Deer Creek IX development put on hold

Drainage concerns to be addressed

The biggest item on the agenda at the Jan. 16 meeting of the Annetta Town Council was the potential of replatting lots, drainage, and access to Deer Creek Phase IX. Kenmark Homes is a Dallas/Fort Worth builder that has aspirations of purchasing the development and building new homes there.

Deer Creek Phase IX was platted several years ago and was actually up for vote back in January, 2020, on the Town of Annetta South's planning and zoning meeting for the same consideration.

Mayor's office contested in May election

Gilliland files for re-election

Doyle Moss has filed for reelection as the mayor of Willow Park, a position he has held for eight years. He will also have some competition for the job as Teresa Palmer has also filed to run for the position.

"Today I filed paperwork to officially run for reelection for Mayor of our great city, Willow Park," Moss posted on his Facebook page. " Along with a great city council and staff, we have worked to make Willow Park better for our citizens."



Palmer, a 30-year-resident of the city, likewise made her announcement Thursday via Facebook, posting "Good Morning, Willow Park! Today begins with a special announcement for the community!"

Moss was first elected in 2017, his first time to hold elected office.

The last time he faced a challenger was 2019.

Also filing for re-election this past week was Chawn Gilliland to retain his seat in Place 2 on the council. Gilliland joined the council in June of 2022 to finish the term of Tyler VanSant, who was called into active Air Force Duty, and won his own election to the office unopposed in 2023.

Place 1, held by Eric Contreras, is also on the ballot in the May 3 election. As of press time, Contreras had not filed for re-election.

Contreras was appointed to the council in 2018, winning reelection unopposed in 2019, 2021 and 2023.

Honors program continues growth

Dr. Christi Cook, coordinator of Weatherford College's Honors Program, was excited to share the continued success of her students with the Board of Trustees at their meeting on Thursday, Jan. 16.

The Honors Program is in addition to honor and leadership societies on campus and boasts a diverse student population including veterans, international students, and athletes.

"We're experiencing massive transformational growth right now," Cook said. "We added 19 new students this spring, practically doubling our numbers, and we're hoping to have that same amount of growth moving forward.

When the program began in the 2021-22 academic year, 28 students participated; now there are 42.

Students in the Honors Program have 20 courses to choose from • to increase the academic rigor of their degree including psychology, •

five hours of community service each semester, and complete an honors capstone project. Students who double their number of honors courses and community service hours graduate with distinguished honors.

To date, 22 WC students have graduated from the Honors Program, two of those with distinguished honors. Four students went on to transfer into the honors college at their chosen university.

"Each of them has expressed the tiniest bit of remorse and regret that they're not with us anymore," Cook said. "That although they're succeeding and excelling, they miss the support and comfort they had in our program. That makes us feel like we're doing the right thing, and we want to continue doing that and providing that level of individual attention even as we grow."

Eagle Scout project improves Dawson-Hackett Cemetery

Crosses placed at gravesites, overlook seating installed

Hudson Oaks, TX - Early on a recent Saturday morning, more than two dozen members of Scout Troop 75, under the direction of Evie Banis, gathered at Dawson-Hackett Cemetery. Banis, a student at Aledo High School, had chosen a project at this cemetery to earn her Eagle Scout badge. It was a multifaceted project that included heavy brush and tree trimming, digging out and discarding large amounts of yucca and cactus, placing crosses at gravesites, erecting a kiosk, and installing a stepped seating area halfway up a bluff overlooking the cemetery.

All this took planning. Banis visited the site several times to determine the scope of the project, assembled a list of materials (including lunch), tools and personnel, obtained funding, and then submitted the plan to a review board. Once the board approved the plan, she began implementing it by first visiting Lowes, which kindly

arranged for some preferential pricing of the materials.

Banis provided leadership throughout the day, assigning tasks as workload requirements shifted. By mid-afternoon, the project was completed much to the satisfaction of all.

The Abandoned Cemetery Association of Parker County issued a statement that it "greatly appreciates Ms. Banis choosing this project to preserve and enhance this historic Black cemetery. The ACA has no doubt she will obtain her Eagle Scout badge for her meticulous planning and commitment. She will be the third young lady in Parker County to earn this distinction."

George Dawson (1842-1913) set aside the land for this cemetery in 1906. His wife, Lucy (1847-1905), had died the year before and had been buried there. Other burials probably pre-date 1906. So far as is known, there are at least 21 burials.

The Dawson's farmed a couple hundred acres in this area, raising their 13 children here. It was at the behest of two of their descendants who suggested a seating area for rest and contemplation of the significant challenges their forebears surmounted.

A previous Eagle Scout project built a fence around the cemetery.

"After looking at this plat and listening to the presentation, I have some major concerns with the proposed drainage," Causey said. "There are two designated run-off lots that are extremely close to established homes and could become a future problem."

The plat has 47 home sites at a minimum of two acres each. Also, another concern was the amount of heavy-duty traffic from construction and the future installation of 47 water wells that would need to be tapped into the current water supply for the city.

Councilman Shane Mudge expressed his concern about the addition of the water wells.

The News reported that the official recommendation of a reservoir project in no way guarantees its construction. The permitting process at the state and federal levels likely will take decades. Cost to build the 66,000-acre lake is now estimated at more than \$7 billion.

Abbott floats notion of buying water from **Houston for West Texas**

Abbott and Houston Mayor John Whitmire reportedly have been in initial talks to sell the city's "excess" water to West Texas, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Whitmire, a longtime state senator before being elected mayor, told the *Chronicle* that he was open to the idea if it means the city can get much-needed infrastructure funding, calling it potentially a "win-win."

Cities and businesses operating in the Permian Basin are calling for more access to water as their aquifers run low after decades of unrestricted drilling. However, a recent State Water Plan predicts the 15-county region that includes Houston could itself run short of water for municipal needs by 2030.

Whitmire said the city could build new reservoirs to hold water sold to the state in exchange for funding to fix its crumbling infrastructure.

The city needs about \$15 billion just to fix its water pipes and build a new water purification plant. Houston has lost 36 billion gallons of water in the past two years - enough to supply the entire city of Fort Worth, with 900,000 people, with water for a year.



Ken Paxton's campaigns, was the focus of a federal investigation. Allegations that Paxton improperly used his office to help Paul thwart the probes led to the attorney general's impeachment in the House in 2023 on 20 counts of improperly accepting gifts and favors from the developer. Paxton was acquitted in the Texas Senate.

Investigators said Paul underreported his total debt and overreported his cash on hand in order to obtain loans to buy commercial properties.

Fatal occupational injury report released

A total of 564 workers died on the job in 2023, according to the Texas Department of Insurance's annual report, down slightly from the previous year. Most of the fatalities occurred in the private sector – 93%.

The trade, transportation, and utilities industry, both private and public sector, reported the most fatalities at 183. During the same period 126 construction workers died on the job.

The number of worker fatalities has not changed markedly in the past five years, according to TDI.

Air in 12 counties exceeded federal soot standards

A dozen Texas counties have recently exceeded federal air quality standards for particulate matter, also called soot, The Texas *Tribune* reported.

However, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality is recommending that eight of those counties be excluded from stricter federal pollution rules because of either faulty air monitoring data or "exceptional events," such as wildfires and dust storms.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency last year cut the permitted level of particulate matter from 12 to 9 micrograms per cubic meter annually. It is considered the deadliest form of air pollution.

TCEQ has proposed that four counties - Dallas, Harris, Tarrant, and Bowie - be declared out of attainment. The other eight counties that exceed the new limit would be allowed to avoid the tougher standards. Those are Travis, Montgomery, Kleberg, Harrison, Ellis, Webb, Hidalgo and Cameron counties.



Former Bearcat living life of adventure on bikes

In his own words, Dan Hardick hasn't gone far and he's gone to a lot of places.

The 2003 Aledo graduate now lives just a few miles down the road. However, his life has taken him to places all over the globe.

"When people ask me what I do, I ride motorcycles and I talk to people," Dan said.

Dan is more than a Harley Davidson enthusiast. He has some legendary stories to tell, and loves doing so on his Danger Dan's Talk Shop podcast.

Among the many motorcycles he owns, one of his five Harleys is on display in the Harley Davidson Museum in Milwaukee.

"There are so many beautiful

enough area to ride them," he said. "I think somebody brought a PW 50 over, other friends' motorcycles.

"My dad was so against me riding. He had a couple friends die on motorcycles when he was young."

Now, his dad, Jim Hardick, is one of his son's biggest fans, though he admits holding his breath still when it comes to some of Dan's rides.

"Some of the stuff he does as he rides, I can't watch it," Jim said. "The Himalayas, the tip of Mexico. Some of the places he rides are not for the faint of heart."

First dirt bike

"I just progressed. I got bigger, my friends got bigger and so did our dirt bikes," Dan recalled.

Hardicks also have a second son, 9-year-old Brack.

Katie and their sons will sometimes join Dan on his adventures.

"They travel with me when they can, but they've got lives of their own," he said. "I try not to be gone more than two weeks a month."

Podcast

The Danger Dan's Talk Shop podcast began from his biking adventures. Along the way he would meet folks in motorcycle shops, making friends and hearing some interesting stories.

Editor's note: The podcast contains explicit language.

"For a long time I just had a 1959 Harley Davidson Chopper. I rode that all over the country," he said. "Riding a bike that's 60 years old, you have to constantly be working on it, and I would constantly be finding shops all over the country.

Autry is now 12 years old. The a lot of fun to do and people really enjoyed them.

> "Then, I started getting some 'cease and desist' letters. I think the first came from Bob Dylan's attorney, or somebody related to whatever entity owns the Bob Dylan songs.

"I realized I can't just put people's music on the podcast."

Of course, the podcasts have continued, as have his interactions with what Dan calls some amazing people. His list of conversations/ interviews range from the CEO of Harley Davidson to "some guy I met on the side of the road who was peddling his bike across the country to meet a girl."

Then, there was a unique connection in a foreign country with another motorcycle lover of a difcustom motorcycles, my name got thrown in the mix," he said.

But it wasn't a done deal at first. The museum asked Dan if they could display his Chopper.

"I said there's no way I'm going to let you have my Chopper. I can't go without it," he said, still with emphasis.

But a deal was worked out.

"He liked the look of this 1994 Sportster I built to race in the Mint 400 (a motorcycle race near Las Vegas)," he said. "I was going to ride it in South America, then 2020 happened (the Covid 19 pandemic)."

Musical doppelganger

If you look up Dan Hardick on the internet, you might also come across Dan Hardick and a popular band out of Oklahoma. They are not

places in this country. Mexico is one of my favorite places to go," Dan said. "The food's great, expenses are great, the people are incredibly nice and it's right next door.

"I can leave my front door in Tin Top, Texas and be at the bottom of Copper Canyon in a little more than two days travel time."

Getting started

Dan credits his education in Aledo with getting it all started.

"What's really helped me out in my career is a video tech class I took at Aledo High School with Mrs. (Karen) Paul. Her husband (Joey Paul) was the band director," he said. "I still use all that stuff every day. I can't thank her enough — and Aledo for having a video tech class to take."

His family moved to Aledo in 1995 from Grand Prairie. Of course, he played football until his sophomore year. He also marched in the band and played in the drum line - a talent he still puts to regular use today.

And he stood out from the norm, so to speak.

"I rode skateboards, rebelled against everything. That's what I did," he said with a smile.

He also fell in love with motorcycles.

"I first started riding as soon as I moved out to Aledo and there was

Dan got his first dirt bike from a friend of the family while he was growing up in Aledo.

"My friend's mom knew I needed a vehicle and she hooked me up with her deceased husband's Suzuki Savage 450," he recalled. "I rode that around for few years with no license, registration, or insurance for a few years.

"Then I went down a different path and traded it for a bag of drugs and a gun."

Straightening out

For a while Dan actually had no bike – and his life had some challenging questions. Then he met his wife Katie and they began plans for a family.

Dan decided to make some major changes in his life. He took a job working on a drilling rig in Wyoming to save money for having their baby.

"I decided to get my [act] together," he said.

But he couldn't stay away from motorcycles, the other big love in his life. Plus, he wanted his son to see his true image.

"I had a bunch of money socked up and before he was born, I decided I didn't want to look like a [wuss] in front of my son and not have a motorcycle, so I went and bought my first Harley," he said. "I've been riding them ever since."

"They were just great people. This is what I came up with to give back to those guys. You've got to have these independent shops to keep these bikes on the road. There's so many Harley Davidsons out there."

Dan also highlights shops through his business MC Shop T's. He distributes them to subscribers, along with giving boxes to the shops themselves.

"It's like a T-shirt of the month club, but I feature a different motorcycle shop every month," he described. "Every couple of years I throw in a Danger Dan's Talk Shop T-shirt. I don't really sell any Danger Dan merchandise."

Favorite podcasts

"Some of my favorite ones I call 'The Road Shows," Dan said. "When I used to travel with that 1959 Chopper, I would just pull my phone out as things would happen on the road and record stuff. I would mix music in."

Well, for a while he mixed music. "I was almost like a DJ, really, picking my favorite songs, whatever was going through my head during that trip," he said. "They were

ferent kind.

"I met a Mexican when I was down in Peru whose family was a motorcycle circus stunt team," Dan said. "He had these incredible photographs."

Harley Davidson Museum

Dan has a motorcycle in the Harley Davidson Museum. He and his family recently took a trip there during the holidays to see it on display.

"It was a surprise to find out it was there. I said, 'Let's go, let's take the grandkids," Jim said. "Dan's on video talking about it.

"I never thought I'd have a kid with a bike in the Harley Museum. There's so much history connected to Harley there, the first one ever made, an Evil Knievel exhibit. It was just so cool seeing it all and knowing Dan's bike was among it all."

As to how the bike ended up there, Dan said it began a few years ago when he was in Milwaukee working with the annual Mama Tried Motorcycle Show.

"It was put on by a guy named Warren and another guy named Scott who have become good friends of mine. They work directly with Harley Davidson, as do I, and when the museum reached out to Scott and Warren about creating a Mama Tried exhibit and bringing in some

the same Dan, but they are related.

"My dad's brother is Dan Hardick and has a band called Finger Pistols," he said.

However, Dan does still play drums in his own band, Outbound Train. They play motorcycle shops, skate parks, and as Danger Dan said some of the crowds are "freaking huge."

'We don't do it for a living, so we try to curate the funnest places to play," he said.

In fact, last year Dan said Outbound Train even went on tour.

'We played a penitentiary in Boise, Idado, then we toured back to Texas on the Choppers, riding our motorcycles to a different show every night," he recalled. "I just mapped out the coolest route, the most scenic route, from Boise to Dallas, and then I found bars in motorcycle shops along the way.

Bearcats take down Brewer for league lead

Ladycats fall just short in close contest By Geoff Heppes The Community News

The Aledo Bearcats and Ladycats basketball teams hosted respective teams from the mighty Brewer basketball program Jan. 14 in front of a packed crowd of fans. Both contests had major implications in the District 5-5A race.

The energy was palpable and the games did not disappoint as the Ladycats tipped off first followed by the boys. In the end, the Ladycats' late rally came up just short in a 50-46 defeat while the boys collected an impressive victory over the Bears by a final score of 64-56 to take sole possession of first place in district.

Bearcats

For the boys squad, the win over Brewer was momentous as it was Aledo's first victory over the Bears since the teams were placed in the same district in the 2020-21 season.

"It's big for these guys - it's not as deep-rooted for me individually - but I'm really happy for them," Bearcats head coach Brian Blackburn said. "These guys have been working really hard and I know these guys really wanted this win."

The long-coveted win has also provided a huge boost for Aledo

(22-4 overall), who earned a 6-0 record through the first half of district play.

"It feels amazing and we're just ready to move on to the next game and get that same momentum going against Chisholm Trail," star senior guard Joaquin Pacheco said. "We're undefeated through the first round of district - we're just ready for anything."

The teams competed through a first quarter that ended with Brewer and Aledo deadlocked at 16 points apiece. The Bearcats controlled the action through most of the second quarter - highlighted by strong play from junior post Townes Van Huysen down low, who had two key putback layups during the middle of the frame. Brewer ended the first half on a 4-0 spurt that gave the Bears a 31-30 advantage at intermission.

Then, Aledo used its playmaking and togetherness to turn things in its favor.

"I think it's awesome how each player has an individual role and they don't stray away from it," Pacheco said. "We were a really good team last year, but everyone really knows their assignments this year to the best of their abilities. Coach (Blackburn) is the best coach I've ever played for, and he's been making sure everyone knows their

roles - I give him a lot of the credit with where we're at."

Sophomore guard Caden Cunningham got Aledo within 34-33 after drilling a 3-pointer with 6:42 left in the third. Moments later. Pacheco drained a triple of his own at the 5:02 mark to trim Brewer's lead to 39-36. Then, backto-back buckets from Van Huvsen and Enrique Pacheco pulled Aledo to within 41-40 with 2:27 to go.

After that, junior guard Kaiden Clayborn spearheaded a key sequence that Blackburn called "the deciding factor."

First, Clayburn splashed a 3-pointer with 1:44 left that gave Aledo the lead back at 43-41. Then, he drew a charge with a minute left before Joaquin Pacheco completed an acrobatic 3-point play through traffic to boost Aledo's lead to 46-41 entering the fourth quarter.

For good measure, Pacheco hit nothing but net from outside the arc just 17 seconds into the fourth

quarter that increased the lead to 49-41. Aledo led by as many as 10 points while Brewer could not get closer than five the rest of the way.

"I think it gives everyone confidence knowing that we've now beaten every team in our district," Pacheco said. "Getting our first district championship this place has ever seen would be something really amazing to contribute to."

While the start to the district portion of the season has been nothing short of impressive, the process and diligence from the players has been admirable in the eyes of the coaching staff, where players have taken on plenty of extra homework off the hardwood.

"We may give them a scouting report, but they have to read it. We may send them some video clips from Hudl, but they have to watch the film on their own - that's what champions do and I think that's what separates them right now," Blackburn said. "We'll go over stuff with the guys but it's really their team - we'll just facilitate a successful game plan, they just have to understand it. I told them I would treat them like a college team ... everything that we do is based off stuff I learned as a player at Texas A&M, and they are able to buy into this process based on the aspirations they have."

Pacheco led the charge with a game-high 30 points while Van Huysen added 14 points. Clayborn scored eight points for Aledo while Enrique Pacheco and Cunningham each finished with six points.

In addition to the varsity victory, the ninth grade squad won 58-40 while the junior varsity suffered a 71-61 defeat. No individual scorers were available.

The Bearcats were playing at Chisholm Trail at press time in a battle of the league's top two teams. They host Keller Fossil Ridge Friday, Jan. 24 at 8 p.m.

Meanwhile, the Ladycats put on a show for their home fans as well in spite of the loss. The Ladycats battled closely with Brewer similar to the seven-point road loss, but the improvement on offense and defense was evident.

The loss left Aledo (16-11 overall) tied for second in district with Butler found Elms inside for a score

a 5-2 record, both losses coming to the Lady Bears.

"The first time we played them we lost by seven, had a ton of turnovers and didn't execute well while their two best players combined for 40 (points)," Ladycats head coach Donnie Ott said. "Today, we held them to 27 between the two of them and only lost by four. I love the way they responded to start the second half, too, in using that 8-0 run to take the lead back. It may not be a win on the scoreboard, but it's a win for us and this program. The crowd was packed and very energetic - it was a great and entertaining basketball game."

Even though it was five points short of a win, the game will not inhibit Aledo's ability to continue to contend in its district or make a strong playoff run.

"With the new format of UIL, this game doesn't have much bearing on our playoff standings – we're playing the long game," Ott said. "It has a bearing on the district championship, but it's definitely not the end of the world for us."

Aledo hung close with Brewer early and often as Aledo remained within 14-11 at the end of the first quarter. In the second quarter, senior post Kinley Elms hit a lavup with 4:46 left that cut the deficit to 16-14 and scored again on the block with 3:29 to go to cut the visitors' lead to 20-16. After that, junior guard Elizabeth Griffin drove to the basket and scored with 1:39 and followed that layup with a long ball at the 1:02 mark that made it a 24-21 deficit. Brewer scored once more to enter halftime with a 26-21 advantage.

Then, Aledo owned the third quarter.

Aledo exploded out of the gates on an 8-0 run – a layup from Elms, a baseline floater by Griffin and transition scores from sophomore Brooklyn Dempsey and junior Tiara Butler had Aledo out in front 29-26 with 5:39 left. Later, Brewer continued to creep closer - eventually tying the score at 29-all – but a nice layup by Butler with 1:08 and a buzzer-beating 3-pointer from senior guard August Carlone gave the Ladycats a 34-33 edge entering the fourth.

Aledo held a 36-33 lead after

with 6:53 left, but Brewer responded with a 9-0 run to take a 42-36 lead that they would not relinquish. Aledo managed to get as close as 45-43 after Dempsey split a pair of free throws with 1:59 remaining but could not wrestle the lead back in the end.

"We've got to work on late game situations like trapping out of inbound sets and not fouling 3-point shooters," Ott said. "Offensively, they took Liz (Elizabeth Griffin) out late in the game to put the pressure on our other guards, so we will need to be more efficient there. There is a lot that we can learn and grow from and this game is going to be huge for making us better in the long term."

Griffin led the way with a teamhigh 18 points while Elms scored 10. Butler added nine while Carlone (6) and Dempsey (3) combined for nine more points.

Furthermore, the JV and ninth grade Ladycat teams scored big in the win column in their respective wins over Brewer. The JV team won 46-6 behind 10 points from Sarah Edwards while the freshman squad recorded a 53-8 victory behind 22 points from Bailey Martin and 12 from Sonsoles Rosado.

At press time, the Ladycats were playing at Chisholm Trail. Friday, Jan. 24, they host Keller Fossil Ridge at 6:15 p.m. in a game that could decide second place in district.

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

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


