Swainsboro dominates Metter again to move on to second round

by JUSTIN GRAY The Swainsboro Tigers began their chase for a title with a 20-0 win over Metter in the first round of the GHSA State Playoffs. As the Tigers showed in game one of the season, they were more physical and better than Metter. They had to go prove it again and once again, they did. This was a big-time bounce back win for the Tigers, after dropping their last two games of the regular season. A happy Coach Scott Roberts said, "Our kids played with great effort and did a great job of not getting frustrated when adversity hit us several times. We created several turnovers, which

took care of the football on offense. That's a winning formula for playoff football." The Tigers offense was back to its normal self with 324 yards on the ground and 59 through the air. Jordon Williams led the way with 134 yards on 16 carries with Qin Brown following him with 131 yards on 12 attempts and a touchdown. Bryson Tarver and Demello Jones both added a touchdown in the Tigers 20-0 win. Let's give the defense some love, as they shut down Metter and created turnovers. In two games against Metter, they've only allowed seven points. This is the side of the ball

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Salerno exhibition opens at Kalmanson Gallery

The oil paintings of David Salerno will be featured at the Kalmanson Gallery of Emanuel Arts Council for the months of November-December. Opening reception for "Together, A Portrait of Americans" will be held Thursday, November 16, from 5 to 7 p.m. The event is free and open to the public.

Salerno is an oil painter trained in classical realism. He is an instructor at Townsend Atelier in Chattanooga, TN. He has a keen interest in the technology of oil painting and utilizes only proven techniques and materials to ensure strong and stable paint layers that result in a quality, archival painting. He integrates his training with more contemporary techniques while preserving his commitment to the accuracy and quality of classical realism. He paints a wide range of subjects in landscape, still-life, figurative and portrait painting. Noticing his interest in drawing as a young boy, his artist mother started his learning with a Jon instructional drawing set, with



which he completed all the drawings. He has painted throughout his life, even during his years as a practicing cardiologist.

In Minneapolis, feeling the need for more formal training, Salerno found the local art school experience to be disappointing. He then discovered Atelier Lack. Attending night classes at the atelier, he obtained the foundation he was seeking in classical realism, including rigorous drawing and painting from casts and still-life painting. He later supplemented this training at Townsend Atelier in Chattanooga, where he focused on portrait and figure painting in the realism style. Since reducing his medical practice workload in 2012, followed by retirement from his medical career at the end of 2015, he has worked full-time on his passion for oil painting.

In 2022, he was voted the American Artists Professional League as an Elected Artist member. 2021, he was admitted by jury as a member in the International Guild Realism of (IGOR). In 2016, he achieved the designation of Signature Artist in the National Oil and Acrylic Painters' Society (NOAPS). In addition, he is a member of the Oil Painters of America and the Portrait Society.

"There is something within that compels me to paint," said Salerno. "The beauty that the world displays all around us calls me. We live in a stressful and complex society. I hope that my paintings can provide a source of serenity and simplification."

Worry less, migrate more

One of my grandmother's favorite expressions was, "if you worry about nothing, pretty soon you will really have something to worry about". Now I don't know if that makes sense to you, but if you could have seen the look on her face when she delivered that incantation, you would have understood exactly what she meant. Today, we live in a world that demands that we worry. Facebook, twitter, Fox, MSNBC, 1,001 other networks, and more podcasts than all the red ants in South Georgia, all demand and depend on us worrying most of the day and part of the night. That's how those folks all make a paycheck. At the turn of the century (I'm talking about the REAL turn of the century, not the one that just happened a little while ago), the world was no bigger than the distance you could travel in a wagon being pulled by a mule in one day. Think how simple that made everything. If something happened in Dublin or Statesboro or Hog Wallow, Georgia, don't worry about it, it's not your problem. You might read about it a week or so later in a newspaper, but by then it probably wasn't a problem anymore. That geographical limit worked fine for years and years until radio came along, and your world got bigger, and of course,

there was more "stuff" to worry about. Then, the telephone arrived to put you in touch with people from all over that you never met, who wanted to share all their worrying with you; and your world got even bigger. 
have much of a sense



(From front page) raced 39 yards for the second touchdown of the quarter and Jackson throwing Kennedy, the Bulldogs' only pass in the game, hit Ab Marsh who broke a couple of tackles for a 38-yard touchdown. The Bulldog defense ended two Lanier scoring threats deep in their own territory in the second quarter. James Parker made a diving interception at the ECI one yard line to end the first threat. Chase Johnson intercepted another Lanier pass inside the Bulldog 20 taking it back to the Lanier 28. ECI scored on both turnovers to lead 28-7 at halftime with all the momentum on the visitor's side of the field. Lanier Co. broke a little of that momentum on the opening possession of the third quarter. Using a running and passing game, Lanier put on a 21-play time- consuming drive to score their first touchdown of the second half for a 28-14 ECI lead. Lanier stopped the Bulldogs at midfield on

ECI's only possession of the third. The hometown Bulldogs got even closer as the third quarter horn sounded on a 21-yard run with ECI still leading by a touchdown, 28-21. Hudson Henry, carrying the ball for four consecutive plays, found the end zone on a 7-yard run to put the Bulldogs up by 14 again, 35-21, with 9:45 left in the game. Lanier once again cut the lead to just 7 points on their next drive on a 6-yard run with ECI still leading 35-28. After punting the ball back to Lanier Co. with two minutes left in the game, ECI defense sacked the Lanier quarterback twice to push them back to their own 13. Down by a TD with minute to play the Lanier fourth down pass was incomplete to give the ECI Bulldogs back the ball with under a minute to play at the Lanier Co. 8-yard line. Chase Johnson took the ball to the Lanier Co. 2-yard line on the first play to set up a second and goal. Rather than risk a fumble or possible scoop and score the Bulldogs took a knee on the next 2 downs. Instead of the possibility of a blocked field goal attempt for a possible TD, the Bulldogs took a knee on fourth down. With two timeouts during that possession and the clock stopping on change of possession, Lanier had 4 seconds and one desperation play left to tie the game. Against all odds, the Lanier quarterback threw a simple medium pass to the sideline. The receiver broke the first tackle and outran the Bulldog defense to tie the game as the horn sounded and pandemonium broke out on the home side. Opposition to the Georgia Hi-Lo Trail Project Through Emanuel County

WHEREAS, the Georgia Hi-Lo Trail initiative aims to create one of the longest bike trails in the United States, which is proposed to traverse through Emanuel County; and

WHEREAS, the construction and maintenance of such a trail would necessitate significant financial commitments, including local matches for grants and ongoing expenses for approximately 35 miles of trail within the county; and

WHEREAS, the proposed route of the trail would follow rural county roads, and the majority of landowners along the proposed route have expressed substantial opposition to the trail; and

WHEREAS, the Emanuel County Board of Commissioners respects the property rights of its citizens and opposes the appropriation of land for such projects against the will of the landowners; and

WHEREAS, Emanuel County has numerous other priorities that supersede the development of the Georgia Hi-Lo Trail; and

WHEREAS, the Emanuel County Board of Commissioners is open to collaboration with state authorities to explore future opportunities for bike lane development along state routes, with the stipulation that community input is integral to the process;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Emanuel County Board of Commissioners hereby declares its opposition to the Georgia Hi-Lo Trail project as currently proposed, and to any future efforts that may attempt to route the trail through Emanuel County without the express consent and support of the community and affected landowners.



by HAROLD SCOTT Football playoffs are in full swing, but basketball season has also begun for many state teams. Most teams start their season in the middle of November, but due to Swainsboro High traditionally being in the football season playoffs, their season begins later.

Girls Preview

A few years ago, Swainsboro High girls' basketball team had two 9th graders who looked as good as any two freshmen in the state. Both started and played exceptionally well. The team finished with an 11-10 record and made it to the second round of the state playoffs. During that season, freshman Jayden Wynn averaged 8 points and three steals. Freshman Tanyia Williams averaged 10 points and 12 rebounds. Williams and Wynn are now seniors. As fate would have it, 2020-2021 was the last season both played an entire season together. Taniya missed most of the 2021-2022 season. The team finished that year with a record of 20- 3 and made it to the second round of the state tournament. In 2022-2023, Jayden missed the entire season. The team finished 18-7 and made it to the third round of the playoffs. Tanyia averaged 16 points with 12 rebounds and was selected to the All-State team establishing herself as one of the best players in the state. Tanyia is an outstanding all-around player. She can score, rebound, and play defense. Although she was the leading scor-



ness and leadership are evident when playing defense and rebounding. Many players want to reach the 1,000-point scoring club, but Tanyia says she wants to pass 1,000 rebounds during her career. Jayden Wynn is an outstanding guard who can penetrate and finish strong or score from the outside. Her poise and ball handling makes other teams' pressure less effective. Jayden is coming off an ACL injury last season but averaged 10.3 points, 3.7 rebounds, and three steals in 2021. Look for these seniors to have a significant impact on the season. Her team has been to the playoffs each of those years. Coach Walden's record is 162 wins and 72 losses.

Boys Preview

Hobbs's team finished as the state runner-up during his first season and won the championship during his fourth year. Last year, his team made it to the final four round of the state tournament. Coach Hobbs is one of the senior coaches at SHS and is a proven winner. He doesn't like to take credit for his success. He gives that credit to the kids and former coaches Leroy Jordan and Bobby Andrews for mentoring and building the tradition. Hobbs is an intense coach on the court yet humble off. He depends on God for guidance. Coach Hobbs doesn't mind bringing in former players to assist or listening to the input of those who grew up Tigers or others in the community. Additionally, Coach Hobbs won a state championship in track in 2007 and was runner-up in 2008.

Lost to graduation from last year's team are Ty Adams, Jakari Nobles, and Dorien Foots. All were impactful players over the past few years for the Tigers. Returning players who saw significant time last year are DeMello Jones, LJ Morgan, Carmello Lewis, and Kavoyea Williams. Jones averaged 12 points and seven rebounds on the court and of course is a stand-out on the gridiron. He is a football commit to the University of Georgia, which may impact his status for the basketball season. Lewis was the team's second leading scorer, averaging double figures. 

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
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TCE students perform at annual Veterans Day Program

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

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
