Annexation highlights council meeting

City seeks to become Film Friendly

At its Tuesday, Jan. 14 meeting, the first of the new year, the Willow Park City Council held several public hearings in connection with annexation. This included one particular proposed annexation approved at the Nov. 12 meeting to enter into an agreement with Dean-Beall Ranch, Ltd.

The land, voluntarily offered for annexation and owned by Dean-Beall, consists of just over 317 acres located on the southcouncil announced the next and final step to make the agreement official will come as soon as the Feb. 11 meeting. Per state law, it cannot be made official for at least 20 days following the public hearing and the next meeting on Jan. 28 will not be soon enough.

The addition of the property will include 35.3 acres of single family residential space, 91.7 acres of multi-family residential, 135.2 acres of commercial and 55.5 acres of light industrial.

Potential businesses for the area include sit-down restaurants, fast food restaurants, big box retail, grocers, convenience stores, office and work space. The residential portion will include some green space with a neighborhood park and some small water areas.



ALEDO Stanley announces re-election bid

Aledo Mayor Nick Stanley declared his intention to run for a second term in a Jan. 15 announcement. In a show of unity, all members of the Aledo City Council endorsed his candidacy.

"During my tenure as mayor, we've brought positive momentum and vision to our fast-growing city primarily because we have come together as a community – residents and families of all walks of life – with a common mission to make our special part of Texas one of the most sought-after places to raise children, enjoy retirement or grow a business," Stanley said in his announcement.

"I look forward to continuing this spirit of community-wide cooperation and teamwork to maintain this high energy and achievement," Stanley added. "When I first ran for mayor, I promised to work with the city council, city management, and the community to focus on smart, well-planned growth that aligns with the wishes of Aledo families. I've kept that promise, and I firmly believe our wonderful city is improving daily."

In his announcement, Stanley listed the following city accomplishments during his first term:

• Establishing a police department — Stanley pointed to the city's growth and the need for public safety enhancement as a motivating factor that made a police department his top priority. "The Aledo Police Department is scheduled to be up

The board received thanks and recognitions, but cheerfully bestowed glowing gratitude to



"Being engaged is important for our students," Tommaney explained. "We continue to build a culture of kids who are engaged and involved. When they are engaged, they want to be here. We have the best kids you have ever seen." The board complimented Tommaney on his involvement with students in the school, with campus activities and at sporting events.

ROOted in Excellence

Assistant superintendent of academics Marie Hernandez detailed the ROOted in Excellence program and explained how the district strives to involve the parents in their student's goals by explaining to them what is available and defining expectations for honors courses. Hernandez explained how the staff is supported through advisement, meetings and personal development.

"Our job is to make sure our students have the tools to succeed and to help the staff to direct the

students to achieving their goals," Hernandes said.

Hernandez later presented the results of the 2023-24 Texas Academic Performance Report, noting graduates improved greatly in the categories of college readiness and career/military readiness. The TAPR indicates a student's ability to enter the workforce, seek a military career or continue studies into college.

Election

It was announced four school board seats will be included in the May 3 Parker County election. Places 3, 4, 5 and 6 are currently held by Adam Feriend, Greg Shaw, Weldon Wallace and Kindra Lucia. Those terms will expire by May 27. and running this year and will be led by an experienced and wellregarded police chief," Stanley said.

- Enacted policies for smart economic growth – Stanley said one of his highest priorities is protecting Aledo from substandard, low-quality development. His announcement said he "has worked with city leaders to update and adopt a Unified Development Code, resisted efforts to construct dense development, and established sound economic policies that provides the council oversight of development plans."
- Increased communication and transparency - Stanley's announcement said keeping residents and businesses informed is critical, especially in times of emergency. "The city has prioritized communications with residents by establishing a consistent and reliable presence on social media, and created 'Aledo Alert,' an optin text messaging platform to communicate with residents and business owners. These new programs have allowed the Mayor and City Council to provide more information regularly to Aledo."



- Diversified the tax base "By initiating proactive measures, the city has recruited and attracted multiple new restaurants and small businesses, which have created new jobs in our community and added significantly to our commercial tax base," the release said.
- Secured funding for the wastewater treatment plant - Stanley's announcement said the city secured more than \$27 million in state and federal funds to expand the city's wastewater treatment plant. "Our wastewater treatment plant is critical to the City's long-term success as we continue to welcome new residents and

fallen into disrepair. "By rebuilding a large portion of Bailey Ranch Road, we have improved travel conditions and public safety," Stanley said.

- Improved city parks "The City of Aledo has made a significant investment in our parks, replacing outdated and noncode-compliant equipment and investing in shade structures to better serve our community," Stanley said.

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The Texas Senate's chief budget writer said state agencies and higher education institutions have requested nearly \$25 billion in funding as the legislative session gets underway. State Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, told *The Dallas Morning News* that the requests for new money reflect the growing functions and purposes of state agencies that serve the public.

"As the state continues to grow and inflation remains an issue, one can expect that agencies may request additional funding to maintain operations," Huffman said in an email. The requests are predominantly for pay raises and new hires as state agencies deal with high turnover and pay that is not competitive with the private sector.

"I'm not surprised, overall, to see agencies continue to ask for more money to provide pay raises to stay competitive," said Rahul Sreenivasan, director of government performance and fiscal policy at Texas 2036, an Austin think tank.

Some examples: The Texas Department of Public Safety is asking for an additional \$1.58 billion to create more than 2,000 new positions, mainly for driver's license offices.

The Texas Department of Family and Protective Services wants to hire more than 600 new employees as it battles one of the highest turnover rates among state agencies.

• Texas Health and Human Services hopes to hire 1,772 new employees to check residents' eligibility for social services, such as food benefits. The Legislature begins the session with more than \$20 billion in unspent tax money.

Agencies, universities seek \$24.6 billion in new funding

increase funding to public education this session, as inflation continues to whittle away at the per-student funding level last increased in 2019. *The Austin American-Statesman* reported that new inflation-adjusted figures indicate the base level per-student – now set at \$6,160 – should be increased by \$1,400.

Inflation has eaten into the buying power of schools, especially after public education funding was not increased during the 2023 session. Bob Popinski of Raise Your Hand Texas said the public-school shortfall annually is approaching \$10 billion.

Public education funding became collateral damage during the last session because of the battle over school vouchers, which are once again under consideration. Gov. Greg Abbott has again indicated vouchers are a top priority during this session.

Water supply infrastructure also high on agenda

The Statesman reported that more than 8 million Texans live in areas affected by drought, and the infrastructure that supports the state's water supply is likely to see its funding shored up during this legislative session.

"We will leave this session with a significant sum to jumpstart water supply development and have a constitutional vote in November for perpetual funding going forward," said state Sen. Charles Perry, R-Lubbock.

Perry said that Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and numerous legislators have committed to supporting a new funding plan for water supplies. Water shortages have affected citrus growers in the Rio Grande Valley, and several fast-growing cities, such as Dripping Springs, Conroe and Magnolia, have had to put the brakes on further development.

The state is "about 25 years behind" on developing water supply, according to Perry. state's longest-serving justice with more than 35 years on the bench, Abbott appointed Jimmy Blacklock to take his place. He also appointed James P. Sullivan to take Blacklock's Place 2 seat on the state's highest civil court.

Blacklock has served on the Texas Supreme Court since January 2018. He previously served as Abbott's general counsel. Sullivan has served as the governor's general counsel since November 2021.

"The Supreme Court of Texas plays a crucial role to shape the future of our great state, and Jimmy Blacklock and James Sullivan will be unwavering guardians of the Texas Constitution serving on our state's highest judicial court," Abbott said.

Grid keeps humming during first wintry blast

The state's power grid withstood its first wintry blast last week with no major outages as snow blanketed much of West and North Texas, and heavy rains hit Central and South Texas. *The Texas Tribune* reported that energy supply comfortably exceeded demand during the latest cold snap.

Limited outages unrelated to grid capacity were reported, particularly in far Northeast Texas. Temperatures have since returned this to normal for this time of year across most of the state.

Most of the snow fell in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex and surrounding counties.

Expanded rabies vaccination program underway

The Texas Department of State Health Services has kicked off its annual Oral Rabies Vaccination Program and has expanded distribution areas to far West Texas. Parts of El Paso County and other counties bordering New Mexico are now part of the aerial drops after a new Arizona fox rabies virus variant was confirmed in Sierra County, New Mexico. "Texas has eliminated two canid rabies variants by the utilization of the Oral Rabies Vaccination Program," said Kathy Parker of DSHS. "By moving the program to now include far West Texas, DSHS is striving to protect the people and animals in that area."

More than 1 million baits are being distributed across 24 Texas border counties and far West Texas. The annual project costs about \$2.3 million and is in its 31st year.

No human cases of rabies attributable to the rabies variants targeted by the air drops have been identified since the program began.

State sets employment records in 2024

Texas again broke all records for employment in 2024 as the state again led the nation in jobs added over the past 12 months.

"The No. 1 economy in America is built by Texans," said Abbott. "Texas leads the nation in annual job creation and more Texans are working than ever before as we break record after record for total employment."

The state's workforce reached a new high of 15,536,100, while the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose a tenth of a point to 4.2%.

"After another month of job growth, the Texas labor force participation rate has reached a 10-year high, at 64.7 percent," said Texas Workforce Commission Chairman

Bryan Daniel. "This positive trend shows the strength of the Texas workforce, its employers, and its job seekers."

Blacklock named Chief Justice of Supreme Court of Texas

Following the retirement of Chief Justice Nathan Hecht, the

To most Texans, the name "Rambo" may mean little, but to Todd Compton it evokes memories from his childhood, when kinfolk spoke of 17th century ancestors who lived in what is now Philadelphia.

Peter Gunnarson Rambo (1611-1698) was most discussed, and Compton, now 52, remembers the accounts he heard in his grandmother's kitchen. His genealogical interest ignited, he didn't realize that the discussions would lead to a divine familial appointment in the summer of 2024.

Division Director of Geo-Environmental Services for Colliers Engineering and Design, he veered off course last spring during a tour of the company's area offices. He stopped at the Gloria Dei Episcopal Church, on whose grounds Rambo was buried.

He easily located the brick church, built between 1698-1703—the oldest brick structure in Philadelphia. Previously, it was a log cabin church for 20 years. He wandered around the cemetery, hoping to find a grave marker for Peter Gunnarson Rambo.

Idle American Rambos back when

Soon, he saw a lady working in a flower bed.

She, along with other Historic Gloria Dei Preservation Corporation volunteers, do what they can to maintain the church and cemetery. The location reeks of history. (Betsy Ross, the flagmaker, had a church wedding there in 1777.)

With limited time and resources, they have never-giveup attitudes, having just begun a campaign to fund further grave identification.

She confirmed that Peter and other Rambos—were buried there, him likely near the front door which now is a side entry.

Todd and his associates—"all in" for the pro bono project—went to work in September. Gloria Dei would benefit, and the initiative could be helpful in training new hires for the 40-year-old company that has 3,200 employees in 78 locations, including one near the cemetery.

Todd was on fire with interest, connecting facts with legends and hearsay. He learned that his tenth great-grandfather was a respected visionary and resolute colonist. Rambo's ship—navigating the Atlantic Ocean in 1640--had to return to Sweden twice for repairs, 136 years before there was a USA.

The grave is in a "prominent place," as had been heard, near the original front door that now is a side entry. Thanks to Colliers' ground penetrating radar, an emotional moment loomed. Todd stuck his fingers into the soil, perhaps two feet above the casket, saying, "I found you, man.... It's important for us to know that you are here, that you're still loved by your descendants, and that we're proud to have come from you."

Peter would father eight children who'd give him 37 grandchildren, and his accomplishments in what was called "New Sweden" are staggering. During his 60 years there, he helped William Penn found Philadelphia. He planted apple seeds brought from his homeland, thus explaining today's "Rambo" apples, and providing seeds for scattering by Johnny Appleseed. Rambo ultimately owned large land tracts that are now part of west and south Philadelphia.

Yes, movie star Sylvester Stallone—who played "Rambo" on the silver screen—was named for the colorful pioneers long before there was a Philadelphia Museum of Art, where Stallone later scaled the front steps triumphantly in the "Rocky" movies.

Too bad they didn't have the Rambo facts at hand 55 years ago, when Todd's father, Mike, played professional baseball for the Philadelphia Phillies.

With a "Rambo" nickname, he'd have been a crowd favorite. In 1970, the team counted greatly on catchers Mike Ryan and Tim McCarver, who sustained broken hands in the same game. Enter young Compton to catch during most of the remaining games. Once, he literally "ripped his britches," quickly donning another pair found in the club house. Turns out, they were Philly star Johnny Callison's pants, a "fun fact" that didn't make the stats.

Mike was in professional baseball for 44 years, but injuries--including 14 surgeries—ended his playing career after nine seasons. With the Phillies for 34 years, he filled numerous off-the-field roles before retiring in 2015. A highlight of the Comptons' lives has been helping dozens of Latino players learn English as a second language, with many of them earning GEDs.

I've known Mike and Jeanie both campus favorites—since their college years. Mike was catcher for the vaunted Lobo baseballers who played at historic Kokernot Field, as did the Detroit Tigers' Norm Cash, the only other Sul Ross graduate with a career in the majors.

As Sul Ross PR director, I was on the trip when the Lobos toppled nationally-ranked Arizona State University in Tempe in 1964. It was a David and Goliath day!

Unquestionably, this Tampa, FL, couple has "swung for the fences" in life, with many "grand slams." They look forward to their 60th wedding anniversary come September.

Look for her in Landman and *Lioness*

Parker County has become an increasingly popular filming destination for movies and television series in recent years, and local Medicare broker Lee Ann Miller has experienced much of it firsthand.

A mother of two from Willow Park, Miller, 59, started dabbling in the film industry six years ago, and from the moment she started she was hooked.

"In November 2019 I saw a casting call on Facebook for extras to film the movie 12 Mighty Orphans in Fort Worth and Weatherford," Miller said. "I answered the ad and signed up with a local casting agency.

"I filmed a couple of days for the movie, meeting Martin Sheen in the process. It was interesting, fun and so different from my career as a Medicare broker. I loved it. I was fascinated with the whole process and the details.

"Everything from going to hair and makeup to get the correct 1930s hairstyle and makeup, to the costume department getting the period clothes just right. I loved everything about it."

Covid and Landman

Then the COVID-19 pandemic hit a few months later and everything was placed on hold.

"When we came out of the pandemic, I started hearing about all the filming in the Fort Worth area," Miller said. "I started checking the casting agency portal and submitting my information and photos to all the projects starting up. Most were for Taylor Sheridan productions. I didn't get chosen for anything for a while."

Then the casting for Landman ramped up and Miller started getting booked for roles, appearing in several episodes.

Since all the local filming started I have

Working with greats

The Willow Park woman has also appeared in *Lioness*, and through her work on the two shows was able to work with the likes of Taylor Sheridan, Jon Hamm, Demi Moore, Billy Bob Thornton and Nicole Kidman.

Miller said the experience of working with such talented actors has been incredible.

"When we are preparing to shoot a scene and the director is working closely with the main actors I watch intently," Miller said. "Each star is a little different, but all are very focused when listening to direction, lots of back and forth with their director. I worked up close with Nicole and Billy Bob and they were so intense and in their zone about every nuance of the scene. Things like the expression on their face or the stance they are holding. They are true professionals."

Different challenge

Miller said her roles have provided a nice contrast to her job as a Medicare broker, but added she has encountered an unexpected challenge along the way.

"I found that my naturally curly hair is not something they want my characters to have," Miller said. "They have a specific vision of each character in a scene and my hair is usually not it. The details are really important to their vision for the scene. "They have to really work at taming it in the hair department. It's a constant challenge. Eventually, I learned to wear a wig and it worked out great."

Acting classes

The Parker County woman said she took acting classes all through school for fun but never pursued anything outside of that.

However, before she became a Medicare broker, she was in sales at a healthy food company startup and that included some vork in front and behind the camera.

had the privilege to work on are top-notch, with experts running the show. I feel lucky to see such accomplished professionals in action. It is fascinating to watch them in their element. You never know what each scene is going to be like so you have to be flexible.

"Each experience is different and you've gotta roll with it. You could be filming outdoors in the bitter cold and have to act like it's a hot day. Or it can be scorching hot, but you have to act like it's a cool day outside. You can't whine or complain, just gotta be professional."

Meeting a legend

One of her more memorable moments came while filming 12 Mighty Orphans when the cast members were waiting to take their places on set after a lunch break.

"I was waiting patiently on the side for directions when I turned around and saw Martin Sheen coming right towards me," Miller said. "He had the biggest smile on his face and came right up to me and shook my hand then told me his name. He was so friendly and enthusiastic. As background actors, we are professionals and do not go up to the main actors to engage them when we are between scenes. "They are working and in the zone and we should be as well. But many times the main actors will engage when we are between scenes. Most have been friendly and funny. Martin Sheen was by far the most friendly."

Fulfilling

Miller said she is always willing to play whatever part is necessary for the scene but is usually a patron of some kind, and said she feels like acting has made her life more complete and fulfilling in certain ways.

"Acting gives me a fun creative hobby that is a nice change from insurance," Miller said. "Medicare is very black and white with no gray area — it's very regulated. "Acting is more fun, creative and flexible. With acting in these productions something could change on a whim and go in a different direction than originally planned. It's fun that way. Last May I filmed a movie (not yet released) in downtown Fort Worth, and I also filmed a commercial for a large local hospital system."



Aledo teams look to take next step

Bearcats, Ladycats aim to build off success in 2024

In 2024, Aledo High School saw solid success from its soccer programs on both the boys and girls sides.

The Bearcats finished with an overall record of 14-4-6 with a 5-3-4 (fourth place) mark in District 5-5A play. Meanwhile, the Ladycats' 2024 campaign resulted in an overall record of 11-9-3 and a second-place finish in district (6-4-2).

Coincidentally, both the boys and girls recorded a bi-district playoff win followed by an area round exit.

Bearcats

As the teams are just underway for the 2025 season, sharpening skills and cultivating the talents of returning players is paramount for the boys.

"Austin Randriamahefa is a four-year letterman who scored 23 goals and 24 assists last year in 24 games - he is the engine that makes our team run," Bearcats head coach Derek Vierling said. "He is expecting to commit to a college in the next few weeks. His 2024 season is one of the best we have had at Aledo. He can score with either foot, has great balance and dribbling ability and incredible vision with pinpoint passing."

Vierling also mentioned other key contributors returning, like Cole Crawford, a senior who scored 17 goals a year ago and also was

the football team's placekicker. Also, junior Brody Gill returns to the team after he scored 19 goals and had 17 assists a season ago.

Vierling described Gill as extremely athletic and one who can dribble through a maze. Also, junior Trapper Davis, who scored 13 goals last year, brings a calm demeanor and hardware as last year's utility player of the year in the district. Along with a strong group of defenders, Pierce Ling will guard the goal and surrendered an 0.82 average per game.

Vierling and his squad have big aspirations to win the district and make a run at a state championship behind a combination of experience, offensive skill and defensive grit.

"Defensively we have 4-6 guys that played significantly last year so we should be solid defensively. Plus, we have three really good goalkeepers," Vierling said. "We have had (the motto) 'Be Champions' for some time. It encompasses everything - be a champion on and off the field."

Ladycats

The expectations will not drop in the slightest on the girls' side as this year's Ladycat squad is hungry for the same level of success. Led by head coach Bryan Johnson, Aledo will return several quality players from last year's area-round finalist squad.

Sophomore forward Ally Weimer returns after scoring 28 goals last year as a freshman while seniors Emery Thompson and Reagan

Tomlin come back to anchor the defense and serve as team captains.

Johnson praised his seniors' leadership skills as four-year starters and players who "lead by example on and off the field." He believes their work ethic and experience will only benefit the rest of his younger roster.

"The strength of this team will be our youth," Johnson said. "We are a young team that will grow as we play this season - the future is bright here in Aledo."

While the future looks bright, the present year presents a quality team that could do some damage. With that, Johnson said the team's main goal for this year is to go undefeated in district play and hoist the league championship trophy of course, while making a strong playoff run.
