# City achieves bond rating upgrade

Officials cite economic growth, population expansion ahead

Staff Reports

The City of Aledo announced that, as of Nov. 18, Standard & Poor's (S&P) has elevated its bond credit rating from AA to AA+, with a stable outlook. This upgrade represents a substantial

achievement for the city, enabling reduced interest costs on future debt obligations.

"I was delighted to receive the news of the bond rating upgrade from S&P," Aledo Mayor Nick Stanley said. "This acknowledgment underscores Aledo's strong governance and our commitment to effective financial management in recent years."

The upgrade is a result of S&P's evaluation of Aledo's growing local economy, which exhibits taxable assessed valuation. The BondRatings.

base enhancement and population growth. The city's solid financial performance, highlighted by reserves exceeding 100% of revenues, is anticipated to continue, city officials note.

Aledo's financial strategy includes a stable ad valorem (property) tax base and ongoing residential and commercial construction, driving double-digit increases in

# Aledo resident shows acting talent

## 'God's Here' was debut role

When the movie "God's Here" began filming in Granbury last year, it spawned the potential beginning of a new acting career for one Aledo resident.

Lola Gianna plays the role of Krissy in the Billy McAdams, Jr. film that revolves around a personal tragedy endured by a family during the Christmas season.

Gianna, 21, has not taken a single acting class and has no formal training, but shined in her role as the rebellious teen whose poor and fateful decision altered the course of her life forever.

"Most aspiring actors and actresses find their way with some kind of formal training and benefit significantly from the structured learning environment of an acting school," McAdams said. "Lola, however, relied on natural talent, real-world experience, and sheer determination to carve out an incredible performance in God's Here."



## **Help from above**

For Gianna, it was divine

"I landed the role for Krissy in the film 'God's Here' by God's hand alone," Gianna said.

Gianna had been volunteering at the Branch to Hope Community Center for about six months when the film began production and developed a strong friendship with one of the organization's founders, Mary Jean Bentley.

"She had reached out to me in September of 2023 to read the part of Krissy for the table read of 'God's Here,' originally titled 'A Christmas Heart," Gianna said. "She thought I'd be great to read the part for Krissy for the rough read. Bill was a little unsure about it, given I had no acting experience, but after all, it was just for the table read."

Following the read, Executive Producer Sharon K. Campbell, who also plays a court judge in the film, approached Gianna and said she would like to train her for the role if McAdams decided to cast her.

## Worth the wait

McAdams did not offer Gianna the role immediately but did allow for the training.

For the next two months, Campbell met with Gianna weekly and worked with her on things like set etiquette, how to read a script, how to embody a character using

emotional recall, and most of all how to slow down when she was delivering her lines.

"It was a wonderful experience working with her," Gianna said. "She taught me so well. Before officially landing the role, I met with Bill to go over the script one more time. I honestly had no idea he was

# **Board** approves land sale

#### New degree also added

The Weatherford College Board of Trustees approved the sale of 5.063 acres on the northwest corner of BB Fielder Road and South Main Street for \$2.25 million at their November meeting.

The board previously approved listing a total of 45.682 acres of the Carter property located north of BB Fielder to recoup expenses for the purchase of property on Martin Drive and East Park Avenue.

Three options were listed in the college's request for proposals: the purchase of the entire tract of land, the purchase of 40.619 acres, or the purchase of 5.063 acres.

Four proposals were submitted, with three being rejected at this time. The college will continue to seek proposals for the remaining 40.619 acres.

#### New degree

The board also approved a new Associate of Applied Science degree in Medical Laboratory Technology. The new degree is a step up from the phlebotomy technology program and the next level within a medical lab at a hospital or physician's office setting.

This new degree will fill a gap in the local healthcare workforce. The Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates 29,140 jobs in Texas with an average wage of \$57,080 per year. Data for WC's five-county service area shows 2,510 jobs currently with this title and a 5.1 percent growth rate from 2024 to 2026. With 224 annual job openings and only 10 graduates within the last year at a local higher education institution, this program will provide highly sought-after skills and career opportunities for WC students.

The Lady Roos Cross Country team finished as District 3-6A champions. At regionals, they placed 11th in a tight pack, with Remington Boone advancing to state.



was your audition. You killed it.' And that was the beginning of my journey through 'God's Here.'"

Gianna was born in Illinois, has lived in Alaska, California, Arkansas and Virginia and landed in Aledo eight years ago.

#### **Initial interest**

Her interest in acting was piqued by the popular Netflix show "Stranger Things."

"My 13-year-old self became so obsessed with the series," Gianna said. "I was surfing the internet for casting calls. I even found the part for Max, but quickly gave up after reading the main requirement for the character was being able to ride a skateboard. Other than that, I never had much of an interest in acting. The most experience I had was from a required drama class I took in middle school,

which did not require any acting, but I thought it was cool."

She was excited about the role of Krissy, because there were a number of areas where she felt she could relate to her.

"Her attitude, sense of humor and rebellion really made me feel like I was playing a 16-yearold Lola at times," Gianna said. "I was a tough kid for my parents. We moved states six times while I was growing up, so in a way I was able to relate to Krissy's deep sense of loss."

Gianna said that being chosen to play Krissy reaffirmed her faith in God, especially given the underlying message behind the film.

"Getting a lead role in a film meant a lot to me in the way that God was here with me and walked me right to the doorstep of all the events that have unfolded in my life during and since this experience," Gianna said. "That He chose me to be a vessel to be a part of this story

and help spread the message of forgiveness."

#### **Contemplating future**

Gianna has worked in the restaurant industry for the past few years and said when it comes to pursuing an acting career fulltime, she has not yet decided.

"At first, I definitely approached the experience as a one-off sort of thing," Gianna said. "But after going through it and seeing the results, I would love to do another movie, maybe even a TV series. It would be super cool to get a phone call from Dallas Jenkins (creator of 'The Chosen') one day. For now, I'm focusing on getting started in school, and possibly ministry.

"I recently started co-leading a girl's high school ministry group with Mary Jean. As far as acting, my producer Don Wontz took me to get my headshots taken, and we've currently got some things in the works."

The Eagles have the advantage here statistically. Abilene has only turned the ball over five times (4 interceptions, 1 fumble) and has taken the ball away 17 times (7 interceptions, 10 fumbles).

The Bearcats have 11 turnovers (5 interceptions, 6 fumbles) and have and a dozen sacks.

taken the ball away 18 times (13 interceptions, 5 fumbles).

#### Pass defense

The Aledo pass defense, considered to be a question mark entering the season due to heavy graduation losses, has turned into a strong point. The Bearcats have picked off opposing quarterbacks 13 times this season, scattered among 10 players, led by two each by Owen Henderson, Adrian Fuller and Chase Wilburn.

"That's getting experience they lacked at the beginning of the season, and that's really good to see," Jones said.

In their past three games, the Bearcats have three pick sixes. This past week Alex Patton returned an interception 51 yards for a score, while Wilburn and Kai Taylor each returned one for a TD against Azle.

#### Sacks/tackles for loss

On the other hand, the Bearcats' defensive line was considered the strongest part of the team entering the season and they have lived up to expectations. Leading the charge when it comes to pass rushing, with solid help from a strong linebacking corps, Aledo has 59 tackles for loss and 15 sacks this season.

Abilene has 37 tackles for loss

#### Second-round success

With their 63-7 bi-district victory against Saginaw Chisholm Trail, the Bearcats won first-round playoff game for a 29th consecutive season. In that same span they've enjoyed phenomenal second-round success as well, posting a 24-4 record in such games heading into this Friday.

Of course, that's what happens when you win state championships on a regular basis.

Aledo last lost in the second round in 2012 to Denton Guyer, 42-30. Guyer went on to win the 4A Division I state championship.

#### Strong districts

Between their districts (3-5A Division I for Aledo, 2-5A Division I for Abilene), seven of the eight teams that qualified for the playoffs are still playing. That will change this week, however.

Along with the Bearcats and Eagles facing off, Lubbock Monterrey (7-4, 2-5A champion) is playing Denton Ryan (10-1, 3-5A runner-up) and Amarillo (6-4, third in 2-5A) tangles with Richland (9-2, third in 3-5A).

The fourth-place team from 2-5A, Amarillo Tascosa (6-5) is taking on 4-5A champion Saginaw (11-0), which rallied for a 41-39 victory against District 3-5A fourth-place Azle (7-4) in bi-district.

## Capital Highlights

# More than 1,500 bills filed as session approaches

Texas lawmakers last week filed more than 1,500 bills ahead of the next legislative session, which begins Jan. 14. The Houston Chronicle reported the proposed measures cover a range of topics ranging from border security to abortion access, education and other issues.

Republicans have expanded their control of both chambers after flipping several seats during this year's elections. State Comptroller Glenn Hegar has projected the state will have a \$20 billion surplus at the start of the 2025 session.

- Among the bills already filed: Proposed reduction or elimination of property taxes. State Rep. Cody Vasut, R-Angleton, has filed a bill to eliminate property taxes altogether and create a committee to exam-"alternative methods of taxation." Property taxes raise \$81.5 billion annually, meaning their elimination would likely require a marked increase in sales tax. Other proposed bills would use the state's surplus revenue to partially offset property taxes
- Austin Democrat Donna Howard filed two bills that would expand when a health care provider can legally perform an abortion. The state's near-total ban on abortion has resulted in women coming forward with stories of delayed or denied medical care, and more than 100 Texas OB/GYNs signed a letter saying they have been restricted from providing high-quality care to their patients.
- School vouchers are certain to be considered, since they are a priority of both Gov. Greg Abbott and Lt. Gov. Dan

Patrick. Several Republican opponents of vouchers were targeted in the primaries and defeated, making passage of a measure more likely this session, after it failed in 2023.

- Several House Republicans have filed measures to stop providing in-state tuition to some undocumented students living in Texas, effectively eliminating the Texas Dream Act passed in 2001.
- Lawmakers from both parties filed bills that seek to ensure faster responses from utility companies after power outages caused by storms and hurricanes. The measures come after Hurricane Beryl hit southeast Texas last summer, leaving millions without power for days.

#### **TEA releases** final financial accountability ratings

The Texas Education Agency has released its final 2023-2024 financial accountability ratings, which show 83% of Texas public schools earned an "A" rating, reflecting "a continued commitment to effective financial management practices so that they can best serve students," a news release stated.

The ratings are based on annual financial reports submitted by school districts to TEA, with districts getting a letter grade for financial accountability and management. A dozen public school districts and 10 charter schools were rated substandard and given an "F." Those districts were Culberson County-Allamoore, Fannindel, Karnes City, Shepherd, Denver City, Tioga, Matagorda, Overton, Hitchcock, Sunray, Dew, and Wylie.

Charter schools receiving failing grades for financial accountability were Bexar County Academy, Prelude Preparatory Charter School, Academy of Dallas, Gateway Charter Academy, Education Center International Academy, Texas

Academy Charter School, Rocketship Public Schools, Texas Empowerment Academy, and Austin Discovery School.

#### **Abbott orders college** tuition freeze for next two years

Gov. Abbott sent a letter last week to the state's public colleges and universities saying he would not support any undergraduate tuition and fee increases over the next two years, extending a tuition freeze already in place. The Austin American-Statesman reported Abbott had discussed the issue with all of the state's university system boards of regents, who supported the decision.

"Texans face significant rising costs due to inflation," Abbott wrote in the letter. "When inflation and other economic pressures burden household budgets, our public universities must take every step possible to ease the financial burden on our students and their families."

Abbott signed a law in 2023 that stopped tuition and fee increases for the 2023-2024 and 2024-2025 academic years. His proposal would extend that through 2027.

"I will ensure college affordability remains a top priority for the state as we head into the next legislative session," Abbott wrote.

#### Water agreement might bring relief to **South Texas**

A change to an 80-year-old treaty between the U.S. and Mexico could bring relief to South Texas farmers grappling with a drought and scarce water, according to *The Texas Tribune*. Under the amended treaty. Mexico now has more options to meet its required water deliveries, which have fallen short in recent years.

Under the 1944 treaty, Preparatory School Westlake Mexico must deliver 1.75 million

acre-feet of water to the U.S. from six tributaries every five years, a deadline it is at high risk of not meeting. The country still has a balance of more than 1.3 million acre-feet of water that is due by October 2025.

The amendment will allow Mexico to meet its delivery obligations using other tributaries not covered by the original treaty, and by transferring water stored at the Falcon and Amistad international reservoirs.

"What's more important is we need water transferred at Amistad and Falcon," said Sonny Hinojosa, a water advocate for Hidalgo County Irrigation District No. 2, which distributes water to ranchers and farmers in the region. "If water gets transferred, they'll know they'll have a little bit of water for next year."

The amendment expires in five years unless extended.

#### **Driest, hottest October** in many decades

The drought is back for much of Texas after the driest October since 1952, and the hottest since at least 1895, according to the Texas Water Development Board's hydrologist, Dr. Mark Wentzel. By the end of last month, nearly three-fourths of the state was in drought - up 40 percentage points since the end of September.

Only the northwest corner of the Panhandle and the southern tip of Texas received anywhere near normal precipitation.

Wentzel said the outlook over the next few months is still bleak, rain-wise. The latest seasonal drought outlook from the National Weather Service predicts all of Texas, except that corner of the Panhandle, to be in drought by the end of January 2025.

#### Ladycats sweep Heritage to reach semis

HALTOM CITY - The Aledo Ladycats volleyball team punched their ticket to the Class 5A Division I volleyball state semifinals on Friday, Nov. 15, as they knocked off the No. 2 team in Texas in straight sets, 25-23, 25-17, and 26-24.

"Our entire team was something special," Ladycat head coach Claire Gay said after the match. "They just rallied for each other. At the end of the day, that family mentality is just another level."

Just days removed from toppling No. 1, Amarillo, the third-ranked Ladycats (35-7) made the voyage to Haltom City to square off with a Colleyville Heritage squad they know all too well. The Lady Panthers (36-7) have gotten the best of Aledo in recent years, leaving the Ladycats with a score to settle.

The victory was the 24th consecutive for Aledo, which has not lost since Aug. 27.

After a back-and-forth battle to start the night, Colleyville Heritage was the first to flinch, calling a timeout with Aledo leading 18-16. As play resumed, so did the Ladycat

rally, as they outpaced the odds-on favorite, 3-1. The Lady Panthers were forced to take their second timeout of the set after falling behind 21-17.

This time the momentum began to sway away from Aledo. Colleyville Heritage went on the offensive, leaning on their prized outside hitter and BYU commit, Suli Davis. Davis led the Lady Panthers back to within striking distance at 23-21, as Gay called her first timeout of the night.

The break in action worked to perfection as Aledo got back to work. The Ladycats prevailed in set number one, 25-23 to take an early advantage.

Aledo started off the second set right where they left off with Ella Isbell drawing first blood with a kill from the middle of the net to get the action underway. Isbell, who has progressed by leaps and bounds in her swan song season, became an impenetrable force in the middle for the Ladycat defense in the match, racking up blocks like an expert mason building a wall.

Having a top recruit in the nation is nice to have, but a great player will only take a team so far in a team sport. With Colleyville Heritage running a majority of their attack through Davis, the duo of Isbell and Kinley Elms up front

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



General Nature of the Proposed Authorized Improvements. The general nature of the proposed public improvements to be provided by the District that are necessary for the development of the Property within the District and which shall promote the interests of the City and confer a special benefit upon the Property, may include: (i) acquisition, construction, and improvement of street, roadway and sidewalk improvements, including related drainage, utility relocation, signalization, landscaping, lighting, signage, off-street parking and right-of-way; (ii) acquisition, construction, and improvement of water, wastewater, and drainage improvements and facilities; (iii) establishment and improvement of parks, trails and recreational facilities improvements; (iv) projects similar to those listed above authorized by the Act, including similar off-site projects that provide a benefit to the Property within the District; (v) acquisition of real property or interests in real property in connection with each Authorized Improvement; (vi) payment of costs, including, without limitation, design, engineering, permitting, legal, required payment, performance and maintenance bonds, bidding, support, construction, construction management, administrative and inspection costs, associated with developing and financing the public improvements listed in (i) through (v) above; (vii) payment of costs associated with special supplemental services for improvement and promotion of the District as approved by the City including services related to advertising, promotion, health and sanitation, water and wastewater, public safety, security, business recruitment, development, recreation, and cultural enhancement related to the public improvements listed in (i) through (v) above; (viii) payment of costs of establishing, administering, and operating the District, as well as the interest, costs of issuance, reserve funds, or credit enhancement of bonds issued for the purposes described in (i) through (viii) above (collectively, the "Authorized Improvements"). The Authorized Improvements shall promote the interest of the City and confer a special benefit upon the property within the District.

Estimated Cost of the Authorized Improvements. The current estimated total cost of the proposed Authorized Improvements is \$75,000,000.

Proposed District Boundaries. The District is proposed to include property owned by the Petitioner consisting of approximately 317.732 acres of property generally located south of Interstate Highway I-12, west of F.M. 1187, and north of E. Bankhead Highway, and within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City, as more particularly described by a metes and bounds description available at the Willow Park City Hall and available for public inspection.

Proposed Method of Assessment. The City shall levy assessments on each parcel within the District in a manner that results in imposing equal shares of the costs on property similarly benefited. Each assessment may be paid in part or in full at any time (including interest), and certain assessments may be paid in annual installments (including interest). If the City allows an assessment to be paid in installments, then the installments must be paid in amounts necessary to meet annual costs for those Authorized Improvements financed by the assessment and must continue for a period necessary to retire the indebtedness on those Authorized Improvements (including interest).

Proposed Apportionment of Cost between the District and the City. The City will not be obligated to provide any funding to finance the Authorized Improvements, other than from assessments levied in the District. No City property in the District shall be assessed. The Petitioner may fund certain improvements from other funds available to the Petitioner.

Objections During the public hearing, any interested person may speak for or against the establishment of the District and the advisability of the improvements to be made for the benefit of the property within the District. Written and oral objections will be considered at the hearing.

Elms did a remarkable job of mixing up her fastball and changeup, keeping the Lady Panthers off balance as she led the Ladycats in kills with 14. Alyssa Todd notched a dozen kills of her own with several coming from the middle of the floor.

Todd and Ella Meador led the Ladycats with 13 digs each while patrolling the back line. Kenrie Pruitt ended the night right in the mix with a dozen digs of her own.

While Isbell and Elms combined for 14 blocks in the match, Haley Lowe earned five of her own as the trio made it a tough night up front for Davis and the Lady Panthers.

## Ladycats suffer first defeat of the season

#### Decatur rallies in second half

In spite of being without the services of seniors Kinley Elms and Ella Isbell, who were with the Ladycats volleyball team in their quest for a state title, Aledo's varsity girls hoops squad is off to a solid start under new head coach, Donny Ott.

The Ladycats, ranked No. 13 in Class 5A by the Texas Association

of Basketball Coaches, entered their game against the No. 4 in 4A Decatur Lady Eagles with an unblemished 4-0 record. Decatur (6-2) handed the hosting Ladycats their first loss of the season, 41-38, in a highly physical matchup on Tuesday, Nov.

But for Ott, there were a lot of positives he saw in his ballclub.

"Anybody in attendance just saw a phenomenal high school basketball game by both teams," Ott gushed after the game. "I can't in any way be disappointed at all with our effort. I thought we battled for four quarters. It was just an incredible high school basketball game. Unfortunately, we just didn't make enough plays to finish it."

As tightly contested as the game was on the scoreboard throughout, it was even more so on the floor. Aledo got out early on the Lady Eagles after Elizabeth Griffin and Brooklyn Dempsey splashed backto-back three-pointers to put the Ladycats up 6-2 with just over six minutes left in the opening stanza.

Decatur opted to use their first timeout of the half following Dempsey's long-range drop in order to keep the home team from running away with the game early.

As play resumed the pace up and down the floor was only matched by the level of physicality inflicted by both teams. An unwillingness by the

officiating crew to blow the whistle for fouls left players at both ends of the floor with little choice than to meet force with force.

In the midst of the frenetic pace and the battle royal taking place up and down the court, the Ladycats held their own in the first quarter. Griffin tickled the twine with her second three-pointer of the quarter with 1:40 left to play, increasing Aledo's lead to 11-5 with the clock winding down.

Defensively, Decatur had an answer for everyone on the floor sporting an Aledo jersev except for Tiara Butler. She refused to back down as she fought tooth and nail down in the paint. Her tenacity in the third quarter kept the Ladycats in the game as she accounted for all seven of Aledo's points in the frame.

With Aledo trailing by three, 33-30, to start the fourth quarter, the officiating crew began to reign in the physicality. The teams battled down the stretch with Griffin knocking down a three-pointer with 17 seconds left in regulation.

However, Decatur was in the bonus and Aledo was forced to foul in order to preserve the clock. The Lady Eagles sank both free throws, increasing the lead back to three points and thus, producing the final.

"It was extremely physical," Ott noted. "It was rough. It was both ways. But the thing I'm most proud about is our kids didn't back down. They competed hard. They fought tooth and nail.

"I feel 125-percent like we got better tonight. All those kids in there, I know they're gassed, but I'm just proud to be their coach right now knowing I have a team that fights that hard."

fun to coach a group of girls in it for the right reasons, not to be selfish. It was such a blessing this year because they added so much joy to my life."

Aledo secured an early 6-2 edge fueled by kills from seniors Morgan Estevez and Kinley Elms - who gave McKinney North's talented back line fits all night with a barrage of powerful attacks from the right side. 

# Boys hoops season tips off

# Local schools looking to build on previous success

Boys basketball teams have begun taking the court for the start of the 2024-25 hardwood season across the Lone Star State. Local schools, such as the Aledo Bearcats, the Weatherford Kangaroos and the Willow Park Trinity Christian Eagles have recently begun their respective regular seasons and each program has high expectations coming in.

## New Aledo coach out to establish strong culture

Similarly to the Ladycats, the Bearcats basketball program had a void to fill at the head coach position following the 2023-24 season after James Robinson's departure. With that, Aledo introduced first-year head coach Brian Blackburn to lead the boys basketball squad, and Blackburn is emphasizing the importance of establishing a strong culture.

"I would say that our culture is simple to describe, but hard to maintain," Blackburn said. "We expect excellence on the court, in the classroom and in the community with our players. The characteristics we use to foster this culture is passion, servant leadership, thankfulness, togetherness and toughness. If we are striving for these things daily, then our team will have a successful season."

Character and success will go hand in hand for Aledo, who is returning key players and promoting new faces to lead the charge against the opposition. With their strengths lying in depth, experience and competitiveness, Blackburn expects his veterans to lead the charge.

"Joaquin Pacheco is a returning all-district player from last year who has started the season

off strong offensively," Blackburn said. "Townes VanHuysen is a forward who has been practicing great and that has carried over to games. We also have two sophomores in Caden Cunningham and Josiah Jenkins who we are excited about contributing on varsity this season."

Blackburn isn't focused on the district title, a certain number of wins or astronomical statistics. Instead, the focus will remain on the process and the diligence that comes with it.

"We really don't have a ton of 'goals' in the traditional term," Blackburn said. "Right now, all we are focusing on are things we feel like we must achieve like being great in practice, preparing like a champion, and staying connected as a team."

## Kangaroos want more history

The Weatherford Kangaroos are coming off a historic season that saw the program reach the postseason for the second time in nearly two decades under head coach Neal Welch, who led the Roos to the playoffs in his first year at the helm. Now, it's about establishing consistency to make the postseason again in another tough district.

"We preach process over results, so our main goal is to continually get better each day," Welch said. "We have a long way to go to be able to compete in our district. Last year was great for our program moving forward. Making the playoffs hadn't happened here much, but we are now focused on this season and trying to repeat and get into the postseason in a very tough district."

Despite losing key seniors such as Kane Chandler, Aidan Fry and Blaine Kapka, the Roos return a pair of key contributors from the 2023 season and will also feature new faces who Welch expects to contribute.

"Brendan Ballard and Deshaun Lewis are returning from last year's team, and both players have put in a lot of hard work to get to where they are today as key contributors on our team," Welch said. "Both guvs can do it all on offense and defense, so we plug them into different positions to get the most out of our team. Alex Rodden, Aidan Pool, Thomas Loa, Land Morris, Brady Mills, and Micah Moore will all see playing time and help in different ways. Cristian Taylor and Trevor Poetsch will also see time this year."

Furthermore, Welch said his team's biggest overall strength is their diversity on both ends of the floor. He also touted his team's high basketball IQ, where his guys can diagnose and execute adjustments implemented into the game plan. Welch hopes these aspects pour over into the established culture he is trying to deepen this season.

"We Play Harder is our motto, and we try to instill that daily in practice," Welch said. "We are continually building toughness through everything we do in practice and in non-district games to build up to our district season. Our guys are responding well to all of our coaches who coach our kids very hard. As the head coach, I can see the increase of the buy-in from our players throughout our entire program and it's a joy to coach all of these guys."

## TCA out to take one more step

On the private school circuit, the Trinity Christian Eagles enter the year with confidence after nearly making the postseason a year ago. With plenty to build off of, the Eagles – led by head coach Jeff Peterson – plan to approach the season with a positive mindset while maintaining a high level of work ethic

"Our main goal is to take joy in our team, our competition and

our challenges," Peterson said. "With that being said, we are trying to build on our success last year. We won 16 games last season and made a strong push for playoff qualification but ultimately fell short by one game. This season we are competing in a new-look TAPPS 4A District 1. The district will be a challenge but we will challenge for a playoff berth."

Although TCA's opposition will be strong, the experienced Eagles will rely on their veteran leadership throughout the roster, along with a new big man to bolster the team's overall strength.

"We are blessed to have six seniors in our group this season," Blackburn said. "Sam Carson will lead the charge as a returning starter from last season. Along with Carson, we are expecting big things from Cole Massey, Reed Robbins, John Chrane, and Bo Blauser as they move into bigger roles this season. Our final senior, Scott Smith, is a transfer from a local school who will add to our length and firepower. Aside from our seniors, our coaching staff is looking forward to seeing 6-foot-6 junior Jonathan Overholt contribute in a big way as he steps into a varsity role."

Whatever result the season may bring, Peterson and the team's commitment to exuding joy remains steadfast and has translated over into the effectiveness of the preseason program. Now, they aim to infuse that energy into the regular season and hopefully beyond.

"As I said earlier, Joy is our main emphasis. We want to take joy in all things," Peterson said. "We have seen our players embrace this mantra in the strong way that we have attacked this preseason. Guys have been working hard in the weight room and on the court. We believe a joyful team leads to on court success, and we are certainly heading in the right direction."

TCA will be back in action on Friday, Nov. 22, at home against Bethesda Christian at 7 p.m.



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
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
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

## Bearcats, Eagles meet for only second time

#### First was last season

Aledo and Abilene have been playing football for a long time, the Bearcats first taking the field in 1946 and Abilene going back well over a century, with their first state championship coming in 1923.

However, the teams have only played each other one time - last season, when the Bearcats won 56-21 in the regional final en route to their 12th state championship in program history. It was also their second straight.

The Eagles have seven state titles of their own, with most coming in their early years. Their most recent was in 2009, the same year Aledo began its dominant run of 11 titles since (the Bearcats also won one in 1998).

Part of the reason the teams have not met is because Abilene spent many years in a higher classification, dropping from 6A to 5A Division I in 2022.

"They're a good solid football team with a great history," Aledo head coach Robby Jones said. "They have four returning starters on the offensive line and any time you have that kind of experience on the line you're going to be able to do things offensively."

Like the Bearcats, the Eagles can run and throw the ball effectively.

The Bearcats reached this round by winning the District 3-5A Division I championship and defeating Saginaw Chisholm Trail 63-7 in bi-district. The Eagles finished as the No. 2 seed in District with Lubbock Monterrey, but los-

31-17 loss in Lubbock, and defeating El Paso Parkland 84-0 in bi-district.

#### Next man up

The Eagles lost their starting quarterback, senior Brayden Henry, to a knee injury late in the season. However, sophomore Tristan Beal has stepped in and looked impressive in the full-time

While not the runner Henry (792 yards, 11 TD) is, Beal is an accurate passer. He has completed 72% of his throws for 1,263 yards with 18 touchdowns and no interceptions.

"That's a big difference with the change in quarterback, a lot less quarterback running," Jones said. "That's why you see (wide receiver Ryland) Bradford in the backfield more."

Bradford is the Eagles' go-to player offensively. He's caught 49 passes for 1,034 yards and 13 touchdowns, along with rushing for 397 yards and eight more scores.

Running the Aledo offense in fluid style is junior Gavin Beard. He is completing 69% of his passes for 1,842 yards with 26 touchdowns and three interceptions - all despite missing two full games with an injury.

Beard's backup, sophomore Nash McElree, is completing 74% of his passes for 482 yards with seven TD and two interceptions.

"When you play deep into the playoffs, you're going to have injuries," Jones said. "Look at us last state championship game."

The Bearcats had to switch two 2-5A Division I, sharing the title starters in that game with reserves coming in to play key roles in a 51-8 ing the tiebreaker by virtue of a victory against Smithson Valley.

#### **Explosive offenses**

As was the case last season, both teams bring explosive offensives into the contest. The Bearcats are outscoring their opponents by an average score of 54-15, while the Eagles are outscoring their foes

The Bearcats have scored 30 or more points in all 11 games this season and 16 straight dating to 2023. Abilene has topped the 30-point mark in 10 games.

Abilene is coming off of an 84-0 bi-district victory against El Paso Parkland and has topped 60 points three other times, 50 points two other times and 40 points two more times.

The Bearcats' high score was year with the offensive line in the in a 77-14 victory at Azle. They've topped 60 four other times, 50 twice more and 40 twice more.

> A difference last season, however - and it could be again - is the Aledo defense. The Bearcats have

three shutouts, held another opponent to a field goal and another two to a single touchdown. The Eagles posted their first shutout of the season last week and their previous best defensive performance was holding two opponents to 14 points.

#### Special teams

In big games special teams can often make a difference. The Bearcats would appear to have the nod here as well. They have returned four kickoffs for touchdowns - two each by Adrian Fuller and Lincoln Tubbs - and the team as a whole is averaging 30 yards per kickoff return.

"We don't like having our kickoff team out there. We only want it once a game," Jones said with a chuckle. "But we've got some explosive guys."


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
