Competing against a field of 86 top junior golfers from around the globe in the boys' 15-18 age group, Cooper achieved an impressive sixth-place finish, marking the best showing of his career to date—in his world debut, no less.

Emanuel Medical Center receives Stabilization Grant

The Georgia Departof Community Health (DCH) has awarded **Emanuel** Medical Center (EMC) with a Rural Hospital Stabilization Grant to support the upcoming expansion of the hospital's Emergency Department. In addition to the Stabilization Grant, EMC has also recently received a Rural Hospital Support Grant from the DCH and State Office of Rural Health. Both grants are instrumental in advancing the hospital's mission of providing high-quality, accessible medical care to residents of Emanuel County and the surrounding areas.

Emergency EMC's Department Manager, Brooke Marsh, and Director of Development, ly met with leaders of the DCH State Office of Rural Health and other rural hospitals from around the state to present plans for the redesign and expansion of the local Emergency

Department. "The expansion of our Emergency Department is vital to meeting the growing needs of our community, and we are deeply grateful for the support we have received from the State Office of Rural Health," said Marsh. "Our goal is to expand and renovate our current space, enhancing its appearance, efficiency, and workflow to reduce wait times and length "I am blessed to be of stays in the Emergento help this department continue to thrive and grow for years to come."

Eight Georgia hospitals, including EMC, were awarded \$875,000 each from the Rural Hospital Stabilization Grant. Additional support for the Emergency Department project will come from the Georgia HEART Rural Tax Credit Program, which allows Georgia taxpayers to direct their state income tax dollars to Emanuel Medical Cen-

Round Analyses

Try as she might, Mother Nature did little to deter Cooper. He played consistent, smart golf during his two rounds on Thursday and Friday.

Opening day was a solid showing. He had 3 birdies, 11 pars, and just four bogeys for a score of 72.

He shot 72 again on Day 2. Although he shot one less birdie than the day before, he made par 3 more times. Cooper also cut his number of bogeys in half to improve his gameplay as a whole.




The best deal out there

If you were born between 1946 and 1964, you are an official member of the "baby boomer" generation. Your parents belong to what has been termed the "greatest generation". It is important to understand that those ladies and gentlemen didn't earn that recognition just because they got married and produced all of us baby boomers. Not by a long shot! They were great because they worked, sacrificed, fought and died to make this world safe for democracy by whipping Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini in World War II. They were also great because they came up in hard times imposed by a "soup kitchen and bread line" economy, also known as the Great Depression. They learned how to squeeze a nickel so hard the buffalo hollered. They learned how to make do and how to do without. They also learned a trick called "do it yourself", not to look clever, or show off, but because back then it was sinful and just plain lazy to pay for something you could make or do yourself. That was a different world. If you're a boomer, you know it from the stories your parents told. Nowadays, that do-it-yourself DNA is almost extinct, but there are still a few around who cannot be cured of the inherited DIY bug. My wife has learned that the eight most-feared words in

She knows that means I'm starting another project which will have questionable success and an undetermined schedule. I can't help it. I come from a long line of do it yourselfers. I have fond memories as an 8-year-old of going to Powell's Barbershop on Saturday mornings and sitting in one of the worn brown leather chairs listening to the grownups. When the price of haircuts went up to 50 cents, that all ended. My father brought home a used electric hair trimmer that buzzed demonically like something in

Count Frankenstein's laboratory, and the era of free homemade crewcuts began for me and my brother. all fairness, I will admit that soon after this, my salary for cutting the grass did benefit slightly. From my early days, I was hooked on DIY. This was encouraged and facilitated by tips from the world's best teacher, and I became fully indoctrinated into the idea of doing whatever I could do for myself. Of course, today, our society shakes its head in disapproval of all that. Today, the less you do for yourself, the better it is for the global pay scale. Today, we have people who will do just about anything for you that you

They will tell you what to do and what not to do. There are people called deputy assistants. They do, I guess, whatever the chief assistants don't feel like doing. We also have an occupation called a life coach. I'm not exactly sure what they do, but if you need

someone to show you what to do with life, don't pay for it. Save your money, because some people still do that for free. They're called parents. My last comment on the value of "doing it yourself" would be this: Free advice is worth exactly what you pay for it, and the best deal in this world is thinking for yourself. That might require a little effort, but it's absolutely free, and in the long run, nobody can do a better job at that, than you.

Correcting the Record on the Vietnam Generation

For those of you with some walking-around knowledge of what goes into this space each week, you know that I write what I mean and mean what I write. But today, I am going to walk back something I said a few weeks ago because I didn't say it well.

My column about the Atlanta Vietnam Veterans Business Association's production of a film entitled, "Truths and Myths About the Vietnam War," a 47-minute documentary produced with Emmy award-winning film producer David Naglieri, introduced by actor Sam Elliott and currently running on the YouTube channel (To view, go to the website AVVBA.org.) brought a lot of reader response from those who served in Vietnam. Like most anything having to do with those tumultuous times, the responses ran the gamut.

One called the film "revisionist history conducted by the right wing." Another found the film so meaningful,

he intended to write a Letter to the Editor. Some veterans told of being vilified for their service. Others had no bad experiences. One reader said Vietnam wasn't a war, it was a conflict. He was a minority of one. Everybody else called it a war.

So, where did I screw up? In introducing the column I compared, the Greatest Generation of World War II with what I referred to as the "Not So Great Generation" that followed. That was a generalization that was

inaccurate and unfair and several readers reminded me of that.

I was referring to the draft dodgers who burned their draft cards and left the country rather than serve it. I was thinking of the headline-grabbing antiwar activists and the counter culturalists, the San Francisco hippie community, protesters like Abbie Hoffman and the Chicago Seven, Tom Hayden and Jane Fonda, the riots (aka, "peaceful demonstrations") on college campuses, in major cities and at the 1968 Democratic Convention in Chicago. I realize now they were the minority.

I had that brought home in a response I received from a former colleague in Atlanta, Charles Van Rysselberge, now living in Gainesville. He shared a 16-minute film clip of a presentation by Marine General Anthony C. Zinni in 2012 at a gathering of Marine and U.S. Army veterans in San Francisco. You can find it on www.youtube.com ("2012 Salute Vietnam Veterans General Anthony C. Zinni.") Like the AVVBA film, I highly recommend it to you.

General Zinni is a retired four-star U.S. Marine Corps general and former Commander in Chief of the United State Central Command

who did two tours in Vietnam. Here is what he told those assembled that evening about what I had referred to flippantly as the "Not So Great Generation."

"We" — meaning the Vietnam Generation of which he was a part — "don't have to apologize for anything. We are as much the greatest generation as the one that preceded us. We not only fought this ten-year war with confused political direction, we won every battle we were asked to win." After Vietnam, he said, "We went on to rebuild our military, won the Cold War, faced down the Soviet Union and created the greatest economy this nation has ever had."

"Our generation did as much if not more for our nation as any generation. We saw more combat than our fathers did in World War II," Gen. Zinni told those assembled. "The average 'grunt' saw 240 days of combat in a one-year tour. The veterans of World War II saw 40 on

average."

Referring to the Vietnam Veterans

Memorial Wall in Washington, the gen-

eral noted how young his generation was and "how innocent we were." Among the 58,000-plus names listed on the Wall is a 15-year-old soldier, five 16-year-old soldiers and a number of 17-year-olds. The average age on the Wall is 23. By contrast, the average age in World War II was 26.

Gen. Zinni concluded that his generation came out of the war (and, yes, he referred to it as a war, not a conflict), "young but wise beyond our years. We never lost our dignity or our honor. We are as much the greatest generation, and we are as much the proudest generation as any of those that went before us. No one can take that away from us."

I thank Mr. Van Rysselberge for sharing Gen. Anthony Zinni's remarks with me, making an impressive case as to why the Vietnam Generation can refer to themselves as the Greatest Generation, too. Indeed, they can, and I stand corrected.





He maintained a consistent performance over the two-day outing as well, finishing with scores of 79 and 80. His play was characterized by a steady 19 pars, with a few bogeys and the occasional double bogey affecting his overall score. Despite these challenges, his ability to secure birdies on two key holes demonstrated his potential and competitive spirit.

Layton Terwilliger also admirably, performed securing the 23rd spot. Layton's performance highlighted his growth and adaptability. Like Cooper, he improved on Day 2 by reducing his number of double bogeys and maintaining a higher number of pars compared to the opening round. His overall scores for the two-day outing were 85 and 80 respectively.

Paxton Dixon, Cooper's brother, placed 52nd, showing determination throughout the




