SPD celebrates annual Police Awards Banquet

The 2024 Swainsboro Police Awards Banquet was held Thursday evening, February 22, at Beaver Creek Plantation. Swainsboro Police Chief Randy Ellison opened the program with a welcome to everyone and a note of appreciation to the Webb Family of the Beaver Creek venue for their special support. The Chief also thanked Sgt. Grant, Administrative Assistant Zelda Sumner and his wife Wanda for decorating the room. Members of city council Julian Sconyers and Johnny Ray Stafford were in attendance as well as Mayor Greg Bennett and Municipal Judge Richard McNeely.

Following the banquet meal, the annual awards ceremony highlighted the recognition of achievement and presentation of honors for individual officers for the 2023 service year. Chief Ellison commended the entire department for its dedication in serving the City of Swainsboro including the divisions of patrol, drug suppression, investigations, animal control, code enforcement and administration. In the many years since Chief Ellison first initiated the awards banquet, over 300 individual awards have been earned by members of the staff. The first order of recognition for the evening was the traditional "swearing in ceremony" of new Police Officers. This year, Ptl. Jacob Wheeler, Ptl. Cari Hall, and Ptl. Tyler Beasley were given the charge of the oath by Mayor Bennett. Chief Ellison delivered the badge creed to the newly sworn officers. The badge creed symbolizes the solemnity and weight of responsibility in the enforcement of the law that is reflected by the outward display of the badge. In a special segment of the evening's agenda, four officers received promotions. In announcing these, Chief Ellison emphasized that the recipient must first demonstrate mastery of the duties of the lower rank, and then be willing to learn and carry out the duties of the higher rank. Promotions are granted once a year to fill the gaps in the chain of command, but only if earned by those considered promotable. The following officers were recognized for their hard work and dedication to duty. Ptl. Le'untay Starnes received promotion to Patrolman First Class. Pfc Seth Purvis received promotion to the rank of Corporal. Sgt. Mathew Williams and Sgt. James Young were both promoted to Staff Sergeant. Chief Ellison also commended Sgt. Williams and Sgt. Young for their prior service as Sergeant and completion of all levels 1,2 and 3 of Supervision Training (120 hours) as required by policy.

In a time-honored highlight of the evening, the "Officer of the Year" Award was again given to the individual who is selected by the majority of his or her peers for demonstrating extraordinary accomplishments over the previous year. This award ribbon is worn by the selected officer for one year, unless re-selected for the same. Chief Ellison commented, "This year's winner comes prepared to tackle whatever comes his way during his tour of duty. He keeps himself motivated and does not allow outside influences to affect his job duties. This officer's name will join those previously selected for this honor as indicated by a plaque displayed in the agency's headquarters. This officer served our great nation as part of the United States military and continues his service to our community. It gives me great pleasure to award the "Officer of the Year" for 2023 to Ptl. Le'untay Starnes. After Ptl. Starnes received a standing ovation, the Chief also added that Ptl. Starnes received a unanimous vote from his fellow officers for this honor.

(From front page) As the program moved toward conclusion, the order of business took a personal turn as Chief Ellison marked the approaching milestone of 15 years' service as Chief of the Swainsboro Police Department. He recounted the pleasure he has always taken in leading and fighting for those he led. In doing so, he explained he has always considered himself a cop first and holding the rank of Chief as second. "The many decisions that I have made and continue to make were always made with the best interest of my staff and the agency in mind. Tonight, I am officially announcing to my great staff and those in attendance that I will be retiring in December of this year having completed a total of 35 years of service in law enforcement with various agencies." Ellison referenced his parents as his guideposts for his personal and professional life. "My father, as some of you know, was a decorated war veteran and he instilled in me to work hard every day to leave something better than you found it. My mother taught me compassion and to look at somebody not from the outside but find what lays inside a person". The Chief closed on a lighthearted note with a favorite expression, "I still haven't found out who let the dogs out, or where's the beef, or why all the flavors of fruit loops taste the same, or how many licks it takes to get to the center of a tootsie roll pop, why eggs are packaged in a flimsy paper cartoon but batteries are secured in plastic that's tough as nails, why "abbreviated" is such a long word or why there is a D in fridge but not refrigerator and why do you have to put your two cents in but its only worth a penny for your thoughts and just what is Victoria's secret? I still don't know all of that. But one thing I do know is that I will leave this department in better shape than I found it fifteen years ago. I know that I have the best staff that a chief of police could possibly have, and I know that each of you in this department will do the right thing at the right time for the right reason. As I stand here before you as your Chief and your brother, I want you to know I will always be grateful for my time here and will remain proud of what we have accomplished together. I will complete the next 10 months of duty by focusing on completing my mission by reaching new goals I have set for this agency, and I will continue to work hard for each of you to make your job as safe and enjoyable as possible. I thank you for the confidence you have in me, and for allowing me to have such an amazing group to lead. It's been an honor."

At this point, Administrative Assistant Zelda Sumner took the podium to express her gratitude and appreciation on behalf of the administrative staff to Chief Ellison. She then called on Captain Richard Peacock who provided a response from the uniformed staff as well as recollections of the past fifteen years. Former Mayor Charles Schwabe recounted the hiring of Chief Ellison and the professionalism he brought to the department. "I felt like we picked the right man at the right time for the right job when we hired Chief Ellison back then, and I still feel that way today". In a final tribute, former City Administrator Al Lawson chose several words that he felt were the most descriptive of the Chief. Lawson concluded, "Professionally, the one word that comes to mind when I think of the Chief is integrity, and personally, the one word that says it all is friend". With that, a very busy and meaningful observance of professionalism and camaraderic came to a close. Congratulations to all those recognized and honored.



Church. Blanton Sidney Shepherd, Sr. was born January 16, 1935, in Elizabeth City, NC. His family moved Savannah in 1940 where he attended school and graduated from Savannah High in 1952. He attended Armstrong Junior College before transferring to the University of Georgia "Go DAWGS" graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1957. While at UGA, he met and married the love of his life, Jane. Sidney always said he went to UGA to get a wife and Emory University Law School to get his law degree. Admitted to the State Bar of Georgia in April 1960, he actively practiced law until the end of his life. He served as Deputy Legislative Counsel to the Georgia Legislature before moving to Swainsboro in November 1961 to join the law firm of Williams Smith, founded in 1890, currently known as Shepherd, Gary & McWhorter, LLC. Sidney loved and considered it a privilege to serve this community in many ways over the years. At First Baptist Church of Swainsboro, he was in the same Sunday School class for 50 years, served on the Board of Deacons and taught Sunday School. Who has the worst job in America? I don't have any factual information to back it up, but if I had to throw one out there, I would say the poor souls who have to make a living doing surveys on the telephone would rank pretty high, or low on the list, depending on how you looked at it. I should have known better, but the other day, I answered an 800 number just out of curiosity. The young interviewer wanted to know how I was going to vote and asked me the standard demographic questions, and then he asked about my education. Did you get a college degree? Yes, I did. Well, how would you like some help paying off your student loan debt? Well, I'd like some just fine, but I already paid it off about 40 years ago. I see, well, how long have you been in your current field. Well, I started in my current field in the early 1960s. I then heard a click,

then silence, and then the dial tone. My guess is at that point, I was eliminated from the survey. I had, however, told him the truth. In my current field, I use a computer to write for a newspaper. In 1963, I used a bicycle with a big basket on the front handlebars and a bb pistol to handle the neighborhood dogs as I delivered the news. So, I'm in the same field, right? I think every young American boy with dreams of entrepreneurial glory ought to have a paper route. The first thing it teaches you is how to establish your goals and objectives. In those days, my goal was to have enough money on Saturday afternoon to buy a new plastic model kit of the latest Air Force fighter jet at Bailey Brothers. I would do this after watching the double feature at the Dixie Theater. Then, I would go over to Stewarts Jewelers to purchase the new Elvis

45 record in order to know all the words to the new hit song before school on Monday. Now, you can see the level of planning and organization and preparation that is going on here, and the amazing thing is that we did it all back then without "Venn diagrams" or "bubble charts" or "top-of -mind Something thinking". else you learn with a paper route is pacing and self-preservation. route had thirty-six customers. On a Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday, it wasn't too bad, but when that Atlanta Journal-Constitution truck pulled up outside our house in the wee small morning hours of Thursday, Friday, Saturday and especially on Sunday and dropped all the papers for town, it was "all hands-on deck" to get my papers stuffed, rolled, rubber banded and ready to load on my trusty bike from Western Auto. If anyone remembers a Sunday Atlanta Journal back in those days, you know they were about the size of a medium Christmas turkey. You had to stop the bike and use both hands to throw one like in an Olympic competition. So, when you had 30 to 40 of those papers loaded on your bike, you were dangerously playing around with all the laws of nature, balance and physics to make it up and down the hills of Church Street, Pine Street, Racetrack Street and West Main. All it took was one new pothole in the pavement or one sneaky, lowdown, trouble-making dog lurking in the shrubbery to create disaster in the sleepy, pre-dawn streets of Swainsboro. Those episodes were rare, and I only remember one painful catastrophe. It happened on a very rainy Fall Day. One of this town's finest men in education, Principal V.E. Glenn didn't get his

paper that morning, and after school my mother drove me to his house to deliver it. Mr. Glenn had a big, fine bird dog named Dooley, I knew Dooley, and he knew me. There was only one problem. Dooley didn't know it was me underneath that yellow rain suit bringing the newspaper. He strongly objected to this yellow trespasser coming into the yard and firmly latched on to the posterior portion of this young paperboy in a manner resembling a beartrap. Fortunately, the thick rainsuit absorbed most of the bite. The paper was delivered, the bruises healed, and Mr. Glenn saw to it that Dooley and I remained friends. Sadly, today, paper routes may

they were a great learning tool back in my day. Parttime jobs, after-school work, whatever name they took, were part of the passage out of childhood and onto bigger and better things. They set a course and influenced so much of later life. Some jobs taught you skills, some taught responsibility, some taught understanding, and some just taught you a little more about the world and how it works. Whatever the lesson, the one thing that came through was the understanding that the value you gain is the reward for the effort you make. That lesson is still basic and relevant, even today. Priceless.

News from Under the Gold Dome

On Tuesday, February 20, the House reconvened for another week of the 2024 legislative session. During week seven of the session, we met in the House Chamber for three days. It was a short but packed week as we continued to prepare for the "Crossover Day" deadline on February 29, which is the last day that legislation can be passed out of its chamber of origin and remain eligible to be signed into law this year. With that in mind, we continued to make significant progress this week by voting on legislation to enhance public safety, behavioral healthcare, and education in Georgia.

On Thursday, the House unanimously passed House Bill 993, which would Came from Kay Jeweler's introduce criminal penalties for individuals who knowingly and intention- and has been inspected ally groom minors and use electronic means to persuade, induce, entice, or coerce them into committing sexual offenses or acts of human trafficking.

To help confront the opioid crisis in Georgia, the House passed House Bill 1170, which would require government buildings and courthouses that contain Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) to provide opioid antagonists to assist in the event of an opioid overdose on those premises.

The House also passed House Bill 986 to address election interference using artificial intelligence (AI), specifically deep fake technology that is intended to deceive voters and influence the outcome of an election. Known as the "AI Transparency Protection Act," HB 986 would introduce felony offenses for both the creation and solicitation of deep fake content through artificial intelligence-generated campaign advertisements aimed at interfering with elections. The term deep fake 12pm, & 2pm - 5pm refers to a video recording, video file, sound recording, sound file, electronic image, or photograph that is created through technological means, rather than through the ability of another person to physically or verbally impersonate such person and appears to depict a real person's speech or conduct that did not occur in

Finally, the House advanced legislation to improve behavioral healthcare for Georgians in order to ensure individuals have access to the resources and port needed to effectively address their mental health concerns. House Bill 1077 will establish a student loan repayment initiative tailored for behavioral health practitioners in Georgia. Under HB 1077, eligible providers would include licensed psychiatrists, addiction medicine specialists, psychologists, social workers, professional counselors, and marriage and family therapists. While these providers are completing their internships in qualified programs, they would be eligible to apply for this loan repayment program.

We also passed the following House bills and resolution during the seventh week of session:

- House Bill 472, would expand enhanced disability benefits to sworn officers, commissioners, and deputy commissioners employed by the motor carrier compliance division of the Department of Public Safety
- House Bill 579, would amend current law relating to the Georgia Special Needs Scholarship Act to allow students who previously qualified for the scholarship to remain eligible throughout the students' education House Bill 896, would allow a former spouse after divorce to petition the
- court to restore their legal surname to the given surname on their birth certificate. The motion could be filed at any time after the judgment and decree of divorce is entered, with no publication in a legal organ required.
- House Bill 907, The bill would require drivers on a two-lane road to pull to the edge or curb of the road to give the funeral procession the right-of-way
- House Bill 994, would hold boat operators liable for injury or damage when negligence occurs on the part of the operator. A rented boat operator would be held liable for negligent operation.

The Georgia House of Representatives will resume its work on Monday, February 26, and when we return, only two legislative days will remain until we reach "Crossover Day" on Thursday. With this deadline rapidly approaching, it is important that I hear from you about issues that are significant to you and your family. I hope you will reach out to me with your



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A Black History Moment: Mrs. Daisy Small





Daisy Thomas was born September 11, 1920, in Boston, Georgia, the youngest of five children born to the late Wesley and Martha Hackett Small. She received Christ at an early age at Centenary Missionary Baptist Church in Boston and her faith enriched her character. The Boston school system only went as high as the 8th grade and Daisy wanted to get a high school diploma, so her father sent her to live with his sister in St. Augustine, Florida so that Daisy could get a high school diploma and she attended Excelsior High School. While in St. Augustine, Daisy met Samuel Thomas Sr. and it was love at first sight. In 1944, they married in Chester, PA and were married 51 years until his death in 1995. After marriage, they moved to Greensboro, NC because Samuel was in college. While in Greensboro, Daisy joined the St. James Presbyterian Church. Samuel encouraged Daisy to pursue her interest and a few years later, she graduated from the Agricultural & Technical College, specializing in Tailoring, in 1948. Afterwards, she applied to American Gentleman Designing School in New York City. When she was accepted, she became the first black woman to attend that school and earned her degree in 1949. Daisy worked in a shop tailoring men's suits but at some point, realized that sewing was too boring and left that job. She decided to go back to school while working fulltime as a machinist at the P. Lorillard Tobacco Company in Greensboro, NC. Daisy eventually received a B.S. Degree in History from North Carolina A&T State University in 1968. After graduation, Samuel and Daisy moved to Swainsboro and she began teaching at Lexsy Elementary School in 1968. The next school year, Daisy was selected to teach at Adrian Elementary, an all-white school in Adrian. She was the first black female teacher to integrate the Emanuel County School System. Daisy retired from the Emanuel County Elementary School in Swainsboro in 1988. While in Swainsboro, Daisy became a member of St. James Baptist Church. After retirement, she and Samuel moved to Jonesboro and later to Waldorf, Maryland. While in Jonesboro, Daisy became a member of Shiloh Baptist, then a member of Grace Chapel while in Waldorf, until her health no longer allowed. Samuel and Daisy had two children, Samuel S. Thomas, Jr. (deceased) and Cassandra E. Thomas Kemp. They were devoted parents that built a life of happy memories. Samuel and Daisy enjoyed traveling and spending time with family and friends. Mrs. Thomas peacefully transitioned to eternal life on December 13, 2023, at the age of 103. We know Mrs. Daisy touched lots of lives throughout her career. Below are peers and friends that were directly impacted by her. -Mary Ann Peebles quoted: "To know her was to love her. Daisy appreciated the finer arts of life. She was a very fashionable dresser and loved to travel. Daisy was a true friend. She was dependable, patient, kind, and loved others unconditionally. She always generously gave to others. She did more for others than for herself. She was a good listener and never judged others. She always greeted you with a smile. Daisy always treated me with respect, kindness, and love. I am forever grateful for the many years we taught together in Adrian.

With Lots of Love. -Whitney Ricks quote: "Mrs. Daisy Thomas was my 4th grade teacher. 1968 she taught US History. You were strict for us to learn. You talked about your daughter all the time. Your main goal was for us to learn. You were always serious. Miss Daisy was one of the best African American dressed teachers.
