conversation past Monday with Emanuel County Administrator Guy Singletary, the Forest Blade asked for updates on several items of interest, not the least of which was the reported millage rate increase anticipated for the upcoming tax year. Singletary opened the book on the county's financial position which appears to be on sound

footing. "The tax digest for Emanuel County is again up by a respectable amount which would indicate that the county continues to grow." That's the good news. The not so good news is that inflation, the tight job market, and energy policies have all teamed up to make it more expensive to run Emanuel County.

Administrator

went on, "Our budget is right on track. We are right where we should be, but just like with your household expenses, we are seeing increases in operating costs that we have never seen before, and it is costing the considerably county more money to operate today than it did last year. Mayor Donaldson announces over \$1 million in funding for Twin City

At the August meeting of the City Commission of Twin City, Mayor Donaldson announced the award of over \$1 million dollars in grant & loan funding from 3 different programs. The City Commission met on August 1st in the City Commission Chambers, with Mayor Donaldson Commissioners Jesse Brown, Kenton Landon, and Charles Moody in attendance. Mayor Pro Tem Jule Bady was absent.

The first program was from the Georgia Transportation Infrastructure Bank (GTIB). The City will receive a \$350,000 Lunch and refreshments grant and a \$250,000 loan to fund the city's largest road surfacing project. The total project cost is \$1 million, with the city funding 478.494.3807 should you the remainder in city funds. The Commission

discussed the advertisement of bids during the meeting. The advertisement was posted in July, with the bids due to City Hall by August 25, 2023 at noon.

The current project scope is to resurface (13) city roads. Those roads are Mathis Avenue, Princess Street, King Street, Palm Street, Maple Street, South Railroad Avenue, South College Street, Old Statesboro Road, Rainbow Ridge, Allen Street, Paradise Road, Stokes Avenue, and Eastside Road. The 13 roads account for 5 miles of resurfacing, which is 25% of all the roads in Twin

In 2020, the City Commission approved to submit (7) roads for resurfacing to be funded with T-SPLOST 2 funding. Those roads are: First Avenue, West Broad Street, Parrish Pond Road, Old Swains-Road, Road, Coursey Road, and Sandridge Road.

The second program was from the Department of Homeland Security Assistance to Firefighters Grant. The City will receive \$427,619 in grant funding for the purchase of a new fire truck. The total project cost is \$449,000, with the city matching the grant funding with \$21,381 of City SPLOST funding. The City could wait 12 months or more for the new fire truck, due to the supply chain issues.

Donaldson Mayor said, "With a new fire truck, we hope to lower the City ISO (Insurance Services Office) fire rating. Once we lower the fire rating, this would lower the property insurance premiums for everyone in Twin City and the surrounding 5-mile area. I'd like to thank Fire Chief Foster Grimes and our firefighters for all their hard work."

The third program was from the Georgia **Environmental Finance** Authority (GEFA). The city will receive \$54,750 in grant funding to comply with a new federal requirement to inventory all city water lines for lead pipes. This project is pending, with more information to be discussed at a future meet-

The action items from the meeting were approval of minutes from the June 6th and June 22nd meetings and approval of Resolution 08-2023 to approve the GTIB funding. All 3 items were approved unanimously.



To provide for a determination of property taxes for the coming year, the county commission projects what county operating expenses will be and what the millage rate must be set at to provide that portion of revenue. Singletary believes a preliminary figure of a 1.3 mill increase should be proposed. From all appearances, the county has a steady, conservative plan for continued growth and building. As long as that combines with a vigorous hand to control spending, the result justifies a common sense adjustment any operating budget. Any tax increase is not what the taxpayer wants to hear, but in the long run, you get what you pay for, and eventually, a motivated and fairly compensated employee might be the best way of all to keep future taxes

All these improvements have not come at the cost of the Twin City taxpayer. When Donaldson took office as Mayor, the city property tax millage rate was 7.213. The 2022 millage rate was 6.619. This is a 9%

reduction in city property taxes in 4 years. In 2022, the city used excess Water & Sewer funds to prepay a loan by 2 years to the Georgia Environmental Finance Authority. This saved thousands of dollars in interest. Also, the city reserve balance has increased 95% since 2019.

Donaldson closed with, "I am proud of the work we have done in Twin City. Twin City is on the move, and we are working every day to make our city even better. I love Twin City. I live and work there every day, and it's my greatest honor to lead the people of Twin City."







Let's talk about Hunter Biden



Hunter Biden is a classic case of the horse who was led to water but couldn't follow the instructions about the drinking part. 

Andrew Young and the late Congressman John Lewis, Carol shared with me information on the story of those who serve the hallowed grounds as Sentinels of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. And a fascinating story it is. The Tomb holds the remains of an unknown soldier from Wars I and II as well as Korea. The remains of

of former Atlanta Mayor World

Michael Joseph Blassie, who was shot down in Vietnam in 1972. He was reburied in his home state of Missouri and the crypt that once held his remains now reads "Honoring and Keeping Faith with America's Missing Servicemen." That includes my frabrother, USAF. Boggs, As with many of you, I have visited the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier on several occasions and have always been inspired with what I witnessed. It is a pageant of solemn dignity. After learning what goes into guarding the site, it becomes even more special. soldiers The guard the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier — men and women from every state in the union — are hand-picked and rigorously trained. Less than 20 percent of those who apply are accepted. The Tomb has been guarded every minute of every day since March 25, 1937. The Guard is changed every 30 minutes during the summer and every hour during the winter. During the time the cemetery is closed, the guard is changed every two hours.




the highest honor given to any military or foreign dignitary. The Sentinels walk 21 steps, stop on the 21st step, turn and face the Tomb for 21 seconds. They then change their weapon to the outside shoulder, count off 21 seconds and step off for another 21 steps and face the Tomb. The Sentinel repeats this over and over until the Guard Change ceremony. Incidentally, the guards do not wear insignia, so as not to outrank the Unknowns, whatever their ranks may have been. The weather does not bother the Sentinels at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. They march through rain, sleet, snow or blistering heat. But the welfare of the soldier is paramount. The Tomb Guards have contingencies plans in case weather conditions put them at risk. There is a rumor that during Hurricane Isabel, the Sentinels were ordered to abandon their posts for shelter and that they refused. No such order was ever given. The Society of the Honor Guard which provides information on both the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and those that guard it also debunks



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

They can control the flow of cases but still need two more attorneys. They do not have the ability to sentence nor are they able to set bail. Those functions of the court rest with the two judges in the Circuit, who hear the cases. EXECUTIVE ORDER THE CITY OF SWAINSBORO EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 2023-3 "EXTENSION OF TEMPORARY JUVENILE CURFEW"

WHEREAS, the City of Swainsboro ("City") enjoys all rights, privileges, and powers incident to the establish of the City as a municipal corporation and is authorized to act through the Swainsboro City Council ("Council") who shall have full power and authority to enact all ordinances, by-laws, rules, regulations necessary for the good government of the City and for securing the health of its citizens. Charter of the City of Swainsboro ("Charter"), § 42(1); and

WHEREAS, the City has the right and authority to protect the personal property of the citizens and to establish the police force; Id. at § 42(11); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 30 of the Swainsboro City Ordinances ("Ordinance"), the Council has established an emergency management system for the City ("Emergency Management System"; and WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 62-9 of the Ordinances, the Council has granted the Mayor of the City of Swainsboro ("Mayor") the right and authority to institute a curfew and the hours thereof, when the Mayor "deems it necessary for the protection of the health and welfare of the citizens or public or private property or located in [the City]"; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Executive Order No. 2023-2 Declaration of Temporary Juvenile Curfew ("Ex. Order 2023-2") a temporary juvenile curfew was established and is in place from August I 0, 2023 until midnight September 9, 2023 which may be extended if so ordered within the effective period of Ex. Order 2023-2 for period not longer than thirty (30) days;

WHEREAS, the Mayor deems it necessary to extend the temporary juvenile curfew for an additional thirty

(30) days for the protection of life and property of the citizens of the City; and

IT IS THEREFORE HEREBY RESOLVED by the City of Swainsboro that:

- I. Title. This Executive Order shall be known as the "EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 2023-3 EXTENSION OF TEMPORARY JUVENILE CURFEW".
- 2.Preamble. The foregoing recitals in the Preamble are incorporated herein by reference as if set forth in full herein.
- 3.Declaration. The Mayor hereby declares the necessity to extend the temporary juvenile curfew to protect the life and property of the citizens of the City.
- 4.Extension. The temporary juvenile curfew established under Ex. Order 2023-2 shall be extended and effective until midnight October 9,
- 5.Effective Date. EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 2023-3 EXTENSION OF TEMPORARY JUVENILE CURFEW shall be effective upon signing by the Mayor ("Effective Date").
- 6.Expiration. EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 2023-3 EXTENSION OF TEMPORARY JUVENILE CURFEW shall expire at midnight on October 9, 2023 ("Expiration Date"); provided however, the Mayor shall be authorized to extend the Expiration Date of this Executive Order for a period of thirty (30) days conditioned on (i) the extension occurring prior t? he Exp_irat_ion Date; and
- (ii) the new Expiration Date being no more than thirty (30) days from the ex1stmg exp1rat1on date.
- 7. Notice to Public. This Executive Order shall (i) be available for the public at City Hall; (ii) shall be

posted at City Hall upon execution and for a period ofnot less than fourteen (14) days; and(iii) a public

notice shall be placed in the Forest Blade in the first publication after the Effective Date. SO ORDERED this 11 day of August, 2023

Proposed property tax increase for Emanuel County

The Emanuel County Board of Commissioners today announces its intentions to increase the 2023 property taxes it will levy this year by 12.93 percent over the rollback millage rate.

Each year, the board of tax assessors is required to review the assessed value for property tax purposes of taxable property in the county. When the trend of prices on properties that have recently sold in the county indicate there has been an increase in the fair market value of any specific property, the board of tax assessors is required by law to re-determine the value of such property and adjust the assessment. This is called a reassessment.

When the total digest of taxable property is prepared, Georgia law requires a rollback millage rate be computed that will produce the

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


