After a very long discussion on living and finances, Glinda's parents finally agreed. With their grace and permission, Bill worked the entire summer away to buy Glinda the perfect engagement ring. Every ounce of sweat reassuring him that he was a step closer to his forever after. Fall made its way into the year, and while the two love birds were spending time together at Bill's house, he got down on one knee and presented her the ring that he had worked so tirelessly for. "That was a shocker!" Glinda expressed. She eagerly gave her answer and after accepting the ring they ran to spread the good news to her parents. However, that doesn't mean that there were no hardships faced throughout the duration of their marriage. Eventually, the two moved into the couple's dorms at Georgia Tech where they faced their first time living together as husband and wife. "When we moved into the couple's dormitories, it was strange. We had never lived together before that time or in such a small space. There were only two twin beds so we had to push them

Can you believe that?" Mr. Sasser exclaimed. Another hardship they endured was while living in Houston for Bill's job, in the birth of their first child, Billy. Their son was a preemie and had to be left in the hospital for about a month. Glinda also had severe complications from the birth and was in desperate need of blood donations. Bill's co-workers all showed up to donate. Glinda remained in the hospital for about 18 days. They had difficulties due to not having insurance at that time and Bill having to work to pay all expenses while Glinda was in the hospital. "Neither of our families were there which made it very trying." They later moved to Louisiana. and that's where their second child was born, Mary. Billy had to be left with a neighbor they barely knew, while Glinda rushed to the hospital to have Mary. Bill was able to meet her there in time, but it was extremely difficult for them to be away from family along with deeper circumstances regarding the birth of Mary. After a few years, they decided to return to Swainsboro to be closer to their families and have been here ever since.

"As you get older, the more difficult it tends to become. You have a lot more

factors like child rearing, taking care of your parents, growing a family, making huge decisions, stress from getting older, ailments, and finances. I don't want this to sound like we haven't had those difficulties because we have. We have made bad decisions and have had hard times, but it is how we got through them that counts. It hasn't always been sunshine and roses, but we got through it. You just can't dwell on the things that weren't perfect. You have to have faith in the Lord and in each other," the couple advised. "We learned together that by supporting each other, we can get through anything. Our faith in the Lord, in each other, and the support of the people around us that we didn't even know is really what made us closer. It made us realize how much we meant to each other." The Sassers, through the good and the bad have achieved many goals together throughout their marriage. Their proudest achievement; maintaining a blessed marriage these last 63 years. Six decades with

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

# What's the best way to show appreciation to your spouse?

Since having more time to entertain their own agendas after retiring, Jack and Dee



# Marriage License

The Emanuel County Probate Court, overseen by the Honorable Don. E. Wilkes, offers marriage license to anyone who is over the age of 18 and to minors who are 16 or 17 with the signature of the custodial parents. No blood test is required in the State of Georgia to obtain the license. Both applicants must apply and sign the application in the presence of the clerk. The requirements to obtain a Marriage License are as follows for both parties:

• Valid Photo ID or Birth Certificate of Both Applicants

• Address and Phone Number

• Date of Birth and Place of Birth

• Social Security Number and Place of Employment

Parents' Name Including Mother's Maiden Name
Parents' Addresses

•Parents' Places of Birth

• If either party has been married previously, they must have a copy of the final decree of the last divorce or a certified copy of the death certificate if previous spouse is deceased.

• \$78 in cash, local check, debit/credit card (Mastercard or Visa) without premarital counseling, or \$38 with premarital counseling

Excited over their future



the weekend after you're back.




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
