Chancellor Sonny Perdue to headline

East Georgia State College (EGSC) is excited to announce the return of the Vision Series in September. University System of Georgia Chancellor Sonny Perdue will be the speaker for the event. EGSC faculty, staff, students, and the community are invited to attend Thursday, September 22, at 7 p.m. in the Luck Flanders Gambrell Building on the campus of EGSC in Swainsboro.

The Vision Series at EGSC is an initiative that brings programs of intellectual and cultural enrichment to the College and its broader constituency. Since its inception, the Vision Series has hosted outstanding personal-

ities, authors, newsmakers, musical performances, dance companies, and theatrical productions. Through sponsored field trips, students and community members have opportunities to attend exhibitions and dramatic productions, not only in Georgia, but in neighboring states, as well.

Chancellor Perdue will be speaking about his current role leading the university system as well as his time in office as a public servant. The Board of Regents named Perdue the 14th chancellor of the University System of Georgia effective April 1, 2022. He oversees 26 public colleges and universities with a \$10.3 billion annual budget, 48,000 faculty and staff and more than 340,000 students.

Prior to becoming chancellor, Perdue was the 31st Secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) from 2017 to 2021. He also served two terms (Continued on page 2A)

On Wednesday, August 17, emergency personnel and first responders were dispatched to the intersection of Georgia in reference to a two-vehicle accident involving a 15-passenger van and a Howard Sheppard, Inc. tractor trailer truck hauling a container of clay. The incident occurred around 6:15 a.m. and the highway remained closed for approximately four hours, re-opening shortly after 10 a.m.

Officials believe that regardless of on-coming traffic traveling Highway 57 that day, the 15-passenger van would have inevitably crashed after reviewing dash camera footage pulled from the semi-truck that showed the van traveling at a

high rate of speed and failing to stop at the Stop sign of the intersection before colliding with the tractor-trailer semi.

Reasons related to driver's inability to stop have not been released at this time. There were five individuals involved in the crash, four were in the van and the other being the truck driver.



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Pam's Magic Sauce, Davinci Rub in final stages of becoming a streamlined product in retail stores

During the year 2020, local entrepreneur and U.S. veteran Rodney Patterson started a new journey in life bymaking sauce creation that's universal, kid-friendly and in the final stages of seeking USDA approval as a streamlined market product. He labeled his product Pam's Magic Sauce.

"The name was founded by two individuals who hold a special place in my heart, my late sister, Pamela Patterson, who passed away due to sickle cell disease, and my late best friend, Magic, who was killed in a drive by in Texas," – Rodney Patterson, 2020 interview comment with The Forest-Blade.

On Wednesday, August 17, Patterson, accompanied by his long-time friend, Carlton Sutton, sat down with Blade staff to give an update on how his business has been and where it is heading. He announced a partnership has been formed with Sunbelt in Decatur for the production Pam's Magic Sauce and anticipates the streamline of two original sauce products plus four new Davinci meat rub products in flavors All-Purpose, Lemon Pepper, Cajun, and BBQ within approximately one to two months.

"It took some time to get here but the way I look at it is – God knew that I wasn't ready and that's my testimony," Patterson stated when talking on his business tenure thus far.

A dream does not become a reality if it is not pursued with hard work and determination, and, even then, some setbacks are to be expected. After promoting his business relentlessly for about a year and a half, production for Pam's Magic Sauce came to a brief halt, but only momentarily though. Eager to begin stream-


lining his product with retailers, Patterson paid for multiple lab tests to be conducted on his products but kept hitting the same brick wall it seemed.

"It was depressing because the taste was never right," he explained. "People kept asking for a release date on Pam's Magic Sauce so that they could buy some, and I wanted my product to be out already. But, at the same time, I didn't want to sacrifice the taste of my products either. I didn't want to put out a product that wasn't Mr. UFO approved."

Passing the taste test for approval of Pam's Magic Sauce was not the only setback Patterson was recently faced with. Due to a heavy workload of a former copacker for Pam's Magic Sauce, the product was dropped from the co-packaging company's production

list. "I was heart struck and beaten down at the odds I faced," Patterson reflected. "But I remembered – It's all in God's hands. So, I waited. I sat still and analyzed myself and my surroundings so that He could manifest me where He wanted me to be,"

Patterson explained. Patterson says he continued searching for a solution as he waited for God to intervene on his behalf and eventually, He did just that. After leaving an interview with a potential package company, Patterson received a phone call from Sunbelt will also sport a new

mitted it to Sunbelt for a third batch to be created and tested. Following the third lab test of Pam's Magic Sauce since working with the new packaging business, the results received a 99.9% rating in taste, and coinciding ingredient numbers causing the product launch delay have since been updated to meet Mr. UFO's approval and Patterson says he's ready for stores.

Pending completion of all final-step legalities associated with the process of approval before being streamlined, consumers will be able to purchase Pam's Original and Sweet Heat sauce flavors and all four Davinci rubs through select retail store. Patterson spoke briefly on production plans for his top-selling sauce, Pam's Magic Cheese Sauce. For now, he says we'll "have to wait on that," as he's saving the release of his best-selling sauce for last. In addition to new

sauce flavors, Pam's Magic Sauce products



When introducing his product in the 2020 interview, Patterson explained the creation of his sauce came completely unexpectedly while preparing an at-home meal one day and realizing he was out of his normal sauce. Patterson mixed a few





"A third test was offered, and I was on the fence with making a decision. At that time, I had Patterson's friend and almost gave up until the packaging representative said a term I recognized before – Time is money. So, I decided then I had two options: walk away from this or measure out every single ingredient and make my own batch for comparison and go from there," he stated.

Remaining dedicated to his overall vision of having a successful sauce business, Patterson opted to give his vision another try and formed his own batch for comparison. He videoed the entire process of measuring ingredients and sauce creation and sub-

ed in glass bottles with new logos created by Patterson and his graphic design artist, Alexandra Tucker. 


