Council approves budget

Will continue with no property tax **By Jim Zimmermann**

With a complete and informative presentation City Administrator Sterling Naron dotted the proverbial I's and crossed the T's while presenting the 2024-2025 Hudson Oaks proposed budget to fellow council members and fellow citizens.

"I quickly want to highlight some of the city's achievements in FY24. The city accomplished many feats in fiscal year 2024," he said.

- These achievements included: Mass meter swap – The city used
- funds from previously passed debt to replace every water



meter in the city. This project was long overdue, as there was a substantial amount of water meters that were defective.

- Street grading project The city signed a contract with a third party engineering firm to grade all the streets in Hudson Oaks. "This grading gives us a list of which streets are in the most need of being improved," Naron said.
- The continuation of attracting new businesses, such as Chuy's, Sherwin Williams, Jersey Mike's, and much more.
- Street improvements per the city's schedule with drainage improvements.
- Green Ribbon In FY24 the city continued its partnership with the Texas Department of Transportation with another phase of Green Ribbon projects. The newest phase of these projects includes beautifying sections directly off Exit 414

going westbound off Fort Worth Highway. It also includes the planting of new trees, and the replacement of dead trees, along Interstate 20.

"The most substantial element in the fiscal year 2025 budget is the adoption of water rates and wastewater rates for all water customers the city currently serves," Naron said. "This is due to the new capital projects the city plans to undertake."

The 2024-25 budget is just over \$5.8 million, which is just over \$325,000 less than the 2023-2024 budget.

A much-needed expenditure that was noted is the purchase of a 2025 Ford Police Interceptor for \$48,505 for the Hudson Oaks Police Department.

The 31st annual Coyote Chase Race 5K and 1-mile run will take place Saturday, Nov. 16, at Weatherford College.



countless others who were unable to attend.

As part of the festivities, Mayor Nick Stanley read a proclamation to officially denote Thursday, Sept. 26, as Deana McMullen Day in the City of Aledo. City Manager Noah Simon surprised McMullen by presenting a placard bearing her name that will be placed in the new Aledo City Hall, naming one of the conference rooms in her honor once construction of the facility is complete.

Down to business

Following McMullen's retirement celebration, the council got its scheduled meeting underway. Mayor Pro Tem Nelson Rowls presided over the meeting.

The official business of the meeting was brief, with only two action items on the agenda. The first order of business was a proposed amendment to the Aledo code of ordinances around the issue of fence maintenance. The proposed amendment would permit code enforcement for property maintenance standards across the city as it pertains to broken, or unsightly fencing structures.

The second proposed amendment will help create limitations for parking on public streets.

During the discussion, Simon stated the goal of the amendment is not to ticket residents for shortterm parking on city streets, but rather compliance that will keep city streets clear and passable.

Both amendments passed unanimously.

Upcoming meeting agenda

Aledo's City Council will meet again on Thursday, Oct. 3. On the agenda will likely be presentations regarding delinquent tax collection, the state of the IT infrastructure for the City, and an update on the establishment of the Aledo Police Department. That meeting will take place at the Aledo Community Center starting promptly at 6 p.m.





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margin of error in his race against incumbent Republican Ted Cruz, the Austin American-Statesman reported. A poll released by the Texas Hispanic Policy Foundation shows Cruz ahead of Allred 48% to 45%, nearly within the margin of error of 2.83%.

Cruz is seeking his third term in the Senate. He won his last race against challenger Beto O' Rourke by just 2.6 points.

The tightening race prompted the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee to announce last week that it is sending millions of advertising dollars to Texas to boost his campaign. The committee plants to put its money toward airing more Allred campaign ads. Committee chair Gary Peters said the Democratic candidate needs more funding to get his message out.

"But it is his message," Peters said. "He knows Texas inside and out."

Texas Supreme Court rules on gun ban at state fair

The State Fair of Texas opened last week with its newly enacted ban on weapons intact after the Texas Supreme Court rejected a challenge by Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton just 13 hours earlier. The Statesman reported the court ridiculed the state's legal arguments in a five-page opinion, with Justice Jimmy Blacklock writing that "the State's filings do not even attempt to answer" the question at the heart of the case.

Two lower courts also rejected Paxton's attempt to lift the ban, enacted after three fairgoers were injured in a shooting incident last year.

Party game company sues SpaceX

for trespassing

Cards Against Humanity, makers of a humorous adult party game, is suing Elon Musk's SpaceX company for trespassing and damaging land the company purchased in Cameron County. The company purchased the land in 2017 to send a political message to then-President Donald Trump's campaign to not build a border wall.

KUT reported that the company raised money to purchase the land by soliciting \$15 donations from 150,000 people. It says the land has been kept in its pristine state, but SpaceX has dumped gravel, tractors, and space garbage on it.

A website maintained by the company announced it is seeking \$15 million in damages and displayed photos purportedly showing "before and after" images of its land. SpaceX did not respond for comment from Texas Public Radio.

Going lights out for migrating birds

Audubon Texas is asking residents to not leave the porch lights on this fall, during peak migration season for millions of birds. *The Texas Standard* reported the 2024 Lights Out, Texas, campaign is underway, and Texans are urged to turn off unnecessary lights to minimize light pollution. Migrating birds can become disoriented when traveling through densely populated areas.

Up to 1 billion birds are killed each year due to collisions with buildings. Peak migration runs through Oct. 29, with fall migration ending around Nov. 30. One of every four birds migrating through the U.S. passes through

Texas, according to Audubon Texas.

Building owners, businesses, developers and homeowners can help protect migrating birds by turning off all nonessential lighting from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. each night. Lighting shields that direct light downward can reduce bird casualties. More information is available at tx.audubon.org.

Looking back on last summer's weather

The summer of 2024 is in the books, and Dr. Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board, says it ended up in the middle of the pack when compared to the last 25 summers - the 12th most miserable during that time period.

The amount of the state in drought declined to 28 percent from a high of 88 percent during the summer of 2022, Wentzel wrote. Last summer certainly was an improvement over the two previous, which were considered the second and third most miserable in the past quarter century. But they both pale in comparison to the summer of 2011, which had the worst drought conditions in Texas history, and wildfires swept the state.

Relatively plentiful rain made last summer seem more tolerable, but records indicate it was the fourth-hottest summer of the past 25 years.

Thank goodness for autumn.

State Representative Update **Good Apples, Bad Apples**

Public school teachers in Texas overwhelmingly consist of dedicated educational professionals who have committed their lives to teaching and nurturing our most precious resource, our children. Teachers sit beside us in church on Sunday, parent their own children, and become an important influence in the development and lives of future citizens and leaders.

Arguably, the teaching profession today faces more challenges than any other time in history. Teachers have become the scapegoat for societal woes and the break-down of the traditional family. More and more children depend on their time in public school for nutritional and emotional nourishment.

Instead of providing critical support, politicians readily berate teachers to score political points with their extremist base. Whether it's Governor Abbott echoing "Education not indoctrination," Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller calling public schools a "closed socialist system that hurts kids," or Michael Quinn Sullivan saying public education is a "babysitting service...about employing otherwise unemployable adults," political figures at the highest Liberty PAC's President and (and lowest) levels have centered

their careers on tearing down public school teachers.

As the propagandist mouthpiece of the Farris Wilks and Tim Dunn political machine, the Texas Scorecard seems hellbent on unfairly smearing Texas public schools. While the occurrence is rare, any time there is a case of a teacher acting inappropriately, the Scorecard pushes out an article blasting all public schools in general. While these few teachers should be held accountable and justice should be served in cases of illegal behavior, these few bad apples are not representative of all 370,000 Texas educators. Percentage-wise, bad acting teachers are a minute fraction of all Texas teachers.

Many political operatives from the Wilks & Dunn political network, along with other billionaire funded out-of-state organizations, continually trashtalk our public schools.

They should take a look in the mirror before throwing the first stone at public schools. Mr. Dunn, Mr. Wilks, and Ms. Betsy DeVos should focus on weeding out the deviants in their own organizations.

Just recently, reporters uncovered and alleged that Corey DeAngelis, self proclaimed "school choice evangelist," previously engaged in the performing of homosexual pornography. Disturbing and lewd photos were released as part of the report. DeAngelis works for a DeVos funded organization and is a regular guest on Fox News segments. His lobbying got him into meetings with top officials, including Governor Abbott.

The former Defend Texas CEO of Pale Horse Strategies,

Jonathan Stickland, infamously once wrote, "rape is nonexistent in marriage, take what you want." Cary Cheshire, Pale Horse Strategies Senior Advisor, and Tony McDonald, General Counsel to the Texas Scorecard, were recorded making derogatory remarks about Governor Abbott's use of a wheelchair in 2020. Stickland and his Pale Horse Strategies company went on to host known neo-Nazi sympathizer and anti-semite, Nick Fuentes, meeting with him for 6.5 hours. Reports say that after a week of a negative news cycle, Tim Dunn was forced to replace Stickland as President of Defend Texas Liberty with Luke Macias and to once again rebrand the organization, this time as Texans For a Conservative Majority.

But take a look at Macias; he was a political consultant for disgraced former State Representative Bryan Slaton, expelled from the Texas House after an investigation concluded he got his 19 year-old staffer drunk and then had sex with her at his apartment. Slaton received large sums of money from the Wilks & Dunn funded Defend Texas Liberty PAC.

In another instance, Luke Bowen, the Political Director of Wilks and Dunn funded Texas Right to Life, was arrested for solicitation of a minor. Montgomery County officials say that Bowen communicated via

social media with who he thought was a 13-year old girl; he asked for explicit images, sent pictures of his genitalia, and arranged to have sex. He was arrested upon his arrival. In February, 2023, he pleaded guilty and was sentenced to five years in prison.

Wilks and Dunn, just two men, yield an incredible amount of power, control, and sway in Texas politics. One would hope that they would use that power for good, first by assembling a team of outstanding citizens and then ethically pursuing causes that benefit all Texans. But that is not the case. When looked at on a per capita basis, the small workforce behind the Wilks and Dunn political machine appears to have a large ethics problem. The number of incidents of bad behavior goes way beyond the ones mentioned here. It seems with them, bad roots can grow no good fruit.

Don't give Texas Scorecard's tabloid trash any attention when they paint the noble teaching profession with a broad brush of negativity and false accusations. Good apples dominate the teaching profession.

The endgame of Dunn & Wilks' myriad of organizations, along with other out-of-state billionaires, is the privatization and elimination of our public schools. Texas teachers and public school employees are in their crosshairs. Make no mistake, rather than teachers, the financiers, puppets, and puppeteers carrying out these nefarious operations to destroy public education are the BAD APPLES.

No. 2 Bearcats host No. 1 Raiders

District title could be on line

Quick, can you name the last time Aledo played a football game involving a No. 1 team and they weren't that team?

Don't worry, it's not likely anyone else can either.

However, that is the case when the top two Class 5A Division I teams in the state of Texas square off Friday night, Oct. 4 at 7 p.m. in Tim Buchanan Stadium in Aledo. The No. 1 Denton Ryan Raiders (4-0, 2-0 in District 3-5A Division I) will clash with the No. 2 Aledo Bearcats (4-1, 3-0).

"Normally, if we're in a game with the No. 1 team, that team is Aledo," Bearcats coach Robby Jones said. "But it doesn't make any difference. They still have to come in here and win.

"We were No. 1 in preseason and they were No. 2. Either way, Friday is going to be a heck of a game."

Back to old Ryan

Aledo coach Robby Jones believes the Raiders have returned to being the program that enjoyed phenomenal success for many years before what Raiders fans would consider a "down period." Ryan was only 14-7 in 2022 and 2023 combined, with first-round and second-round playoff exits.

Before that, the Raiders were 97-7. They won a Class 5A Division I state championship in 2020 with a 15-0 record, were state runners-up in 2019 and reached the semifinals from 2016-18. In addition they reached the state quarterfinals in 2015 and 2021.

The Raiders also won state championships in 2001 and 2002.

"That was one of the comments coach (Dave) Henigan made last year, that they were as talented as they've ever been."

Now, those young players have even more experience and appear a kickoff return of 40 yards and

the team is the most dominant for Ryan, Jones noted, "Their defense. It's probably the best defense we'll see all year - and we'll probably see it twice."

Jones was referencing a possible - many would say probable - rematch in the Region I final.

Jones also praised Ryan's depth, which, like Aledo, is strong.

"They even have one of their returning starters who doesn't start for them this year," he said. "Their defensive line is similar to ours, a lot of depth."

On a pair of rolls

Both teams have made short work of their district opponents. Aledo has defeated Brewer on the road, Birdville at home and Keller Fossil Ridge on the road, outscoring the three 183-3.

Ryan has blasted its first two league foes, Fossil Ridge on the road and Granbury at home 119-23.

That's an average of 61-1 for the Bearcats and 59.5-11.5 for the Raiders.

On the entire season, Aledo is outscoring its opponents by an average of 50-13. Ryan is outscoring its opponents by an average of 47-14.

Ironically, the stumbling block for both teams was in Week 1. The Bearcats lost 35-30 at Denton Guyer, which is ranked 20th in the state in Class 6A.

Ryan avoided an opening upset, edging Haslet Eaton 42-32.

Big returns

In a game such as this, special teams could be a factor, particularly returning kicks. Aledo has four kick returns of more than 35 yards this season, including two kickoffs for touchdowns.

This past week, in a 63-3 win at Fossil Ridge, senior Adrian Fuller returned the second-half kickoff 82 yards for a score. Earlier in the season, junior Lincoln Tubbs returned a kickoff 78 yards for a touchdown.

Also, senior Blake Burdine has

"It's valuable, it's kind of like stealing points," Jones said.

Jones recalled the now-graduated Jake Gillespie and his ability to field almost every punt that came his way.

"Punts hardly ever hit the ground. Lamel's stepped in and he's doing the same thing," Jones said. "Most long punts in high school are because they were not fielded. When a punt is fielded it gives us a chance at better field position."

Finley having great season

As the Bearcats enter the second half of the regular season, junior wide receiver Kaydon Finley is having a standout campaign. Through five games he has 28 catches for 489 yards and eight touchdowns.

And he could be a difference maker against Ryan.

"Which is why we moved Kaydon, to make sure we can get the ball to him, similar like we did with JoJo Earle," Jones said.

Earle began his college career at Alabama in 2020-21 and is now playing for TCU.

District winning streak

This game cannot be played without mentioning Aledo's 122game district winning streak. The

Two seasons ago when the Raiders hosted a young Aledo team, there were rumblings the streak might end. Aledo left Denton with a 35-21 victory.

Last season, when the experienced Bearcats hosted a young Raiders squad, Ryan came close to ending the streak. The Raiders overcame a 17-0 deficit to take a 19-17 lead in the final moments before Aledo quarterback Hauss Hejny - now at TCU - broke free for a touchdown of more than 50 yards to escape the upset with a 25-19 win.

All-time series

The Bearcats and Raiders have split their first four meetings. Ryan won the first two in 2002 and 2003, 34-27 and 17-0 - the last time the Bearcats were shut out.

Following three of the four previous meetings the winner has gone on to win a state championship. Ryan took the crown in 2002, with Aledo winning in 2022 and 2023.

Though they did not play, both won a state title in 2020.

The Chisholm Trail match was also Senior Night for graduating seniors Britz, Heckathorn, Bussmeir, Heydman, Jack and Loftin.


