# US Postal Service update

The postal service in Georgia is under a state of delay, which means the delivery of all letters and packages will be experiencing extended times of transit and arrival at destination. The problem is due to letters/packages not being scanned on the day of drop off. In many instances, outgoing mail processing will move hundreds of miles to a regional facility, outside reasonable commuting distance and, in some cases, to another state entirely.

The Swainsboro Post Office is no longer a hub, meaning when mail is dropped off at the Swainsboro Post Office, it is sent to Macon, then to Atlanta, then back to Macon and then sorted to be put on delivery trucks to be sent to the Post Office it originally

was supposed to go to, to be delivered.

Per Tyisha Fernandes, WSB-TV 2 Atlanta, on Wednesday, March 13, at 7:48 a.m., a new U.S. Postal Service facility that was built to make things more efficient is being blamed for causing major mail issues. NewsChopper 2 flew over the Regional Postal Distribution Center in Palmetto, GA on Tuesday, March 12. The facility is supposed to constantly have trucks moving in and out, but NewsChopper 2 and NewsDrone 2 both got a bird's eye view of just how many trucks were sitting still at the facility, and it was dozens. Each of those trucks is full of mail that is meant to be taken to your home. Fernandes spoke with a Postal Workers Union (Continued on page 3A)

The phrase has been used other times in the media and even in a defense debate on May 4, 1944. Still, the overwhelming majority of people consider May 4th as Star Wars Day and enjoy embracing the matching slogan, "May the 4<sup>th</sup> Be with You."

In 2008, the first social media groups appeared Luke celebrating

Skywalker Day, using the same phrase. In 2011, the first organized Star Wars Day took place in Canada. The second annual event did not happen until 2012.

Fans have celebrated Star Wars in a variety of ways using social media and television to share the celebration. Even Major League Baseball, association football and college sports have participated in the May 4th celebration. Some have worn special uniforms as part of the promotions and on May 4, 2015, International Space Station astro-

"They're supposed to stay there for 30 minutes and be gone, they're staying there for four hours. So when they go there, it pretty much ends their route," Mitchell Taylor, President of the American Postal Workers Union stated. He says all the major problems in metro Atlanta stem from the new facility that opened three weeks ago. "What they did was they moved machines and mail and to the RPDC (Regional Processing and Distribution Centers)...it left a void where they're saying we don't need these

He said supervisors had to step in, but they're not used to doing certain jobs and are slowing down operations. Taylor said the new facility has nearly 200 dock doors to get trucks in and out quickly, but it's still not enough. "We never thought that would be up to capacity, but every day all the dock doors are full and you still can't get trucks in or out," he said.






Kiara's unwavering commitment to her teammates set her apart as a true leader on and off the court.



Producing mainly pallets, crossties, crane mats, and grade lumber, they now have a Grade Mill, a Timber Mill, a Pallet Shop, and a Dry Kiln on the 462acre site in Wadley. They also have a sales office in China and export to

19 countries. Since their start with a sawmill, they now have four sawmills on site and have developed a Timber Harvesting Division, with 15 logging crews, and a fleet of 65 trucks in the Battle Logistics Division. We have lawn mower blades in any size!

One type you will not find, however, is the "shy and retiring" car salesman. I have known some of the best people you would ever want to meet while in the car business, but let's be honest, car salesmen can be a little pushy or a little impatient. Sometimes, they can be a little too helpful or a little too courteous, but

I never, ever knew one who lasted more than a month or so who was "shy and retiring". Car salesmen are entertainers, or at least part-time entertainers, and they have a personality and a special language to go with that. For example, if you have shaky credit, they might refer to you as "an upside downer", or "Aquaman" cause you are in so deep on your car loan you may never resurface, or a "dream-chaser". However, if you have a decent down payment and an average credit score, you are "puffy" or "strong as bear's breath". Your trade-in might also be described as a "puff" or "right outa the wrapper". If it's "knee-deep in rubber" that of course means, it's got good tires. If the a/c still works, then "it's colder than a mother-inlaw's love", if the paint is still good, it's "so slick a fly couldn't land on it", and if the engine runs smoothly it's "like a cat

walking on cotton". You didn't realize car people were so poetic, did you? It's a strange language, but that's how car people talk, especially when your trade-in, which is now being appraised by the wholesale guy, (who looks like he has spent too many days on the road and too many nights at car auctions) is getting graded. Anyway, when the final number is totaled up, one last comment has the power to put your old car smack dab in the winner's circle. "She's got eyes". That's the magic phrase! If you hear that coming from the wholesale guy, you know you just hit the jackpot, and the old family car still has that intangible quality of that "special something" that means she's "still got it".

When I left the new car business, I spent 25 years on the used car side. That was the most enjoyable time to me because buying a good used car or truck gave my customers another option to paying the ridiculous prices and yearly increases that GM, Ford, Chrysler and the United Auto Workers union forced on the car-buying public. In the mid-1980s, I sold a brand-new base model GMC pickup to a very "frugal" older farmer for a little over \$3,300.00. That sounds unbelievable today, because now that truck would cost more than TEN times that amount. In 2004, I sold that same farmer's grandson a used truck for \$1,000.00. It was far from perfect, but at age 16 he loved it. It represented real value, and back then you could find thousand-dollar pickups all the time. Obviously, that was a very different world. Now, our economy is still struggling to work its way back from a pandemic and the mismanaged Biden economic response to it. It is time to move on. There is no need to keep giving away "recovery money"



# Do our politicians and bureaucrats really care about protecting Okefenokee?

Between the time I write this and you read this, conditions can change. Particularly in politics. But as of this writing, there seems to be little doubt that an Alabama mining company will get permission from Georgia's **Environmental Protection** Division (an oxymoron) to begin extractions

of minerals from the which includes such Okefenokee Swamp. Correction: It is not "the" Okefenokee Swamp. It is "our" Okefenokee Swamp. A 400,000acre Georgia treasure, currently which is under consideration by the U.S. Department of the Interior to be nominated as a UNESCO World Heritage site,

sites the Grand Canyon, Yellowstone and the Everglades National Parks, Carlsbad Caverns and the Statue of Liberty. Tell that to Twin Pines Minerals. The company, which seems to have adopted William Henry Vanderbilt's "the public be damned" attitude, has applied for permits on 582 acres of wetlands it owns three miles from the swamp to strip mine zirconium and titanium dioxide, ingredients used in sunscreens, cosmetics, paints, foods and toothpaste whitener. Nice stuff to have but is there not any other place on earth available to mine the stuff than in the Okefenokee? Evidently not to Twin Pines. On their website, the company references studies that have been done to ensure that no harm comes to the Okefenokee (refuted by other studies) and the positive economic impact the project will have on Charlton County, where much of the swamp is located. Not surprisingly, the board of commissioners in Charlton County has endorsed the Twin Pines project. At this point, I can't help but think of Monkey gate, the ill-fated attempt to establish a monkey-breeding center in Decatur County, which would have housed 30,000 long tailed macaques and was endorsed by governmenevery tal body in the county along with the local development authority and school board, but not the local citizens who raised such a fuss the idea was dropped. There is a lot of opposition to the Twin Pines project. A petition signed by more than 500 residents of four counties in Charlton, Glynn, Wayne and Ware - appeals to legislators and state officials to "take every possible measure to ensure the long-term protection of the Okefenokee Swamp." At a virtual public hear-




ing a couple of weeks ago, nearly 100 participants spoke against the company's plan to strip mine at the wetland's edge. None spoke in favor of the project. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has weighed in, telling Georgia state regulators that any decision regarding the proposed mining permit must be made "with consideration of federal reserved water rights" and that disruption to the natural flow of groundwater in this interconnected system could have "far-reachconsequences for ing both the Refuge and surrounding areas." Georgia U.S. Sen. Jon Ossoff has pressed state officials to intervene. U.S. Interior Secretary Deb Haaland sent a letter to Gov. Brian Kemp, urging the state to deny the permits. The response from the state has been underwhelming, leaving me to think the skids are greased to approve the deal, no matter what the opposition. The state **Environmental Protection** Division (there's that oxymoron, again) says their own analysis "concluded that water level in the swamp will be minimally impacted" and issued draft permits for the mining project Feb. 9, starting a 60-day period for public comments before regulators work up final permits for the agency's director, Jeff Cown, to approve. The Legislature seems inclined to do nothing. I guess making cornbread



our state bread has taken precedence. HB 1338 sponsored by Rep. John Corbett (R-Lake Park), whose district includes the Okefenokee, would give EPD more time to analyze impacts to the swamp. But the legislation included no specific requirements for data collection and never got out of committee. Opponents blasted the bill. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service expressed "significant concerns" about some of the provisions. According to the Atlanta Journal-Constitution, Corbett's campaign finance disclosures show he has received \$2,250 in donations from Twin Pines since October 2021 and \$3,750 from the company's president, Steve Ingle, since October 2022. Whether the public can derail this project as they did with Monkey gate is uncertain at this point. What is certain is that the ham-handed and tonedeaf Twin Pines crowd may win this battle, but they are going to lose in the court of public opinion (assuming they care, which I seriously doubt.) That renowned resident of Okefenokee, Pogo the Possum, once observed, "We have met the enemy, and he is us." Not this time, Pogo. It is them. Twin Pines Mining LLC. 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

The House of Representatives got back to work on Monday, March 11, for the tenth week of the 2024 legislative session. With Sine Die approaching on March 28, 2024, the time for vetting bills is quickly coming to a close.

We began the week by taking up a bipartisan effort to enhance public and impose safety stricter penalties for criminal offenses, particularly those associated with the act of "swatting" and gang activity. Senate Bill 421 would increase penalties for repeated unlawful emergency service requests, also known as "swatting." Swatting refers to an unlawful request for emergency service assistance that an individual knowingly intentionally and makes to a public safety agency when there is no reasonable ground for such a request to be made.

The House continued our commitment protecting Georto gia's children with the unanimous passage of Senate Bill 335, or the Safeguarding Adopted Children from Sexual Violence Act. This legislation would expand the crime of incest to include those whose familial relationships are created by adoption. Currently, state law defines the crime of incest to be amongst those who are related by blood or by marriage. This bill would update the definition of incest to include those who are related to the perpetrator by adoption. The House's passage of this bill represents final passage, sending the legislation to Governor Kemp to be signed into law. We also passed legislation this week to aid in our fight against human trafficking in Georgia. Senate Bill 370, championed by First Lady Marty Kemp and the GRACE Commission, would expand education and create increased awareness on human trafficking. In 2013, the governor signed a law requiring certain Georgia businesses to post notices regarding human trafficking and how victims can obtain help. SB 370 would expand this current law to add convenience stores, body art studios, manufacturing facilities, and medical offices to the list of establishments that would be required to post notices containing the human trafficking hotline information. This legislation would expand our ongoing efforts to combat human trafficking in our state and provide resources and support to human trafficking victims. The House gave unanimous, final passage to Senate Bill 483, which would enter Georgia into the updat-

ed version of the Interstate Compact for the Placement of Children Act (ICPC) to help ensure that children are placed in safe homes in a timely manner. The ICPC has been in existence for several decades, but this bill would allow our state to enter into an agreement under the updated version of the compact, which 16 other states have currently joined. The purpose of this revised ICPC would be to streamline communication from one state to another in regard to the placement of adopted and foster children across state lines.

On a similar note, my colleagues and I took up a bipartisan measure aimed at providing free state identification cards for eligible children between the ages of 14 and 17 who lack an address or are under the custody of the Division of Family and Children Services (DFCS). Senate Bill 387 would enable these children to apply for an identification card independently, without requiring a parent, guardian, or adult to sign or verify the application. Additionally, SB 387 would prohibit the Department of Driver Services from charging a fee for an identification card for children in DFCS custody or children receiving extended care youth services from DFCS. Providing Georgia's youth in the DFCS program with the opportunity to obtain essential documentation, like identification cards, is crucial for these children to obtain jobs and integrate into our workforce. This legislation seeks to streamline this process, make it easier for these children

to obtain proper identification, and improve our state's foster care system overall. SB 387 received final passage and has been sent to the governor for his signature.

Now that the tenth week of the legislative session has come to a close, we only have five legislative days remaining in the 2024 session. The pace is expected to intensify under the Gold Dome as we work to address outstanding issues and finalize pending legislation before the clock runs out. Despite the significant progress we have made thus far, there is still much work that lies ahead before the session's conclusion.

In addition to voting on legislation this week, we also took time to commemorate the life and legacy of the late House Speaker David Ralston on what would have been his birthday. Speaker of the House Jon Burns and other leaders unveiled a portrait in his honor, which will be permanently displayed outside of the House Chamber in the Capitol. Accompanied by his family and esteemed guests, the House held a ceremony on the House floor to honor Speaker Ralston's enduring legacy and impact on our state. The unveiling event included remarks by former governors Sonny Perdue and Nathan Deal, as well as remarks from the current governor, Brian Kemp. The portrait will be positioned to the right of the center entrance, on the opposite side of former House Speaker Thomas portrait. Murphy's Speaker Ralston's legacy will live on for many generations, and the permanent placement of the House Chamber is an abundantly fitting tribute to our former colleague.




