Council approves language for drive-thrus

Reappoints P&Z members

With many commercial additions to Hudson Oaks in recent years, one thing that city officials agreed needed updating was regulations regarding drive-thru facilities.

After the Planning & Zoning Commission unanimously recommended approval at its May 14 meeting, it was the council's turn to take a look at language in the ordinance and decide what changes to make.

The existing ordinance had no regulations on drive-thrus that are not restaurant related, which meant, in essence, that any business could have a drive thru without it being properly reviewed by the city for safety and traffic concerns.

New definitions proposed in the land-use tables outline the need for a special use permit (SUP). Citing as an example, a dry-cleaning business with a drive-thru pickup lane would need an SUP to construct and use that lane.

"This does not meet the spirit of the overall zoning ordinance as drive-thru uses of other types can still pose a public risk in terms of traffic and safety," said Assistant City Administrator Hayden Brodowsky in a staff report.

That noted, "establishments providing services to customers in motor vehicles that are either temporarily parked, or through a service window and a drive-thru lane, such as drive-in or drive-thru restaurants, banks offering drive-thru services, pharmacies or dry cleaners offering drive-thru services, gas pumps/fuel sales, car washes, or similar concepts," will now be required to file for a SUP after council voted to approve the changes May 30.

During the meeting the council also approved acceptance of a proposal from The Hub International for benefit consulting services to aid with challenges small group employers face when providing benefits for employees and their families.

The Hub, with a local office in Fort Worth, will charge \$10,900 annually for the city's 26 full-time employees. National Benefits Solutions will continue to administer the deductible reimbursement program/flex spending sccounts and the third-party contract for the employee assistance program.

An existing contract with Brinson Benefits will expire on June 30.

Also at the meeting, council re-appointed Robyn Jackson, Dante Hall, and Angela Pereira to the planning and zoning commission for the 2024-2026 term.

Aledo's Gregory makes history

Crosses stage in Cherokee regalia **By Rick Mauch**

Hunter Gregory grew up hearing about his Cherokee heritage. When he crossed the stage on May 24 to





receive his diploma as a graduate of Aledo High School, he shared that heritage with all in attendance.

He is believed to be the first student in the history of the school to wear his Native American regalia when receiving his diploma.

"It means a lot for me to represent a part of me that I've always been extremely proud of, and I'm glad I can help pave the way for more to do so," he said. "Our heritage should be shared and shown as part of who we are.

"I don't know much other than my citizenship comes from my father's father, but it has made me a more spiritual person and I've always felt more in tune with nature whenever I take a moment to appreciate it."

Meaningful moment

Derek Gregory, Hunter's father, noted that tribal regalia, such as eagle/hawk feathers, cords, stoles, and beadwork on graduation caps, plays an important role in

graduation ceremonies for many indigenous students. These sacred items are typically gifted to graduating students by their families or tribal elders to recognize the student's success and academic achievements, and to celebrate those achievements from both a spiritual and cultural perspective.

"Indeed, graduation ceremonies are especially meaningful for indigenous students because indigenous students have long faced structural barriers and discrimination in the educational context and are less likely to graduate from high school than their peers," Derek said. "We are incredibly proud that our son will be representing the Cherokee

Nation by wearing tribal regalia during his graduation ceremony."

While the Aledo ISD is allowing this honor to take place, doing so is up to the individual district. Derek said he is disappointed that the Texas Legislature did not pass legislation that would prohibit some school districts from preventing students like Hunter from wearing tribal regalia.

"I sent a letter formally requesting a religious exemption in accordance with state law to the superintendent of AISD. I also contacted all of my elected officials and gave them the information and the contact info for the superintendent," Derek said.

"Having Cherokee ancestry has been good for our family because it has provided a sense of pride, belonging, and connection to something older than this very country," he continued. "Being a registered citizen of the Cherokee Nation is an incredible privilege and honor, and I am grateful to be able to pass that down to my son and for him to be able to pass it along to his children."

College plans

Hunter plans to attend Abilene Christian University and study criminal justice. A three-time state swimming qualifier at Aledo, he does not plan to swim in college, but is open to participating in at least one sport if the opportunity presents itself.

"If Water Polo becomes available I will be the first to sign up," he said with a smile.

He'd also like to get more in touch with his tribe and learn more about their practices and become more involved with that part of his ancestry. In addition, he's shared what he does know with several classmates.

"I've told them a good bit of my heritage and they've been excited that I'll be the first to represent my tribe in Aledo," he said.

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EDUCATION Million dollar donation aids Weatherford Christian School

Co-founder sells land. donates proceeds

Finding a high return on investment can be impossible in these uncertain economic times, but for Jim Bob and Kate Measures, there was no question where they wanted to donate their land sale for an eternal impact.

The Measures recently sold a tract of land and donated \$1 million of the proceeds to Weatherford Christian School.

"God has given me two hands, one to receive with and the other to give with," said Jim Bob, co- founder of WCS. "When I stand before God at the end of my life, I would hope that I will not have a single earthly item left and could say 'I used the many blessings You so richly blessed me with to help provide a Christ-centered education for every young soul fortunate enough to attend Weatherford Christian School."

In 2008, WCS purchased 72 acres on Ranger Highway through a mortgage loan. The private Christian school conducted a capital campaign to raise funds to fully cover the loan. However, the recession later that year caused a loss of more than half of the pledges and then later a sharp increase in

interest rates left the school with a hefty monthly financial burden that offered students some encouragenegatively affected the operational budget.

"Being able to relieve our budget of carrying the rising interest costs from a long-standing loan will be a huge blessing," said Dr. Beth Riley, WCS Head of School.

It's a balancing act to accommodate the needs of a growing school population and tend to the financial restraints of loan responsibilities to be fiscally responsible to parents, staff, and donors.

"Yet, God always provides for us just when we need Him," said Dr. Riley.

The Measures have designated the \$1 million real estate sale proceeds to directly reduce the school's original mortgage loan on the school's acreage. Since there is no state or national funding for the private school sector, WCS relies 100 percent on donor support.

"This generous gift

from the Measures will allow the school to move forward with additional projects to accommodate our current growth and prepare for the future," Dr. Riley said. "God bless extraordinary donation."

The future-minded Measures ment, too.

"After graduating may they pursue higher education at a Christian college. At the proper time in life, choose a Christian spouse in marriage rearing their children in the nurture and admiration of the Lord, passing their love for the Lord on to the next generation," Jim Bob Measures said.

Investing in Christian education has been in the Measures' hearts for a lifetime and the couple said they've seen so many blessings because of their obedience. That's why they wanted to extend an offer to the public to join them in supporting quality Christian education by prayerfully considering helping to pay off the remaining \$631,000 of the school's land mortgage loan.

"I hope I live long enough," Jim Bob Measures said, "to witness that day (for our mortgage to be fully paid off)."

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House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, narrowly won re-election in a hotly contested runoff race and has vowed to seek his third term as speaker, drawing threats from Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton to oppose any of his supporters in the 2024 primary. "I've done it twice, Phelan told

The Dallas Morning News. "I'll do it a third time." But Patrick was quick to threaten opposition to any representative supporting Phelan's bid.

"My message to Austin is clear: to those considering supporting Dade Phelan as speaker in 2025, ask your 15 colleagues who lost reelection how they feel about their decision now," Paxton said in a statement. "You will not return if you vote for Dade Phelan again." Two former Phelan support-

ers already have announced they will run for speaker. Rep. Tom Oliverson, R-Cypress, announced his plans to do so before the runoff results were known. Rep. Shelby Slawson, R-Stephenville, announced her candidacy on Thursday.

Phelan has drawn Paxton's ire since supporting impeaching the attorney general, who was ultimately acquitted by the Senate last September.

SBOE to approve more rigorous course material

Public comment is now open for new course materials proposed by the Texas Education Agency and under consideration by its governing body, the State Board of Education.

The Austin American-Statesman reported the state has developed academic content that will be offered free online for kindergarten through fifth grade reading and language arts, and for kindergarten through eighth grade math. SBOE must approve the materials for use in all public schools that wish to use them.

Education Commissioner Mike Morath said the intent is to provide free, state-developed and vetted course materials. He said teachers have said in TEA surveys that they spend many hours outside of school looking online for such material.

"In many cases, the materials that have been cobbled together by curriculum teams or grade level teams, while seemingly appropriate, have not given students exposure to the background knowledge they need," Morath said. "You want kids to be able to read independently, but you want them to be really stretched."

If approved by the board, districts will receive an additional \$40 per student to use board-approved books and \$20 to print state-owned content. Anyone interested in viewing the proposed materials and provide feedback by going to the board's website sboe.texas.gov - and finding the "Instructional Materials Review

The board could approve use of the materials in November.

TPWD approves rules for trapping mountain lions

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission last week approved rules for hunting and trapping mountain lions in the state, banning canned hunts and setting a 36-hour limit for checking traps for live mountain lions, kut.org reported.

Before the vote, there were no requirements for checking traps, and whatever was trapped could be left to die of exposure or dehydration.

"We don't need to facilitate negligence. We have a duty to manage wildlife. We have a duty to be ethical as hunters," Brandt Buchanan, a ranch manager and hunter, told commissioners.

Violating the new regulation is a class C misdemeanor. Prior to the vote, Texas was the only state that did not have any rules for trapping or hunting mountain lions.

Wildlife filmmaker Ben Masters told commissioners that technology provides an economical way for ranchers and trappers to comply with the new regulations for live mountain lions caught in traps, showing them a small motion-activated camera that can let them know what is in a trap.

"Y'all have the opportunity today to show some dignity and respect to our cats," Masters said prior to the regulation being approved.

State revamps Narcan distribution following delavs

Texas is revamping its distribution program for an overdose-reversing medication after vears of supply and distribution challenges, The Texas Tribune reported. The state has tapped into more than \$45 million in federal funds since 2019 in order to get Narcan into the hands of law enforcement and members of the public seeking to reduce overdose deaths. The program has been beset by delays, supply challenges and communication lapses, however.

UT Health Science Center San Antonio will continue to administer the program, now called Naloxone Texas, and says it has improved distribution and communication in recent months.

"I am aware that individuals have expressed concern about the rapidity with which they receive naloxone," said Jennifer Sharpe Potter of UT Health San Antonio. "This is life-saving work, and we want to make sure that people get naloxone as quickly as possible."

UT Health San Antonio's contract with the federal Health and Human Services Commission requires it to distribute at least 120,000 doses a year in Texas, The Tribune reported. This year marks the first time the state is using its own funds in part for distributing naloxone instead of

relying solely on federal money.

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CITY OF ALEDO, TEXAS ORDINANCE 2024-207

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ALEDO, TEXAS, AMENDING VARIOUS PROVISIONS OF ARTICLE VI "TECHNICAL CODES," OF **CHAPTER 10, "BUILDINGS AND BUILDING REGULATIONS," OF THE** ALEDO CODE OF ORDINANCES TO ADOPT THE 2021 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL RESIDENTIAL CODE, THE 2020 NATIONAL ELECTRICAL CODE, 2021 INTERNATIONAL PLUMBING CODE, THE 2021 INTERNATIONAL FIRE CODE, THE 2021 INTERNATIONAL MECHANICAL CODE, THE 2021 INTERNATIONAL BUILDING CODE, THE 2021 INTERNATIONAL ENERGY CONSERVATION CODE, THE 2021 PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE, THE 2021 EXISTING BUILDING CODE, AND THE 2021 INTERNATIONAL FUEL GAS CODE; TO ADOPT LOCAL AMENDMENTS TO THE ADOPTED CODES; **PROVIDING FOR RECORDING OF THE CODES AS PUBLIC RECORDS;** PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE CUMULATIVE OF ALL ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; **PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS; PROVIDING** A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION IN THE **OFFICIAL NEWS PAPER; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

Sec.10-179. - Penalty.

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this article shall be deemed guilty and is subject to the penalties as set forth in section 1-10 of this Code of Ordinances.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and it is so ordained.

part of 10 others as offensive coordinator since 2009.

"I think we made a lot of improvements throughout the spring on both sides of the ball," Jones said. "The defense is a little ahead of the offense right now, but when you don't have your starting running back (junior Raycine Guillory) and only returning starting offensive linemen (junior Payton Williams), that is to be expected. We will be a lot better in the fall when those two guys are back to 100 percent."

Both Guillory and Williams are recovering from injuries. Despite missing several games last season, including almost the entire last half of the postseason, Guillory accounted for almost 1,400 yards and 21 touchdowns.

"Ray was not able to participate in spring drills. We had to hold him back at times because he wanted to be out on the field with his teammates," Jones said. "We just must be smart with his rehab and get all the strength back in his leg before we put him back on the field."

Jones said the focus on the defensive side of the ball is replacing the entire secondary, with all four starters signing NCAA Division 1 college scholarships and the top backup signing a NCAA Division 2 scholarship. This includes State Championship Game MVP Davhon Keys, who is now with LSU.

"We are still trying to figure out the best combination in the secondary going into the summer months, but we feel pretty good about the guys that we have." Jones said.

starter back (Williams) and he got injured the second week of spring. "It left us very experienced up

front. We saw a lot of improvement by those guys as a unit as the spring went on, and we fully expect to have a good offensive line when we get going in the fall," Jones said.

Other key losses on the offense include now graduated QB Hauss Hejny, the 2022 State Championship Game Offensive MVP and 2023 State Championship Offensive MVP Hawk Patrick-Daniels. Hejny is now with TCU and Patrick-Daniels signed to play for Tyler Junior College.

Gavin Beard is the heir apparent to Hejny. In limited action last season the sophomore completed 45 of 62 passes (73%) for 517 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions.

"Gavin showed that he is a more than capable QB. The coaching staff knew going into spring that Gavin has a chance to be a really good QB for us, and I think he showed that throughout the spring," Jones said.

"The major competition is in the two areas that we focused a lot of attention on this spring, the defensive secondary and offensive line. There is still competition going on to decide who the starts are going to be in some of those positions," Jones continued. "We also have a lot of competition at the wide receiver and tight end positions. There are several players that can fill different roles for us in those positions."

Jones added that junior Kayden Finley, who has seen action at tight end and wide receiver the past two seasons, is expected to get the ball even more in 2024 after catching talent from the JV progam whom 39 passes for 602 yards and six he expected to be strong contributouchdowns in 2023.

Ladycats lose 1-0 in state semifinal heartbreaker

Aledo's resurgent season concludes against historic Harlingen South squad

GEORGETOWN – After losing to Richland in the area round of the 2023 postseason, the Aledo Ladycats softball team bounced back with a resurgent 2024 campaign that took the squad back to Austin.

The Ladycats marched into their state semifinal match against a Harlingen South squad making its first appearance in program history at this juncture of the postseason. Ultimately, the Lady Hawks pulled the upset in the pitchers' duel, courtesy of a third-inning RBI single and coming out on the right side of a defensive rundown between third base and home for the game's last out and a 1-0 victory Saturday afternoon at East View High School in Georgetown.

Aledo junior Taylor McKean took the circle for the Ladycats, who batted second in the contest and dazzled with a healthy combination of her offspeed repertoire and location on the outside corners. She nabbed two of her 14 strikeouts in the top of the first inning, but Lady Hawks junior pitcher Lexi Sandoval responded by striking out Aledo's top of the order in succession.

Aledo got a strong scoring opportunity in the bottom of the second when third baseman Kyleigh Pawlak doubled to right field and was moved to third on a sacrifice bunt by Texas Tech-commit Brynlee Gonzales. After that, McKean drew a walk and her pinch runner, Grace Heath, stole second base shortly after her substitution on the base paths. However, an infield popout and a groundout during the next two at bats ended the threat.

Then, Harlingen South mustered the game's only offense on a two-out RBI single by its second baseman Emily Ruiz for a 1-0 lead. The Ladycats threatened with two base runners in the bottom of the same frame but were stranded after a groundout to Lady Hawks' star third baseman Amira Rodriguez, a Washington commit and the state's current RBI leader.

Defensively, Aledo remained stalwart throughout the contest. McKean collected six more strikeouts in the fourth, fifth and sixth innings while the Ladycats played errorless defense behind her to keep the deficit at one run.

After McKean retired three of four Harlingen South batters in the top of the seventh inning, the Ladycats still had one more chance to either extend the game or walk it off. With two outs and momentum growing for the Lady Hawks, center fielder Jordyn Eddington blooped a double to right field that gave Aledo life and hope late in this state semifinal. Next, leadoff hitter Addie Perry beat the muffed throw from third to first for an infield single as Eddington rounded third base and raced for home plate. However, she was caught in a rundown between
