
# Council and Mayor put the brakes on Sunday alcohol

The regular meeting of the Swainsboro City Council and Mayor took place Monday evening, January 8, 2024, at 6 p.m. at City Hall. Reverend Love of St. Phillips Baptist Church brought an Invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance followed. In public meeting, a second reading of a proposed ordinance providing an additional 3% penalty to original fines for violators of traffic laws in Georgia took place. In later action in old business, council endorsed this ordinance increasing fines by a unanimous vote. A new council member, Quantavius Foster Sr. was sworn in and assumed the seat formerly held Ward 5. Foster defeated

Parker in a December Incumbents runoff. Julian Sconyers and D.J. Davis were also sworn in for new terms in their respective wards. A rambling discussion concerning an alcoholic beverage license advertisement took the stage as old business continued. After deliberation, council voted to accept the application for alcohol license

advertisement only at 227 West Main Street. In new business, council voted to move two part time employees to full time. Emily Hendley was given full-time status in the Clerk's department and Austin Woods became a full-time employee in the Fire Department. 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
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# Hometown decorator decks the capital halls—again!

If decorating the White House gets you on Santa's Nice List, Jim Roberts is on it. He's fresh off his third trip to help pretty up the president's home for the holidays, and this year, he got to put his talents front and center at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue.

"I was in the Blue Room this time," Roberts explained. "It houses the main, huge Christmas tree that pays tribute to all the states and territories. I actually hung Georgia's tag on it."

Getting to do that honor has been a long time coming.

Roberts started his business, Southern Traditions, more than 20 years ago. Since then, he has become the go-to for many people in Emanuel County when it comes to floral and interior design. That is especially true around the holidays each year; his open houses bring hundreds of people from near and far to his shop on East Main for the unveiling of his artistic show of Christmas.

In 2019, he went national—literally—and volunteered to help execute then-First Lady Melania Trump's festive vision for the White House. He and a group of "teammates" were specifically assigned the Lower and Upper Cross Halls.

Roberts made a repeat trip to Capitol Hill a year later. He spent 8

days, leading a team of his own to decorate the East Colonnade, the East Room, and the East Landing, home to the all-important Gold Star Tree that memorializes fallen service members. His handiwork earned him yet another trip to Washington about 2

months ago.

Roberts admitted a fondness for his first gig working on the presidential mansion; he compared it to the jaw-dropping magic of a first-ever Disney World trip. However, his most recent time in the capital was unique in a few ways.

For starters, gone were the days of volunteering to help. This time, he was sought out to help.

"The designer in charge of the Blue Room, he was hired by the White House," Roberts explained. "He actually reached out to me. He asked if I was interested, and, of course, I said yes."

It also gave him an opportunity to work under a second first lady, Dr. Jill Biden.

She took inspiration from "The Night Before Christmas" as the theme and tasked Roberts and his colleagues to transform the historic, stoic walls into a winter wonderland that embodied the special splendor the season brings for children while reminding adults, through the nostalgia of the classic holiday book, to be present with their loved ones.

Roberts left Swainsboro the day before Thanksgiving and spent almost a week working on the project. As it turned out, the process looked different this time as well.

"When we all got there, we learned there would be a lot of designers doing different sections. They told us about the theme and the inspiration, how the hope was to feel like you were walking into that book, and each team was given a specific color to work with to do it," Roberts said. "I actually thought, 'This isn't going to look cohesive because each designer is going to have their own look,' but in the end, it flowed very well. The First Lady and her staff did a very good job of getting everyone to work in that same theme."

He also credits that feat to the level of expert hands in the White House at the time.

"There were some big designers there. Common people might not know who they are, but for me in the design world, they're big names. Getting to work alongside them and watch them bring their part to life was surreal," Roberts said.

He continued, "In fact, that's a good word to sum up the experience as a whole, no matter how many times you get to do it. You look around and you're in the White House! There's Secret Service around you all the time, the social secretary is coming around constantly to make sure you're enjoying yourself. First Lady Biden hosted a reception for us, and I got to meet her... Not only is it surreal, it's also humbling. To have been trusted enough to get to be a part of this, especially for a third time, I'm really grateful for that." He also learned a lot during this trip.

"Looking back on it, I definitely came back with new design ideas.

Not all of what I saw would be applicable here at home, but I can modify them so that they will be. So, that's good news for Swainsboro."








































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# O'Conner speaks to Kiwanis
