Contreras, Allen to vie for Place 1 on council

Join mayor's race in being contested

Park City Council. For the first time since 2019 he will have an opponent in David Allen.

Contreras has held Place 1 since 2018 when he was first appointed. winning After re-election in a contested election in 2019, he ran unopposed in 2021 and 2023.

Contreras joins Mayor Doyle Moss and Place 2 Council Member Chawn Gilliland in also running for re-election.

Moss has held his office since 2017

and last faced a challenger in 2019, winning that year and repeating in unopposed elections in 2021 and 2023. He is challenged this year by Teresa Palmer and Catherine Davis.

Gilliland was appointed to office in 2022 and won his own election in 2023. As of press time no one had filed to run against him this year.

Council approves final annexation of Beall-Dean property

Multi-faceted development planned

Months of analysis, research, and meetings came to a conclusion Feb. 11 with the unanimous approval from the Willow Park City Council to annex 317 acres of Dean Ranch at the southwest corner of Interstate 20 and Highway 1187. The land along the main road into Aledo will be a multifunction commercial and residential development.

After the vote, city manager Bryan Grimes leaned into his microphone and gave a hardy, "Welcome to Willow Park, Mr

Beard leaving **Bearcats**

QB transferring to All Saints

One season after being the starting quarterback for the Aledo Bearcats, Gavin Beard is leaving the program to trans-

fer to Fort Worth All Saints, Bearcats head coach Robby Jones announced.

Beard, a junior, previously attended All Saints for one year in the eighth grade, but returned to Aledo his freshman year. He could not be

reached for a comment about his decision to leave the Aledo program.

All Saints won the Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools Division II state championship last season, finishing 14-0.

Beard quarterbacked the Bearcats into the Class 5A Division I state quarterfinals this season. Despite missing two games early in the season with a back injury, he completed 69% of his passes for 2,573 yards with 35 touchdowns and five interceptions.

He was named first team Class 5A Division I All-State by the Padilla Poll.

Beard was key in Aledo finishing 12-2and winning the District 3-5A Division I championship. It was their 17th consecutive league title dating to 2008 as they extended their national-record district winning streak to 127 games.

With Beard leaving, the starting quarterback position is going to feature several players battling for the position come spring ball. Jones noted two strong quarterbacks who will be vying for the starting job.

Lincoln Tubbs, who will be a senior next season, came into games throughout the season as a wildcat quarterback to give the team an additional running threat.

"Lincoln just ran a 4.53 40 (yard dash) time in our first offseason test, so he would bring quite a bit of speed back to the quarterback position," Jones said. "Lincoln has provided some early leadership this offseason with his tremendous work ethic."

In limited play at the position in 2024, Tubbs rushed for 48 yards and a pair of touchdowns on 10 carries.

Nash McElree, who will be a junior next season, started the two games Beard missed and led the Bearcats to two victories. For the season he was 37-of-49 (76%) passing for 500 yards with seven touchdowns and a pair of interceptions, along with rushing 22 times for 75 yards.

"Nash McElree has a very strong arm and proved last year that he can win games with starts against Lancaster and Brewer," Jones said. "Nash has been in basketball for the first part of the offseason and we look forward to getting him back with us as subvarsity basketball season comes to a close.

"Spring ball is going to be extremely important for us this year to see which quarterback establishes himself as the frontrunner. It could even be something that will continue into the start of the season because both players are very talented."

Education key to Soontornvat's literary recognition

New York Times best-selling author cites WISD education

Christina Soontornvat is quick to credit her Parker County experiences for her love and talent of writing. The 1998 Weatherford High School graduate's energetic, positive personality is reflected in many characters of her children's novels and her perspective of historical events has earned her awards in non-fiction as well.

Targeting primarily children and middle-grade students, her more than two dozen volumes educate, entertain, and charm students of all ages.

The star characters in her books are often autobiographical, including two novels, The Tryout and The Squad.

"Oh, yes. It's a memoir," the author said. "It's about growing up in Weatherford, middle school, and trying out for cheerleader. All of it is true."

Soontornvat mentions teachers Janis Smith and Charles Carroll among the educators that touched her life. Carroll teaches Weatherford High School AP English and Composition, and literature instructor Smith is retired from WISD

and is the director of communications for Manna Storehouse in Weatherford.

"Christina was a phenomenal reader and writer, although I think she was strong in all academic areas. Her university major would certainly indicate that," Carroll said of his former student. "I am flattered Christina considers me a positive influence on her development as a writer. She is a funny, insightful, intuitive person who shared her ideas and perspectives in extraordinarily effective prose."

Soontornvat received what she calls a world-class education in Weatherford where the teachers encourage and push students to be their best.

The author is not limited to encouraging and motivating students through storytelling. In 2018, a monsoon trapped a teen-aged soccer team and their coach deep in the Tham Lang cave system of Soontornvat's ancestral Thailand for 18 days, and the writer's research and report of the incident in her book, All Thirteen, earned a 2021 Kirkus Prize plus nine other literary honors.

Along with the New York Times bestselling novel The Tryout, other Soontornvat titles include The Ramble Shamble Children, To Change a Planet, and Diary of an Ice Princess. It was announced at the





acres of multi-family residential, 135.2 acres of commercial and 55.5 acres of light industrial. Eateries, both take-out and sit-down dining, are among the plans, as is a public park and walking/biking trails.

The City of Fort Worth relinquished the property from its extraterritorial jurisdiction because they could not provide utilities to the area, whereas Willow Park could. Businesses are anticipated to open 12-18 months after the utilities are finished, and the city reported the estimated value of the development at full buildout to be \$500 million. The development is expected to roughly double the city's current sales tax collection.

Park survey completed

City marketing director Rose Hoffman reported an extensive survey seeking input from the public about city parks has been completed. Her department will begin assimilating the information for future presentation to the council. Hoffman said highlights of public wants and concerns include playground equipment, walking

restrooms.

Hoffman detailed how every means possible was taken to give residents a voice in the matter, including multiple social media outlets, the city's website, an announcement in The Community News, and flyers distributed to residents and posted in public.

"Did we do everything we could to get a scientific analysis and response from the public? Yes, we did," Hoffman concluded.

Mayor pro-tem Lea Young said the next steps to park improvements and expansions will include designing conceptual plans, obtaining quotes and estimates, and bringing the results to the board for financial approval.

Police chief hunt

The board approved the forming of a committee to find and hire a new police chief. Daniel Franklin resigned from the post in January and Quincy Hamilton, who has been with the department since 2021, is serving as interim police chief.

Council members Eric Contreras and Chawn Gilliland, along with Mayor Dovle Moss, were chosen to be on the search committee. Council member Nate

Voucher bill passes Senate, arrives in House

A bill to implement school vouchers in Texas sailed through the Senate largely on party lines last week and now awaits consideration in the House, the Austin American-Statesman reported. House Speaker Dustin Burrows, R-Lubbock, said he believes there are enough votes in that chamber to pass the legislation, which was defeated a half-dozen times in 2023 by a coalition of Democratic and rural Republican members.

"As Speaker, I'm committed to ensuring the agenda of the Texas House remains truly member-driven this session," Burrows said in a statement. "I support empowering parents to decide the best educational option for their children."

The bill's supporters, which include Gov. Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and other top elected officials, say it would give students access to more school choices. Opponents fear the \$1 billion program will siphon funding and students away from public schools already facing budget deficits.

The political director of the Texas Freedom Network said legislators should focus on funding public schools instead.

"Voucher schemes steal vital funds from kids in our neighborhood schools, all so megadonors and the politicians in their pockets can subsidize private and religious schools for the wealthy at our expense," Rocìo Fierro-Pérez said.

bbott outlines his legislative priorities

Abbott outlined his legislative priorities in a speech last Sunday. Besides school vouchers, he wants state lawmakers to cut property taxes by \$10 billion, launch a massive water project to ensure adequate supplies, and restrict bail for a number of crimes, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Other priorities include pay raises for teachers and investment in nuclear energy as a way to "fortify" the state's electric grid.

Abbott is backing a plan by state Sen. Charles Perry, R-Amarillo, which would invest in several large projects to increase the state's water supply. Among the projects are desalination plants and a network of pipelines to distribute water.

"We will make the largest investment in water in the history of Texas," Abbott said. "We will tap into new water supplies and repair pipes to save billions of gallons of water each year."

The Democratic response to Abbott's State of the State address blasted the governor for being too friendly with President Trump and billionaire Elon Musk, who is leading an effort to eliminate federal government waste and inefficiency.

"The fact is people are struggling after 30 years of Republican rule," Gilberto Hinojosa, the former Democratic Party chair, said in the response.

Dairy, poultry producers grapple with bird flu

By now, most everyone has noticed the steep rise in the price of eggs, which is being blamed on the spread of avian flu, first detected in a flock of pheasants in Erath County nearly three years ago, the *Texas Standard* reported.

"It's a supply-and-demand issue," said J.C. Essler, executive vice president of the Texas Poultry Federation. "When we're putting multiple flocks down, and our layer operations can be up to a million birds, you're taking a substantial supply out of the market."

Thus far in Texas, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have confirmed 14 cases of bird flu at poultry farms, only one of which was at a large-scale farm with 2 million chickens. There have been 27 confirmed cases at Texas dairy farms.

The potential economic impact could be huge if bird flu continues to spread in the state. The poultry industry contributes more than \$5 billion to the state economy annually, while dairy operations add \$53.8 billion.

One longtime researcher of bird flu at Texas A&M University

said he didn't expect the virus to spread from human to human; 67 cases of it being transmitted to humans from poultry or cattle have been recorded, including one in Texas. One death has been reported.

"If we ever start seeing human-to-human transmission, that tells us the virus is adapting to humans," said Gerald Parker, associate dean for Global One Health at A&M. "That would not be a good sign."

State struggling to fix leaky abandoned oil wells

Abandoned oil wells turned into water sources are threatening aquifers that supply water to cities, farms and ranches, the Statesman reported, particularly in rural West Texas where oil exploration began nearly a century ago. The leaky wells are called P-13 wells after a Texas Railroad Commission form that allowed them to be repurposed to provide water.

The state has recorded 1,915 P-13 wells, though many more likely exist undetected and undocumented. They have the potential to become environmental disasters. One example is the 60-acre Lake Boehmer in Pecos County, formed by a leaky well. It emits high concentrations of hydrogen sulfide, a potentially fatal gas.

The state committed \$10 million to plugging the leaky wells in 2023, but two years later none of that money has been distributed. Even that amount, whenever it is actually spent, is likely inadequate to solve the problem, since plugging a single well can cost hundreds of thousands of dollars.

"We do not know how much it will cost to plug each well, so we cannot determine how many wells could be plugged under this program," said Ricky Richter, a spokesperson for TCEQ. Federal funds that are being used to plug orphan gas and oil wells can't be used for P-13 wells, since they are no longer considered oil wells.

Abbott backs legalizing sports gambling in Texas

Abbott recently said on the Texas Take Podcast that he has no objection to Texas joining 39 other states that have legalized sports betting, the San Antonio Express-News reported.

"I don't have a problem with online sports betting," Abbott said in the interview. "The reality is that I'd be shocked if there were not some Texans that do it already."

A coalition of major sports franchises including the Dallas Cowboys, San Antonio Spurs and Houston Astros have teamed up with several sports gaming companies to push for legalized sports gambling. They have hired more than a dozen lobbyists and have tapped former Gov. Rick Perry and Houston Rockets owner Tilman Fertitta to help make their pitch to legislators to pass such a measure. The issue ultimately would require voters to approve a constitutional amendment.

A quarter for your thoughts?

Economists have suggested for years that we'd be better served if the U.S. Mint ceased turning out pennies--the nation's lowest denominational coin. Though some 140 billion pennies remain in circulation--many in jars, under sofa cushions, on sidewalks or playgrounds--their demise will be gradual.

With cost-cutting the order of the day, why should we mint coins that cost three cents each to make?

Hoarders--I am told--are combing through garage sales, seeking piggy banks--long considered depositories for pennies--anticipating their becoming collectors' items. A clue is that at such sales, prices for piggy banks now are negotiated upwards.

The penny--introduced in 1793--became "Lincolnesque" when "Honest Abe's" likeness was struck thereon in 1909, the 100th anniversary of his birth.

It's a sad prospect, really, but pennies don't buy much anymore. You'll need a pocketful to buy McDonald's coffee, and at Starbucks, take a wheelbarrow.

"Penny" will remain a cute girls' name, but it won't buy anyone else's thoughts that are now going for a quarter or more, and sometimes even priceless.

I--and likely a few million others--have stopped in our tracks for decades to claim grounded pennies. General disregard for their meager value--coupled with the exertion of bending over-have lessened the practice.

It's been several years since I've picked one up. Should I be tempted by a quarter, however, I may stick a wad of chewing gum on my cane for, uh "bendless retrieval."

If anyone is watching, I may use store-bought "stick-um."

Pennies, long romanticized, have mobilized folks to embark on noble causes, promoting "one for all and all for one" projects.

Glenn Dromgoole, who spent more than 30 years in newspapering--mostly as editor of the Abilene Reporter News--is a recognized author, now having penned 35 books. This friend of almost 60 years wrote The Power of a Penny back in 1999.

His 35 books--several on best-seller lists--can't be put

down once picked up, unlike mine, which can't be picked up when put down.

Years ago at an overnight East speaking Texas engagement, someone broke my car window, I assumed to access the case of books on the back seat.

He or she opened the case, took one copy and tossed it on the sidewalk near my motel room

Now that's a discerning reader right there.

One great "penny story" has been shared for decades in Snyder, TX, where a fidgety youngster attended church regularly.

Every Sunday, his mom refused to let him join the "march to the penny jar" at the altar.

That's where children--largely pre-schoolers--dropped pennies for missionaries on Sundays nearest their birthdays,

The youngster was barely three years old when he first noticed the practice. Several months away from his fourth birthday, he squirmed each Sunday to participate, his eligibility be hanged.

Finally, his fourth birthday Sunday arrived, and his mother set him free to take his four pennies to the

> Racing forward, he rang the rafters with an unlikely "unchurchy" expression: "Hi yo, Silver, here I come!"

Had Dromgoole come across the Snyder story when he wrote about pennies, I'm sure he would have "scooped" me. But this one time, I am first, as far as I know.

The Power of a Penny, by the way, is still available, prominently displayed at the Texas Star Trading Company in Abilene. Multiple copies sold last year, and it'll likely continue to be offered for years to come.

After all, Dromgoole and his wife, Carol, have run the business for 20 years and still accept coins--even buckets of pennies--as legal tender. If Glenn is minding the store, he'll offer a plethora of thoughts at no charge. Come to think of it, he may offer you a penny or two for yours.



"We're thinking about that. I hope we can make it happen," Taylor said.





Ladycats claim bi-district title over Birdville

Move on to face Timberview

HALTOM CITY - With the regular season in the rear view window, Aledo's varsity Ladycats kicked off their 2025 playoff run with a dominant performance against Birdville to claim their Class 5A Division II bi-district contest on Monday, Feb. 10.

A second-half flurry by Aledo (22-11 overall, 10-2 in District 5-5A, second place) allowed them to put some distance between themselves and the Lady Hawks (12-18, 6-6 in District 6-5A, third) as they cruised to a 16-point victory, 53-37.

"I feel really, really good," firstyear Ladycat coach Donnie Ott said after the game. "We've got to clean some things up defensively that I would've liked to have done better that exposed us a little bit. It's good. You want those things, as coaches, to continue to work and improve your team. But I was just so proud of their effort."

The start of the game resembled more of a three-point contest during an all-star weekend with the two teams trading volleys from beyond the three-point line. Birdville opened the scoring with a three-pointer. Aledo's junior point guard Liz Griffin answered right back with a long ball of her own to make it a 3-3 affair early.

The Lady Hawks knocked down another three-pointer on the ensuing possession to make it 6-3

with neither team having attempted a shot from inside the arc.

Then the Ladycats began to find their rhythm.

Since transferring to Aledo from Virginia last summer, Tiara Butler has become a cornerstone of the Ladycat basketball team at both ends of the floor. Monday night was no exception. Butler claimed her first basket of the night with 5:13 left in the first quarter, thrashing around in the paint to score a tough bucket to bring Aledo within one of Birdville.

After the Aledo defense forced a turnover, Griffin earned three the hard way, taking a hard shot as she drove the lane for a layup. The shot scored, putting Griffin at the charity stripe where she converted the free throw to give the Ladycats their first lead of the game.

Birdville answered back to tie the game at 8-8 with 3:51 left in the first quarter. However, that was as close as the Lady Hawks would get to the lead the rest of the way. In the remaining three and a half minutes in the first quarter, Aledo outpaced Birdville 11-5.

Griffin remained hot as she knocked down a pair of threes to put the Ladycats up by a half dozen forcing the Lady Hawks to take their first timeout of the game with 3:20 left in the first and the score 14-8 in favor of the Ladycats.

As play resumed Butler drew a hard foul in the paint before knocking down both free throws. A minute later August Carlone came off the bench, got a good




In the 200 free relay, they set a school record with a clocking of 1:41.57, dropping 4.88 seconds off their district time.

"The standard does not change year to year," Barry said. "The goal every season is to get to the state tournament. This group seems to be taking that goal and running with it."




