Recent solicitation letters meant to deceive By Christpher Amos

A letter with the headline, "Weatherford City Council members need to hear from you!" visible through the envelope window could get any citizen's attention. However, according to various sources, the money solicited from the National Police Association does not go where you may think. The letters mention how well maintained your neighborhoods are and asks for you to vote "yes" on a so-called Quality of Life Policing Petition that will be presented to the Weatherford City Council. It then asks for you to donate so the association can continue its "Quality of Life" policing. It sounds well meaning, but on the back of the letter, beneath 40 lines of literally zero-spaced illegible jargon is a small disclaimer stating the National Police Association is not affiliated with any law enforcement agency. The letter ends with bold face font, "Won't you please send just \$5 now to help restore sensible law enforcement in our nation!" Charity Navigator, an online non-profit service designed to track and publish the performances of charity organizations, gives the National Police Association a zerostar "very poor" rating.

ALEDO ISD Board prepares legislative pitch

Seeking more funding

As 2024 winds to a close, the bi-annual state legislative session in Austin will get underway shortly after the new year. With public school districts across Texas still feeling the squeeze after the legislature failed to allocate \$5 billion earmarked for public education during the 2023 legislative session, the Aledo ISD Board of Trustees is ready to make their legislative pitch.

During the monthly meeting on Monday, Nov. 18, Superintendent Dr. Susan Bohn and Trustee David Lear advised the rest of the board of the two key asks the district will present to legislators in January.

First and foremost is increase to funding. The last time the Texas Legislature passed an increase to school funding was back in 2019. With rampant inflation plaguing the global economy since 2020, districts across the Lone Star State – Aledo included – have been forced to make some excruciating decisions to deal with budgetary shortfalls.

Limiting meetings to once a month during November and December because of the holidays made for a slightly larger agenda and a much larger crowd for the Weatherford City Council on Nov. 19. The City of Aledo reminds residents that winter is the perfect time to save water and lower utility bills. With the implementation of the Winter Averaging method, sewer charges for residential customers are based on average water usage during December, January, and February. These readings determine monthly sewer charges for the following year, making water conservation during this period especially important.

By reducing outdoor water use and conserving indoors during these months, residents can lower their sewer bills for the next 12 months. Since outdoor water usage does not enter the sewer system, limiting its use ensures that calculations are based mainly on indoor



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Capital Highlights **Abbott issues orders targeting China**

executive orders last week targeting the Chinese government and the Chinese Communist Party, The Dallas Morning News reported

intended to protect Texans of Chinese descent from "harassment and intimidation" by the Chinese Communist Party and government, and to fight threats to state security.

"Texas will not tolerate the harassment or coercion of the more than 250,000 individuals of Chinese descent who legally call Texas home by the Chinese Communist Party or its heinous proxies," Abbott said. The orders:

Instruct the Department of Public Safety

to establish a hotline for victims and to "target and arrest" operatives in the state working with the Chinese Communist Party and the Chinese government.

Texas

Direct all state agencies, colleges and universities to "harden" their systems against foreign governments. That includes stronger background checks on employees with access to critical infrastructure and banning state agencies from doing business with companies owned wholly or partially by foreign adversary countries.

Direct the Texas Department of Emergency Management and the Public Utility Commission to create a task force to study cyberattacks and run simulations of possible responses.

its plan to improve broadband internet access for the estimated 7 million Texas residents who don't have access, The Texas *Tribune* reported.

The approval came from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration, which means the state now has access to about \$3.3 billion in federal funding included in the 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.

The state has already awarded more than \$1 billion in state and federal funding for broadband investments. Last week, applicants in 15 counties were awarded \$580 million to connect 80,000 locations, according to the Texas Broadband Development Office. Federal maps that show where internet connections are needed are being questioned as to their accuracy, The Tribune reported.

"We want to make sure the data being provided to us by the federal government is accurate and up to date," Greg Conte, director of the TBDO, said.

More buoy barriers added in Rio Grande

Despite a dramatic decrease in border crossings in recent months, Abbott has ordered expansion of the 1,000 feet of orange buoys in the Rio Grande near Eagle Pass, the Houston Chronicle reported.

"We're not letting up at all; we're continuing our efforts," Abbott said.

The barriers have prompted lawsuits from the federal government, which are tied up in an appeals court.

Monthly border crossings have dropped steadily since March. U.S. Customs and Border Protection data for October indicate that 27,000 migrants were encountered that month in the five Texas sectors of the border with Mexico – fewer than vulnerabilities to potential the 44,000 monthly migrants encountered in the final months of the first Trump presidency.

Washington Post. Texas Land Commissioner Dawn Buckingham sent a letter to Trump on Nov. 14 extending the offer.

Tom Homan, former director of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency and Trump's pick to be "border czar," said the incoming administration would "absolutely" use the 1,400-acre parcel of land.

"We absolutely will. When we find somebody - it's a targeted enforcement operation. When they get arrested, they'll be detained," Homan said.

"We feel like this is actually very well-located. The land is very flat there. It's adjacent to major airports. It's also adjacent to a bridge over the river," Buckingham said. "So, if it's helpful, then I would love to partner up with the federal government. And if it's not, then we'll continue to look to ways to be helpful to them."

Texas still leads nation in job growth

The Lone Star State has again led the nation in job creation over the past 12 months - October 2023 to October 2024 -- adding nearly 275,000 nonfarm jobs during that time period.

"With the best business climate in the nation and a skilled and growing workforce, Texas is where innovative entrepreneurs and businesses find the freedom and tools needed to succeed," Abbott said.

Coming in second in job creation during that same time frame was California, which added 212,000 jobs, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, followed by New York, which added 133,600 jobs.

The state's unemployment rate has changed little in the past year, reported at 4.1% last month, up just two-tenths of a percentage point from October 2023.

Master Gardeners 25 years and growing

Local organization celebrates quarter century

When they started, they called themselves The Dirty Dozen.

Tarrant County Master Gardener Neil Collins spoke with then Parker County Extension Coordinator Jon Green, and the two began spreading the word among fellow TC Master Gardeners who lived in Parker County about the possibility of starting a local group.

Eleven others were recruited, and because they would be digging in the dirt a lot, in 2000 they called themselves the Dirty Dozen.

They were Neil Collins, Ann Anderson, Marlene Deaton, Jackie Hoover, Gay Larson, Debra Limbocker, Bill Newart, Alyce Preble, Jo Ann Glenn, Esther Proctor, Jim Saunders and LaDanna Stockstill. Of the original Dirty Dozen, a few have passed away and others have retired from the group after years of planting, but Glenn and Larson are still digging and teaching.

Glenn and Larson joined dozens of Parker County Master Gardeners last month to celebrate 25 years of growth. Glenn estimates there are about 80 Parker County Gardeners, and with 24 current interns in-training, the membership will soon be more than 100.

"My sister, Ester Proctor, and I got certified in Tarrant County in 1998. Those of us in Parker were certified with Tarrant County until we got our certification and we became Parker County Master Gardeners," Glenn said. "The party was really nice. It was a good celebration. A lot of us were there and the members that put it on did a really nice job."

Parker County Master Gardener public garden projects include Azle Central Park, The National Vietnam War Museum Gardens near Mineral Wells, Chandor Gardens in Weatherford, Town Hall of Annetta, Aledo Community Center, Weatherford Public Library, Parker County Extensions garden in Weatherford, and Willow Park Gardens. The public gardens are also used as hands-on education for Master Gardeners in-training.

Larson was crowned Mother Nature in August 2023 during a laughter-filled pompous coronation ceremony. Her husband, Rolf, was made an honorary PCMG member for his ceaseless labor helping Gay and the Master Gardeners.

The group is part of the Texas Master Gardeners, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, and have won several state-wide awards over the years.

State Coordinator Jayla Fry extended her congratulations to the Parker group in a letter.

"With over 25 years of dedication to the program, the Parker County Master Gardeners have left a profound mark on the community," Fry said. "By freely sharing their expertise, time, and resources, they have fostered a culture of environmental respect and responsibility."

Spread flowers, knowledge, money

Funds raised help community projects

Buying flowers from Parker County Master Gardeners annual plant and flower sale does more than beautify your home. Proceeds from your purchases are spread across the county to beautify public gardens, educate the public, and help fund agriculture projects for clubs, schools and churches.

Spring plant sales are in April at the Weatherford Heritage Park maintenance facility, directly south of the First Monday Flea Market grounds on Sante Fe Drive. Funds for current Master Gardener public gardens are used throughout the year and grants are awarded in October.

Joy Bailey said Parker County groups can fill out an application to help finance an agriculture project. Bailey has been a Master Gardener for five years.

"Two years ago we gave a grant to Peaster High School for a bee hive colony and this year we are giving them another grant because they want to add an additional bee hive." Bailey said. "Applicants describe in detail what their project is and how they intend to complete it."

Bailey is an Aledo resident and former Weatherford Middle School principal. Now retired, she has found gardening and assisting others through the Master Gardeners a satisfying passion.

"A few years ago we began to have a surplus of funds beyond what we needed to keep up our training gardens and we thought helping fund other projects in the county through grants would be a good idea," Bailey added.

Current Parker County Master Gardener public gardens include Azle Central Park, The National Vietnam War Museum Gardens near Mineral Wells, Chandor Gardens in Weatherford, Town Hall of Annetta, Aledo Community Center, Weatherford Public Library, Parker County Extensions Garden in Weatherford, and Willow Park Gardens. 

In Aledo's case, staffing has been cut by way of attrition. As personnel have either retired or left the district, many of those positions have gone without a replacement. Another less than savory mechanism the district has employed is taking on debt to cover remaining shortfalls.

In 2023 the legislature tethered the school choice question to school funding in an attempt to force the law to Governor Greg Abbott's desk. Lear stated the district intends to ask the legislature to pass a funding increase for 2025 that would at least put schools across the state in a similar financial position to 2019, accounting for inflation.

What schools across the state cannot handle is for the legislature to hold funding as a political hostage yet again, keeping those dollars locked up in Austin while districts are forced to take the proverbial chainsaw to their budgets to continue operating on funding from a bygone era.

The second ask, while seemingly not as dire, is equally as important. The board will be asking for more local control. With over 1,200 different districts across Texas, a one-size-fits-all methodology coming from elected legislators and unelected bureaucrats in Austin is not conducive to the varying educational needs of each district being met. Lear argued local trustee boards have their fingers on the pulse of the educational needs of students within their respective districts more so than politicians and bureaucrats at the state capitol.

Giving season

Trustees Jennifer Taylor and Jeremy Pruett took an opportunity during the meeting to provide updates on some recent charitable endeavors around the district. Taylor announced the Aledo PTO recently completed the Big Kahuna Fundraiser – the organization's biggest fundraiser of the year.

With the success of the fundraiser, the PTO is currently in the process of distributing funds to each campus across the district.

Taylor also mentioned the AdvoCats are working on their annual Angel Project. Through the Angel Project, AdvoCats will serve 636 students across the district by not only ensuring they have presents under the tree on Christmas morning, but also by providing a holiday meal to the families of those students.

Third round of playoffs By Rick Mauch

A few weeks ago this matchup seemed unlikely. In fact, one of the teams didn't even appear to be on the way to the postseason. However, the Aledo Bearcats (11-1) find themselves facing the surprising Amarillo Tascosa Rebels (7-5) in the third round of the Class 5A Division I playoffs Friday at 1 p.m. in Snyder.

For Aledo, being in this round is as common as, well, turkey being served at Thanksgiving. Tascosa, no stranger to thirdround appearances themselves over the years, looked to be anything but a deep playoff participant just a month ago.

On Oct. 25, Tascosa was 3-5 overall and 2-2 in District 2-5A Division I, coming off a heartbreaking 31-29 loss at Abilene. Since then, the Rebels have reeled off four straight wins, including last week's 35-13 humbling of previously unbeaten District 4-5A Division I champion Saginaw (11-1).

Meanwhile, the Bearcats won their 11th straight game since dropping a 35-30 contest at Denton Guyer, defeating Abilene (8-4) 59-14, moving a step closer to another state championship three-peat. They accomplished the feat twice before in 2009-11 and 2018-2020.

Facing the Flexbone

The Bearcats defense will face a Flexbone offense for the first time in 2024. The option-oriented offense is geared toward a lot of running, but Tascosa isn't shy about throwing the ball out of the formation.

"They're gonna run, but they throw more than most Flexbone teams," Aledo head coach Robby Jones said. "It's gonna be something different than what we've seen this season, but we saw it with Burleson Centennial the last couple of years.





'Our guys just have to know their assignments and make sure they contain them."

In fact, the Bearcats faced the Spartans and the Flexbone three times in that span, winning all three. In 2022 Aledo won 64-21 in Burleson in the regular season and 42-21 in the Region I final at The Star in Frisco. Last season the Bearcats won 42-0 in Aledo.

Still, Tascosa is averaging around 270 yards per game rushing compared to just over 80 through the air. The Aledo defense has been stingy against the run this season, surrendering less than 100 yards per game.

The Bearcats are the much more balanced of the two offenses, averaging around 240 on the ground and just under 225 passing. Scoring-wise, they are outsourcing their opponents by an average of 55-15, compared to 33-24 for Tascosa.

First impression

This will be the first ever meeting in the history of the Bearcats and Rebels. Throughout the history of the Aledo program, dating to 1946, when the Bearcats meet a team for the first time, it's usually a successful outcome.

Guillory played his freshman seadozen TD (9 rushing, 3 receiving)

In 60 first-time meetings, Aledo is 46-14. That's a win percentage of 77 percent.

Third-round success

This is the 12th consecutive season in which the Bearcats have advanced to at least the third round of the playoffs. They are 10-1 in the previous 11, the only loss being 33-28 to Dallas South Oak Cliff in 2021.

The Bears would go on to win the first of back-to-back 5A Division II state championships.

Since Aledo began its nearly three decades of dominance in 1996, this will be the 25th time they've reached this round. They are 22-2 in the previous 24.

Turnovers/takeaways

The Bearcats have a decided advantage in this statistical category. Aledo is plus 11 and Tascosa is minus two.

While the Bearcats have turned the ball over 11 times (5 interceptions, 6 fumbles), they have 22 takeaways (16 interceptions, 6 fumbles). Four of these have been pick-six interceptions in their past four games.

The Rebels don't turn the ball over much, with only six all season (2 interceptions, 4 fumbles), but they

Both teams had big leads in games played in Aledo. Ryan led 27-8 late in the first half before the Bearcats stormed back for a 42-27 victory. Richland had leads of 28-14 and 25-21, but ultimately fell 49-42 in overtime, a game in which Aledo's Raycine Guillory scored six touchdowns.

"It's a blessing to be able to play here one last time," Guillory said. "My friends were here to see me one last time in this stadium and it was great to see them and visit with them."



Lady Coyotes ninth in national tourney

The Weatherford College Lady Coyotes, after dropping their opening match in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Division I Vollevball Championships, rebounded with four straight victories.

In their final match of the season, on Saturday, Nov. 23, Weatherford College (32-8) defeated Odessa College in comefrom-behind fashion, 3-2. After dropping the first two sets 27-25 and 25-21, they won the next two 25-21 and 25-17, before winning the thrilling fifth set 15-13.

In the tournament opener on Wednesday, Nov. 20 at Austin Peay University in Clarksville, Tennessee, WC stumbled with a 3-1 loss to Utah State Eastern College. They followed with back-to-back three-set sweeps of Eastern Wyoming College on Nov. 21 and Trinity Valley Community College, from Athens, Texas on Nov. 22.

This is Weatherford's second consecutive season to advance to the NJCAA Division I Championships. WC has only had a volleyball program for three years.

The Lady Coyotes began the season 1-4 before reeling off wins in 28 of their next 29 matches. Their pre-conference slate included early season matches against New Mexico Military Institute (3-1 loss) and Odessa College (3-1 win), No. 15 Indian Hills Community College (3-2 loss), No. 2 Miami Dade College (3-1 loss), No. 14 Trinity Valley Community College twice (3-2 win each time), No. 20 Daytona State College (3-1 win), No. 13 Assists: Sanchez 24, Lorena Gomez 18.

Navarro College (3-0 win), No. 19 Salt Lake City Snow College (3-1 win) and No. 12 Salt Lake Community College (3-1 loss).

In all, WC finished 8-7 against nationally ranked teams this season.

The Lady Coyotes returned four players from last season's team that advanced to nationals and finished eighth. They are Emerson Reedy, Lorena Gomez, Abby Helman and Evelyn Benson.

"I think that makes this moment even more special and impressive," WC head coach Kailee May said. "Our four returners have really done an impressive job at leading this team of mostly freshmen to the biggest stage of the year.

"We're excited to compete and establish ourselves as a team that should make an annual appearance in the tournament. We want everyone to know who Weatherford College is."

The varsity boys were 12th out of 30 teams in the elite tournament and the varsity girls were 19th out of 29.




Weatherford has large projects on the horizon as the city moves through the Christmas holidays and the end of the year. The projects are reflective of the population growth the city has experienced.

vary on the treasures found within the craft fair.





If you are an Aledo Bearcat fan you may already be familiar with two of the fami-


