Reopening plan for Emanuel County Schools

The Emanuel County School District believes that in-person instruction is best for student learning while acknowledging that the threat of COVID-19 has challenged the ability to provide face-to-face instruction as the sole method for teaching children. The district understands that anything less than a full-time, in-person school schedule strains many parents who have to go to work and cannot be home with their children. The district also recognizes that because of medically fragile students, at-risk family members, or other issues, some families may not be comfortable returning to a traditional classroom until a vaccine for COVID-19 is widely available or until the risk of COVID-19 diminishes.

With that noted, for the 2020-2021 school year, the district will offer families the following options:


- 1. **Traditional schooling,** following guidelines based upon Georgia's Path to Recovery for K-12 Schools that protect the health and well-being of students and staff as much as possible, or
- **2. Virtual learning** from home, ECS Virtual Academy, emphasizing that the

level of instruction and learning expectations will be equal to a traditional schooling environment.

The safety guidelines and plans set for local schools and facilities are based upon Georgia's Path to Recovery for K-12 Schools. They are fluid and subject to change, as the safety of students and staff is top priority.

Elsewhere in this tabloid are the district's guidelines for operating schools as safely as possible. After reading the precautions, if you remain uncomfortable with returning your child to a traditional classroom, you may opt to participate in the ECS Virtual Academy with the following stipulations:

• The ECS Virtual Academy model will rely on Edgenuity. Edgenuity provides an online curriculum and instructional services for K-12 schools. Edgenuity will provide video lessons that will teach students and provide an online tutor to assist with academic content difficulties. 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Open House

Emanuel County Schools has adopted the following guidelines for holding open house on Thursday, July 30, 2020:

Face-to-face open house will only be held for transitional grade students, listed below, that are planning to attend the school year in the traditional school setting.

- Swainsboro Primary kindergarten families
- Swainsboro Elementary third grade families
- Swainsboro Middle sixth grade families
- Swainsboro High ninth grade families
- Twin City Elementary kindergarten and third grade families
- Emanuel County Institute sixth grade and ninth grade families

Open house will be divided into two sessions for these specific families:

- \bullet 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. for parents whose last name begins with the letter A-M
 - 2 to 6 p.m. for parents whose

last name begins with the letter N – Z.

Open house for pre-K and early head start will be held virtual based on direction for their organizations.

Temperature checks will be required of all individuals entering the building. Anyone with COVID-19 symptoms or a temperature of 100° or above will not be permitted inside the school.

The school district strongly encourages masks to be worn by all visitors in school buildings. This is to protect you, students, faculty, and staff.

Only two adults are allowed with their student(s) inside the building. Once parents/guardians and students finish visiting with teachers, they are asked to leave the building.

All other grade levels will conduct virtual open houses with students/families. Virtual open house may be done in a group or individual sessions through a virtual platform such as Zoom or a telephone call

Your commitment to the ECS Virtual Academy model will be for a minimum of one complete semester (two nine weeks) at the high school level. At the elementary and middle school levels, the commitment is for a minimum of one entire grading period (one nine weeks).

- Students will not be able to shift back and forth between traditional learning and the ECS Virtual Academy model during the respective grading periods.
- As previously noted, the instructional level will be equal to a traditional

classroom environment and much more rigorous than what was experienced this past spring. Because Emanuel County Schools was near the end of the school year, lessons and learning were focused more on review and at a slower pace. With the start of the new school year, instruction and learning will shift back to a more rigorous and faster-paced experience.

• Parents that opt to have their children learn from home, due to safety concerns, will **not** be permitted to participate in extracurricular school sports, clubs, and organizations.

PLEASE NOTE: Emanu-

el County Schools is scheduling all K-12 students in the traditional schooling model, expecting all students to return to school on August 3. If you plan to send your child(ren) to school in the traditional schooling model, no further action is required.



Emanuel County Schools' guidelines for opening on August 3, 2020

Emanuel County Schools has adopted the following guidelines to reopen schools based on the latest CDC, Georgia Department of Public Health, and the Georgia Department of Education recommendations:

- All students and employees must stay home if they have COVID-19 symptoms, tested positive for COVID-19, or had close contact with a person with COVID-19 within a 14day window. Employees parents/guardians are asked to self-report to the school nurse. A written physician's release will be required for return. Ouarantined students will have access to their education through a variety of methods.
- Temperature checks will be required of all personnel and students before entering the school environment. Students employees with and COVID-19 symptoms or a temperature of 100 and above will be immediately isolated, required to wear a mask, and sent home. Local health officials will be notified immediately for guidance on the next steps.
- Employees are encouraged to wear masks when social distancing is not possible for example, helping a student with an assignment at their desk. Students are not required but are encouraged to wear a mask, especially in common areas such

as hallways and bathrooms. Counselors and administrators will support mask-wearing efforts at each school. Students who ride school buses are required to wear masks. The school nor district will provide mask.

- The school nurse will be the school's main COVID-19 point of contact.
- Frequent hand washing breaks will take place daily in all elementary schools, where students will be required to wash their hands for a minimum of 20 seconds. Middle and high school students and employees will be reminded to wash their hands throughout the day for the same length of time.
- All will be reminded to cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue, place the tissue in the trash, and immediately wash their hands.
- Hand sanitizer stations will be located throughout each building. Locations include hallways, lunchroom, media center, office areas, etc. Students and staff are also encouraged to bring hand sanitizer from home.
- To promote COVID-19 protective measures, signs will be posted in highly visible locations, and schools will broadcast daily messages.
- Schools and departments will develop a schedule for increased cleaning and disinfection. The custodial staff has been trained on the safe

and correct application of all disinfectants. Frequently touched surfaces will be cleaned and disinfected throughout the day (door handles, sink handles, light switches, etc.).

- Ventilation systems will be monitored regularly to ensure proper operation and increased circulation of outdoor air as much as possible.
- Based upon classroom configuration and to the extent possible, student desks will face in the same direction, and students seated at tables will sit on the same side. Excess furniture will be removed from classrooms to allow teachers more room to separate students.
- The sharing of items that are difficult to clean or disinfect will be discouraged.
- Schools will promote social distancing when feasible and consider practices for transitioning, such as lanes for travel, throughout the school. Additional time for transitions, designate flow paths to minimize student congregation, stagger class movement to reduce the number of students in a hallway at the same time is just a few of these measures.
- Non-essential student movement throughout the school day will be limited.
- Outdoor recess will be continued, but the number of students gathered in one area will be limited. Some playground equip-

ment that cannot be sanitized may be prohibited for student use.

- While ensuring the safety of children, to the extent possible, students will eat in classrooms, lunchrooms, and outside. This will allow students to be spread out during their lunchtime.
- Traditional water fountains will be closed; water fill stations will be open. Students and staff are encouraged to bring plastic water bottles from home (no carbonated or sugar drinks allowed).
- In place of field trips, assemblies, special performances, and school-wide meetings or events, including open house and curriculum nights, virtual activities will be pursued.
- No parent walk-up for dismissal. All afternoon car dismissals must stay in the car line.
- Non-essential visitors, volunteers, and activities involving external groups or organizations will be limited.
- Parent/guardian teacher conferences will be held virtually, when possible
- Guidance from the Georgia High School Association (GHSA) will be followed for school athletics.

Transportation of Students on Buses:

• Emanuel County Schools encourages all parents that can transport their children to and from school to please do so. This will minimize the number of riders on a bus route.

- Students are required to wear a mask while riding the bus. Students will not be allowed on the school bus without a mask covering their nose and mouth. The school nor district will provide mask.
- Students will be asked to keep their hands to themselves and face forward throughout the trip to school and home. Parents need to encourage this of their children.
- All buses will be deep cleaned before the school year starts.
- Every bus will be equipped with disinfectant and will be disinfected after each route.
- Each bus will have hand sanitizer stations located at the entrance for students to use as they enter and leave the bus.
- Although many buses have air conditioning, drivers will partially open select windows of all buses to allow free flow of fresh air.
- The bus driver will utilize spaced seating (to extent practicable).
- Students will be loaded from the back to the front and then dismissed from the front to the back.
- To the extent practicable, siblings will sit together on the same seats.

If a staff member or student tests positive for COVID -19:

• Schools and Districts will follow the screening for and responding to COVID-19 in K-12 Schools.



All about ECS Virtual Academy

The Emanuel County School System believes that the best education is one that is delivered in school by a teacher. However, the school district recognizes that some families may not be comfortable sending their child(ren) to school. To accommodate those families, the Emanuel County School System is proud to partner with *Edgenuity* to offer a fully online option for families. Families who are interested in the virtual option need to apply before July 29. A link to the application is at the bottom of this article.

IMPORTANT

- The ECS Virtual Academy will be offered for grades K through 12.
- The ECS Virtual Academy is different from the digital learning/paper packets that occurred during school closure last spring.
- The ECS Virtual Academy is for families who want their child(ren) enrolled with the Emanuel County School System, but they do not wish to send their child(ren) to the school building for in-person instruction.
- All ECS Virtual Academy instruction will be delivered online through interactive lessons. Students complete lessons at their own pace and can be supported by an online tutor through Edgenuity. Mentors, who will be a

certified employee for the **MENTS** Emanuel County School System, will monitor the progress and follow-up with students.

- The ECS Virtual Academy will follow the same school calendar and grading windows as in-person instruction.
- ECS Virtual Academy students will be expected to adhere to the rules and procedures in the school handbook.
- Assignments will be graded and daily participation is an expectation. Failure to regularly participate and/or to complete assignments on time may result in failing grades and lead to retention.
- Families choosing to enroll in the ECS Virtual Academy will need to provide their child(ren) with an internet connection and telephone. **Emanuel County Schools** will assist with a computer checked out to parents for each virtual student.
- Students participating in the ECS Virtual Academy will be required to complete state assessments that will take place on the school campus.
- Students participating in the ECS Virtual Academy cannot participate in extracurricular activities (sports, clubs, band, chorus, etc.) during the semester or nine-weeks they are enrolled in the Virtual Academy.

PARENT COMMIT-

- Students must be enrolled in the Emanuel County School System.
- Register and enroll their child(ren) in ECS Virtual Academy.
- Commit to their child(ren) completing a full semester of online instruction for Grades 9-12 or nine-weeks of online instruction for grades K-8.
- Monitor the care and usage of the computer provided to students (if needed).
- Monitor and assist child(ren) with online courses as needed.
- Hold child(ren) accountable for completing online course work.
- Serve as point of contact for the onsite mentor.
- For elementary school students choosing to begin the semester with distance/digital learning, the school system is planning to utilize Accelerate Education. Students will be enrolled in selfpaced, on grade-level, online classes through an online learning management system called Accelerate Education.
- Students in grades K-5 will need significant assistance from a parent/adult in the home (approximately 2-3 hours each day of adult assistance). This adult will become the student's Learning Coach.

If you are considering this option, it is essential that you watch the brief

video at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=eyWxH-FtKLZ0 about the role of the Learning Coach and the Accelerate Education model of delivering instruction. The Learning Coach website can be accessed at http://learningcoach.accelerate.education/.

STUDENT COMMIT-**MENTS**

- Complete assignments and assessments independently, without assistance from others.
- Complete at least 5 hours of work per course each week.
- Make progress in each course each week.
- When assistance is needed or questions arise, contact the virtual tutor or onsite mentor.

ENROLLMENTS **DATES**

- Enrollment Window for Fall Semester: July 17, 2020 to July 29, 2020
- Fall Semester: August 3, 2020 to December 18, 2020 (first nine weeks ends on October 2, 2020)
- Enrollment Window for Spring Semester: December 1, 2020 to December 18, 2020
- Spring Semester: January 7, 2021 to May 26, 2021(third nine weeks ends on March 16, 2021)

Once enrolled, families will have 10 days to decide to change back to traditional, in-school instruction. After the 10 days expire, the student will have to attend the

ECS Virtual School until the end of the nine-weeks or semester, whichever is applicable.

ECS Note: Virtual Academy courses do not adhere to NCAA Clearinghouse rules.

To apply for the ECS Virtual Academy, visit Emanuel.k12.ga.us, click ECS Virtual Academy, then click the hyperlink next to the line of text at the top of the webpage about applying for the academy. If you type this hyperlink exactly as it appears in this tabloid, you will be directed to the Google Form automatically.

After your application for the ECS Virtual Academy is approved, you will be contacted by phone before the start of school on August 3, 2020.

IMPORTANT: If your child(ren) did not attend **Emanuel County Schools** at the end of the 2019-2020 school year, they would need to be registered at their home school before enrolling in the ECS Virtual Academy. Contact your child(ren)'s home school for more information.

Emanuel County Schools dress code

STUDENT DRESS EX-PECTATION

Students are expected to comply with the Emanuel County School's Dress Code while in attendance at school. This includes wearing items in the adopted school dress code. This policy addresses requirements for normal school days and dress down/spirit days. The appearance of students should be reasonable and not distracting to others. Students are expected and required to show proper attention to personal hygiene, neatness, and conservative standards of dress and appearance. When questionable the school principal or the principal's designee will make the final determination of whether a student's attire or appearance is in conflict with the system policy. Students will observe the following dress code both at school and on the school bus:

The following mandatory standards for student attire have been developed and are applicable to all middle and high schools.

Girls: The basic clothing for girls in sixth through twelfth grades shall consist of a long or short-sleeved white, black, grey, or khaki (or other color designated by the school) collared, polo or oxford style shirt with khaki, or black skirt, shorts, slacks, Capri pants, or skorts. Polo shirt-dresses are not permitted. The

skirts, shorts, slacks, capri pants, or skorts should be made of standard twill, cotton, or polyester material. See bullets below for description. No tears, rips, or holes in clothing.

Boys: The basic clothing for boys in sixth through twelfth grade shall consist of a long or short sleeved white, black, grey, or khaki (or other color designated by the school) collared, polo or oxford style shirt with khaki, or black shorts or slacks. The shorts or slacks should be made of standard twill, polyester, or cotton dress material. See bullets below for description. No tears, rips, or holes in clothing.

- Pants must be solid khaki, or black pants/ slacks, shorts, skirts, skorts, or capri pants (no knit pants, leggings, footless tights, jogging, exercise/yoga; no zippers or other ornamentation on pant legs or skirts or any other part of the outfit.) Clothes must be worn and belted at the natural waist, made of standard dress material (cotton, polyester and /or twill) and pants legs must not drag the floor. No denim jeans, skirts, shorts, etc. Shorts, skorts, and skirts must be no more than 2 inches above the knee cap. Athletic shorts, skinny jeans/ pants, leggings, or jeggins are not acceptable.
- *Tops* must be solid white, black, gray or khaki polo or oxford or the des-

ignated school color. Shirts can have insignia no larger than a standard credit card. Shirts longer than 3 inches below the natural waist must be tucked in. No more than two chest pockets on shirts. Under the shirt, students can wear solid white, black, or school color undershirt, camisoles, or turtleneck.

- *Shoes* refer to item #6 below.,
- *Tights, socks, or hose* must be solid, neutral, black, white, grey or chosen school color.
- No hats, sun visors, scarves, rollers, bandannas, hoods, caps or sunglasses may be worn in the

building.

• The dress code shall not prohibit students from wearing coats, jackets and sweaters when necessary due to weather conditions. Trench coats and dusters are not permitted. Hoodies cannot be worn in the building.

The following guidelines must be followed regarding jackets:

Cold weather gear (jackets, coats, wraps) to be worn over clothes.

• Acceptable ·colors are solid gold, white, red, black, grey, khaki, brown or a combination of these colors i.e. Letterman jackets.

- Cannot bear inappropriate messages
- Cannot be a trench coat or duster
- Must be deemed appropriate by the principal
- It cannot bear a logo or name brand symbol or other insignia or message larger than the size of a standard credit card.
- Articles of clothing that may be worn over the shirt (i.e. polo, crew neck sweatshirt, turtle neck, or **current year** school spirit shirt) include jackets, windbreakers, sleeveless V-neck or crew neck sweater vests, long or short sleeve pullover V-neck (Continued on page 16)

or crew neck sweaters, cardigan sweaters, long sleeve or sleeveless V-neck or crew neck wind shirts, V-neck or cardigan sweatshirts, or fleece garments of the same type. The collar of the polo is to be worn out of the extra garment. If a spirit shirt, sweatshirt or turtleneck is worn it must show at the neck of the outer garment.

- If the extra garment has a hood, the hood cannot be worn in the building.
- Prints, plaids, camouflage and other patterns or designs are not acceptable.

Garments that can be

worn *under* a polo, oxford, the current year school spirit shirt or crew neck sweatshirt are:

- A solid white, solid black, or second school color undershirt or camisole
- Solid white, black or solid school color turtleneck
- Extreme hair color/ style that causes a disruption or interferes with the learning environment will not be allowed. Hair must be a natural shade or tone, no extreme colors i.e. blue, pink, purple, burgundy, and green, etc. No mohawks.
 - Clothes should be in

the correct size to avoid sagging.

- In addition to the shirts described above, each school may include in its dress code the option of allowing students to intermittently wear the school sponsored (which may have a crew neck rather than a collar.)
- Belts must be plain style solid color black, brown, tan, navy or white and worn inside the belt loops. They should not have oversized, ornate buckles or buckles that bear offensive messages.
- This policy prohibits students from wearing or displaying expressive


items on the clothing that may contribute to disruption by substantially interfering with discipline or with the rights of others. It also prohibits items that undermine the integrity of the policy, notwithstanding their expressive nature, such as a sweatshirt or other over-shirt that bears a message and/or covers or replaces the type of shirt required by the policy.

• On special occasions schools will be allowed to have dress down days. The principal at each school will determine the dress down days for that site. Acceptable dress for dress down days will be consis-

tent with the dress code as published in this policy and in the Emanuel County Student and Parent Handbook.

- Schools should strive for full compliance using positive reinforcement. Corrective action should only be used when all positive measures have been exhausted.
- High school students who participate in pathway programs that have prescribed uniform requirements may wear those uniforms throughout the school day provided that the uniforms meet the individual program requirements.

are also going to clean the playground equipment before the next class goes out to play.


Parents, if the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pan-



What you need to know about Early Head Start and Emanuel County Pre-K

by MARIA W. DANIELS, Early Head Start and Pre-K Director

Early Head Start (EHS), the federally-funded program for infants and toddlers from birth to age three and their families, and pregnant women, continues to provide services to income-eligible families in Emanuel County to help them become self-sufficient. Center-based services are provided to 48 infants and toddlers from six weeks of age to age three by caregivers trained in infant and toddler caregiving, and seven pregnant teens at the local high schools and middle school. Teen mothers graduate from high school, and parents work and attend school and job training programs while their infants and toddlers receive quality center-based care from qualified caregivers.

At EHS, many parent engagement activities are provided throughout the year including the opportunity for parents to check out children's books from classroom lending libraries and attend parenting workshops with a family literacy focus.

The program's new school readiness initiative provides training sessions and opportunities for parents to identify school readiness goals for their children. Children with disabilities are identified and provided on-site services by Babies Can't Wait, Georgia's early intervention program which serves children from birth to age three.

The Emanuel County Pre-K Program is designed to prepare children for kindergarten and the curriculum is focused on having children school ready by the time they leave Pre-K. Students are taught to verbally communicate needs, wants, and thoughts, and to be enthusiastic and curious about approaching new activities.

The Pre-K Program reflects an understanding of how children learn by emphasizing active learning, consistent daily routines, and the use of positive behavioral management and assessment strategies. The school readiness goals provide emphasis in language and literacy, math concepts, science, social studies, arts, physical development and social and emotional competence.

Currently there are eight classes in Swainsboro, and three classes in Twin City. County wide, we have 242 slots, and registration is taken on a first come, first serve basis. We follow district guidelines for entry into each location. This year, we are offering a virtual option as well.

Early Head Start and Swainsboro Pre-K are located at 308 Tiger Trail adjacent to the Swainsboro Primary School with its own entrance. Twin City Pre-K is located in Twin City Elementary School at 162 Parrish Pond Road, Twin City, GA. If you have a child that will be four years old by September 1, 2020, and would like to register them for Pre-K for the 2020-2021 school year, please call 478-

Star Honor Roll / Honor Roll Criteria:

- Star Honor Roll A student with all "A's" in all core courses for the nine-weeks grading period shall be awarded Star Honor Roll.
- Honor Roll A student with a 90 average or above in all core courses for the nine-weeks shall be awarded Honor Roll. A student must have all As or Bs with the lowest grade being an 80. When averaging grades for the nine-weeks the average will not be rounded up.

Yearly Star Honor Roll and Yearly Honor Roll Criteria

- Yearly Star Honor Roll A student is recognized for yearly star honor roll if they have all As on their report card in every core subject for each of the 4 grading periods.
- Yearly Honor Roll A student is recognized for yearly honor roll when the average of all grades for every core subject. A student must have all As or Bs with the lowest grade being an 80. When averaging grades for yearly honor roll the average will not be rounded.

Food Allergies:

The school should have a prescription with a doctor or physician assistant's signature, a diagnosis and a recommended alternate food. The prescription should be updated annually and can be easily done during well checks for children. We can no longer offer juice and water as an alternative for milk even when requested by a physician. This eliminates an entire food group and is not allowed by the state. Ingredient information on all foods purchased is still available upon

Drop-off and Pick-up:

Parent drop-off and pick-up will remain at the front entrance of the school. At the end of the day, students being picked up will proceed to their designated pick-up areas. Teachers will es-

cort students out to the bus and pick-ups areas. Parents should remain in their vehicles at pick up and drop up times.

Early release pick-up:

Parents will call in advance and we will walk the student out to the vehicle.

Dates to remember:

Open House — Thursday, July 30, for third grade students only for parents last name beginning with A-M from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and for parents last name beginning N-Z from 2 to 6 p.m. We are requesting only two parents or guardians to attend open house with each student. Parents and students are asked to leave immediately after visiting with their child's teacher.

First Day of School — Thursday, August 3, 2020

We encourage our parents or guardians to become active in our Parent Teacher Organization (PTO). The PTO is a wonderful way for you to share ideas and support the mission of the school. You are welcome to volunteer to help tutor students and share your expertise to classes or the school as a whole.




their schedule and have the opportunity to meet their teachers, counselors, support staff, and administrators.



School bus safety tips from the National Association for Pupil Transportation

School bus transportation plays a critical role in the education of our nation's students and is the direct link between a neighborhood and the classroom. More than 25 million children ride the yellow bus every school day. Here are tips to keep children safe at the bus stop.

Getting ready for school

Have your children put

- Encourage them to wear bright, contrasting colors so they will be more easily seen by drivers.
- Make sure children leave home on time so they can arrive at the bus stop before it is due, ideally at least five minutes early.

Running after or in front of a bus is dangerous.

Walking to the bus stop

- Walk young children to the bus stop or encourage children to walk in groups. There is safety in numbers; groups are easier for drivers to see.
- Practice good pedestrian behavior: walk on the sidewalk, and if there is no sidewalk stay out of the



street. If you must walk in the street, walk single file, face traffic and stay as close to the edge of the road as you can. • Stop and look left, right and then left again if you must cross the street. Do the same thing at drive -ways (Continued on page 31)

and alleys. Exaggerate your head turns and narrate your actions so your child knows you are looking left, right and left.

At the bus stop

- Have children wait in a location where the driver can see them while driving down the street. Try to avoid waiting in a house or car.
- Do not let children play in the street. Playing with balls or other toys that could roll into the street is also dangerous.

Getting on and off the bus

- Warn children that if they drop something getting on and off the bus, they should never pick it up. Instead, they should tell the driver and follow the driver's instructions.
- Remind children to look to the right before they step off the bus.
- If you meet your child at the bus stop after school, wait on the side where the child will be dropped off, not across the street. Children can be so excited to see you after school that they dash across the street and forget the safety rules.

Mobile devices

Cell phones and other electronic devices are often permitted on the school bus as long as:

- They are in backpacks or other holders, keeping hands free to use handrails while boarding and departing the bus.



Keep Children Safe at the Bus Stop

THE SCHOOL BUS DANGER ZONE


The Danger Zone is the 12-foot area that surrounds a stopped school bus where the bus driver might not see you or where cars might be moving when you are getting on and off the school bus.

- When outside a school bus, remember if you can see the bus driver, the bus driver can see you.
- NEVER return to the bus after unloading.
- Leave any object dropped or forgotten and get out of the danger zone.
- Gain the bus driver's attention by waving your hands and arms above your head.
- Wait for the driver to see you and give you instructions before returning to the bus or before picking up anything dropped.
- If you do not get the bus driver's attention, you should not return to the bus.
- Always be aware that cars may not stop for the bus as required. Keep a watchful eye on all moving traffic around a school bus.
- If you hear the bus horn, it means DANGER. Look for passing motorists and seek safety.



LOADING THE SCHOOL BUS

- Wait 12 feet off the road, wait for the bus to stop, the door to open and the red lights to be activated.
- Look to be sure all cars have stopped before walking towards the bus.



UNLOADING THE SCHOOL BUS

- Exit your bus only at your assigned stop.
- Remain seated until the bus comes to a full stop.
- Never use an electronic device or wear ear buds until safely unloaded and 12 feet off the roadway.
- Wait for your bus driver's signal to unload.
- When exiting the bus, make sure everything is in your book bag and all straps are secured so they will not be caught on handrails or in the door.
- Exit in full view of the driver. Keep walking until you are out of the Danger Zone (12 feet away from the bus.)

A blowing bus horn means danger. Look & find safety M LOOK

CROSSING STREET TO LOAD SCHOOL BUS

- Wait 12 feet off the road, wait for the bus to stop, the door to open and the red lights to be activated.
- Wait for the driver's signal to cross.
- Look for moving cars as you walk to the edge of the road.
- Be sure all cars have come to a stop before entering the the road and continue to watch for approaching cars as you cross the road.
- Cross 12 feet in front of the bus. Make sure you can see the bus driver, and they can see you.
- Stay alert for moving traffic.



CROSSING STREET TO UNLOAD SCHOOL BUS

- Walk in a straight line away from the right front of the bus, in the driver's full view.
- Wait for the driver's signal that it is safe to cross at the end of the crossing gate and **AGAIN** at the center of the road.
- Look for cars in both directions before stepping off the bus.
 Be alert and aware of moving traffic. Do not enter the road unless all cars are stopped.
 - **NEVER** cross behind the bus.
