Former church to become fine arts school

The Willow Park City Council made a decision at its Tuesday, April 23 meeting that is both educational and entertaining.

They approved a zoning change for the building that once housed Willow Park Baptist Church, allowing it to become The Premier Academy of Fine Arts of North Texas. The property, located 129 S. Ranch House Rd., will be leased by The Journey Church, which intends to sublease areas within the campus to operate as a private high school.

Although a church can occupy any zoning district, a private school usage requires commercial zoning, hence the request for change in zoning from "R-1" Residential to "C" Commercial.

Dr. Elizabeth Timius, Executive Director and Founder of The Premier Academy of Fine Arts, said the school is unlike any other fine arts academy. For one thing, she said, it is the only Christian fine arts academy in the state.

She also noted that what sets her school apart is its ability to find paying gigs for students within the field of fine arts.

"By the time a student graduates (from the school) they should be able to pay their own tuition through paid opportunities," she said.

Timius also noted that the school plans to have its own television station and will produce programming such as music videos and entertainment short videos. "A few of us suggested doing it differently this year," Shelton said.

library," Valerie Koehler, owner of Houston's Blue Willow Bookshop and a lead plaintiff, said of the court's decision. "But the damage has been done in terms of the libraries across the entire state have changed their policies in a way that makes it hard for new books to get in."

State Rep. Jared Patterson, R-Frisco, sponsored the bill and disagreed with the court's decision.

"It's incredibly disappointing that a majority of the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals sided with book vendors who push pornography on unsuspecting children in our public schools," he wrote in a statement posted on social media.

Tax-free holiday for emergency supplies coming up

A wide range of emergency preparation supplies will be exempt from sales tax April 27-29, the Austin American-Statesman reported. The total cost of the items must be less than \$75 for most items on the list, such as batteries, first aid kits, flashlights, tarps, and fire extinguishers. Higher amounts are allowed for portable generators (less than \$3,000) and emergency ladders and hurricane shutters (less than \$300).

Supplies that do not qualify for tax exemption include face masks, cleaning supplies, gloves, toilet paper, and tents.

\$100K daily fine for state temporarily halted

A \$100,000 daily fine levlaw already has caused a chilling ied against the state for failing effect and resulted in lost orders. to implement fixes to the state's foster care system ordered by a

U.S. District Judge Janis Jack levied the fines last Monday after finding the state Health and Human Services Commission repeatedly failed to fully investigate abuse allegations in the foster care system.

Jack issued a 427-page ruling that listed dozens of cases where mistakes or delays in investigations resulted in children going without treatment for physical and sexual abuse.

Houston attorney Paul Yetter, who has represented the plaintiffs since the case was filed in 2011. condemned the state's appeal.

"Rather than certify safe, timely investigations of reports of child abuse and neglect, the state seems determined to avoid responsibility," Yetter wrote to the Statesman in an email Tuesday. "This appeal sends a terrible message to Texas children that state leadership just doesn't care about their safety.

The stay means the fines will not be levied until the 5th Circuit Court considers the merits of the state's appeal.

Biden administration awards Samsung \$6.4 billion for Texas chip factories

The Biden-Harris administration announced last week that it would grant \$6.4 billion in direct funding for Samsung Electronics to expand its computer chip manufacturing and research cluster in Texas, the Associated Press reported. The money comes from the CHIPS and Science Act signed by President Joe Biden into law in 2022.

"The proposed project will propel Texas into a statesemiconductor of-the-art ecosystem," Commerce Secretary Gina Raimondo said on a call with reporters. She predicted the project in Taylor will create at

The funding will also expand an existing Samsung facility in Austin. The two factories being built in Taylor, about 45 miles northeast of Austin, are expected to become operational in 2026 and 2027.

Senator John Cornyn commended the measure in a statement Monday.

"By investing in leading-edge semiconductor manufacturing, we are helping secure this vulnerable supply chain, boosting our national security and global competitiveness, and creating new jobs for Texans," Cornyn said.

Auto insurance continues to spike in Texas

Auto insurance rates in Texas rose an average 25.53% in 2023, according to the Texas Department of Insurance. It's largest annual increase in at least a decade and more than double average increases across the country, according to the *Express-News*.

Among the factors driving the increase are increased prices for new and used vehicles; increased costs of labor and parts; and the volume of accidents in Texas. The number of serious injury crashes in 2022 was up 18.5% from 2019, while the number of vehicle traffic fatalities increased 23.6%.

Ware Wendell, executive director of the consumer advocacy group Texas Watch, recommended that customers go to the Office of Public

The Good Book's Chapter 6 of Matthew provides challenging specifics on living the good life, but verse three seems most daunting. It concerns the importance of maintaining a chasm between the works of the left and right hands, perhaps as far as the east is from the west.

In essence, God knows, and that's what counts. As my old mother would often say, "Don't go around 'showing out."

Maybe I was drawn to that verse early on, what with my being left-handed. From time to time, I still gaze at a now frayed certificate I received at graduation in 1956 at Early High School. It decreed--by vote of my 25 fellow students--that I was "most likely to remain left-handed." Needless to say, all graduates were voted most likely to be something.

Anyways, in this space the other day, I wrote of the current paucity of Aggie jokes. Most of us lament this omission, and--down deep--I think most Aggies do.

One of 'em--a respected veterinarian who has practiced since 1965 and is still at it part time-called me with a new take on an old joke I've repeated hundreds of times over the past half century.

I've told it because it is a "can't miss" joke that invariably draws hearty laughter, even if some of it is muffled, perhaps even gratuitous. It's about an Aggie who allegedly studied both veterinary medicine and taxidermy at Texas A&M. Upon graduation, his business card read, "Either way, you get your dog back."

I have meant no ill by it. As old Foghorn Leghorn used to say in the movie cartoons, "It's a joke, son."

My friend wisely chooses anonymity. Probably he's not the only one who doesn't want others to know he reads my columns.

"I've heard that joke countless times, often from you," my friend began. "Most of my colleagues have heard it, too, and still laugh, even if out of courtesy."

His primary purpose for calling was to let me know that upon his classmate's completion of vet studies, he was indeed both a veterinarian AND a taxidermist. At first, I thought he was teasing. Or, maybe he was setting me up for another Aggie joke.

No sirree, he was hand-onthe-Bible serious. "He was an older student, and he brought

his taxidermy skills with him to vet school," my friend said. "What I most remember is that he slept through most sessions of a dairy course. Admittedly, it was a course that few of us were interested in, since most of us were more interested in small animal practices. His sleeping in class didn't set well with the prof, so he had to repeat his senior

His call set me to wondering. Reckon the doctor/ taxidermist had a card advertising both services? Was he ever asked to turn a prized pet into a mounted den trophy? Finally, my mind flitted back to Matthew 6:30, about "each hand minding its own business."

On the matter of serving two masters, Dr. Kenneth Ashworth, former Commissioner of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, could well have been kidded unmercifully if details of his part time teaching in retirement had been widely known.

He taught graduate classes in higher education at two locations--in the same semester. One was at Texas A&M University in College Station, the other at The University of Texas in Austin. His business card was printed in maroon on one side and orange on the other.

The 92-year-old educator has written numerous books. Two of my friend's titles are Horns of a Dilemma: Coping with Politics at the University of Texas and Caught Between the Dog and the Fireplug. Bright and witty, Dr. Ashworth served Texas boldly and masterfully. No doubt his



"fireplug" book helped him to decompress after dealing adroitly with both governmental and educational politics.

GOLF **Stokes seeking home run at state**

Keeps Aledo golf tradition going

For a baseball player, Braden Stokes turned out to be a pretty good golfer.

Less than three years ago his dream was to follow his dad, Jason Stokes, into major league baseball. However, he chose the path of his grandfather and took up the game of golf.

And now the sophomore is competing for a state championship as he qualified for the Class 5A State Tournament April 29-30 at Legacy Hills Golf Club in Georgetown. He qualified after posting rounds of 75 and 76 at Lubbock's Hillcrest in the Region I Tournament April 15-16.

It's the third consecutive season in which the Bearcats will be represented at state. Two years ago they qualified as a team and last season Braylon Mahanay, now playing at Weatherford College, qualified individually.

"I played baseball ever since I was very young. All the guys on the Aledo baseball team I played with," said Stokes.

And while he still loves baseball — he played catcher — he fell in love with golf while joining his grandfather on some outings.

"I'd go with him every few months, then he invited me to play some charity tournaments with him. That led to some junior tournaments and I just loved it," Stokes said. "I gave up baseball and started playing a lot more golf."

That was just less than three vears ago, but when you love something you learn in a hurry.

Pro pedigree

Stokes' father, Jason, still holds the Texas high school record for home runs in a season. As a senior at Coppell he hit 25 on his way to being named the Gatorade High School Baseball Player of the Year in 2000.

In Boys Singles B, Ben Kurth also went 4-0 to earn first place, while Casen Freeland finished second with a 3-1 record.

TRACK AND FIELD Ladycats win regional championships

Pardon the pun, but the Aledo Ladycats track team is on quite a run.

And now, a trio of Ladycats will continue on to state, along with a member of the Bearcats. The quartet will compete in the Class 5A State Track and Field Meet at the University of Texas in Austin May 3. They qualified with top-two finishes in their respective events at the Class 5A Region I Meet at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

As a team, the Ladycats won the regional championship, scoring 55 points to runner-up Burleson Centennial's 52. The top five teams, which included Mansfield Timberview (48), Amarillo (46), and Denton Ryan (45) were within 10 points of each other.

Making the trip to Austin for the Ladycats will be regional champions Taylor Hindman (senior) in the pole and Lauren St. Peters (seniors) in the shot put - along with a runner-up finish in the discus - as well as 800-meter runner-up Sofia Brandenburg (sophomore). All three competed at state last season and this will be a third straight year for Hindman and St. Peters to compete on the big stage.

St. Peters' shot put throw of 49 feet at regionals is also a new school record.

Braylon Brown, a junior, qualified by winning the pole vault for the Bearcats. It will be his debut appearance at state.

Narrowly missing a berth at state was Brad Campbell in the pole vault. He placed third and missed out on a wild-card bid by a slim margin.

Last season Hindman finished second in the state, while St. Peters was third in the shot put. As sophomores, St. Peters was fourth in both

Brandenburg finished fifth at state last season in the 800.

"The girls competed very well. The weather was not favorable, especially Saturday, but these girls did not let that get in their way," Ladycats coach Mike Pinkerton said.

Due to heavy weather moving in overnight, all field events were moved to Friday. The Ladycats capitalized by scoring 38 points that day.

"Going into Saturday, we had the 800, 100, 1600, and 4x400 to try and score more points. These girls really performed," Pinkerton said.

Going into the final event of the meet, the Ladycats trailed by one point in the team standings, with the title up for grabs. However, the leading team did not qualify a 4x400 relay for the finals.

Aledo's relay, consisting of Mykel Murry, Mayden Mitchell, Brandenburg, and Addison Smith, fought through the wind and rain, finishing fifth, and giving the Ladycats the regional championship.

The regional championship comes on the heels of the Area 5/6-5A championship a week earlier in Fort Worth. Prior to that they were second in the District 5-5A Meet by a single point to Northwest.

"These girls have worked hard, and competed even harder all season. I do not have the words to express how proud of them I am," Pinkerton said, also praising his assistant coaches.

"I believe that all three of our state qualifiers will do a fantastic job. There are none that work harder, or prepare better," he continued. "All three have been to state before, and all three have also competed at the state facility this year (Texas Relays). I am looking for them to do great things in Austin."

After defeating Azle 5-1 on Friday, April 19, to secure the District 5-5A title for the fifth season in a row - not counting 2020 due to the pandemic - the Aledo Bearcats had the opportunity to finish off their district schedule unbeaten when they faced Wichita Falls Rider in the season finale on Tuesday, April 23.

A late two-run rally in the top of the seventh inning brought an end to Aledo's undefeated district run, as the Raiders went on to win 4-2. However, the loss was of little consequence heading into the playoffs, with seeding for both teams already determined regardless of outcome. Jake Huffman got the start on the hill for the Bearcats against Rider. Huffman found a rhythm early, surrendering just a lone walk in the top of the first before getting out of the inning with no harm done.

As the Bearcats came up to bat in the bottom half of the first, they put the pressure on the Raiders' lanky left-hander early. Brooks Burdine worked himself into a deep count before eventually drawing a leadoff walk when the 3-2 payoff pitch missed the zone.

SOFTBALL Ladycats end regular season undefeated in district play

The Aledo Ladycats ran away with the District 5-5A title once again as they closed out the 2024 season unblemished in District 5-5A play.

A combination of stalwart pitching and discipline at the plate has been the recipe for success all season. The district finale on Friday, April 19, against Granbury was no different, as the Ladycats dropped the Lady Pirates, 10-0.

After mowing down Brewer the week before, Texas Tech commit Brenlee Gonzales picked up where she left off against Granbury. The southpaw hurler pitched a complete-game shutout. The Lady Pirates managed just one hit against her.

Gonzales pounded the zone, challenging hitter after hitter, who came up empty. She retired 15 of the 18 outs she was responsible for by way of strikeout in the last district outing of her high school career.

Not satisfied to just dominate in the circle, Gonzales brought the same energy to the plate. Her 2-for-3 night at the plate was capped off by a solo home run to right field in the bottom of the fourth inning that lifted the Ladycats to a 3-0 lead to that point in the game.

Gonzales' homer in the home half of the fourth spurred the scoring rally that led the Ladycats to the early finish. Two batters later, Kennis Marx singled up the middle to give Aledo a two-out baserunner.

Addie Perry came up to bat with two outs as the lineup turned over. She hit a fly ball to left field for what routinely would've been the final out of the inning. However, a fielding error not only put Perry on base, but allowed Marriage to score from second.

With two outs and her team leading 4-0, Delaney Rosser picked up her second base hit of the game as Edington came around to score.

Aledo scored three runs on four hits in the bottom of the fifth, as Marina Taveras, Kyleigh Pawlak, and Grace Heath all plated runs in the inning. An inning later, the Ladycats were able to close out the contest as Rosser and Flores scored on a hard hit double to right field.

In the regular-season finale, the Ladycats dropped an extra-inning affair to Forney 1-0 on Monday, April 22. Gonzales pitched 7.2 innings for Aledo, giving up five hits and just one run in the top of the eighth before being replaced by Taylor McKean.

The District 14-5A champion Lady Jackrabbits got the better of the pitching duel, surrendering no runs on just three hits in eight innings.

While the Ladycats only managed three hits against Forney, all three went for extra bases. Gonzales and Taveras each hit a double. Flores hit a two-out triple in the bottom of the first inning to give the home team an early opportunity to score. Unfortunately, it ended up being their best opportunity to score.

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
