Dixon wins 4-H State Sporting Clays Invitational

Paxton Dixon, 8th grader at David Emanuel Academy, placed first in the Junior Division with a score of 83. In the Senior Division, 12th grader Jack Williams placed second with a score of 87 and was followed in third place by DEA 9th grader Cooper Riner with a score of 86. Other youth competitors were Sam Williams, Robertson, Spencer Lawrence, and Olivia Boatright.

The competition was also open to adult shooters and several Emanuel County volunteers competed. Ed Akridge placed

5th in the adult division. Chelsey Dixon Adam Boatright, and Brad Williams also participated.

The State 4-H Sporting Clays Invitational Match is a 100-target per discipline event. Proceeds from the shoot are used to support Georgia 4-H Shotgun Teams that advance to National 4-H Shooting Sports events.

The 4-H shotgun program is open to 6th through 12th grade students in Emanuel County who are enrolled

in the 4-H Program. All 4-H'ers are coached by volunteer leaders from the 4-H program who are

certified instructors. 4-H provides fun, exciting, and educational events year-round for youth in 4th-12th grade. 




Larry Adams, Sr., age 53, was called home to rest on Monday, April 3, 2023.

Unbreakable rules

If you wanted to do a detailed dissection of what makes this country tick, you would have to include a serious discussion on its love for sports. Competitive sport is part of the "core being" of this country. People cannot get enough of it because it is one of the few truly honest human endeavors left. Sports are simple. You learn the rules and play by the rules. You can't fake it. You just do your dead level best, and then you live with it. You can't spin the truth when it's right there in front of everybody. People will talk honestly about sports when they will lie about everything else from politics to religion to neighbors to kinfolks to you name it. Now, of course sports are not always spotless, but there is an integrity of purpose with

sports that is undeniable and inspiring.

There was a major sportingeventthispastweekend in Augusta. Thousands of people from all over the world poured into 370 acres right off of Washington Road. There were people there of all ages, all colors, with all sorts of different backgrounds and beliefs. But one common thing bound them together; their love of golf. That is important to understand because it is not cheap to attend the Masters at Augusta National Golf Course, and if you are going to go, you should know this. They have some rules about how you should behave, and they seriously expect you to follow them. You should practice normal courtesy, refrain from loud conversation or creating any disturbance,

be respectful of others, don't smoke, never use cellphones on the course, and always comply with the orders of the gallery guards. At Augusta National, you won't find any activists in black pajamas or protesters with pink hair screaming and waving signs in your face about getting "woke" and being "lit" and firing the Supreme Court and defunding the police. What you will find there are people who enjoy golf and the beauty and order of the place, and it's really amazing how well it all works. That's what happens when people observe rules and appreciate tradition and custom and behave themselves and enjoy watching great golf instead of worrying about democracy ending next week. All these thousands of different people from all around the world got to watch the Masters together and they all got along just fine. Amazing!

In glaring contrast, I thought about the three Tennessee Democrat legislators who are now basking in the glory of their own self-proclaimed political martyrdom after initiating their "bullhorn"campaign to overthrow the rules of the Tennessee House of Representatives, just because they wanted to. Somewhere along the line, a lot of "progressive" folks in this country have decided that the idea of rules is somehow irrelevant today. "Rules" were very much on the minds of the folks who struggled to create an independent country from 13 colonies. "Rules" were the central idea in the creation of America's founding documents penned in



We'd go to the Farmers Market which stunk like fish. I'll never forget that smell either. Woolworths was always a great place to look at toys and spin around on the seats at the lunch counter. I remember getting lost there, one time. (That was why she held onto my hand after that.) Then, when it was time to go home, she took me to Leopold's Drug Store for lime sherbet. Man, I was living! Then, back on the streetcar we'd go and return before Daddy got home.

I remember peeking out the windows early foggy summer mornings and looking down at the street when I'd hear the cloppety clop of the mules

I decided my playmate next door needed a haircut, so I found some scissors and gave her a nice new hair do. Her Momma gave my Momma a piece of her mind. So much for loving thy neighbors.

Daddy bought me a pair of roller skates. This was the kind of skates with a strap over the top and that you screwed to your shoe soles with a key. It was impossible to skate on cobblestone, so Daddy and Momma would take me a couple of blocks down to the park where there was a covered gazebo and they would sit while I skated to my heart's content. Then we would walk hand in hand back home to our apartment.

Sometimes on Sunday, we'd ride the street car as far as it went - Isle of Hope – just the three of us



I was worried and didn't understand what was wrong. later learned that the letter was from the Dept. of Defense calling my Daddy into service. He was deferred because of his employment at the shipyard He served his country with his skills as did many other men and womer who were needed to provide the necessary equipment essential for war.

I wanted so badly to be able to walk by mysels around the corner to the corner store where Momma would do some grocery shopping when she had some money or ratior stamps to use. She was afraid to let me out of her sight, however. The story goes that somebody asked me if I were to get lost would I be able to tell anyone my address. I said "O: course, I live at 309 Each Tall Street". I knew exactly where I lived. And I did.

He was the benefactor of many other philanthropic projects but he wanted no credit, only for people to enjoy life.



Luck Coleman Mitchell, Born in 1876, her parents were pioneer citizens of Emanuel County. Mrs. Mitchell donated the land where the Federal Courthouse now stands, the land where the First Methodist Church stands, land for one of the first industries in Swainsboro, Swainsboro Flour Mill, and the land for the Swainsboro High School and football field where Southeastern Tech now stands. She also donated land for the John C. Coleman Hotel and the Mitchell Building where the county tag and tax office is now located.




Williams Edward Vann



The member spotlight for the night was Frank Patrick. Patrick is a hard-working Kiwanian who has been with the club for 36-years. He is also a United States Air







News from Under the Gold Dome

The Georgia General Assembly returned to the State Capitol for the final two days of the 2023 legislative session on Monday, March 27. On Wednesday the session came to an end as the House and Senate completed Legislative Day 40, which is also known as "Sine Die," a Latin term meaning "without assigning a day for further meeting." During these two eventful days, my colleagues and I worked late into the night to vote on legislation that will impact communities across our state. I will share some of the bills that we voted on from the Rules calendars, as well as highlight a few House bills that received final passage this week. All of the bills that received final passage before we adjourned Sine Die will go to Governor Brian Kemp for his final consideration.

Fiscal Year 2024 Budget Before we adjourned on Sine Die, the state legislature approved a Conference Committee Report for House Bill 19, or the Fiscal Year 2024 (FY 2024) budget, fulfilling our one constitutional obligation of the session. Effective July 1, this final version of the FY 2024 budget is set at a revenue estimate of \$32.4 billion, which is \$2.2 billion, or 7.4 percent, more than the Fiscal Year 2023 budget.

More than 50 percent of this state budget is dedicated toward funding our state's K-12 and higher education systems and includes \$13.1 billion to fund the Quality Basic Education program and an additional \$50.2 million in lottery funds to bring the HOPE factor rate for scholarships and grants up to 100 percent of last year's tuition costs.

I am also excited to announce that certified teachers and school employees would experience a \$2,000 increase to the state base salary schedule through this budget.

Nearly a quarter of the FY 2024 budget would go toward health and human services, and within this crucial budget area, we included \$42.2 million for Medicaid reimbursement rate increases for provid-

To ensure the House's public safety priorities are reflected in this budget, this conference committee report includes \$23.5 million for a total compensation increase of \$4,000 for more than 3,900 law enforcement officers across 12 state agencies. Finally, almost 10 per-

cent of the FY 2024 budget would go toward economic development and general government services, and seven percent of the budget would support transportation infrastructure improvements.

This robust budget is full of bipartisan initiatives, and you can find more highlights from the FY 2024 budget here. HB 19 has now been sent to the governor for his consideration.

Building Georgia's Electric Vehicle Infrastructure

The House also overwhelmingly passed Senate Bill 146 to provide a regulatory framework for elective vehicle (EV) charging stations and allow our state to regulate these charging stations to the same extent as gas pumps. As the EV market continues to grow in Georgia, its infrastructure must be able to efficiently and fairly support EV drivers, and SB 146 would lay the necessary groundwork for this developing industry.

Final Passage of House

My colleagues and I also gave final passage to a flurry of House bills on Legislative Day 40, and I would like to make you aware of just a few of these bills that are on their way to the governor's desk.

House Bill 88, or the Coleman-Baker would require law enforcement agencies to conduct a thorough review of an original cold case murder investigation dating back to 1970 upon written request to determine if a new investigation could produce new leads or identify a likely perpetra-

House Bill 538, or the Georgia Early Literacy Act, would require schools systems to teach high-quality literacy instructional materials approved by the State Board of Education in grades kindergarten through third grade based on the science of reading.

House Bill 189 to provide a 10 percent weight variance for trucks when hauling agricultural or farm products within a 250 mile radius of the farm or point of origin outside of the 13 county metro Atlanta region; this variance would increase the truck limit weight from 80,000 pounds to 88,000 pounds on Georgia roads. Signing Bills into Law

Although the 2023 legislative session has officially come to an end, I look forward to sharing more updates about different bills that made it across the finish line this session and are on their way to becoming official laws. Over the next 40 days, Gov. Kemp will sign or veto measures that received final passage by the House and Senate this session. Any bill the governor signs will become law, and any legislation not signed or vetoed within this 40-day period will also automatically become law. House bills that did not receive final passage this session have been sent back to their respective committees, and these bills will be eligible for consideration again next year. I hope that you will contact me if you have any questions regarding potential new state laws or if you have any suggestions for future legislation.

I remain dedicated to serving your interests as your state representative, and I hope that you will contact me with any questions or concerns you may have regarding the legislative session or with any proposals or recommendations for future legislation.


