# Tiger Woods course spotlight of new elite community

# Good friend J.J. Henry on board with project

In perhaps the understatement of all time, Tiger Woods knows a thing or two about golf and winning. And if ever a community has endeared itself to the concept of success, it would be Aledo.

So, it should come as no surprise that Woods, a 15-time majors winner in the world of professional golf and hailed by many to be the greatest golfer of all time, has chosen the Aledo area as the site for his latest golf course design. Bluejack Ranch is slated to open in early 2026.

The private course will be the centerpiece of a private club community set on a 914-acre working ranch located at Hwy. 377 and Kelly Road. Backing the project are Fort Worth's Andy Mitchell and his wife,

Kristin, the same developers who built Bluejack National, which opened near Houston in 2016. Bluejack National was Woods' first U.S. course design and his only other one in Texas.

"I wake up every day excited, energized and humbled to help push this project along," said former PGA Tour player J.J. Henry, a Fort Worth resident who is on the development team and who competed against and with Woods.

The duo played together on the 2006 U.S. Ryder Cup Team.

Woods will collaborate on the course with his TGR Design partner Beau Welling. Also advising on the project is Mark Brooks, a former PGA player from Fort Worth who played in the most tour events ever (803), and Michael Bennett, executive partner and CEO of architecture firm Bennett Partners.

Brooks is also helping with the development center at the course.

# Care close to home

# Cook Children's, Goodwin Dental anchor new Aledo Medical Plaza

Some might say that one path to success is finding a thing you do really well and specialize in that.

For Louie Lu, who has had a number of successful business ventures, that one specialty would be building high-quality medical facilities.

From his first project about 16 years ago, which still houses Baylor Family Medicine in Weatherford, Lu has projects all over the metroplex, but his heart is here in his hometown.

He completed two medical buildings, one 14,000 square feet and another 12,000 square feet along Crowne Point in Willow Park a few



years ago, and also built the Baylor Rehab building in Aledo.

On adjacent property just past the Tri-County Electric building in Aledo, his latest project is a twobuilding medical plaza in Aledo.

Three tenants are already booked to anchor the plaza: Goodwin Dental, Cook Children's Pediatrics, and Clover Oxygen Hyperbarics & Wound Care.

Cook recently vacated their office in Willow Park, and is operating temporarily at the Walsh location while their new space is finished out. Goodwin and Clover are already operating at the new location.

The steel-structured building is separated from Tri-County by a new retaining wall. Lu quipped that "the Chinese have been building walls for 5,000 years - we know how to build a wall!"

The modern-themed facility also has artificial grass as a water-saving measure in the summer.

Only two spaces remain in the plaza — one is 3,267 square feet and one is 4,551 square feet. Lu is hoping to find perhaps a primary care provider or an urgent care facility to round out the tenants.





# **Building on a legacy**

"It's extremely motivating for me to contribute to the golfing legacy of Fort Worth," Woods said on the Bluejack website.

That golf legacy, of course, includes the legendary Ben Hogan. In 1953 he became the only golfer to win three major championships in a year until Woods won the final three majors in 2000.

Woods added the Masters championship in 2001 to accomplish what is known as the "Tiger Slam," winning all four major championships in succession. Hogan might have done the same thing in 1953, except the PGA and British Open had colliding dates that year.

Fort Worth is also known for its historic Colonial Country Club, home to the Charles Schwab Challenge, the current name for the oldest invitational in pro golf. The tournament started in 1946 and Hogan won it five times.

Woods played in the tournament in 1997, tying for fourth in his rookie year.

There's also Bluejack Town, which will cover 65 acres. It will present an authentic western town along with the golf course, will fea- feel, right down to its general store, Henry said.

# The golf course

The championship course will be the centerpiece of the entire development. It will be designed to allow for creative shot making, something that Woods was well known for throughout his career, along with having five-plus sets of tees, Henry said.

Along with the practice facility, the par-3 course will have 10 holes and be lighted.

"It's great for kids and families," Henry said.

As for the main course hosting tournaments and events, Henry said, "Andy, Tiger and I were talking about the potential of what we could host there."

Henry said he and the folks connected with Bluejack plan to be part of the Aledo community, which, of course, will have a growth impact as a result.

"Golf's given me so much the past 25 years, but there's nothing like home," he said. "To see how excited Tiger was when he physically got here on the property was

# Capital Highlights

# Legislative session begins on Jan. 14

The 89th Texas legislative session begins on Jan. 14 with a still-unresolved race for speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

State Reps. David Cook, R-Mansfield and Dustin Burrows, R-Lubbock, are considered the frontrunners for speaker, but speculation continues as to whether other candidates will throw their hats into the ring.

The Republican caucus is split between those who oppose appointing any Democrat to chair a House committee and those who contend it's essential to work across the aisle to get the state's business done in a biennial five-month session. Historically, a few chairmanships have gone to members of the minority party.

In the wake of the November elections, the makeup of the 150-member Texas House is 87 Republicans and 63 Democrats.

School vouchers will again be on the legislative plate since they are a top priority for Gov. Greg Abbott. His efforts to pass what are also called Education Savings Accounts failed numerous attempts in 2023, including several special sessions.

Legislative watchers predict more bills aimed at property tax relief but geared more toward business owners, since those passed in the 2023 session were primarily aimed at homeowners.

Another issue that Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick has prioritized is banning the sale of all THC products in Texas. Since the state legalized the growth of hemp, some stores have begun selling products containing previously illegal levels of THC, the compound that gives marijuana its "high."

# **GOP** bills seek to regulate wind, solar and battery power projects

Several Republican lawmakers have filed bills to increase government oversight over

renewable energy projects, The Dallas Morning News reported. Proposals include requiring property buffers between the projects and neighboring properties. Another bill would require environmental fees and studies for any new renewable projects.

The News reported that wind, solar and batteries account for about 46% of electric generation capacity for the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, which controls nearly all of the state's power grid.

"Currently, renewable energy facilities do not have statewide guidelines for permitting and decommissioning, leading to variations in how the installations are installed," said state Rep. Jared Patterson, R-Frisco and sponsor of one of the bills.

# FBI probes reported threats against SpaceX

The FBI is investigating reported threats made against SpaceX's Starbase Facility near Brownsville, the San Antonio Express-News reported. The bureau's San Antonio office confirmed that it is investigating possible bomb threats in South Texas in recent weeks."

"While we are working to carefully vet and investigate the information we have received, we want to reiterate that the safety and security of the American people is the FBI's highest concern," the bureau said in a statement late

A frequent camper near the launch site reported five male passengers in a vehicle talked of blowing up a SpaceX space

The probe comes as the company is working toward a planned test flight on Jan. 10 of its secondgeneration Starship.

The company has come under fire in recent months for its environmental record. Several Rio Grande Valley groups have sued the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for allowing SpaceX to discharge wastewater from its launch platform without a permit.

# Texas losing its clout in **Congress this session**

There are fewer Texans in leadership in Congress in the session that just began, largely because of retirements

of several GOP members, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

U.S. Rep. Kay Granger, R-Fort Worth, who led the powerful Appropriations Committee, and U.S. Rep. Michael Burgess, R-Pilot Point, who led the Rules Committee and was the second-ranked Republican on the Commerce Committee, both retired from Congress this year.

Eighteen of the 25 Texas Republicans in the House have been there for three full terms or fewer. Another incumbent, Michael McCaul, R-Austin, is no longer heading the House Foreign Affairs Committee because of term limits.

# State starts 2025 with 2.9 million business entities

Texas rang in the New Year with more than 2.9 million business entities actively registered with the secretary of state's office to conduct business here. That is up more than 125,000 from a year ago, according to Texas Secretary of State Jane Nelson.

"The economic climate in Texas continues to be strong as entrepreneurs grow and create businesses in our state and more out-of-state entities want to expand to Texas," Nelson said.

That number includes both businesses incorporated in Texas and out-of-state companies conducting business here.



# State's citrus industry on the brink of disaster

The state's citrus industry is reeling after a pair of natural disasters - the deadly winter storm of February 2021 and a severe drought, The Texas Tribune reported. Nearly four years after that winter storm, production levels have not recovered.

The state's citrus industry is located entirely in the Valley and has an economic impact of more than \$300 million annually.

"We are not a large physical footprint anymore, but we still pack enough economic punch," said Dale Murden, president of Texas Citrus Mutual, a nonprofit trade association that represents the interests of commercial citrus growers.

Farmers in the Valley largely depend on surface water from the Rio Grande. A mature citrus tree needs between 40 and 50 inches of water a year, according to the Texas A&M Agrilife Research Center. About half of that amount must be supplied by irrigation. Drought conditions and Mexico falling behind on delivering water under a 1944 treaty are blamed for the drop in citrus production.

# Books on no-hitters available now

It is one of the rarest and most exciting phenomena in the world of professional baseball - the no-hitter.

From the time of the sport's inception in 1869, there have only been 326 no-no's, with the most recent coming in a combined effort between Shota Imanaga, Nate Pearson, and Porter Hodge on Sept. 4, 2024.

The Chicago Cubs defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates by a score of 12-0 that day. It was the first combined no-hitter thrown by the Cubs at home in 52 seasons.

There were only four no-hitters thrown in all of the 2024 season out of 2,430 regular season games.

Aledo resident Kevin Hurd has a fascination with no-hitters that he turned into a two-volume Amazon best seller, and it all started when he retired from the Air Force after 20 years of service in 2014.

"In June of 2014, both Tim Lincecum (San Francisco Giants) and Clayton Kershaw (Los Angeles Dodgers) threw no-hitters," Hurd said. "After Kershaw's no-hitter, I read an article, I believe it was from ESPN.com, about how longtime Dodgers announcer Vin Scully has called 21 no-hitters, which was about nine percent of all no-hitters (231) from 1901 to Kershaw's game. The article also had a link to all no-hit games from 1875-present. I became very interested in no-hitters."

But Hurd, 68, did not actually start working on the book until six years later because he took a job in security at the Western Currency Facility (WCF) in Fort Worth and worked there until March

2020.

"In early March 2020, I went to Arizona where we (two brothers, sister-in-law, and friend) went to watch the Giants play several spring training games," Hurd said. "While there, I got back in touch with my friend (Rob Adams) and told him about my interest in nohitters. He suggested I write a book about it.

"Due to COVID, I retired from the WCF at the end of the month and concentrated on writing the

# Growing up a fan

A baseball fan from childhood, Hurd played little league ball from 1965-69 and grew up as a San Francisco Giants fan.

"I was very happy from 2010-2014 when the Giants won three World Series," Hurd said. "I liked the 2010 series win the most since it was the Giants first World Series win while in San Francisco."

Hurd's books, From Randy Johnson to Dallas Braden: No-hitters Beyond the Box Score Vol. 1 and 2 required extensive research and eventually became a project on which he and his brother collaborated.

"Usually I worked four hours a day; sometimes more, sometimes less," Hurd said. "In September 2021 I got my brother Bruce involved with editing and he was a big help.

"When I was working with two other friends, I wound up writing about 49 games. With Bruce's help, it got paired down to 23 games. I did most of the interviews (15 out of 20). Bruce handled the publishing part. He is also a self-published author. I wound up having a book launch on Sept. 29, 2024."

# **Background**

Hurd and his family have lived in Aledo since 2001.

He grew up in California in the Bay Area in the city of Los Altos, which is a suburb of San Jose.

The area he grew up in has been known as Silicon Valley since the 1960s, and he actually went to high school with Steve Jobs.

Hurd graduated from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo, graduating with a degree in Business Administration.

He joined the Air Force in 1984, flying as a Navigator on RC-135s and KC-135s, and his last 12 years were as a staff officer (retired as a lieutenant colonel) at 10th AF at Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base.


Hurd said in writing the book, he was struck by a few things.

"First, I remember reading an article by Los Angeles Times/ Hall of Fame Baseball writer Jim Murray," Hurd said. "In the article, he wrote that 'anybody could throw a no-hitter and that the vast majority of no-hit pitchers were 'non-entities.'

"The first part was true — there are a vast array of pitchers who have thrown no-hitters. There are Hall of Fame pitchers who have not thrown no-hitters and pitchers with a win-loss record of 3-7 who have thrown a no-hitter. The part about non-entities was wrong though."

Hurd said that of all the nohitters, more than 60 percent were thrown by pitchers who had an average career win-loss record of 130-115 or better, hardly non-entities.

"There is some luck involved, but usually no-hitters are thrown by better than average pitchers," Hurd said. "Secondly, many of the journeyman pitchers (average W-L of 46-48) had less than average records because of injuries, not



Kevin Hurd of Aledo has documented Major League Baseball no-hitters and has written two books about them.


minors and they switched to catcher because that was the best chance they had to get into the big leagues."

# **Looking ahead**

Hurd said he would like to go onto some baseball podcasts to discuss his books and might write more in the future.

As for his books, the Aledo man said he hopes that readers understand, among other things, how special no-hitters actually are and his day in the sun," Hurd said. "I have several tables where I list no-hit games. I refer to them as 'David vs. Goliath,' games, where a journeyman pitcher on an average team throws a no-hitter against a much better team. That doesn't happen a whole lot in other team sports, depending on what you consider an equivalent event, such as a quarterback throwing five TD passes, NBA players who score 50 points in a game, or an NHL player scoring four goals or more in a game, to a no-hitter. It's one of the things I love about baseball."







Furthermore, the Ladycats continued to shoot well from the free throw line, which has been a point of emphasis from Ott and his staff.



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

In accordance with Texas Local Government Code Section 271.049, (i) the current principal amount of all of the City's outstanding public securities secured by and payable from ad valorem taxes is \$18,515,000; (ii) the current combined principal and interest required to pay all of the City's outstanding public securities secured by and payable from ad valorem taxes on time and in full is \$36,616,026; (iii) the estimated combined principal and interest required to pay the certificates of obligation to be authorized on time and in full is \$39,622,745; (iv) the maximum interest rate for the certificates may not exceed the maximum legal interest rate; and (v) the maximum maturity date of the certificates to be authorized is August 15, 2055. The above information excludes \$13,760,000 in principal amount of outstanding debt obligations the City has designated as self-supporting which the City reasonably expects to pay from revenue sources other than ad valorem taxes; provided, however, that in the event such self-supporting revenue sources are insufficient to pay debt service, the City is obligated to levy ad valorem taxes to pay such debt obligations. 

Meanwhile, the Bearcats followed the girls game with their own blowout win. While head coach Brian Blackburn and the squad are eager to get back into the Tuesday-Friday routine of game play, Aledo's first-year head coach said he has been pleased with his roster's style of play and the conditioning it takes to play at such a breakneck pace.


"We're pressing, playing fast, and I think the guys like that," Blackburn said. "It took the guys a little bit to get in the right shape during the offseason, but when we tell the guys we are trying to score 70 or 80 points every game, that makes players want to buy in - they like to score."

Aledo led comfortably throughout the game with many players firing on all cylinders in transition and defensively. Leading the charge was junior post Townes Van Huysen, who scored a game-high 25 points. The junior missed significant time last season from a broken hand and is now making the most of his opportunity this year.

points while his younger brother Enrique Pacheco scored nine. Bearcat sophomore Josiah Jenkins also contributed with eight points.


# Subvarsity

The Annetta Town Council approved a partnership with KKM Associates, LLC to become their engineering firm for the Town of Annetta.


The Weatherford Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution installed new officers for the years 2024 - 2026 at its May meeting.


