
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

Council addresses full agenda

Holidays loom

With what would typically be the second meeting of the month scheduled to fall the day after Christmas, the Aledo City Council packed an entire 31 days worth of business into their only meeting of the month on Thursday, Dec. 5.

Bursting at the seams, the agenda covered a wide array of issues ranging from updates to signage ordinances to the passage of a hotel occupancy tax.

Amending Article 4 of the Unified Development Code set the business of the meeting in motion. The intent of the amendments was to create consistency in the code, while upholding the desired estetic the city is shooting for as Aledo continues to grow.

Specific changes to Article 4 are things like not permitting signs to be painted on buildings, ground-based signs having at least a five-foot buffer from property lines, and ensuring wiring for electrical signs meeting safety codes.

Landscaping

Ordinance 2024-222 will fill in the gaps in the current Unified Development Code related to maintenance standards and responsibilities for landscaping, buffering, and screening on properties across

RV thief's conviction affirmed

Sentence of 65 years **Courtesy Parker County District** Attorney's office

The convictions and sentences totaling 65 years a would-be Willow Park RV thief was given by a Parker County jury last January were affirmed in an appellate ruling last week.

In the trial, Lori Beth Wiles, 53, of Newark, was convicted of

possession of identifying information from an elderly person. In 2022, she tried to steal an RV from a Willow Park business using a woman's bank account. Jurors sentenced to prison terms of 65 and 40 years on the cases. Under Texas law, those sentences run concurrently.



Shane knows the struggles many people deal with in getting healthy because he has been there.



Work is nonstop, but rewarding

With the football playoffs having just concluded and basketball season in full swing, the parents of student-athletes and cheerleaders are often nearly as busy as the athletes themselves.

And, of course, the band is, pardon the pun, instrumental in many activities as well.

But sometimes lost in this mix are the band parents — the men and women whose students get the fans fired up, demonstrate unparalleled devotion to their schools' teams and significantly contribute to the symphonic ambiance that comprises a high school sporting event in the state of Texas.

Two such parents are Tommy and Brea Darnell whose son Luke is a member of the Trinity Christian Academy drum line, where he plays the snare drum.

Brea Darnell said that while most of the school year is pretty hectic for her and Tommy, the fall can be especially active.

"Football season is the busiest, as it shares the same time as a few volleyball game performances and the big state competition," Brea said.

the day of a drum line performance, Brea said her day is pretty full.

"We know exactly where we will be that night — there on the sidelines at the game or watching the drum line competition from the crowd," Brea said. Brea said that she and Tommy try to take this in stride.

"There are sometimes late changes, where there is an opportunity to perform somewhere like a volleyball game or another school function," Brea said. "This time in life is fleeting, and as parents, we recognize it far more than our kids. So any opportunity to see him play is a real blessing, not an

Tommy Darnell agrees and said the experience itself and what it means to Luke is what makes it special for him and Brea.

"There is a lot of pride, like anything you see your son or daughter take on with commitment and passion," Tommy said. "I am always proud of the dedication to practice time he puts in and how hard he tries to deliver each performance perfectly. I don't know how to play an instrument myself, so maybe I'm easily impressed, but I think he and the drum line might each be as good as Keith Moon or Neil Peart."

That being said, Tommy agrees with his wife that there are some unique challenges at times.

"It can be a challenge when a road game is really far away, as we have a younger daughter," Tommy said. "So it usually means only one of us may get to go or will need to get him home really late from the

On the flip side of that is a great sense of camaraderie that exists among the parents of drum line students who work arduously to ensure that performances go off without a hitch.

"The drum line is relatively small, with a lot of carryover from one year to the next," Tommy said. "So you get to spend a good bit of time with the other parents at prethe games. We are really fortunate Dorrell, he has excelled at it."

Aledo. The ordinance will help to prevent potential neglect and degradation of landscaping over time.

The other noteworthy piece of business for the night was establishing the means for administering and collecting a hotel occupancy tax within the city limits of Aledo. While no hotels are coming to Aledo at this time, there are listings for short-term rentals on websites like Airbnb that are subject to hotel occupancy taxes in most municipalities.

The Council agreed a seven percent tax would benefit the city while placing no extra burden on residents. Following a motion to approve the ordinance that was quickly seconded, the ordinance passed.

Swain added. "If it seems too good to be true, it probably is."

Wiles' case began in August, 2022 when a Willow Park woman noticed multiple fraudulent charges on her bank account. One of the charges, a \$229,559 draft from a Willow Park RV business, caused her account to overdraft. She called the business and found out that Wiles used her account information to pay for an RV purchase.

Upon hearing from the victim. the business called WPPD and it was decided to set up a sting operation the following day when Wiles came to do her final sale paperwork. She arrived, signed the paperwork, and was arrested.

According to testimony from the salesman and one of Wiles'

friends, she said she had recently received a large inheritance. She showed them a banking app on her phone that showed she had a net worth of over \$45 million.

Officers testified that they later found that, in addition to your regular account balances, the app would allow users to input additional properties or accounts and provide a stated value for each. In this way, someone could be made to look quite wealthy even if they only had a small balance in their account. Testimony at trial showed that Wiles actually only had around \$6 in cash and investments, not millions.

"Ms. Wiles had no problem with lying to her friends, to sales and finance staff at the RV business, or to police officers to accomplish her theft or try to get away with it," said Assistant District Attorney Al Charanza, who tried the case for the prosecution with Assistant District Attorney Abby Placke.

On appeal, Wiles contended that evidence from her cell phone should not have been admitted, claiming it should not have been searched and that also she should have been given a copy of its contents.

Assistant District Attorney Brian Wolfskill, who handled the appeal for the prosecution, argued that the search was lawful because Wiles gave officers consent to search the phone. He added that, while screenshots were taken from the phone, which were provided to the defense, law enforcement did not have a complete download of the phone and when trial prosecutors offered to download it for Wiles' lawyer, the defense declined.

The Second Court of Appeals in Fort Worth found that 415th District Judge Graham Quisenberry, who presided over the trial, "did not abuse [his] discretion by denying" Wiles' motion. The appeals court also rejected a claim that prosecutors should have been disqualified.

Wiles can still appeal to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, the highest criminal appeals court in Texas, Swain said.

Wiles will be eligible for parole when her time served plus good time credit equals a quarter of her sentence, Swain said. "At that time, it will be in the discretion of the Board of Pardons and Paroles if they want to keep her in prison or put her back on the street."



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
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

Phelan drops bid for speaker; no clear winner yet

House Speaker Dade Phelan withdrew last week from seeking another term leading that chamber. After three rounds of voting on Saturday, state Rep. David Cook, R-Mansfield emerged as the preference of most House Republicans. However, his opponent, state Rep. Dustin Burrows, R-Lubbock, claims to have enough support from both Republicans and Democrats to clear the 76-vote threshold.

The Dallas Morning News reported that Cook acknowledged the race for speaker wasn't yet over.

continue working between now and Jan. 14 to earn [the vote] of every member of the Texas Republican caucus — as well as any Democrat," Cook said.

Phelan, R-Beaumont, narrowly won re-election to his seat in the May primary, needing to prevail in a runoff to return to Austin. He was opposed by fellow Republicans who blamed him for the failure of several priorities in the last session, including the push to institute school vouchers.

Among Phelan's opponents were Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton, who was impeached by the House but survived a conviction trial in the Senate. Paxton blasted Burrows, who voted to impeach him, as "Dade 2.0"

"Supporting Burrows is a betrayal of the conservative movement," Paxton said Friday. 'Voters will remember."

Voucher push spurs call for accountability

Education savings accounts, popularly known as school vouchers, are again a top priority for Gov. Greg Abbott in the upcoming session after a similar push failed in 2023. This time, however, the primary loss of several voucher opponents last March has even

those opposing vouchers conceding passage of a measure is likely.

That means lawmakers will pass a bill to send public tax dollars to private schools, according to the *Texas Standard*.

At a recent visit to the private religious school Kingdom Life Academy in Tyler, Abbott said, "We are assuring that students who may have fallen through the cracks in their public school, they're going to have a new chance, a new opportunity to be able to, to learn, to achieve, to succeed."

Dallas school board member Dan Micciche recently said that since vouchers are a likely possibility, it is vital that private and home schools that receive taxpayer money be held to the same accountability standards as public schools, including STAAR testing.

"Any school or educational entity that receives public funds should be held to the same accountability standards for student outcomes, fiscal performance, open records and meetings act, and student services," he said.

Public school administrators are also pushing for teacher pay raises, something that fell by the wayside in the last session when a voucher bill failed to pass.

Lawmakers mull social media ban for teens

Texas lawmakers could consider banning social media from minors in the upcoming session, The Texas Tribune reported. A bill filed by state Rep. Jared Patterson, R-Frisco, would prohibit minors from creating accounts on social media sites and add age verification for new users.

Other online measures would attack use of artificial intelligence to make pornographic images using people's likenesses and would boost funding for internet crime units in law enforcement agencies.

"Social media is the most dangerous thing our kids have legal access to in Texas," Patterson said.

A number of national organizations, including the American Federation of Teachers and the American Psychological Association, have criticized social

media companies for being a "root cause" of the nationwide youth mental health crisis. Studies indicate 95% of youth ages 13 to 17 use social media, with more than a third saying they use it "almost constantly."

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton sued TikTok in October, saying the company allows its algorithms to affect minors. That suit is set to go to court in coming months.

Higher risk of another deep freeze in Texas

The top meteorologist for the Electric Reliability Council of Texas said the coming winter could bring a higher risk of extreme cold temperature than experienced during the February 2021 storm.

Chris Coleman with ERCOT said a bevy of weather variables such as ocean currents, atmospheric patterns and soil moisture appear very similar to the 2021 conditions that spawned Winter Storm URI, the *Houston* Chronicle reported.

"The more I look at this winter, the more cold potential I see," Coleman said. "This is like a tornado watch. Doesn't mean a tornado is going to happen. It means conditions are there."

ERCOT is emphasizing that any potential rotating outages because of winter storms would be only hours long rather than multiple days because of improvements to the Texas grid, such as weatherproofing of power plants and more backup power sources.

"I always point to the weatherization program as probably being one of the most statistically significant changes that have been made, that has markedly changed the risk profile of the ERCOT grid, in particular during the winter seasons," ERCOT CEO Pablo Vegas told the board Tuesday.

TEA investigating 100 teachers in cheating scheme

More than 100 Texas teachers are being investigated by the Texas Education Agency in connection with a teaching certification cheating scheme. The vast majority of teachers on a list released last week by TEA are employed by North Texas or Houston-area school districts.

Five people have been charged with felonies in connection with the scheme, allegedly organized by a Houston-area basketball coach, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

School districts have had a difficult time filling teacher vacancies since the pandemic, and the number of uncertified teachers hired has risen considerably. Statewide, 34.6% of teachers hired during the 2023-24 school year didn't have a teaching certificate, nearly three times the rate in 2019-20.

Patrick vows to go after THC products sold by dispensaries

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick said banning THC products will be a top priority next session, threatening the livelihood of dozens of stores across the state selling products with higher levels of the main compound in cannabis, the Chronicle reported.

Hemp was legalized in Texas in 2019. That has led to a proliferation of products containing higher levels of THC, which produces a high similar to cannabis, which is still illegal in Texas..

"Retailers exploited the agriculture law to sell life-threatening, unregulated forms of THC to the public and made them easily accessible," Patrick said.

Hemp producers are regulated by the Texas Department of State Health Services, and industry groups say there are far too few producers for the booming market.

"Such a ban would hand this multi-billion-dollar industry over to the illicit market, abandoning all opportunity to properly regulate the industry." said Heather Fazio, co-founder of Texans for Responsible Marijuana Policy.

Routes old and new

The song has been a staple in Christian hymnals for more than a century, underscoring deeply held beliefs. "The Way of the Cross Leads Home"--written in 1906--might be in the running for Christians' national anthem if it ever came to a vote.

Until here lately, the "way" to Branson, MO, has not been quite so clear. Though highway routes to this Christian entertainment mecca are many--some of them picturesque--they can easily eat up the better part of a day for Texans driving there.

Eureka! Southern Airways Express now offers twice-daily flights from Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport to Harrison, AR, just a half-hour from Branson. Round-trip airfare is around \$150, parking is free and the two-hour flight a few thousand feet aloft provides welcome "look-sees" at the colorful foliage below. (The aircraft has eight seats, with some safety requirements that may be unfamiliar, such as use of scales to determine weight of both passengers and

app or lean on a friend for pickup in Harrison and the short final "leg" to Branson. Remember to pack light and arrive early for check-in.)

En route to this one-of-akind entertainment center that emphasizes God and country, one sees an exit for College of the Ozarks in Point Lookout, MO. It's a stop worth taking, a scant half-dozen miles from Branson, this college of some 1,500 students. The Lord is honored and patriotism is the hallmark of the appropriately nicknamed "Hard Work University."

Students earn their way to four-year degrees by working at numerous campus sites. They graduate free of debt, unlike many college graduates who face heavy pay-back commitments for several years.

Named C of O president in 2022, Dr. Brad Johnson envisioned an additional symbol to enhance the institution's spiritual and patriotic values. It already had The Missouri Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Now, the giant cross erected last year reminds students and visitors of Christ upon entering or leaving the campus. Artist/ designer Max Greiner, Jr., was commissioned for the project--The Empty CrossTM --made of steel--is 40 feet tall and weighs 28,000 pounds.

I have written about Branson many times, but somehow was

luggage. Rent a car, use an Uber never previously present for the much-heralded "Christmas in Branson." Though "late to the party," I recently was "wowed' by a community emblazoned by lights and Christmas décor, and a bevy of shows "glitzed up" with festive costumes, Christmas music and creative dancers. (The season starts in November and runs through the first week of January.)

During a whirlwind 46-hour visit, I attended seven shows, including the Sight and Sound Theater's "Miracle of Christmas." This is Branson's "crown jewel" where all 2,200 seats often are taken for productions that dazzle with Broadway quality and are always Christ-centered. "David" opens March 8, 2025.

Doug Gabriel has been "at it" for decades, playing a stringed instrument his dad made from a car muffler. He calls it a "muff-tar."

This account barely touches the garment's hem of Branson. Experiencing it--coupled with a visit to C of O--never grows old, at Christmas and throughout the year.

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

Ryan rally ends Bearcats' season

Raiders get payback in regional final

CROWLEY - In a reversal of their regular-season encounter, the Denton Ryan Raiders defeated the Aledo Bearcats 31-21 in their Class 5A Division I Region I final at Crowley ISD Multi-Purpose Stadium on Saturday, Dec. 7.

This time it was Ryan (13-1) who rallied from a double-digit deficit in the second half to advance to the state semifinals against Dallas Highland Park (13-1) next weekend. The Scots defeated Frisco Lone Star (12-2) 41-28 in the Region 2 final the night before.

During the regular season, the Bearcats (12-2) overcame a 27-8 deficit to defeat Ryan 42-27 in Aledo on Oct. 4 en route to Aledo's 17th consecutive district championship. However, this time it was the Raiders who provided the late heroics for their fans by outscoring Aledo 21-0 in the final 15:12 to overcome a 21-10 deficit in a game that featured a constant downpour of rain throughout.

Aledo, which was seeking a third consecutive state championship and 13th overall, had won 14 consecutive regional finals dating to the 2006 season. Ironically, this is the third time the Raiders have defeated them in the regional final dating to 2002.

In fact, the teams are 3-3 against each other all time, with Aledo holding a 3-0 advantage in the regular season and Ryan having won all three playoff meetings.

'We're very disappointed. We didn't play like we know we can play," Aledo head coach Robby Jones said. "Hats off to them. They're a great team and they have a chance to win another state championship. They're going to have a tough time with Highland Park, but they've got the talent to win it all."

Following their two previous playoff meetings in 2002 and 2003, Ryan went on to win state. In 2022 and 2023 Aledo won regular-season meetings and went on to win state.

The Raiders won their most recent state title in 2020 with Seth Henigan at quarterback. He's now playing at Memphis, but his younger brother Quin is carrying the mantle.

The comeback

The younger Henigan threw two touchdown passes in the rally. The first went for 80 yards as he threaded the needle to Tre'Vaughn Reynolds to pull the Raiders to within 21-17 with 3:12 remaining in the third quarter.

Ryan took the lead for good on Nemo Warmate's second touchdown run of the game, this one from 27 yards out just seven seconds into the fourth quarter. His first TD, a 30-yard run gave the Raiders an early 7-0 lead.

Ickert eclipses milestone as Lady Eagles soar

Scores 1,500th career point

The home crowd inside Barber Gym had two reasons to cheer as the Trinity Christian Academy Lady Eagles decimated Harvest Christian, 51-9, on Friday, Dec. 6.

The first and most obvious reason was the huge win made possible by a stalwart defensive performance by TCA. The other was being on hand to witness Emily Ickert eclipse 1,500 points in her prep career with a layup midway through the third quarter.

"I've been coaching - I believe this is my 23rd year - and I've coached some pretty good players, but [Ickert] is probably the best pure shooter I've ever coached," praised Lady Eagles head coach Garrett Hilton. "One thing she started doing this year is not just being a shooter, but she's getting to the basket as well. That makes her a tough player. She's really good!"

Ickert, only a junior at TCA, entered the game as the Lady Eagles all-time scoring leader, and 26 points shy of the 1,500point milestone. The Lady Eagle defense started fast, creating multiple turnovers on their end of the floor, leading to quick conversions at the basket.

Ickert ended up on the scoring end of those conversions, scoring the first eight points of the game for TCA as she edged towards the milestone.

By the end of the first quarter, TCA had the game well in hand. Led by their defensive effort, the Lady Eagles outpaced Harvest Christian 23-3 in the first eight minutes, as Ickert put up 15.

The second quarter was more of the same as Harvest Christian continued to struggle against the defensive onslaught. Turnovers were commonplace, and the points were plentiful as TCA's lead swelled from 20 points at the end of the first quarter to 32 points at the break.

"We're trying to play fast," Hilton said of his team's philosophy. "We're trying to force a few turnovers on defense, but really we're trying to force up bad shots, get rebounds, and then get down the floor fast. We've got a long way to go, but we definitely did some good things."

With the game all but over as the second half got underway, the Lady Eagles put on the cruise control. After posting a 39-point first half, the offense slowed, adding just 10 points in the third quarter.

Even with the offensive output slowing the home crowd waited with bated breath every trip down the court to see Ickert hit her mark. Midway through the third quarter, it finally happened. Following another forced turnover by the Lady Eagles defense, she raced down the court on a fast break, playing a right-handed layup off

the glass for point 1,501 of her illustrious career.

Bradford working toward the future

Wants to move on from 2024

Aledo native Cody Bradford's career in Major League Baseball has been quite the rollercoaster two seasons in.

After what he referred to as, "feeling like I had a cup of coffee in the Big Leagues," as a rookie in 2023, he was part of the first World Series championship team in Texas Rangers history.

With sights set on returning to October baseball in 2024, injuries plagued the boys in blue. Bradford himself succumbed to a freak rib injury that left him sidelined for months while the Rangers playoff hopes were dashed.

In his sophomore campaign, Bradford and the Rangers began the season on the mountain top, but ended the year in the valley.

"It started off really exciting," Bradford said. "I broke camp for the first time with the big league team, so that was definitely a milestone. The coaches and some of the older players congratulate guys for breaking camp with the big league team for the first time.

"There were a few things the older guys did for us. One of the things was, a couple of the guys split the cost and bought all of us two suits. They had a guy fly in from New York City to the stadium to custom fit us for two suits that we each got to pick out. That was really cool, because we got to go to the White House this year, so I got to wear one of them."

Strong start

The Rangers started off the season hot. They won 2-out-of-3 against the Cubs and Rays before splitting a four-game series at home against Houston.

Bradford had one of the best outings of his young career against the Astros on Friday, April 5, at GlobeLife Field. The lanky left-hander threw 7.2 innings, striking out four without issuing a walk. The only two hits he gave up were the bookends of the outing.

Offensively, the Rangers gave Bradford all the support he needed and then some. Adolis Garcia and

Marcus Semien each hit three-run homers as Texas cruised to a 10-2 win to start the series.

Then the wheels started to come off.

"Started off the year about as good as it could've gone," Bradford recalled. "I didn't really have expectations on myself. I just wanted to be on the big league team and contributing somewhere. It just happened that there was a spot [in the rotation] open with [Michael] Lorenzen still building up and [Max] Scherzer and [Jacob] DeGrom banged up.

"I got to get my feet wet early in the year with three good starts, and then had kind of a freak rib injury."

Just six days after the best outing of his career, Bradford suffered a stress fracture to his rib that sidelined him through most of July.


'There's not much you can do [with this type of injury] from a PT (physical therapy) side, except for sit back and wait for that bone to heal on its own. I think there was a big learning moment there, not only in baseball, but in life in general that some things are totally out of your hands," Bradford said.

"That was a really cool opportunity for Madi and I both to just step back and be patient during that and trust God was going to work through that - that his plan was going to be better than any way we would be able to handle it."

Return to form

Once the injury healed enough for Bradford to return to the Rangers, it took a few outings to return to the form he exhibited early in the season. In his return to the majors, he met up with the team in St. Louis, where he came out of the bullpen in a relief effort. Tommy Pham had just been reacquired by the Cardinals from the White Sox when he hammered a grand slam off Bradford and received a standing ovation from the Redbird faithful.

"I was like a dog going back to his legs," Bradford remembered. "That was not how I envisioned

like, especially not after the early success I'd had earlier in the year."

However, the Rangers coaching staff didn't seem concerned over one tough outing. He was brought back into the rotation to finish out the season, proving yet again to be a reliable asset to the starting five.

For as tumultuous as it was for the Rangers as a whole, Bradford's 2024 season went remarkably well. In 13 starts he finished the year with a 6-3 record. He threw 76.1 innings, struck out 70 batters, issued just 13 free passes, and ended the year boasting a 3.54 ERA.

Yet, in spite of the success he enjoyed personally in 2024, Bradford's perspective hasn't shifted as he looks towards the 2025 season.

"I'm definitely not the type the dugout with his tail between of guy that's going to say I've earned a spot," Bradford stated. "I'm much more in the mindset my rejoining of the team going that there's a lot of guys who want

to play professional baseball. If you want to be a starter, there's five spots on a team, maybe six. Those are really important spots and everybody's vying for it.

"I'm under the impression that I've got to earn my job every single year, especially as a guy that doesn't have the velocity or the stuff that is the wow factor. I'm a softer-throwing, left-handed pitcher who needs to command his pitches. I think for the rest of my career it's going to be something where I've got to go out and earn my spot every year. And I'm okay with that."

Seeking another title

Following the end of the regular season, players took three weeks off. Bradford and his wife. Madi, toured Europe and he took a family hunting trip. Before the Los Angeles Dodgers were crowned the World Series champions, the Rangers were back to

media of him wearing one of the team's jerseys with his No. 1 on it.

Also, Guillory made a verbal commitment to the University of Texas earlier this year only to rescind that decision shortly after in lieu of looking at all of his

Guillory announced the week before the high school playoffs began that he was decided to graduate early and forgo his senior season at Aledo. Ever since, much like LeBron James when he announced his decision to play

for the Miami Heat in 2010, folks speculated where he'd land up to the point of his announcement.

Guillory played his final game as a Bearcat this past Saturday as they were eliminated from the Class 5A Division I playoffs with a 31-21 loss to Denton Ryan in the Region I final. He ended the season with 1,322 rushing yards and 25 touchdowns, along with 180 receiving yards and two more TD.

In two seasons with Aledo, Guillory accumulated over 2,900 yards of offense and scored 48 touchdowns. He moved to Aledo following his freshman season at Mansfield Lake Ridge.

At Lake Ridge, Guillory led the team in total vardage and touchdowns. He rushed for 769 vards and nine TD, along with catching passes for 154 yards and three scores.

He immediately made an impression at Aledo as a sophomore, rushing for 1,236 yards and 17 touchdowns, while collecting 175 receiving yards and four TD. All this while missing several games - including the final two and a half playoff games with a knee injury.


Following offseason knee surgery, Guillory responded with his best season yet. Included in his


final season as a Bearcat was a six-touchdown performance in a 49-42 overtime win against Richland.


Utah plays in the Big 12 Conference and has a game at Baylor in the coming season, date and time to be announced. TCU, Texas Tech and Houston are also in the conference.

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

work, getting started on their offseason lifting program.

"Guys who understand how to take advantage of the six to eight weeks in the offseason to build up their body, build strength, and to be able to stay healthy the next year is huge," Bradford said. "I know Marcus Semien has been one of the best guys in MLB at staying healthy and staying on the field the last three years. He's local. I see him every day when I go into the stadium to work out. He knows how to go about the game in the right way. I think guys like that set the example and the tone for the younger guys coming up, we can learn a lot from Marcus."

The Rangers aren't spending time licking their wounds this offseason. The players are well aware of Manager Bruce Bochy's cadence from his time in San Francisco where he led the Giants to World Series wins in 2010, 2012, and 2014 while missing the postseason in 2011 and 2013. According to Bradford, the expectation looking ahead to 2025 is to continue that cadence and hoist the World Series trophy once again next October.

"We all understand this offseason is going to be big," he explained. "[Chris Young] made it really, really clear to us as a team and to the organization, his expectation next year is to win a World Series. That's what we want to do. We tasted that last year. Then after a series of punts, two by Aledo and one by Ryan, Henigan connected with Braeden Mussett on a short pass that Mussett turned into a 65-yard touchdown. It was the final score of the night, with the Ryan defense stymieing any rally by the Bearcats with two interceptions.

Warmate (122) and Reynolds (101) each rushed for over 100 yards in the contest.

The Ryan defense also tightened in the second half with three sacks, all by defensive lineman Kha'Ron Freeman Wade. Still, three times in the fourth quarter the Bearcats reached the Ryan 45, their own 46 and their own 47 before punting twice and throwing an interception.

Early control

After giving up the opening touchdown, the Bearcats appeared to take control of the contest. Junior quarterback Gavin Beard drove Aledo 69 yards in nine plays, capping the drive with a 1-yard run of his own for a 7-7 tie at the 4:38 mark of the first quarter.

The score was set up after Beard found Lincoln Tubbs for a pinpoint 32-yard pass to the Ryan 1.

Ryan regained the lead on a 27-yard field goal, but again the Bearcats responded with a touchdown. Following a short Ryan punt that gave Aledo the ball at the Ryan 42, Aledo used seven plays before junior running back Raycine Guillory scored from 2 yards out, carrying what seemed like half the Raiders defense into the end zone to put his team up 14-10 at the half.

At the 4:02 mark of the third quarter, Beard threw his 35th touchdown pass of the season. He found Blake Burdine for a 43-yard score and a 21-10 advantage.

Beard completed 16 of 28 passes for 205 yards. Of those, nine were to junior Kaydon Finley for an unofficial 95 yards.

Finley ended the season with 80 catches for 1,429 yards and 21 touchdowns.

Junior running Winkfield led Aledo in rushing with an unofficial 37 yards on 10 carries. He finished the season with 892 yards and 13 TD.

This was Guillory's final game as a Bearcat. He announced he is graduating early and has signed a letter-of-intent to play for the University of Utah next season.

Battling an ankle injury, Guillory saw limited action, gaining 19 yards on 13 carries. He ended the season with more than 1,500 vards of offense (1,322 rushing, 180 receiving) and 27 touchdowns (25 rushing, 2 receiving).

For his high school career, he accumulated 3,800 all-purpose yards (3,327 rushing, 509 receiving) and scored 60 touchdowns

Along with Guillory suiting up as a Bearcat for the final time were more than 40 seniors. Among highlights in their final performances were kicker Cole Crawford being a perfect 3-for-3 on extra points and cornerback Kai Taylor

A fine season

Despite Saturday's loss, the Bearcats had what most teams would consider a very successful season. They won a dozen games, captured yet another district championship, while extending their national-record district winning streak to 127 games, and they held the No. 1 spot in the state rankings for much of the season.

"It's a successful season, but with Aledo standards it's not," Jones said. "These guys are all winners. We just didn't come out on the right end tonight."



Team effort leads Eagles to victory

TCA in midseason form

Just 11 games into the 2024-25 hoops season, Trinity Christian Academy's varsity basketball team appears to be in midseason form. After handing Nazarene Christian Academy a loss earlier in the week that was not nearly as close as the final score would indicate, the Eagles ran roughshod over Christian Life Prep on Friday, Dec. 6., to pick up their eighth win of the season.

Trinity Christian (8-3) put together an excellent team performance at both ends of the court. Utilizing head coach Jeff Peterson's philosophy of using defense to create offense, the Eagles locked down the visiting Knights at one end of the floor while five TCA players finished the game with double-digit scoring in the 75-43 win.

"I'm really excited to see us come out and do what we set out to do." Peterson said after the game. "Our full-court attack was a lot better tonight than it has been. Still trying to get over the slow start [on offense], but we'll get there eventually. Overall, the guys played really well tonight."

Similar to the contest against NCA earlier in the week, several minutes passed in the opening quarter before the Eagles got on the board with their first score. However, once the scoring started, it didn't stop. Led by senior John Chrane, TCA's offense was relentless. Even in the instances when the first shot didn't fall, Trinity Christian continued to fight for rebounds, putting up second and

third attempts when necessary to make each offensive trip down the floor a successful one.

"We struggled at the rim," Peterson acknowledged. "We've been highlighting attacking the rim more and relying on the three-ball less. I'm going to consider it a little bit of a baby step in the right direction. We were a little inconsistent at the rim. It's certainly something to address in the coming weeks."

One of the things that made TCA so successful on Friday night was ball distribution. By ensuring all five players on the floor were a scoring threat, the Knights weren't able to key in on one specific player. In the first quarter four of the five starters made shots, as TCA took a 15-10 lead through the first eight minutes of play.

The second quarter was much the same as the Eagles outpaced their foe 19-13 to take a 34-23 lead into the break, with all five players tacking on points.

Coming out of the break Chrane went off, scoring 10 of his game-high 19 points in the third quarter. While Chrane did the bulk of the scoring for TCA in the third, he was by no means the only one finding the net. Once again, all five Eagles on the court scored, while TCA's defense shut down CLPS en route to a 23-3 run. Through three quarters, the Eagles held an insurmountable 57-26 lead.

TCA kept the hammer down in the fourth quarter despite the big lead. Shane Palmer, TCA's resident sharpshooter, knocked down two of his three long balls in the game during the final stanza. Chrane, Sam Carson, Cole times when we got into half-court
