A Willow Park Parks and Recreation meeting Oct. 29 drew 30 participants adding suggestions to upcoming public park improvements and expansions. Being more of a town hall gathering than an official board meeting, the night had the feeling of an upbeat class participation project.

Led by park board member and Willow Park Mayor Pro Tem Lea Young, residents discussed Cross Timbers Park and Demonstration Garden at 631 Ranch House Rd., Veterans Memorial Park east of Cross Timbers Park, and Kings Gate Park and Trails along Clear Fork Trinity River off Kings Gate Road.

"We think it will be a good idea to get your input and feedback for our survey, so we wanted you all to come tell us what you

think and what are your ideas," Young told the group.

Parks board members and city employees Rose Hoffman (communications director) and Mandy McCarley (parks and rec director) logged suggestions as participants spoke of restrooms, sidewalk lighting, parking, improvements to Memorial Park, playground equipment, and the placement of a possible disc golf course at Kings Gate Park.

### **Parker County** amplifies national trend

#### **Trump takes almost 83** percent of county votes

As Republican Donald Trump coasted to a major electoral count victory with eked out victories in "swing states" on Tuesday, Nov. 5, Parker County left no doubt at the local level.

With all precincts counted, the unofficial total of county votes in the county gave Trump 75, 091 (82.76%) votes to Kamala Harris' 14,840 (16.36%). The cumulative total votes for nine additional candidates was less than 1%.

The race statewide was closer, but not close. Statewide, with 99% of precincts reported, Trump garnered 6,366,002 (56.26%) votes to Harris' 4,792,854 (42.35%).

Democrat Colin Allred took advantage of some split tickets in his quest against incumbent Ted Cruz, slightly outperforming Harris.

In Parker County, Cruz took 72,400 (79.9%) to Allred's 16,318 (18.01%).

Statewide, Cruz received 5,964,650 (53.15%) and Allred received 4,988,677

In terms of congressional representation, portions of two districts lie in Parker County. In U.S. Representative District 12, the race to succeed retiring Republican Kay Granger was won by Republican Craig Goldman, who received 215,112 (63.5%) votes to Democrat Trey Hunt's 123,666 (36.5%).

In Parker County, Goldman led with 56,925 (84.97%) votes to Hunt's 10,210 (15.21%).

Incumbent Republican Roger Williams ran away with the U.S. Representative District 12 race, receiving 262,087 (99.41%) votes to Chad Hagg's 1,564 (.59%). Hagg did not have a party affiliation.

In Parker County, Williams inched a little closer to 100%, receiving 20,017 (99.81%) votes to Hagg's 38 (.19%).

#### **Closer to home**

Parker County also hosts two Texas State Senate districts.

In State Senate District 10, incumbent Republican Phil King easily defeated Democrat Andy Morris in Parker County 31,793 (86.84%) to 4,820 (13.16%).

District-wide, King received 227,021 (61.74%) to Morris' 140,679 (38.26%).

In State Senate District 30, Republican Brent Hagenbuch took

He began working at an early age riding with his

dad and uncles in the oil fields of Oklahoma, barely surviving after the great depression and the Great Dust Bowl. During his high school years, he learned to rope. He rode in local rodeos. After a couple semesters of playing basketball in college, he was drafted into the Army where he served during the Korean Conflict. After being Honorably Discharged, he moved to the Bay Area of California to live with his brother and started work with Kaiser Jeep as a graphic artist and doing whatever they asked of him. Henry J. Kaiser and the management team took dad under their wing and dad became an expert on everything Jeep. Bob married a beautiful Portuguese woman in San Jose, California, by the name of Zelda Rodrigues, on December 8, 1956. He became a Regional Manager for Kaiser Jeep and moved to Irving, Texas and then to Chicago, Illinois.

In 1968, a gentleman from Chicago named Jim Moran, contacted Dad about starting the parts and service operation for a new vehicle being imported into the United States – Toyota. Dad was the 2nd person on the payroll of Southeast Toyota Distributors where he became Vice President of Parts and Service. Dad spent quite a bit of time negotiating with the Japanese on projects for Southeast Toyota.

### Insurance hikes make affordable housing tougher

A growing number of Texas homeowners are forgoing buying homeowners insurance as premiums skyrocket, according to a recent report from the Texas comptroller.

Recent natural disasters hurricanes, severe storms and wildfires - have prompted some insurers to limit or even eliminate coverage in Texas. Daniel Onev. research director of the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University, says premium increases in Texas have outpaced the rest of the country.

"At the end of 2023, Texas had the biggest percentage point increase of any state in the last five years," he said. "You file claims, the insurance companies pay that, then they have to get that covered by the reinsurers. So, some of the price increases we're seeing now are from storms that happened a couple of years

Oney said a "surprisingly large number of people" are choosing not to have insurance once their home is paid for. Mortgage lenders require homeowner insurance, but there is no requirement to do so once a home is paid for.

The high cost of insurance is just one factor affecting the state's housing shortage, which is driving up home prices and rental costs. The Texas Tribune reported that in 2022 the state needed about 320,000 more homes than existed, according to an estimate by Up For Growth, a housing policy organization.

"While Texas has been building a lot of housing overall, in many places, it just has not been enough to keep up with demand in the state and people moving in from out of state," said David Garcia, Up For Growth's policy director.

#### **Northeast Texas** officials attack reservoir study

A recent study by the Texas Water Development Board on the long-proposed Marvin Nichols Reservoir is under attack by northeast Texas officials, The Dallas Morning News reported. The proposed 66,000-acre lake would be built in Franklin, Red River and Titus counties to pump water more than 100 miles to the Dallas-Fort Worth area at an estimated cost of \$7 billion. It has been on the state's planning books since 1968, drawing staunch opposition from landowners and officials in the affected counties.

The Region D water planning group, which represents those counties, said the draft report is biased and misleading. Opponents of the reservoir say it would destroy homes, farms, churches and cemeteries while not providing any benefit for people living in that area. Proponents say the reservoir is a solution to Dallas-Fort Worth's growing water needs as its population continues to boom.

"It's a flawed project. It should not go forward," Jim Thompson, chair of the Region D planning group, said. "It should be removed from the state water plan."

Kevin Ward, the chair of Region C, which represents the metroplex area, said the concerns of northeast Texas residents have been heard.

"We've heard it, so you've got to believe that if we thought there was another way to do what we're

trying to do right now ... we'd certainly latch onto it as fast as we could," he said.

#### **Texas buys two ranches** near the border

The state General Land Office announced last week that it has bought a massive ranch in the Big Bend Region and a smaller ranch in Starr County, The Tribune reported. The 353,785-acre Brewster Ranch that borders Big Bend National Park is a collection of 28 ranches put together by its previous owner over two decades. Land Commissioner Dawn Buckingham said the ranch could be used for hunting, agriculture, and carbon sequestration.

"With such a beautiful and expansive property, the GLO has the opportunity to generate many forms of revenue for the schoolchildren of Texas," she said in a statement.

Also purchased was a 1,400acre ranch in Starr County, along the Texas-Mexico border. The state plans to build a border wall on the property to deter illegal migration.

#### **Battleship Texas still** looking for a new home

The U.S.S. Texas has been undergoing repairs at a dry dock near Galveston after the Legislature approved \$25 million to keep the ship seaworthy, but wharves officials have rejected a proposal to dock it there permanently, according to the Texas Standard.

The battleship is the only one still in existence that served in both World Wars. For decades it was docked in the Houston Ship Channel near the San Jacinto Battleground State Historic Site and served as a museum. Over the years it developed leaks and was in danger of sinking before it was towed to a dry dock in

Galveston for renovation. The Texas is currently berthed next to the Elissa, the official tall ship of Texas.

However, there has been a backlash from business owners near the ship, who are concerned that if not moored correctly the ship could cause damage if a hurricane or tropical storm struck Galveston.

Repairs likely will take at least another year, during which the ship's supporters hope to find a permanent location for the venerable vessel.

#### **RRC** digitizes more than 83 million oil and gas records

The ongoing effort by the Texas Railroad Commission to digitize its oil and gas records continues, with 83.4 million now searchable online from any place with an internet connection. The records date back to the 1930s and include oil and gas production records, such as well depths and location of producing fields.

"Putting millions and millions of oil and gas records online is a win-win for the public and the agency," said Danny Sorrells of the commission. "Not only does it give the public easy access to historical information dating back almost 100 years, but our staff can now devote the time they would have spent tracking those records for the public for other tasks at the agency."

### Our Annual Popcorn Rush

Carl Sandburg--his poetry collections winning three Pulitzer Prizes--warmed the hearts of Americans with his beautiful description of how tides roll in, "on little cat feet."

He would be hard-pressed to similarly describe crowd's arrivals at our house each year on October 31. They're in all shapes, sizes, ages and all manner of dress-but, unlike fog--they arrive as if on tidal waves, eager to gather their popcorn. Only a handful say "thank you."

Before you think ill of today's youth, let me quickly add that mere "thank yous" don't seem to be enough; most add two words: "Thank you very much," or something akin thereto.

This marked the 23rd annual popcorn giveaway at our home in Burleson and our 50th year to use popcorn as calling cards or welcome mats. We love these evenings of smiles in an atmosphere of goodwill, when ugly politics and an atmosphere of general negativity are tossed aside for a few hours.

Involved in it all are parents and grandparents, smiling as they watch their youngsters respond with gracious expressions of thanks, even though more treats beckon down the street. They seem highly organized— perhaps utilizing GPS thingies, maps and records--of specific addresses where abundant "loot" is found

annually. These kids act as if they fear that Santa Claus might be hovering nearby, making a list of who was naughty and nice.

We don't "keep score" on numbers of visitors. We'll admit, though, that our inventory of small bags (we called them "nickel bags" in days of yore) was reduced by 600 and our stash of popcorn now is 75 pounds lighter. This event is invariably "good medicine" for us. Seeing families arrive with youngsters--their attention to courtesy in play--does a body good. This year, a half-dozen friends helped fill bags and marvel with us at the creativity. We'll use the age-old description used long ago in small "personals" printed in newspapers across the land: "A good time was had by all."

Some said they've dropped by for Halloween snacks since "day one;" others said they were attracted by the aroma wafting throughout the neighborhood. This counters my wife's description used across the years; she insists on calling it an "odor."

There were "oohs and ahhhs" aplenty, particularly for toddlers

barely able to walk alone. Some said nothing, but knew to extend their bags for popcorn deposits. (One kid, perhaps a first-grader, asked if he could "borrow" a bigger bag. It was a request easily granted.)

Many costumes were lit by batteries; some were inflated. A heart-warmer was a four-year-old lad. He wasn't costumed, but carried a sign made from cardboard, attached to a sawed-off yardstick. On it were these words, scrawled with a magic marker: "Will Work for Candy."

Have we ever seen seasons so "rushed" by store holiday displays? One seen recently promoted Halloween, Thanksgiving AND Christmas. One pharmacy, however, was unadorned. Pictured, though, was a photo of a handsome dog, perhaps a pharmacy mascot. I asked if the dog had a name. "Rex" was the answer.

I should have known. It was clearly shown on his nametag. Spelling, though, was unexpected.

I'll close out this week remembering Sandburg, who was to poetry what Norman Rockwell was to artistry in his scenes of Americana on the covers of The Saturday Evening Post magazine.

Sandburg was never thought of as an academician. In fact, he lasted just two weeks at West Point, posting bad marks in both mathematics and grammar.

I suffered similarly in mathematics, but made acceptable grades in grammar. Before suggesting that Carl may have spent too much time in the fog, who is to say that he didn't gain knowledge that isn't reflected on college transcripts? Obviously, many people thought so. President Lyndon B. Johnson called him "America" when Sandburg died in 1967 at age 89

### Aledo teams compete at state

#### Ladycats finish third

For a second consecutive season the Aledo Ladycats and Bearcats completed at the Class 5A State Cross Country Meet at Old Settlers Park in Round Rock on Saturday, Nov. 2.

The Ladycats placed third as a team, scoring 145 points. Comal Smithson Valley won the state championship with 54 points, followed by defending state champion Lucas Lovejoy with 97.

The race was expected to be a showdown between Lovejoy and 2023 runner-up Aledo, but Smithson Valley pulled off the surprise.

The Aledo Bearcats clinched their 17th consecutive district championship last week with a 77-14 win at Azle. Now, as they prepare for their 29th straight postseason appearance, they have one more task in the regular

The Bearcats (8-1, 7-0 in District 3-5A Division I) host the Denton Broncos (2-7, 1-6) Friday night at 7 at Tim Buchanan Stadium. A win will give Aledo 52-3 in 2015. its 127th straight league victory dating to 2008, a national record.

In a game such as this, with all due respect to Denton, a complete mismatch, the greatest risk is avoiding injury. Also, Aledo coach Robby Jones doesn't want his team to get lethargic one week before facing Saginaw Chisholm Trail (7-2) at home in bidistrict on Nov. 15.

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

### Eagles dual-threat QB shining in final season

#### Kaznowski helping strengthen foundation of TCA football

The road to rebuilding and improvement can be a long, winding road, whether it is in a competitive or a professional setting.

For the Trinity Christian Eagles football program, improvement has been noticeable in the midst of the 2024 football season. The Eagles have been largely led on the field and in the locker room by senior signal-caller Canaan Kaznowski, a dual-threat quarterback and transfer from Azle High

"The role of quarterback is nothing new to me - I have played quarterback my whole life," Kaznowski said. "The thing that makes this year different, I would say, is that I'm more vocal compared to previous years. Also, I think a lot of that comes from being a senior and the experience I have. I know the team looks to me as their quarterback and I cannot fail to give them anything but my best effort."

#### More than on-field leader

Through nine games this season, Kaznowski has produced 1,047 passing yards and seven aerial scores, along with 476 rushing yards on 84 carries (5.8 yards per carry) with seven scores on the ground. While the production of his arm and legs have come up big for the Eagles this season, his leadership in the locker room has been contagious with the rest of his team.

"I would say people are stepping up into leadership positions," Kaznowski said. "Teammates are being more vocal in a good way. I think we all just got tired of losing and getting thrown around. We changed our mindset to a 'Let's go out and win this game' rather than just expecting another loss. We have the mindset to go out and

During their best stretch of the season, Kaznowski helped lead the Eagles to wins in two of three games. Trinity Christian scored a 42-27 victory at home over Bishop Gorman before losing a tight 26-24 contest to All Saints Episcopal. The Eagles followed that up with an impressive 56-36 romp over the Newman International Academy Warriors in front of their home fans.

Kaznowski discussed goals of putting up good statistics, being a reliable leader for his teammates on and off the field and winning as many games as possible as goals for the season. To his credit, the Eagles (2-7, 0-3) have as many wins as the previous two seasons combined and have scored more points through nine games (193) than that of the 2022 and 2023 seasons combined (181). In addition, the Eagles have two single-digit losses compared to zero from the past two seasons.

"I want to have fun and enjoy it since it's my senior year," Kaznowski said. "I want it to be my best year and to play each game with no regrets. As a team, we want to win as many games as possible, but we can't get fully wrapped up in the win and loss columns. Football is a game that I feel exemplifies life more than any other game. There are times of joy, times of anger and times of regret. However, you have to power through and do your best no matter what. As a team, we want to be Godly men who can handle the struggles that both football and life will throw at us."

### Ladycats claim bi-district championship

#### Aledo beats Birdville as Burleson awaits in area

FORT WORTH – In a rematch from last year's area round playoff bout, the No. 6 state-ranked Aledo Ladycats squared off against the Birdville Lady Hawks for an opportunity to claim the bi-district championship of Class 5A Region I Tuesday night at the Wilkerson-Greines Activity Center.

The Ladycats (32-7) were dominant in the opening two sets, but needed a little extra juice to get the job done in the end, as Birdville (25-9) handed Aledo its first defeat in a set since August. However, the Ladycats answered the bell emphatically with a resounding fourth-set victory, claiming the bi-district crown by a final score of 25-22, 25-16, 24-26 and 25-10.

"Going into this match, we knew we were going to have to swing big against them because of how good and scrappy they are," Ladycats head coach Claire Gay said. "We tried to capitalize on our offense and we have some really good offensive threats, so we just tried to keep everybody involved."

The Ladycats built an early first-set lead following that exact formula with different players contributing to the winning effort. Senior middle Haley Lowe connected on a huge kill following an overpass that gave Aledo a 13-7 advantage. Then, star junior outside hitter Alyssa Todd put down a kill that ended a 4-1 spurt from Birdville, giving the Ladycats a 15-11 cushion. After that, Todd put the ball away emphatically to end

one of many long rallies throughout the match on two occasions to keep Aledo's lead at four points.

As Birdville continued to make its push, different players stepped up for Aledo. Senior middle Kinley Elms pounded the ball to the hard-court from the right side and senior Morgan Estevez put away the deciding kill to give Aledo a 1-0 lead in sets.

Another upperclassman up front had her own block party at the net. Impactful senior middle Ella Isbell, who recorded a game-high 10 stuffs, got the crowd on its feet with a big block that gave Aledo a 3-0 lead to open the second set. After Birdville tightened the action later in the frame, Isbell blocked consecutive Birdville attacks for points that gave Aledo the lead back for good at 11-9.

"I thought our block stepped up huge tonight and was a big turning point for our game," Gay said. "We were really efficient there and were able to slow the ball down or score points when we needed to."

A few points later, a block from Elms and a service ace from senior setter Ava Reding extended the lead to 15-10 and, after Birdville scored the next point, Aledo closed out the set by scoring 10 of the next 16 points.

Each time the smaller Birdville team tried to make a run, Todd seemingly always had the answer at the net Aledo needed.

"I like it because I can just look to my teammates and know that they trust me to get the kills down," Todd said. "If I don't get it, then I know I can look to them again to get me the ball back and put it down."

Then, Aledo looked as if they would win comfortably in straight

sets as the sixth-ranked Ladycats held a 20-12 lead, needing just five more points for their 15th consecutive straight-sets victory. Instead, the Lady Hawks rallied to take a 23-22 lead following a gutsy 11-2 run. Kills on consecutive possessions by Todd and Ali LoBaugh put Aledo ahead 24-23, but Birdville scored the final three points to make a match of it – trailing 2-1 in sets.

Although it was Aledo's first defeat in a set since Aug. 30, the challenge was accepted and met with both optimism and resolve.

"We can look at it as something to help us come back to get the next set if we are in a situation like that going forward," Todd said. "We know we can come back and grab a set after losing and not get down on ourselves."

"We had a couple little lapses in the third set – we shouldn't have had to go to four sets – but I thought we really took over in that fourth set," Gay said. "We did what needed to be done in the fourth set even though it should have happened in the third set."

From the opening serve of the fourth set, it was all Aledo. Todd produced two big blocks and Lowe followed with one of her own to help Aledo build a 9-5 lead. Later, Isbell put forth arguably the block of the night - an emphatic, solo, two-handed stuff - that completed a 9-1 Aledo run that put the score at 15-6. From there, Aledo continued to produce up front while the back line defenders, who were attentive and consistent the entire match set up their offense for success to close the deal, playing as well as they did during the previous three sets. Whether it was a diving save by Ella Meador, an athletic dig from

Kenrie Pruitt or a watchful eye on the service line by Logyn Denbow, the back row provided a strong platform for the offense to succeed.

"They've done a phenomenal job all season long for us and really keep us in a lot of matches," Gay said of her back row players. "They're very efficient, they listen to instruction well and they adjust well against different types of hitters and offenses. A lot of the girls out there are three-year varsity starters who have a very high volleyball IQ, and they have been preparing for these moments. They can identify distance of serves, angles of attacks – that's their experience taking over, for sure."

Todd starred for Aledo with a game-high 23 kills, 21 digs and three blocks. Reding and junior setter Sophie Frank distributed the ball well to their hitters, combining for 41 assists. Pruitt, who tallied a team-high 22 digs, also did her part feeding the front line players with five out-of-system assists. The setters were also impactful defensively, as Reding recorded 10 digs and Frank finished with 13.

Meador and Denbow compiled 18 and eight digs, respectively, while LoBaugh and Estevez combined for 13 digs. Elms was strong once again off the right side with 13 kills and six
