Members Swainsboro City Council and Mayor Greg Bennett convened for a meeting on Tuesday, September 6, at 6 p.m. at the city hall. The meeting was called to order and Pastor Andrew Flowers of Eastwood Church of God gave the invocation that was followed by the pledge of allegiance. Minutes from the August 15 meeting of City Council were presented for review. Johnny Ray Stafford made first motion for approval of minutes and was seconded by Julian Sconyers, with all remaining council voting according-

Councilman Sconyers then requested an agenda change for the meeting be made to allow Dr. H. Kemp Jones opportunity to address council. This request passed on a 5 - 1 vote.




- Boats must be made of nothing but flat cardboard and duct tape and have a bottom and sides - no paddle-







Lawson details month-long Covid battle

Emanuel Medical Center (EMC) is known for providing families in Emanuel County and the surrounding areas with quality care. Through a partnership with Augusta University Health (AU Health), EMC has taken that care to the next level, giving local residents access to the physicians and specialists at AU Health through telemedicine. With the emergence of COVID-19 in early 2020, the impact of the telemedicine program grew drastically, helping EMC to provide care to patients at their facility and determining who should be transferred to AU Health. Swainsboro resident Harriett Lawson, who has a long-standing relationship with the facility, was one of those patients. "I was born here at this hospital," said Lawson. "My momma was in the nursing home (at EMC) for 10 years. If I was not sick or out of town – and I'm a pretty healthy person and I'm a homebody – I went to that nursing home three times or more every day. And I'd do it again tomorrow. I can never thank the EMC nursing home staff enough for all that they did."

In 2020, Lawson found herself at EMC for a different

reason. With COVID spreading through the community and knowing she wasn't well, at Dr. Vijitha Prasad's instructions, Lawson drove herself to EMC.

"I had never been admitted to the hospital in my life. I was probably as scared as I've ever been," said Lawson.

Lawson walked herself in, only bringing with her what she needed for one night, planning that "tomorrow, I'm going to be back home." But what Lawson didn't know

was that it would be nearly a month before she returned home.
"I came in here with COVID, and I stayed here for 10 days under their care," Lawson said. "I was only awake and alert for the first three or four days of that. They trans-

ferred me to the EMC ICU and put me on a ventilator here."

During that time, the team of physicians and nurses at EMC were conferring with the team at AU Health through telemedicine. Dr Matt Lyon, Service Chief of

During that time, the team of physicians and nurses at EMC were conferring with the team at AU Health through telemedicine. Dr Matt Lyon, Service Chief of Virtual Care for the Medical College of Georgia at Augusta University, was part of the team looking at Lawson's case.

"What we learned with COVID, but for telemedicine in general, it has much more power to help with patient care. Emanuel Medical center has an intensive care unit, we found we could really help the doctors at Emanuel Medical with the sickest of their patients. Help them keep more and more patients there," Lyon said. "We are going to follow along with your care, if at any point you need a service or an intervention that can't be provided there in Swainsboro, we'll bring you to Augusta, we'll transfer you. We're following along so we know what's going on with you, we know what you need, and when you get here, we'll be ready for you."

Mary Radford, Chief Nursing Office at EMC, said the telehealth partnership has taken the EMC team's care to the next level.

"These respiratory, lab techs, nurses - they wanted the patient to be taken care of. If it takes rolling a computer into the room and talking to a doctor from Augusta to get the patient taken care of, that's what we are going to do," Radford said.

Within a week of being transferred to EMC's ICU, a room became available for Lawson at AU Health. The decision was made to transfer her, and she was airlifted to Augusta. Lawson was unconscious during most of this time, and when she regained consciousness, she woke up not knowing where she was or how she got there. "When I got to Augusta and woke up, I didn't know a soul. The people in Swainsboro and Emanuel County were good to me, but they were people that knew me," Lawson said. "The strangers and the nurses that were at AU, you couldn't have asked for any better. I don't know how they stood to do what they did day after day after day. Some of the travel nurses had been there since March, and this was going into November (2020)."

Lawson remained at AU Health for 16 more days and was unconscious for many of them. Some of the hardest parts for Lawson were the parts she didn't know. "I'm a pretty strong person, I try to hold it in, but I have had so many questions about the helicopter," Lawson said. "I've come over here on my lunch hour because I could see a helicopter had landed. I sat and watched it. I wanted to see them load someone on it. I wanted to see how it was done. I wasn't happy that anyone had to do that, but I wanted to see it. It has just about driven me crazy, because I don't know what it looked like when I was on there."

Despite not being aware of her transfer until after the fact, Lawson was grateful that the team made the decision that they did.

"It probably meant everything in the world," Lawson said. "I feel like people would not have been able to stay here had it not been for the doctors at AU guiding the doctors here. They were looking for that guidance and help. They were dealing with much more volume and knowledge up there to handle COVID."

As her health improved, Lawson was able to rehab at AU Health. But she said her road to wellness started at EMC.
"I've asked a million questions since then, but it all started here at Emanuel Medical," Lawson said. "Had they not given me the care that I got here, I probably wouldn't have made it. The good Lord working through the doctors and staff here."

As the EMC staff continues to implement the telehealth program for the benefit of their patients, hospital and community, Damien Scott, CEO of EMC, said that telemedicine is the future for rural hospitals.

"It's a phenomenal program. I believe in it," Scott said. "I think it is the future for rural hospitals, and it has to be a part of what a rural hospital does." For her part, Lawson said that her difficult COVID journey has given her a new appreciation for EMC.

"I've always appreciated healthcare workers, but I have had a whole different outlook on it since my mother stayed at the nursing home here for 10 years," Lawson said. "I appreciated everything that was ever done for her at the nursing home and here at this hospital. But, after you yourself have a near death experience, it makes you appreciate it and look at them in a different way."

Where words fail... music speaks

Have you ever been told a story through unspoken words? If you've ever been a guest of the symphony, then you absolutely have. Only there can you feel the powerful emotions of a captivating story, through music alone. Conductor, Leopold Stokowski once said, "A painter paints pictures on canvas, but musicians paint their pictures on silence." For Swainsboro native, Kellie Henry, this is the reality that passionately consumes her, because where many must physically visualize art for it to be considered as such, she's a storyteller who combines sound and soul to create beauty through vibration and magic through composition.

Since childhood, Henry has been influenced by the classics. An effect that has helped her character develop into the inspiration that she is today. By the way, 51% of Georgians said they totally ignore all those studies that warn of the health risks of eating too much fast-food. Take that, New York Times and pass the fried pies.



The plain little pod, that packs a punch

Ah, the smell that brings you back to places long forgotten. Grandmama's kitchen. Birthday parties. Bath and Body Works. Vanilla has long been an omnipresent scent of sorts for years. car—islands in the Indian Ocean off the Southeast coast of Africa—and give off buttery, rich notes. Mexican vanilla is bold, with smoky undertones. This gives your desserts, your entrees, and your alcohol their potency and their flavors.

But did you know, Vanilla can also provide you with natural medicine???

The medicinal potential of vanilla has been the subject of extensive scientific study over the past two decades (and beyond, but just from what is recorded). Vanillin, the primary compound in vanilla, is considered an analgesic, and has anti-carcinogenic properties. Vanilla contains coumarin, eugenol, phenol, and salicylic acid, which support pain relief (think eating vanilla ice cream, getting brain freeze, AND it helps it go away!). It also contains catechins, which is effective in support of herpes. It is also considered a febrifuge which can help reduce fever naturally. It's a digestive, and anti-bacterial, a stimulant and an antioxidant.







Georgia Memory Net offers telehealth options for diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease, related dementias

Net, the statewide program dedicated to earlier diagnosis and customized care plans for Georgians living with Alzheimer's, is implementing multiple telehealth options to help Georgians access diagnostic services around the state.

In years past, Georgians in need of an Alzheimer's or related dementia diagnosis had to travel to a metropolitan area like Atlanta or Augusta to get a diagnosis from a specialized neurology practice. The waits for an appointment could be as long as 18 months. That long wait is one of the reasons why Georgia Memory Net (GMN) was created. One of GMN's goals is to make quality dementia diagnoses available to all Georgians, no matter where they live in the state.

Part of this effort launching includes telehealth options for dementia diagnostic appointments. Telehealth appointments allow patients who can't make it to one of GMN's Memory Assessment Clinics for any reason to receive diagnosis much closer to home via technology. Each of GMN's five Memory Assessment Clinics can provide telehealth diagnostic appointments for patients at home via telehealth, and now GMN is launching a new hybrid telehealth model.

"Our new telemedicine partnership with the Georgia Department of Health is a meaningful step for our organization in eliminating barriers to care for individuals with memory loss and other symptoms of cognitive impairment," said Kyle Brunen, Georgia Memory Net's Project Director. "These telemedicine locations in Dooly and Emanuel counties are the first, with more to come, and provide the necessary technology, connectivity, and clinical staff to deliver a first-class cognitive assessment closer to a patient's home."

While some telehealth options require a patient to log in to a device in their home, Georgia Memory Net's new telehealth sites take place in a clinical setting that is close to home. There, staff can help the patient log in to their appointment, and support them in any other
