PCSO expanding criminal investigation division



Authier has announced the expansion of the Sheriff's Criminal Investigation Division (CID) with the creation of a financial crimes investigator position.

Authier said the continual rise in financial crimes necessitated the

need to add an investigator's position whose primary focus is centered in the field.

"Financial crimes and related scams are among some of the fastest growing crimes in Texas," Authier said.

The Federal Trade Commission reported receiving 2.8 million fraud reports nationwide from consumers in 2021, equaling more than \$5.8 billion in losses. That number has surged by over 70 percent within the last four years.

In 2023 alone, the amount nearly doubled at \$10 billion in financial crime loss reported across the United States.

Arnold stepping down as chief

Taking job in Oklahoma

After serving at the helm of the Weatherford Police Department since 2017, Lance Arnold is stepping down as its chief, effective Dec. 20. He is leaving to become the police chief in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma.

Arnold has a distinguished 28-year career in law enforcement.

Arnold was appointed chief of police in Weatherford following 20 years with the Norman, Oklahoma Police Department. He advanced to director of public safety in 2020 and assistant city manager in 2022.

Duringhistime in Weatherford, the department experienced significant growth, expanding from 58 officers to 69 officers, with a total of 95 employees. Under his leadership, the department achieved significant reductions in crime while fostering extensive community partnerships.

One of his key contributions was serving as the project manager for the design and construction of the state-of-the-art public safety building, which was completed in October of 2022. The department was also re-accredited for the third time under the Texas Law Enforcement Best Practices Accreditation Program and received recognition from the International Association of Chiefs of Police for its comprehensive member wellness program.

"I will forever be grateful for the opportunity to serve this remarkable community, and it has been an honor to work alongside our talented and dedicated members," Arnold said. "This community will always hold a special place in my heart, and I will deeply cherish the relationships formed."

Arnold was also deeply involved in community leadership, serving on several boards and committees. These included the Medical City Weatherford Board of Trustees, the Tarrant Area Food Bank West Advisory Committee,

the NCTCOG Criminal Justice Policy Development Committee, the NCT 911 Strategic Advisory Committee, and the Texas Police Chiefs Association Recruitment and Retention Committee.

"We are deeply grateful for Chief Arnold's outstanding service and unwavering dedication to our community over the past seven years," City Manager James Hotopp. "Under his leadership, our police department has achieved significant milestones, and his commitment to fostering trust and safety within our city will have a lasting impact. While we are sad to see him go, we wish him the very best in his future endeavors."

Assistant Chief Jason Hayes, a Weatherford native, will serve as interim chief while the search for a permanent replacement is underway. Hayes has 24 years of experience in law enforcement, all with Weatherford Police Department.







Agency seeks \$300 million to bolster Medicaid

The Texas Health and Human Services Commission is seeking a \$300 million transfusion of funds to bolster the state's Medicaid application process, The Texas *Tribune* reported.

The public health insurance program provides coverage for people or families with limited income, as well as pregnant women and people with disabilities. Wait time for applicants in Texas has been as long as 71 days, with nearly 132,000 pending applications last month.

The proposed funding would allow hiring more than 1,000 additional workers and upgrading a decades-old computer system to speed up the Medicaid application process in Texas.

The agency's request notes the COVID-19 pandemic put considerable stress on the eligibility system.

If lawmakers approve the \$300 million request, the state could receive an additional \$100 million in funding, largely from the federal government.

Four Texas cities in top 10 for population growth

A study by financial technology company SmartAsset indicates a number of Texas cities continue to see major population growth, according to the Austin American-Statesman.

Four Texas cities were in the top 10 in the United States for population growth by percentage:

- New Braunfels was second in the country with a 12.49% population increase from 2022 to 2023 and 29.68% in the past five years.
- Georgetown's population increased 11.34% from 2022 to 2023 and 29.85% in that same five-year period.

Atascocita, in Harris County northeast of Houston, increased its population by 11.03% from 2022 to 2023 and grew by 38.56% from 2018 to 2023.

Conroe's population rose 6.73% from 2022 to 2023 and 23.49% in that same five-year period.

SmartAsset used recent population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau to rank more than 600 U.S. cities.

At least 17 National Guard troops have died patrolling border

The mobilization of National Guard troops along the southern border with Mexico over the past three years has taken its toll, with at least 17 dying from various causes, the Texas Standard reported.

The deaths include at least seven suicides, two accidental shootings and two traffic fatalities, as well as an accidental drowning while attempting to save migrants crossing the Rio Grande.

The death toll was disclosed during a hearing of the Texas House Committee on Defense and Veterans Affairs.

"The loss of life for any National Guard member is one too many, and our hearts are with the families and loved ones of these heroes," Gov. Greg Abbott said in a statement. His office said last month that Operation Lone Star has resulted in more than 526,000 immigrant apprehensions and nearly 50,000 criminal arrests.

U.S. Rep. Joaquin Castro, D-San Antonio, has opposed Operation Lone Star since its

"There's just a lot of concerns about how these troops have been treated in Operation Lone Star, in addition to serious questions about the effectiveness of the whole operation," Castro said.

Paxton files suit against two chemical giants

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton last week filed a lawsuit against chemical behemoths 3M

and DuPont, accusing them of misrepresenting the safety of socalled "forever chemicals," called PFAS, The Tribune reported.

PFAS are a family of chemicals that resist oil, stains, heat, grease, and water. They are called "forever chemicals" because they don't break down and remain in water and soil indefinitely.

The products are sold under brand names such as Teflon, Stainmaster, and Scotchgard. There is mounting evidence they contain chemicals considered harmful to human health.

"These companies knew for decades that PFAS chemicals could cause serious harm to human health yet continued to advertise them as safe for household use around families and children," Paxton said in a news release. "Texas is taking action to penalize these companies and hold them accountable for deceiving Texans into buying consumer products without vital information."

A spokesperson for DuPont called the lawsuit "without merit... We look forward to vigorously defending our record of safety, health, and environmental stewardship."

PUC pushing voluntary use of smart thermostats

The Public Utility Commission is providing residential consumers of electricity a way to save on their electricity bills by installing smart thermostats that allow retail electric providers to reduce energy use when demand is high, though only in areas with retail competition.

"Ensuring grid reliability as Texas continues to grow requires both expanding our state's power supply and finding ways to reduce demand and use electricity more efficiently," PUCT Commissioner Kathleen Jackson said. "By offering residential consumers opportunities to neip them reduce their energy use, we help them save money, reduce demand on the ERCOT system, and improve grid reliability."

Participation is voluntary. The PUC hopes the new rule will strengthen grid reliability by reducing the total power consumption of participating customers by 20%.

November was warmer, wetter than usual

After a hot and dry October, the state for the most part received much-needed rain in November, though temperatures remained above average for this time of year, according to Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board.

As a result, the percentage of the state in drought dropped 24 percentage points by the end of November. However, half of Texas is still in drought, mainly in Far West Texas and a piece of Central Texas around San Antonio.

"November was a welcome relief from October's statewide record-setting heat and nearrecord-setting dryness," Wentzel wrote. Drought conditions are expected to remain relatively stable through the winter months, he added.

Gesundheit! Cedar season underway

It is cedar season in Texas, meaning runny noses and watery eyes especially affecting folks living in Central Texas where juniper trees are prominent.

"Cedar fever is irritating to many due to the quantity and density of Ashe junipers in Central Texas that all produce pollen at the same time, which leads to a high concentration of pollen in the air," said Robert Edmonson of the Texas A&M Forest Service.

Don't feel safe or smug if you live in East Texas. The eastern red cedar also releases pollen around the same time and can provoke similar irritating reactions.

Both types of trees begin producing pollen in mid-December, with production reaching its peak in mid-January, and relief setting in by the beginning of March.

Parker County also saw an uptick in the number of financial crimes reported, where in 2020, the Parker County Sheriff's Office (PCSO) CID received 209 financial crimes cases. By 2023, the number of financial crimes cases received increased by 58 percent to 331 cases involving wire fraud, forgery, counterfeiting, identity theft, ATM fraud/ credit card and debit card abuse cases.

Previously, PCSO financial crimes cases received were assigned on a rotating basis to property crimes investigators within the Sheriff's Criminal Investigations Division. The intricate nature of many financial crimes cases demands a

specialized skill set and training as they are often some of the most challenging cases to

"Following the unanimous approval by the Commissioner's Court, we conducted assessments to identify the most suitable candidate for the financial crimes investigator role," Authier remarked. "Deputy Christian Townsend achieved the highest score and was promoted into this new position."

Townsend came to the PCSO in January 2023. His experience includes seven years of experience with New Mexico law enforcement and working major crimes investigations.

Townsend has advanced training as a peace officer and holds an undergraduate and graduate degrees in fields of study relating to law enforcement transactions since taking the

and public safety. He also has experience investigating numerous types of cases ranging from minor property crimes to homicides as well as investigating interstate federal offenses.

"The complexity of many financial crimes requires not only the application of specialized investigative techniques but also the promptness in intercepting transfers and the expertise to electronically trace these transactions," Authier noted. "Funds can swiftly circulate through various channels, and with the emerging trend of digital currency, there is an urgent need for effective and timely resolutions."

In just a few short months, Townsend has frozen or recovered more than \$60,000 in funds and assets stolen from victims in fraudulent scams and

financial crimes investigator position. In October, Townsend made several arrests stemming from existing case investigations and obtained additional arrest warrants in connection with new financial crimes cases received.

He also seized over \$17,000 from an account used to collect and distribute funds stolen during a financial scheme. Townsend also obtained a seizure warrant on an account totaling more than \$43,000, which is believed to have been used in a separate fraud case.

Authier expressed his gratitude to the Parker County Commissioner's Court for their unwavering support of the sheriff's office and for approving funding for the financial crimes investigator position.


Roger Yates

Date, Time, and Place of the Hearing. The public hearing will start at or after 6:00 p.m., January 14, 2025, at Willow Park City Hall, 120 El Chico Trail, Suite A, Willow Park, Texas 76087.

General Nature of the Proposed Authorized Improvements. The general nature of the proposed public improvements to be provided by the District that are necessary for the development of the Property within the District and which shall promote the interests of the City and confer a special benefit upon the Property, may include: (i) acquisition, construction, and improvement of street, roadway and sidewalk improvements, including related drainage, utility relocation, signalization, landscaping, lighting, signage, off-street parking and right-of-way; (ii) acquisition, construction, and improvement of water, wastewater, and drainage improvements and facilities; (iii) establishment and improvement of parks, trails and recreational facilities improvements; (iv) projects similar to those listed above authorized by the Act, including similar off-site projects that provide a benefit to the Property within the District; (v) acquisition of real property or interests in real property in connection with each Authorized Improvement; (vi) payment of costs, including, without limitation, design, engineering, permitting, legal, required payment, performance and maintenance bonds, bidding, support, construction, construction management, administrative and inspection costs, associated with developing and financing the public improvements listed in (i) through (v) above; (vii) payment of costs associated with special supplemental services for improvement and promotion of the District as approved by the City including services related to advertising, promotion, health and sanitation, water and wastewater, public safety, security, business recruitment, development, recreation, and cultural enhancement related to the public improvements listed in (i) through (v) above; (viii) payment of costs of establishing, administering, and operating the District, as well as the interest, costs of issuance, reserve funds, or credit enhancement of bonds issued for the purposes described in (i) through (viii) above (collectively, the "Authorized Improvements"). The Authorized Improvements shall promote the interest of the City and confer a special benefit upon the property within the District.

<u>Estimated Cost of the Authorized Improvements.</u> The current estimated total cost of the proposed Authorized Improvements is \$75,000,000.

Proposed District Boundaries. The District is proposed to include property owned by the Petitioner consisting of approximately 317.732 acres of property generally located south of Interstate Highway I-20, west of F.M. 1187, and north of E. Bankhead Highway, and within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City, as more particularly described by a metes and bounds description available at the Willow Park City Hall and available for public inspection.

Proposed Method of Assessment. The City shall levy assessments on each parcel within the District in a manner that results in imposing equal shares of the costs on property similarly benefited. Each assessment may be paid in part or in full at any time (including interest), and certain assessments may be paid in annual installments (including interest). If the City allows an assessment to be paid in installments, then the installments must be paid in amounts necessary to meet annual costs for those Authorized Improvements financed by the assessment and must continue for a period necessary to retire the indebtedness on those Authorized Improvements (including interest).

Proposed Apportionment of Cost between the District and the City. The City will not be obligated to provide any funding to finance the Authorized Improvements, other than from assessments levied in the District. No City property in the District shall be assessed. The Petitioner may fund certain improvements from other funds available to the Petitioner.

Objections During the public hearing, any interested person may speak for or against the establishment of the District and the advisability of the improvements to be made for the benefit of the property within the District. Written and oral objections will be considered at the hearing.

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

"I'd love to be a receivers coach," Finley said, being a bit more explicit. "But my dream job would be a football commentator."



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

Named to all-state tourney team


