaging," the story said. A number of bills were filed during the 2023 legislative session to restrict education regarding vaccines and access to vaccines. House Bill 44 was signed into law and took effect last September. It threatens to withhold Medicaid funding for physicians who refuse to offer vaccine exemptions for patients.

"I'm looking at the unintended consequences that lawmakers aren't necessarily thinking about because they want to get their win and move on," said Rekha Lakshmanan, chief strategy officer at The Immunization Partnership. "But then, all of us Texans are left holding the bag."

Computers now scoring STAAR essays

Written responses on the state's performance exam will most likely be scored by a computer, The News reported. The Texas Education Agency rolled out a new model for evaluating student answers on the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness (STARR) in December, saying three-quarters of written responses are graded by an "automated scoring engine."

The automated scoring engine is "programmed by humans, overseen by humans, and is analyzed at the end by humans," said Jose Rios, director of the student assessment division for TEA, told

TEA officials said the new test format, which includes essays at every grade level, would require four to five times the number of human scorers and cost up to \$20 million more. Under the new format, only one in four student essays will be scored by a human.




Although early voting has begun, I'm sure the attacks will continue, and we will probably learn that Glenn Rogers eats babies and steals lunch money from orphans.

You may be reading this thinking I am advocating to vote for Rogers, but I'm not. You should vote based on who you think would best represent you in the Texas House of Representatives.



"The goal for this Legacy Dinner event was \$125,000. We crushed that goal with over \$154,000," said Nicole Reynolds, development coordinator for the school.







across the state for the next two years, allowing the Republican-led legislature in both the State House and Senate to pass sweeping property tax reform.

While between \$4-\$6 billion was earmarked by the legislature for additional public education funding, the legislative session came and went without the legislature passing any laws to distribute those funds to schools across the Lone Star state.

With funding still tied up in Austin, Governor Greg Abbott called four special sessions before the Christmas holiday to provide more time for the legislature to pass a law. However, school funding ended up being held hostage by the State House in order to force an up vote on a school choice voucher program as part of Abbott's agenda. Without the additional funding, schools across the state are forced to operate in 2024 and 2025 on 2017 funds.

"It's a bi-annual budget, which means it's two years before we might see relief," Bohn explained to a room full of Aledo ISD parents. "It's completely due to the fact that we did not receive additional funding from the state to run our schools. It's very, very hard for us. It's difficult. We know what you all expect for your children to have. We know the exceptional experiences that we want to give.

"I am a parent too, as we all are up here. And there's just no way that those will not be impacted by what's about to happen."

What is about to happen, is the administration is having to find ways to cut back the cost associated with operating the district. The board has already made the unsavory decision to adopt a deficit budget. However, as costs continue to rise as record-high inflation impacts the Lone Star State, difficult decisions lay ahead as the administration is forced to cut funding to a number of programs across the district.

The district has already cut \$1.1 million from the current 2023-24 school year budget utilizing a sweeping 10 percent reduction in non-staff operating costs. With the district experiencing 188.95 percent increase in fuel costs, a 55.53 percent increase in utility bills, and a staggering 329.43 percent increase in insurance costs due to inflation since the 2019-20 school year, cuts to non-staff related items is no longer enough when 80 percent of the budget-

ary costs are staff related. While no decisions have been made as of yet, according to a district-wide email sent out

by the board on Tuesday, Feb. 20, the administration must find another \$3.8 million in cuts before the start of the 2024-25 school year. Items outlined as potential cuts include:

- Deeper cuts to department and operating budgets
- Larger class sizes on average

Reducing staffing through attrition

- Reducing instructional support for teachers
- Reducing academic supports/ interventions and extensions for students
- Altering transportation services Reducing professional learning
- opportunities for staff Reducing staff travel for student activities and staff
- development Freezing staff salaries
- Reducing staff work calendars
- Reducing contests, events, competitions, and student travel
- Reducing the number of academic and extracurricular programs

"If you've been here the last couple of years, you know that we've added things like art at the elementary schools. We've added girls powerlifting, and wrestling. We've added dance. We've added a lot of opportunities for children at school," Bohn lamented. "We're

> going to have to stop adding. We will not be able to afford to ensure that we can continue to add those things as places for students to fit in, find what they love to do, and excel at school.

"You'll be getting communication from us. Our staff will be getting communication from us. That way you'll know how your student might be impacted along with you all, and our staff in the coming years.

"It's a direct result of who represents us in Austin. We have a voice. We don't vote like we should in the primary elections. So, we are asking you to do that - to make sure that there are people in Austin who are willing to fund your Aledo schools so that the experiences that your kids have there can continue."

Oh, irony

On a night of cautionary warnings related to looming budget cuts that may potentially impact extracurricular programs across the district, several Aledo High School students were in attendance for the board meeting to recognize Aledo's strategic partners for their support. Students representing Bearcat football, Ladycat softball, FFA, photography, and yearbook among others took the opportunity to thank the partners for all their efforts to support these programs.

2023 bond election update

A pair of significant updates involving Lynn McKinney Elementary School were also made during the meeting. The first of which was related to the completion of the roof of the building coming over the next few days.

The second announcement was to acknowledge Heather Street as the new principal for LMES when it opens in August 2024. Currently the principal at Walsh Elementary, the search for Street's successor will begin in short order.


Rowls said. "You can do whatever you set your mind to. If you want to

Some members of the Brazzell family attended Swan School. Jeff Brazzell, a founding member of Parker County NAACP, recalls his mother, Mae Brazzell, and her siblings attended the colored school, which Jeff describes as being off FM 5 in what is now a housing development, Stone Creek Farms Estate, west of McDavid Estates.

His great great grandfather, John Brazzell, was a settler who came to the area on a covered wagon with his large family. The Brazzells settled in the land of what is now Annetta North and started a farm.

"He was a very astute farmer," Brazzell recalled with a smile. "I remember him sitting on his porch with a cigar in his mouth relaxing after a hard day's work. He was respected at the public market. He had land, a nice house with a cellar, a smokehouse, and a windmill."

Much of the Brazzell family is buried in the black section of Willow Springs, and Jeff said he will be there in time as well.

Joe Gratts feels the same way. His father, Josef Gratts, organized volunteers to keep the hallowed grounds tidy and researched the history of families buried there. After he passed away, he passed those obligations on to his son.

"I am honoring my family for their existence and hard work to overcome the powers that were against them, especially back in those days and times they were born in," Gratts added.

"I have three generations there and I will probably end up there, and I want to be buried with them."

wanted to be. Eight years ago the Rowls family joined the Aledo community, and hopes to call Aledo home for the foreseeable future.


Their oldest daughter graduated from Aledo High School in 2022. Their youngest is a sophomore at AHS, and is on the school dance team.







Ninth straight year

Aledo and Austin aren't that far apart it seems, especially if you go by way of water.

For a ninth straight season the program will have competitors in the University Interscholastic League Class 5A State Swimming and Diving Meet at the Lee & Jo Jamail Texas Swimming Center at the University of Texas Feb. 23-24.

This season there will be five representing Aledo, including three returners. Juniors Haley Roberson and Victoria Crews are back for a third time and senior Porter Lane is there for a second consecutive year.

Roberson qualified in three events, including two individually. She won the 200-yard individual medley at the Region II Meet with yet another school-record time of 2 minutes, 5.57 seconds, besting her own previous mark. She also took first in the 500 freestyle, make it out of regionals easily clocking a 5:07.38.

"And while we might aim for one to peak at district to aim for regionals, some we know will make it out of district easily, so we aim to peak at regionals to shoot for state.

"Then we have the third category that we are confident will and we aim to peak at state. Our Roberson and Crews will join state team crosses that spectrum, next level."

Previous experience a boost

While two of the quintet are newcomers to state, coach Roberson is counting on the previous experience of the returning trio to boost the entire team. Roberson, Crews and Lane have a combined five years of previous competition at state.

"I'm relying on their leadership in the water, especially when we get to UT - the pool has quirks that are best navigated through experience," coach Roberson said. "With these three able to help the newcomers acclimate, they'll have a leg up over those that don't race there as often."

The coach also noted that while Faulkner is a new competitor this year, she was a part of the 2023 state team as an alternate. Last year Corah Satterfield went as a swimmer and will be the alternate this season.

"Julia Gordy is our only true newcomer to the team, and I suspect we'll see her on future state teams," coach Roberson said.

Six Bearcats honored

Led by quarterback Hauss Heiny and linebacker Davhon Keys, six senior members of the Class 5A Division I state champion Aledo Bearcats were named to the Texas Sports Writers Association Class 5A All-State Team.

Hejny was selected as the Offensive Player of the Year and Keys was named Defensive Player of the Year. Hejny has signed to play for TCU and Keys signed with LSU.

Also honored were wide/ receiver running back Hawk Patrick-Daniels, first-team all-purpose player; defensive back Jake Gillespie, first-team defense; tackle Djay Williams, first-team offense; and defensive back Jaden Allen, second-team defense.

The group led the Bearcats to a 16-0 season for their second straight state title, extending their state record with 12 total championships.

Heiny accounted for over 3,700 yards of offense (1,026 rushing on 131 carries; 2,701 passing) and 40 touchdowns (27 passing, 13 rushing). He completed 64% of his passes, had nine interceptions and just one fumble.

A highlight of Hejny's season came against Denton Ryan in the ninth game at home. Down 19-17 in the closing moments and his team facing a third-and-11 on their own 43, the Bearcats' 117-game district winning streak was on the line before Hejny broke free for the winning 57-yard touchdown run.

Keys posted 110.5 tackles, of which 99 were solo and 19 were for a loss. He also had four sacks and three interceptions, returning one for a touchdown.

In his final game as a Bearcat, Kevs was named the Defensive MVP in Aledo's 51-8 win over Comal Smithson Valley at AT&T Stadium in December. He registered 11.5 tackles, including 11 solo, a sack and two tackles for loss.

Keys also had some standout moments on offense. Running out of the Raider package, where he

took direct snaps, he scored 16 touchdowns, including 11 in the postseason.

"Hawk showed in the playoffs playing both running back and receiver that he was a great all-purpose player. Gillespie was a physical presence in our secondary that had offensive players looking out for him. Continuing another tradition

The season-ending tradition is more than just competing in Austin, coach Roberson noted.

"As this has become a part of our end of season, we've developed a few traditions that we're excited to introduce Julia to: The pre-state stop at Bucee's, the hole in the wall best bagel place, and the team atmosphere," coach Roberson said. "There's nothing like a travel competition to bring a team together. It's as much about the competition as it is about making these high school memories together.

"They won't call each other in 10 years to re-hash the races, but they will talk about the shared experiences."

Earning their way in more ways than one

While it does ultimately come down to their performance in the water, swimmers from Aledo face a challenge competitors in other places do not. Most notably, they do not have a natatorium in their backyard, so they have to travel to Fort Worth each morning for practice before the school day begins.

"Swimmers at most schools just practice in the pool next to or down the road from their high school. Without an appropriate competition pool in Parker County, when my swimmers make the choice to take part in Aledo swimming, they are agreeing to wake up and meet the bus in the parking lot at 5:30 in the morning," coach Roberson said. "We have a 30-minute commute to the Wilkerson Greines Activity Center in Fort Worth where they practice for between one and a half to two hours, then they get ready for school and get back on the bus at 8:30 to make it back in time for second period.

"Then we have swimmers like Avery Faulkner, who is also heavily involved with the Leodian and is

taking two AP math courses this year ,which doesn't allow her the swim period. Avery wakes up as early as the rest, drives herself the 25-plus miles into practice most days of the week, then heads back to school in time for the first period of the day."

Coach Roberson said that many team members will also head to back to the same pool to practice club from 5-7 p.m. In all, they spend close to 20 hours in the water each week, she said.

Additionally, most of the swimmers carry an intense academic load of advanced/preAP, AP and OnRamps courses, working on homework late into the night, only to wake up and do it all over again.

"These high schoolers and their parents take on an intense schedule and are incredibly dedicated to the sport to be as successful as they are," she said. "And while I'm sure they'd all love to enjoy a typical teenager sleep-in - or even just a regular school day - there are rarely complaints over anything but how cold the bus is in the morning."





For just the second time in program history, the Aledo Bearcats basketball team won a bi-district


The Bearcats (20-12), who finished fourth in District 5-5A, edged out 6-5A champion Arlington Heights, 48-46, at Cleburne High School on Tuesday, Feb. 20, to advance to the area round for the first time since the 2001-02 season. The Bearcats were playing Colleyville Heritage (27-6) at press time.

Aledo leaned heavily on their perimeter play early on to establish a comfortable lead. Jackson Todd, Owen Peterson, and Joaquin Pacheco accounted for 14 of the Bearcats' 16 first-quarter points, all while shooting from outside the paint.

Starting off the second quarter with a nine-point cushion, Pacheco went to work. The junior guard put in a couple of buckets, drained a three-pointer, and knocked down a pair of free throws for nine of Aledo's 13 points in the frame.

With Arlington Heights settling into their offense in the second quarter while doing equal damage, Aledo headed into the break at halftime still holding onto a nine-point advantage.

The second half became about survivability for the Bearcats. The Hornets worked out the kinks in

their offense that held them to the final quarter. Coming close to just seven points in the first quarter, and were chipping away at Aledo's lead in the third quarter. Within striking distance with the game winding to a close, the Hornets threw everything they had left in the tank at Aledo in the fourth quarter. They outscored the Bearcats once more, 14-10, in

punching their ticket for free basketball in overtime, Aledo did just enough to hold off the Hornets.
