





### Savvy Senior: How to sell unwanted burial plots

Dear Savvy Senior,

How do I go about selling unwanted burial plots in my hometown cemetery? When my parents died about 25 years ago my husband (at the time) and I bought two plots near them in the same cemetery. But we've gotten divorced since then and have both moved out of state. Besides that, I would like to be cremated instead of buried.

Looking to Sell Dear Looking,

Life changes such as relocating, family disputes and divorce, along with the growing popularity of cremation in the U.S., is people to sell previously purchased burial plots they don't intend to use any longer. But, depending on where you live and the location of the cemetery, selling a plot can be difficult. And, if you do sell it, you'll probably get less than what you initially paid for it. Here's are a few tips to get you started.

Contact the cemetery: Your first step in selling your unwanted burial plots is to contact the cemetery and find out if they would be interested in buying them back, or if you're allowed to sell person or family. And if so, what paperwork will you need to complete the sale and is there a transfer

Some states require sellers to offer the plot back to the cemetery before selling it to others.

Selling options: If you find that it's OK to sell your plots yourself, many people choose to use a broker. There are a number of companies, like PlotBrokers.com GraveSolutions.com, that will list your plots for sale and handle the transaction for a fee and possibly a commission. If you go this route, you'll sign paperwork giving the broker permission to work on your behalf. Listings can last up to three years or until the plots sell.

Alternatively, or simultaneously, you can also list them yourself on sites like The Cemetery Exchange, GraveSales.com along with eBay and Craigslist, and handle the transaction yourself. In the ad, be sure to post pictures, describe the area where the cemetery is located and give the plot locations.

What to ask: Appropriate pricing is key to selling your plots. It's recommended that you find out what the cemetery is selling their plots for today and ask at least 20 percent less. If you're pricing too close to what the cemetery charges, there's no incentive for potential buyers.

Beware of scammers: If you choose to sell your plots yourself, it's not unusual for scam artist to reach out and try to get your personal financial information. Phone calls causing more and more tend to be more genuine than emails and text mes-

sages. Donate them: If you don't have any luck selling your plots, and if money isn't an issue, you can donate them to charity such as a religious congregation, a local veteran's group or an organization that aids the homeless. To get a tax deduction, you'll need an appraisal, which a cemetery or broker may supply for a fee.


mysteriously by no fault of her own. Some say they have also heard her weeping when the wind stirs among the grave-





## Smith accepted to Mercer University School of Medicine Primary Care Accelerated Track Program

Lindsay Smith of Swainsboro was recently accepted to the Mercer University School of (MUSM) Medicine Primary Care Accelerated Track (ACT) Program, announced MUSM Dean Dr. Jean Sumner.

The Primary Care ACT Program allows students interested in a career in family medicine, general internal medicine or pediatrics to have the opportunity to complete their medical school coursework in an accelerated three-year program of study.

Scholarships awarded to highly-qualified medical students upon the completion of their first year of medical school and cover tuition for the second and third years. These students must be in good academic standing and have a strong desire to practice primary care in a rural area.

Upon completion of residency, Scholars are required to participate in three years of continuous, full-time, primary care medical practice in a medically underserved rural area of Georgia. The practice must also accept Medicaid patients.

"This is an outstanding program that enables qualified students to accelerate their education, decrease their debt and enter the workforce



For those of you recently arrived in our fair state, Erskine "Erk" Russell was the head coach of the Georgia Southern Eagles football team in Statesboro; the man who resuscitated the program after a 40-year hiatus. Georgia Southern had fielded a football team until World War II whereupon it was suspended and lay dormant until 1981. That is when Russell arrived.

## Georgia Farm Bureau accepting entries for hay contest, hay directory

Georgia Farm Bureau (GFB) is accepting entries of Bermudagrass hav until Oct. 31 for its 2022 GFB Quality Hay Contest. Hay entered in the contest will be tested at a University of Georgia lab using the Relative Forage Quality (RFQ) Test, which provides an analysis of the nutritional value of the hay. Winners will be determined by the RFQ analysis.

Winners will be announced at the GFB convention in December. Prizes will be presented to the top five producers. The first-place winner will receive the free use of a Vermeer 604R baler for one year, courtesy of the Vermeer Manufacturing Company. The winner will have the option to purchase the baler at a reduced price at the end of the year.

"If you grow Bermudagrass hay, entering this contest is a great way to have the nutritional quality of your hay analyzed," said Emanuel County Farm Bureau President Robert Fountain, Jr. "Everyone who enters hay samples in this contest will benefit from learning what management adjustments they can make to their hay fields to improve the quality of their hay."

Contest rules, applica-

tions and instructions for submitting samples are available at the Emanuel County Farm Bureau office or may be downloaded at www.gfb.ag/Hay-Contest. All hay entered must have been grown in Georgia on a field with at least 25 days of maturity or regrowth. Hay samples should be naturally dried in the field and taken from the center of at least five different bales (rolls or squares) that come from the same field. Contestants must be a Georgia Farm Bureau member to enter the contest.

There is a \$20 entry fee for each sample entered in the contest to cover the cost of the lab analysis. Hay producers may enter more than one sample and will receive RFQ

analysis for all samples submitted. Contestants submitting multiple samples, however, may only place in the contest's top five for the sample with the highest RFQ score.

Checks to cover the entry fee should be made payable to Georgia Farm Bureau. Entry fees, forms and samples should be sent to the GFB Public Policy Department 1620 Bass Road Macon, Ga., 31210. Entry fees, forms and samples may also be taken to your county Farm Bureau office.

Previous first-place winners of the GFB Hay Contest may enter their samples for the purpose of having them officially analyzed but are not eligible to win any prizes in the contest for three years after winning.








### USDA and South Georgia Black Cattlemen's Association Leadership host roundtable discussion on Federal Farm Programs including drought assistance

FSA provides resources to help cattle producers recover from natural disasters

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director, Arthur Tripp recently visited with members of the South Georgia Black Cattlemen's Association to dicuss advancing agriculture in Georgia, FSA program eligibility, and disaster recovery assistance for cattle producers, including recent increases in Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) payment rates and eligibility for the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP).

"Our visit with the South Georgia Black Cattlemen's Association was critical in our effort to inform cattle producers across Georgia of FSA's various programs and loans available to assist them in their recovery from drought and other natural disaster events," said Tripp. "Many people don't realize the many ways that we can help them. It is vitally important that we have these conversations with producers so that we can work together to ensure that agriculture remains Georgia's number one industry."

LFP is one of several disaster assistance programs available to cattle producers. LFP provides payments to eligible livestock producers and contract growers who also produce forage crops for grazing and suffered losses due to a qualifying drought during the normal grazing period for the county. To date, seven Georgia counties have met the drought severity levels that trigger LFP eligibility for the 2022 program year. Eligible counties are: Bulloch, Bryan, Chatham, Effingham, Long, Liberty, and McIntosh.

To expedite the application process, producers are encouraged to gather and submit records documenting 2022 losses. Supporting documents may include information related to grazing leases, contract grower agreements, and more. Eligible producers are encouraged to contact their local FSA office to schedule an appointment to apply for LFP drought recovery assistance. The deadline to apply for 2022 LFP assistance is Jan. 30, 2023. View our LFP fact sheet.

An additional USDA disaster assistance program available to cattle producers is the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP). LIP provides benefits to livestock owners and some contract growers for livestock deaths exceeding normal mortality from eligible adverse weather events, certain predation losses, and reduced sales prices due to an injury from an eligible loss. Indemnity payments are made at a rate of 75 percent of the market value of the livestock on the day before the date of death.

Recently, USDA has increased LIP payment rates for beef, beefalo, bison, and dairy animals less than 250 pounds to be more reflective of the substantial increased cost of these non-adult livestock in 2022. New payment rates in-

- Non-adult Beef, under 250 pounds: Old Rate -\$175.27 New Rate - \$474.38
- Non-adult Beefalo under 250 pounds: Old Rate -\$235.86 New Rate - \$559.20
- Non-adult Buffalo/Bison under 250 pounds: Old Rate - \$336.84 New Rate - \$559.15
- Non-adult Dairy under 250 pounds: Old Rate - \$45.32 New Rate - \$255.47





There are over 100 subtypes of childhood cancer



Today, we have only six drugs made soecifically for childhood cancer

Childhood cancer is the leading cause of death by disease for children in the U.S.

In 2022, it is estimated 10,470 children (birth to 14 years) and 5,480 adolescents (aged 15-19 years) will be diagnosed with cancer.

The overall incidence of childhood cancer is on the increase, averaging 0.8% increase per year since 1975. Overall cancer incidence rates increased an average of 1% per year from 1997 to 2018.

About 1 in 285 children will develop cancer before the age of 20.

In 2018, 17,293 children were diagnosed with cancer in the United States — approximately 47 children per day.

As of 2018, 4,317 children and teens under age 20 were diagnosed with CNS tumors, accounting for 25% of total cancer diagnoses in the age group 0-19.

The average age at diagnosis is 10 overall (ages 0 to 19), 6 years old for children (aged 0 to 14), and 17 years old for adolescents (aged 15 to 19), while adults' average age for cancer diagnosis is 66.

Childhood cancer is not one disease - there are more than 12 major types of pediatric cancers and over 100 subtypes.

Most new cancer diagnoses in children are for leukemia (28.1%) and brain/CNS cancers (26.5%), while malignant epithelial neoplasms and melanomas (23.3%) and brain/CNS cancers (21.9%) are top cancers for adolescents.

It is estimated that there will be 13.7 million cases of childhood cancer between 2020-2050. Unless there are major improvements in diagnosis and treatments, of this, 45% will go undiagnosed and 11.1 million will die if no further investments in interventions are made. The vast majority, almost 85%, will be concentrated in developing countries.
