Commissioner Foskey won't seek re-election

The Emanuel County Board of Commissioners held its first meeting of the new year on Tuesday, January 16, at 6 p.m. at the John C. Coleman County Office Building. Members present included Commission Chairman Hugh Foskey, Commissioner Timmy Commissioner Oliver, Thompson, Ricky and Commission Chairman Vice Jim Sherrod. Also present were County Administrator Guy Singletary and County Clerk Stacy

Chairman Scarboro. Foskey called the meeting to order and asked Administrator Singletary to offer the Invocation. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting and opened the floor for any public comments. Hearing none, the agenda moved to approval of minutes from the regular meeting of December 18, 2023, and the workshop meeting of January 9, 2024. The minutes were unanimously approved.

Foskey then discussed appointments of the committee members for 2024. These committees are vested by the county, and Commissioners serve in an advisory role and in some cases as voting members. Emanuel County Schools awarded **Opportunities Grant from GaDOE**

Emanuel County Schools has been selected to receive a Teaching and Learning Opportunity Grant from the Georgia Department of Education. As a part of this grant, three schools -Swainsboro Elementary Swainsboro School, Middle School and Twin City Elementary School have been award-Manipulatives and Materials Grant. The grant amounts to \$11,639 and will help promote interactive and high-quality mathematics instruction aligned manipulatives, explore with the new K-12 math standards for ECS students. With this grant, students can work with

real-life situations, and solve problems, all while enhancing their math skills.

– 1996. Brown is not new to public service, as he has served on the Development Authority of Twin City since 2017.

Mayor Donaldson briefed the Commission on the upcoming road resurfacing project. Beginning in January, the City will be resurfacing 25% (1/4) of all the roads in Twin City. The project cost is approximately \$1 million. The project is funded through a grant and loan through the Georgia Transportation Infrastructure Bank, with the City pledging \$400,000 in matching funds.

The Commission also Resolution approved 2024-01, which is a cooperative agreement between the City and Spring Fountain Lodge 414. The lodge has been engaged in city beautification projects and wished to formalize the relationship with the adoption of West Broad Street. Mayor Donaldson thanked the lodge members for their involvement and pledged continued support from the City of Twin City.

In other action, the Commission approved the minutes from the December 5th Budget Hear-

Since 2022, Freeman has taken on other roles involving applying for grants and community projects - mostly notably the Cotton Blossom Festival. Missy Turner is the featured artist for Black History Month at The Kalmanson Gallery of Emanuel Arts Council. An opening reception will be held February 8, from 5 to 7 p.m. and is free and open to the public.

Missy and her husband, David Burrell, are the new owners of the historic Morgan House in Swainsboro. Missy has always shown that one of her main aspirations in life is to actually discover her various purposes and then fulfill them. Always creative, and a woman who takes life by the horns to create her own path, Missy ventured into the world of art a few years ago as a painter. "Most of the time, I begin with a few strokes and allow the art to take its own direction," she said. "The energy leads. I follow." Since beginning her artistic journey, she has created over 200 pieces of art. Missy's art is reflective of who she is as a person--colorful, thoughtful, often deliberate, soft and strong, smart, emotional, conscious, and loving. She uses acrylics, oils and other media in combination with trained well-developed and self-taught techniques. As a result, she's able to produce still-life and abstract artwork that reflects a distinguished painting style in which her unique aesthetic signature is easily

identified. Missy sources and collects a wide range of figurative and abstract imagery from her environment. She then transposes and translates these images with bold brushstrokes, sometimes colorful patterns, and exuberantly painted imagery. Her art also includes muted tones and meticulous detail that invoke feelings of gentleness and the fragility of life. As from where she draws her inspiration, she says, "The answer is simple. Look around you-Nature. Animals. Experience. Love. Life."



Fulton County DA suddenly finds herself in a big mess

Shades of Laurel and Hardy. When something went awry in one of their slapstick movies Oliver Hardy would declare to hapless Stan Laurel, "This is a fine mess you've gotten us into." This would certainly apply to Fulton County district attorney, Fani Willis, and unlike Laurel and Hardy who managed to extricate themselves from said mess before the end of the movie, Willis's mess isn't going away. In fact, it is getting messier. For reasons that make no sense other than political self-aggrandizement, Willis took it upon herself to begin an investigation and indictment of former president Donald Trump and eighteen others on racketeering, conspiracy and other charges regarding potential 2020 election interference. I am not a Donald Trump fan but I think the effort is and has been a waste of taxpayer dollars and that any perceived electoral misdeeds on the part of the former president and his supporters should be the responsibility of federal authorities, not Fulton County. Willis should be concentrating on the huge backlog of pending felony cases awaiting trial. Leave Trump and his posse to the Feds. It has been a mess from the beginning. The first indication was when Willis subpoenaed Georgia's current Lt. Gov. Burt Jones, one of 16 Trump electors who signed on to an "unofficial electorate certificate" in an effort to undo the Electoral College vote in the 2020 election. This, after she had held a fundraiser for Iones' Democratic opponent before the election and had donated money to his primary campaign. Fulton Superior Court Judge Robert McBurney who oversaw the special grand jury proceedings criticized Willis and called it

a "What are you thinking moment," and added, "The optics are horrific." And the political ineptitude striking. Fani Willis now finds herself in a mess worse than anything Laurel and Hardy could have dreamed up. A motion filed by attorney Ashleigh Merchant, representing Mike Roman, one of Donald Trump's codefendants in the case, accuses Willis of engaging in an "improper, clandestine personal relationship" with a married private attorney, Nathan Wade, who she had hired as a "special prosecutor." Fulton County records show Willis has paid Wade \$654,000 since January 2022, far more than other attorneys on the case. Merchant says she has no proof that Wade has ever tried a felony RICO case. The other two special prosecutors are Anna Cross a former DeKalb County assistant district attorney who has handled dozens

of felony cases and John Floyd, considered an expert on state RICO prosecutions and who helped draft the law. Together, they billed \$116,000, less than a quarter of what Wade was paid. Merchant's motion which runs 38 pages alleges among other things that Willis and Wade began a romantic relationship prior to her hiring him and that Wade funded lavish vacations for the two of them with money he was paid for his work on the election interference case. The mess keeps getting messier. On the same day Merchant filed her motion, Willis was served with a subpoena by representatives of Nathan Wade's wife, Joycelyn, to testify in the Wades' divorce case. As it stands now, the records of the divorce action have been sealed in Cobb County and a number of news outlets, including the Atlanta Journal-Constitution, the New York Times, Washington



Post, and CNN are asking that the records be unsealed. Willis has been trying to quash the subpoena seeking her testimony in the divorce proceedings. Why? Does she have anything to hide? Fulton County Superior Court Judge Scott McAfee who is overseeing the election interference case against former president Trump and the others has set a hearing for Feb. 15 and has given the Fulton County District Attorney's Office a Feb. 2 deadline to file a written response to the allegations made by Mike Roman and his legal team. Rather than provide taxpayers with answers as to the accusations and taking the opportunity to prove her accusers wrong, Willis has



chosen instead to play the race card. She has declared all of this is because she is a Black woman. Joycelyn Wade, Nathan Wade's ex, is a Black woman, too. This isn't about race. It is about perceptions. If Fani Willis is paying a hefty salary to a romantic partner with limited experience, that is a genuine conflict of interest that would require her dismissal from the case and possible action by the State Bar Association and perhaps Georgia Atty. 

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



News from under the Gold Dome: *Week of January 8*

The 157th Georgia General Assembly convened for the 2024 legislative session on Monday, January 8, 2024, which marked the start of the second year of our biennial General Assembly. In addition to convening in the House Chamber each day, our House committees also began holding meetings to consider legislation that carried over from the 2023 legislative session, as well as new legislation that has been introduced.

On Thursday, members of the House and Senate gathered in the House Chamber to convene for a joint session to hear Governor Brian Kemp as he presented his assessment on the current condition of our state government in his annual State of the State Address. This gathering provides a unique opportunity for our governor to reflect on the foundation of the state and present his legislative priorities for the year ahead.

Prior to discussing his priorities for the session, the governor reflected on the progress our state has experienced since his last address. Over the last year, Georgia's government has provided nearly \$5 billion of direct relief to taxpayers in the form of tax refunds, gas tax suspensions and homestead tax exemptions. The governor applauded the state's work to maintain a Triple-A bond rating, while simultaneously creating more than 171,000 new jobs and approximately \$74.5 billion of investment over the last five years. To build off of this job growth and economic prosperity, the governor announced his plans to speed up the implementation of the largest tax cut in state history. This proposed tax cut would decrease our state income tax to 5.39 percent starting this year and represent a savings of \$3 billion for Georgia taxpayers over the next decade.

I will share a few highlights below:

• The Amended FY 2024 Governor's budget provides funds for the design, construction, and equipment of the dental school at Georgia Southern University, Savannah, Chatham County.

• A permanent appropriation in the state budget for school security of \$104 million, specifically for school safety improvements. With these funds, schools will be able to determine how to use that money in order to best meet the security needs of their individual schools.

• A request for a \$3,000 pay raise for State Patrol officers, as well as Georgia's correctional officers and other state law enforcement agencies.

• Legislation for the peace officer loan repayment program. Peace officers play a vital role in supporting the safety and security of Georgia's residents.

• Continue efforts to combat human trafficking in Georgia. Under the leadership of First Lady Marty Kemp and the GRACE Commission, eight pieces of legislation that target traffickers, while also supporting victims, have been signed into law. These efforts have enabled Georgia's GBI HEAT unit to investigate 369 cases of human trafficking since its creation.

The governor went on to outline his priorities surrounding health care, recapping the strides made to lower health care costs, expand access and incentivize more health care providers to give care. Since the passage of the Patients First Act in 2019, 87 percent of Georgia counties now have three or more health care insurance carriers, whereas prior to 2019, no Georgia county had more than two. The governor continued by expressing his gratitude for the Georgia Access and the reinsurance program for their efforts to grow enrollment in the private sector from 460,000 to more than 1.2 million Georgians today. Gov. Kemp also touted the achievements of the Mental Health Parity Act, a fitting capstone to the late Speaker David Ralston's years of service to the Georgia House Representatives. of As a result of this legislation, Commissioner Kevin Tanner and the Georgia Department Behavioral Health of Developmental and Disabilities (DBHDD) carried out Speaker Ralston's legacy with the 9-8-8 crisis hotline campaign, which gave more Georgians access to the services and help they need. To build on this achievement, the governor is proposing a total increase of \$205 million for DBHDD and other entities that address mental health in our state. With these appropriations, Georgia will be spending \$1.6 billion on mental health care – more than ever before.

Finally, Gov. Kemp discussed his plans to bolster retention and recruitment efforts across the state by proposing pay increases for all state employees and teachers. In his remarks, Gov. Kemp highlighted the importance of maintaining an efficient state government, while staying ahead of Georgia's continued economic growth none of which would be possible without the dedication and workmanship of Georgia's state employees and teachers. In his proposed budget, Georgia's state workers and teachers would see a four percent pay increase. In addition to supporting Georgia's current employees, the governor intends to allocate \$500 million to shore up the state retiree fund, ensuring our state keeps its promise to our retirees and maintains solid financial footing. The governor closed his remarks with applauding the state of our state for being strong, growing and full of opportunity.

In addition to hearing Gov. Kemp's State of the State Address on Thursday, the House voted to adopt an Adjournment Resolution, House Resolution 779, to set our calendar for this legislative session. Each session is comprised of 40 non-consecutive days, and this year's calendar sets our final day of session, or "Sine Die," on Thursday, March 28. We have an aggressive schedule this year and much work to be done prior to the final swing of the gavel. You can find a copy

of our complete legislative calendar here. Now that the 2024

legislative session has begun, I will spend most of my time over the next few months at the State Capitol. After we celebrate the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday, my colleagues and I will return to the Capitol on Tuesday, January 16 to begin our work on one of the most important pieces of legislation of this sessionthe state budget. Before leaving the Capitol last Friday, my colleagues and I received the governor's budget books, which include his budget recommendations for the amended and full fiscal year budgets. We will review these recommendations, and the House and Senate Appropriations committees will hear directly from the governor to discuss his recommendations on Tuesday morning. The Appropriations committees will continue to meet throughout next week to discuss budget requests from our state agency heads, and I look forward to sharing updates with you about the budget process.

As our House committee meetings get underway throughout the session, you can attend these meetings in person or watch live streams of all official House committee and subcommittee meetings on the House website. You can always find the meeting schedule and live streams at *https:// www.legis.ga.gov/schedule/ house.*

News from Under the Gold Dome: Week of January 15

On Tuesday, January 16, I returned to the State Capitol to begin "budget week." Each year, the Georgia General Assembly is tasked with one constitutional obligation which is to pass a balanced budget. The second week of the legislative session is historically devoted to joint House and Senate Appropriations Committee hearings to begin the state budget process. To kick-off budget week, Governor Brian Kemp presented his formal recommendations to the joint committee for the current and upcoming fiscal year budgets, and the governor's proposal will ultimately be incorporated into legislation that will guide how our state allocates its spending. As we start the state budget process, we will begin drafting two budget bills. The first bill, the Amended Fiscal Year 2024 (AFY 2024) budget, will appropriate spending for the remainder of the current fiscal year ending on June 30 and accounts for any differences between last year's projected revenue estimate and actual revenue obtained. Based on updated revenue estimates, the AFY 2024 budget will include approximately \$5.06 billion in additional revenue that our state can utilize over the next six months. This adjustment brings the total appropriation for the Fiscal Year 2024 budget to \$37.51 billion. The second bill, the Fiscal Year 2025 (FY 2025) budget, will determine state spending for the upcoming fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2024, and ending on June 30, 2025. This FY 2025 budget is set at a revenue estimate of \$36 billion. As Gov. Kemp discussed his budget proposal with the joint committee, he recapped Georgia's achievements in recent years and highlighted that more than \$5 billion has been directly returned to Georgia taxpayers through tax rebates and suspension of the state's motor fuel tax in addition to enacting the largest income tax reduction in Georgia history. He also noted that because of sound financial investments, Georgia has remained the number one state in which to do business for 10 consecutive years and remained one of only a few states to have a AAA bond rating. Gov. Kemp highlighted that his AFY 2024 and FY 2025 budget proposal will help further our state's historic economic development for years to come.

and OneGeorgia Authority. This funding would support economic development projects, promote investment in Georgia businesses, expand grant opportunities for rural site development, as well as provide further grant opportunities to address workforce housing in our rural communities.

the remainder of the fiscal year and the upcoming fiscal year. We also heard from Georgia's fiscal economist who provided a comprehensive overview of Georgia's economic forecast for this year. The important presentations will assist us as we begin the next phase of the state budget process and work to ensure that we create budgets that meet the diverse needs of our state and its citizens. Now that the joint budget hearings have concluded, the House Appropriations subcommittees will begin to meet to review specific portions of the budget and delve deeper into the state agencies' budget needs. Since the Georgia Constitution requires budget bills to originate in the House, each House Appropriations subcommittee will pass their respective portions of the AFY 2024 and FY 2025 state budgets, which will collectively result in two complete budget bills to be approved by the full House Appropriations Committee. After being approved by the full House Appropriations Committee, each budget bill will be scheduled for a vote on the House floor by the House Rules Committee. After each budget bill is voted on and passed out of the House, these bills will be transmitted to our counterparts in the Senate and will undergo the same process. There will likely be changes to the governor's original proposal as the House and Senate continue to work through the budget process, and I will keep you updated as these bills are voted on and finalized. We will reconvene for legislative day six of the session on Monday, January 22. We expect to have another busy week ahead as the pace of the session continues to pick up and as House committees begin to meet more frequently to consider legislation. I remain dedicated to serving your interests as your state representative, and I hope that you will contact me with any questions or concerns you may have regarding the legislative session or with any proposals or recommendations for future legislation.

Highlights from the Governor's proposed budget:

• \$1.5 billion investment in the AFY 2024 budget for the Georgia Department of Transportation to maintain our roadways, accelerate construction on "shovel-ready" projects and expedite existing projects.

• \$250 million for the Georgia Environmental Financing Authority's Georgia Fund to support critical water and wastewater infrastructure development through low-interest loans to local communities across the state.

• \$250 million in additional funds for economic development grants provided through the Regional Economic Business Assistance (REBA) grant program

• \$1 billion investment in the state's retirement, risk and health portfolios. This includes a \$500 million investment in the Employees' Retirement System to provide greater flexibility in establishing cost-of-living adjustments for state retirees.

• \$244 million to K-12 schools for teacher's health insurance without requiring reductions in coverage or further increases in their out-of-pocket costs

• \$306 million in the AFY 2024 budget to provide a \$1,000 pay supplement, as well as \$630 million in FY 2025 to provide a four percent cost-of-living adjustment to state employees; K-12 teachers and other certified employees would see a \$2,500 salary increase under the governor's plan.

• \$205 million to update the public transportation formula to provide significantly more state support for school transportation needs.

• \$11 million for K-12 literacy initiatives, including regional literacy coaches and screeners for K-3 students to ensure that our young learners are able to read on grade level.

• \$104 million in FY 2025 to establish a new, annual school security grant program.

This FY 2025 budget proposal would provide local schools with a combined total of more than \$1.4 billion in additional funding to meet growth needs, bolster teacher pay, maintain quality health and retirement benefits and improve safety.

A few other noteworthy items in Gov. Kemp's AFY 2024 and FY 2025 budget proposal include:

• \$1 million to expand access to mental health services for Georgia's military service members, veterans and their families

• \$205 million for the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities and other entities that address mental health in our state

• \$9 million for a new behavioral health crisis center

 \$4 million for the Safe Harbor for Sexually Exploited Children Fund Commission for rehabilitation of victims of sex trafficking

• \$1 million to expand the maternal health pilot program in rural communities

• \$42 billion to provide a \$3,000 salary increase for select POST certified law enforcement officers

• \$3 million for equipment and vehicles to implement the Georgia Electric Vehicle Charging Program

• \$10 million to begin reducing the pre-K classroom size from 22 to 20 students
