> A recap of those qualifying for the May 21, 2024, county election includes Brandon Jones who will be unopposed for the Board of Education District post. Incumbent Del Brown will face Cathi Frederickson for Board of Education District 3 and John Allen Baily is unopposed for District

In the May 21, 2024, election for the regular term of County Commissioner District 1, five candidates have qualified. Kwame Coleman, Kenny Griffin and Quin McKinney are running as a Democrat, Allen Farley will run as a Republican and Chris Jukes has qualified as a Republican. In the race for District 3 County Commissioner, four candidates are seeking the slot and will all run as Republicans. They are Nicky Alfonso, Chandra Hooks, John "Johnny" Randy Moore and Youmans.

The remainder of the May 21, 2024, ballot

will feature uncontested races. For the post of County Coroner, Incumbent Jeffrey Peebles is the sole qualifying candidate. In the office of Probate Judge, a political newcomer, J. Chase Sherrod has qualified without opposition. For Sheriff, the incumbent Jeff Brewer is unopposed and for Solicitor, Cindy Delgado is the sole candidate. Incumbent Richard McNeely is the single candidate for State Court Judge, and another political novice, Jessica Underwood Moran, will have no opposition in the race for the post of County

Council accepts new alcohol ordinance

The Swainsboro City Council held a called meeting on Monday evening, March 11, for the purpose of considering the adoption of the new Alcohol Ordinance for the City of Swainsboro. Present were Councilpersons Collins, Davis, Foster, Quarterman, Sconyers and Stafford. Mayor Greg Bennett was excluded from participation in the meeting due to conflict of interest. Mayor Pro Tempore Bobbie Collins conducted the meeting in which Councilperson Sconyers made a motion to adopt the new ordinance. Councilperson Foster seconded the motion, and a 5 - 0 vote resulted in its passage. The new ordinance goes into effect April 15, 2024. There was no further business reported.



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Editorials Columns **_** *Our Best?*

In a little over seven months, this country will select one candidate in the Presidential election to serve as the leader of this nation for the next four years. There are many questions to answer concerning platform and policy, world events, domestic issues and on and on. One question, however, stands out above all the others in the minds of many, and is perhaps the gravest and most consequential one of all. That simple question concerns the quality of the two leading candidates and bluntly asks, "Is this the very best our country has to offer?' The follow-up to that is another question that is just

as curt and asks, "Why would anyone want to do this anyway?" You can reasonably say it's the toughest job in the world. The pressures are immense, as evidenced by the physical appearance of every occupant of the oval office after a year or two. It's also fair to say that the job becomes more and more difficult as the external forces of a chaotic world and the internal struggles of a diverse, burgeoning and sometimes chaotic country regularly collide. Even considering all of that, it must still be true that the nation with the most successful form of government in the world in the last two centuries as well

as the most able country in the world by any other standard still produce men and women who are able to shoulder the arduous demands of the most powerful position in the free world and still reflect the goodness, honor, fairness, and enlightenment that this great country is grounded in. But where are they?

The choice we are faced with in the coming Presidential election is uninspiring and alarming, but it hasn't crept up on us without warning. The dark horizon of extremism on the left and right has slowly but incessantly grown to the point that a wider and wider chasm in political thinking now

divides us. The result is a country with less and less room for what used to be referred to as the middle ground or silent majority. Most threatening is the fact that there is also less room for "the best" this country used to rely upon and look to for leadership. Time-honored principles like healthy compromise, negotiation, and the free exchange of ideas and energy in this country have been cancelled, reviled, and pointed to as signs of weakness instead statesmanship. Whether you are Republican or Democrat, the more we retreat into party lockstep, the less we reflect the hope and the dreams

of the original founders of this country. When that happens, the "best among us" retreat as well. That is the greatest actual threat to democracy today, not the politically fabricated ones that one candidate repeatedly refers to. In the remaining months of this year, there will be two vigorous campaigns misrepresentation, exaggeration, and unvarnished lies. That disappointing process has already begun. No mat-

ter what political camp makes you feel the most comfortable, listen to the other side just a little. You don't have to agree, but maybe if enough tolerance pervades the political scene, it will help restore an atmosphere where the "best" can once again be found among us and in us. At the very least it will give you a small spark of optimism and a ray of positivity in an otherwise cloudy forecast.

able? Are we so used to this


behavior that we turn a

Georgia Ag Week celebrates farmers as they prepare to harvest and plant Spring is coming, which means Georgia farmers

onions, blueberries and wheat. In May and June, they will plant their summer crops of peanuts, cotton and soybeans. That's why Georgia Farm Bureau and other ag organizations across the state will observe Georgia

are gearing up to harvest strawberries, Vidalia

Ag Week March 18-23 and celebrate National Ag Day on March 19. National Ag Day, which has been celebrated for 51 years, is traditionally celebrated on the first day of spring. "During Georgia Ag Week, I encourage every-

one to take time to think what their life would be like if we didn't have farmers," said Robert Fountain, Jr., Emanuel County Farm Bureau president. "Farmers keep us fed, clothed and housed. They also provide habitat to wildlife on their farms while protecting soil and water resources using environmentally friendly methods to grow their crops and livestock."

United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) statistics show that Georgia farmers play a big role in feeding us. They are the top peanut producers in the United States growing almost half the peanuts grown in our country, with most used to make peanut butter and snacks. Georgia farmers lead the nation in growing broilers, the chickens used to make our favorite chicken sandwiches, tenders and wings. In 2022, Georgia pecan growers led the U.S. in production of pecans.

Georgia ranked second in production of cantaloupes, watermelons and cotton. Georgia ranked third in the U.S. for production of peaches and bell peppers, and fourth for blueberry and cucumber production, according to USDA data.

We can also thank Georgia farmers for growing cotton to clothe us and timber to house us. Georgia cotton farmers placed second in the U.S. in 2021 for both the quantity and cash value of lint and seed produced. Georgia consistently ranks as the top forestry state in the nation.

Most Georgians are multiple generations removed from the farm, so Georgia Farm Bureau (GFB) has prepared several videos that provide insight into Georgia agriculture. Not only does Georgia agriculture feed and clothe us, but it also benefits our state economy. Agriculture and related industries contributed \$83.6 billion to Georgia's economy in 2022, according to the University of Georgia's Center for Agribusiness and Economic Development (CAED).

Georgia's Top 10 commodities for 2022 were: broilers (\$6.7 billion); cotton (\$1.3 billion); eggs (\$960.2 million); peanuts (\$790.8 million); timber (\$780.8 million); beef (\$730 million); greenhouse nurseries (\$611.2 million); corn (\$522.7 million); blueberries (\$449.4 million) and pecans (\$400.8 million) according to UGA CAED reports.

Food and fiber production and the process of getting the raw materials to consumers con-

tributed 323,300 jobs for Georgians in 2022, the CAED reports. Agricultural careers include crop and livestock research, engineering, precision ag specialists, software and IT work, agribusiness management, marketing, food product develop ment and safety, processing, retailing, ag teachers banking, bioenergy, livestock veterinarians and others.

Besides providing our basic needs and driv-

ing Georgia's economy, farmers also protect the environment. Farmers prevent soil erosion and water runoff by planting cover crops and using minimum tillage methods like no-till or strip-till to plant their crops. These conservation tillage methods reduce the amount of fuel farmers use and sequester carbon in the soil, reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Farmers use about 50% less fertilizer to produce a bushel of corn, wheat or soybeans than they did

in 1980, the USDA reports. They're able to do this by using GPS, sensors, field mapping software and tractors equipped with precision ag technology. These practices allow farmers to apply only the fertilizer and crop protectants that they absolutely need to grow a healthy crop.

Lots of salt is in preserved and canned foods. When using canned vegetables, give them a sodium rinse before use. The key to modifying recipes is not "all or noth-
