Superintendent Hattaway excited about new role

'It's challenging, it's exhilarating, and it's an answered prayer,'

Scotty Hattaway has left his role as deputy superintendent of Floyd County Schools to take on the top post here in Emanuel. The board of education approved Hattaway's hiring with a unanimous vote during their morning meeting on Wednesday, May 19. His first day as superintendent of Emanuel County Schools was Thursday, May 20.

The new leader comes to the district with 27 years of experience in education. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture Education from the University of Georgia as well as Master's and Specialist degrees from Valdosta State. Over the years, he has worked in the classroom as a teacher and has accumulated a handful of administrative titles, including Assistant Principal, Director Principal. of Support Services, Superintendent, and

Deputy Superintendent. Hattaway has worked with four school districts prior to Emanuel. Those districts were Pierce County, Long County, Lanier County, and Floyd County.

A native of Louisville, Hattaway is now 50-years-old. He and his wife, Holly, a stayat-home mother, have two daughters: Madison Grace (17) and Maggie Layne (14).

About becoming superintendent, Hattaway said he's thankful and excited to

be afforded the chance to be the leader of our school system. "I'm just really excited to have this opportunity. It's challenging, it's exhilarating, and it's an answered prayer. I'm grateful to be back in a rural setting; it's what I'm used to. I'm thankful and very humbled to have the opportunity to be chosen to lead our school system."

As for his vision for the system, Hattaway wants to provide every child with the opportunity to meet his or her absolute potential. He also wants to help local students become the best post-secondary students, employees, and family members possible with the ultimate goal of keeping these individuals local in the future. On that note, he wants **Emanuel County Schools** to be a "service-oriented" district. Most importantly, however, he aims to take the system "from good to great."



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OLIVER WITH WIFE AND CHILDREN

Hometown Public Servant: Timmy Oliver

This week's Hometown meetings, excluding the Public Servant is Timmy Oliver, volunteer fire fighter and first responder 20-08 with Twin City Volunteer Fire Department.

Oliver, a native of Emanuel County, grew up in the Summit area of Twin City and has always loved his small town. From riding bikes to skateboarding to rollerblading around the city for many years, Oliver credits his hometown as a safe town where crime is never really an issue. Oliver, along with his siblings, attended Twin City Primary and Emanuel County Institute. While enrolled in Twin City schools, Oliver crossed paths with Tiffany Clifton. The couple dated for many years and eventually married. Together, they have three children, Gunnar, 15; Kanyon, 14; and Blaise, 12.

"I love Twin City; it is home to me. All of my children attended TCE and are currently students at ECI middle and high school. I now outside of the city limits, but Twin City will always be home," Oliver commented.

Oliver has been a fire fighter for seven years, a first responder for six vears, and served as the department's lieutenant for two years. He obtained his titles by completing certified volunteer fire fighter and first responder courses. What sparked his interest to serve the local community was a casual conversation held with a high school friend while waiting in a checkout line one day at a local store.

"It was a Tuesday afternoon. I was in a store when a high school friend was standing in the same checkout line as me. Twin City Fire Department had a drill that night, and a reminder was announced over his radio that the drill would begin at 7 p.m. Conversation sparked up about why he decided to be a volunteer fire fighter, and his answer kind of struck a nerve. His response was simple - 'If it wasn't for the volunteers, who would respond. It could be a while before someone could get to your house if it was to catch on fire.'

I really started thinking about other scenarios, as we don't only respond to fires. I thought about my family. If something was to happen to them, I would want someone there as fast as they could get there. So, I joined the department. Emanuel County has volunteers spread throughout the county. A lot of times, it's a volunteer who is first on scene before other units arrive and can give a sizeup of the scene to other responding units," Oliver

Oliver enjoys helping the people of his local community as well as the fellowship shared with other members of the volunteer fire department. The department hosts weekly

first Wednesday of each month. During these sessions, fire fighters train and participate in setups organized by the department's captain and training officers in order to maintain at least 24 hours of required annual training.

In addition to conversation held with an old high school friend, Oliver gives credit for his desire to serve to his father, Ricky, fire fighter for the same department. According to Oliver, his father's footsteps not only led him to fight fires, it also prompted him to be a positive influence on local youth by serving as a volunteer coach with the Twin City Recreation Department.

"My dad was a volunteer fire fighter for Twin City, and he was also a coach. I guess I am a chip off the old block," Oliver stated during a recent interview.

Oliver coached baseball

and softball for Twin City Recreation Department for 12 years until his son, Gunnar, became too old to play. He also occupied a seat on the recreation department's decision committee for four years. The committee helped Twin City Commissioners and the recreation department make decisions on improvement projects for the local rec. The committee eventually dissolved after the recreation department was joined by the Twin City - Emanuel County Recreation Department. Oliver was later appointed by the Emanuel County Board of Commissioners to serve on the Twin City - Emanuel County Recreation Department board, and still serves on this board today.

Oliver is one of three owners of Stitch-N-Print in Twin City and has been a company employee at this location for 20+ years. His hobbies include scuba divwho was also a volunteer ing, fishing, hunting, cooking, riding motorcycles, and spending time with his family.

When asked for public comments, Oliver stressed the importance of volunteers, first responders, and every employee in public servant uniforms.

"These folks are responding to possibly one of the worst days of your life. They don't get enough credit for what they do. When the call goes out, quite honestly, we don't know who or what we are responding to. These jobs are very rewarding but stressful; the men and women in public works go through a lot. Until you walk a mile in the shoes of a public servant, just be glad someone is there for you and your loved ones during difficult times.

Support received from our community, friends, and families means a lot. I would like to say thank you to the community and friends for their support. Most importantly, I would like to thank my family. They have been understanding of me arriving home late and leaving before they're up to respond to another call, or just me having to rest because I was up most of the night responding to the needs of the public. Derden speaks to the Wiregrass Chapter

The Wiregrass Chapter, Georgia Society Sons of the American Revolution held its monthly meeting on Thursday night, May 13, at 7 p.m. at the New China Restaurant. With President Wilder Smith, Jr. presiding, there were 13 members and guests in attendance. Compatriot David Portwood was presented with his supplemental certificate for proving his linage back to American Revolution Patriot David Edenfield.

The speaker for this evening was Compatriot John Derden, member of the Wiregrass Chapter in Swainsboro. His topic was President George Washington's 1791 trip through Georgia. Derden mentioned that Washington had planned to visit every state in the country in order to become better acquainted with principal characters and internal circumstances. His southern trip began on April 9, 1791 and took him through Virginia and three states he had never been, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. With a carefully devised line of march and accompanied only by his senior secretary, Maj. William Jackson, and a hand full

of servants, Washington left Mount Vernon to investigate conditions in the most southern states. He traveled in a lightweight carriage; a wagon, the only other vehicle in his simple entourage, followed with his luggage. A total of eight men and eleven houses made the bulk of the southern tour. His carriage was pulled by four brown horses and the baggage wagon was pulled by two horses. Five extra saddle horses were brought along, including the president's tall white charger, Prescott. The group often departed between 4 - 6 in the morning, halting for breakfast for their first stop, and traveled around 25 to 40 miles in a day. The president, well aware of imagery, often mounted Prescott to enter a town. At well over six feet tall, Washington rode high in the saddle. In Georgia, Washington's tour took him into Savannah, then up the Savannah/Augusta Road, across Brier Creek into Waynesboro and into Augusta. When he left Augusta, he crossed a bridge over the Savannah River and journeyed to Columbia, SC.



Question: Do I need to read the EULA?

Answer:

The End User License Agreement (EULA) is a legal document. It is strongly encouraged you read the agreement before checking the box to agree.

The agreement tells you your rights in case the product is not what you want, or it does not perform up to your standards. The agreement tells you what the software or hardware company will provide for you. It usually tells you whether you have transfer rights to your copy of the software or hardware.

For instance, Palo Alto firewall equipment cannot be used unless you purchase a maintenance agreement with them, and vou must have ownership. They design their equipment that if you do not have a current maintenance agreement, about all year equipment can be used for is a doorstop.

Some software licenses show they are freeware, and vou can distribute however you want and make copies. Other software allows you to make one copy as a backup and that is it. Others allow no backup. A few years ago, Microsoft office started letting people have 5 copies on desktops or laptops and 5 copies on mobile devices. They put it in the EULA but did not publicize and people were surprised when they found that.

Some software EULAs include Easter Eggs in them which is where they add something as a pleasant surprise. I think it was SUPERAntiSpyware a few years ago who did this.

I would encourage you to always look at the EU-LAs before clicking accept so you know what fees you may encounter in future and what you may or may not do to protect your investment with a backup.


