



Emanuel County, part of District 1, competed in the 20,00 to 50,000 population bracket, beating out several other recreation powerhouses like Mc-Duffie, Toombs, and Effingham to earn the 2024 title. Departments are evaluated on several criteria, including and innovative new programs, major accomplishments, staff development, budget management, facility improvements, and social media engagement.

According to County Administrator Guy Singletary, the department's achievements start with the strength of its team.

"It all begins with getting the right people in the right place, and that's exactly what the county has done since we acquired the rec," Guy said. "By building a team that's both passionate and experienced, we've been able to expand our programs and engage more of our community."

Jerry was promoted to recreation director last December and led the department flawlessly through its transition to a fully county operation, Mitchell joined the team as assistant recreation director in January, and longtime recreation department employee Deandra was bumped up to athletic coordinator.

Additionally, to support its growing roster of programs, the department also created a new position of Program Coordinator. Eric Weber was hired in February and has spent the last 8 months working with his fellow rec notch.

District 2 Commissioner Ricky Thompson has an honest appreciation for the new and improved direction.

"As someone who works with older adults, I understand how essential it is for a community to offer activities that welcome everyone, young and old. The Emanuel County Recreation Department has created a place that allow all generations to engage in fun activities. That is so important as we get older-staying active. The Agency of the Year award reflects a commitment to inclusivity, ensuring every resident, no matter their age, has the chance to be part of our community's recreational life, and I, for one, am really proud of that."

District 1 Commissioner Kawame Coleman joined the board while many of these changes were already in the works, but he says he's proud to be along for the ride.

"Seeing these accomplishments come to life has been great. As a longtime coach and referee and as a father, I've seen firsthand how impactful recreation can be, and Emanuel County has created something really special here. I feel confident in saying we're offering programs on par with those in much larger areas, showing that size doesn't limit our potential. In fact, our team's out-of-thebox thinking and hard work have allowed us to outshine even similar-sized departments, proving that, when it comes to providing unique, high-quality recreation, we're playing on the same field as of Emanuel County's softball teams brought home state championships this season.

District 5 Commissioner Timmy Oliver sees those leagues as a critical piece of foundation for young athletes.

"The work the Emanuel County Rec Department does is imperative. It's the first place a lot of our children have to be part of a team, learn the fundamentals of a particular sport, learn dedication and selflessness and how to react to outcomes. It's where most of our kids develop skills and confidence they carry with them into school sports and beyond. This honor is a win for the whole community, but especially for the next generation of Emanuel County athletes and leaders. I don't think GRPA could've picked a better agency to give this award to."

The department also made significant strides in facility improvements across the C. Carmichael Billy Recreation Complex this year, enhancing accessibility, safety, and functionality for community use.

At the Woody Nasworthy Baseball Complex, new bathrooms and updated scoreboards have improved the experience for both players and spectators. Additionally, the batting cages at the baseball fields were covered and lighted and new turf was installed, which has been a huge hit.

The Ronnie Womack Softball Complex received multiple upgrades as well, including: a newly converted batting cage from the old cookshed, a relocat-

growing interest in this sport within the community.

These various improvements have created more inviting, accessible, and safe spaces for all residents to enjoy, but they required careful budgeting and the prioritization of long-term value. District 4 Commissioner and this year's vice chair Jim Sherrod says that's an investment for which he gladly votes "yea."

"Recreation to me is more than programs and facilities; it's about creating value for the entire community. Recreational opportunities are chance for folks to get out of the house and spend time with one another. When we do that, we build community pride and ultimately make Emanuel County a more attractive place to live and visit, which strengthens our tax base. This award reflects that balance of providing for today while also thinking ahead for tomorrow, ensuring our resources are well-spent and our community continues to grow in a financially responsible way."

Even with the right team, diverse programs, and upgraded facilities, engagement hinges on accessibility and outreach. To address this, the recreation department leaned into the 21st Century and integrated digital tools, streamlining registration and enhancing communication to better connect with the community.

As a result, participation rose 3.5 percent in 2024—and the efforts that prompted the increase have not gone unnoticed.

"Emanuel County has truly had an exceptional year from start to finish," said GRPA District 1 Commissioner Trevor Welch. "The team there has been a pleasure to work with They're committed professionals who consistently go above and beyond. Even as they expand their staff, they remain fully focused on delivering outstanding recreational opportunities for their residents.

2024 Chairman Hugh Foskey has been District 3's commissioner for 20 years, so he's had a front row seat to the rec's evolution.

"This year's award shows just how far we've come. As I prepare to leave office, I'm proud to leave behind a department that's stronger than ever, ready to continue providing for our residents for years to come."

Looking ahead, the Emanuel County Recreation Department has big plans to keep the momentum going. The team is actively exploring new program offerings and expanding youth sports leagues. Plus, the county intends to continue working on the gym and the softball complex at the Billy C. Carmichael Recreation Complex. The crown jewel of this effort will be the construction of a new Olympic-size swimming pool, which will give Emanuel County its first public pool in 40 years. All three of these projects are thanks to \$6 million in state grants. With these exciting developments, the Emanuel County Recreation Department is poised to remain The Place to Play and a leader in its field, delivering opportunities and experiences that enrich lives. 
Timber owner says Okefenokee mining ban would violate Constitution

comes up in the controversy regarding the possible permitting by the Georgia Environmental Protection Division to allow mining for titanium dioxide on Trail Ridge at the edge of the Okefenokee by Alabama-

One of the names that based Twin Pines Minerals is attorney Joe Hopkins of Charlton County. То the environmental groups fighting the permitting process, Hopkins, president and CEO of Toledo Manufacturing Company, is a political power respon-

sible for the deafening silence coming out of Gov. Brian Kemp's office as well as the EPD and assorted members of the Legislature. They have it wrong, Hopkins told me by phone. He had gotten in touch with me to correct what he con-

my part in an earlier column on the Okefenokee. I had called him the owner of Toledo Manufacturing. Not so. He is president along with other shareowners he chose not to identify and calls it a "small privately held company." He also took issue with my referring to him as a "timber baron." We might have to quibble over that one. Toledo owns tens of thousands of acres of land in the county, including a 30,000acre tract directly north of Twin Pines' property. Hopkins wanted to set the record straight about his perceived role in the Okefenokee dispute. To him, it is all about the Fifth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, which protects private proper-ty rights. "My position is based on my support of the U.S. Constitution and the guarantees protected. Statutorily banning mining over a certain geographic area eliminates due process of law and terminates a private property right that landowners currently have," he says. Testifying against The Okefenokee Protection Act in March 2023, which would have prohibited future mining on Trail Ridge, Hopkins said the permitting process couldn't be bypassed without infringing on property rights. "The Fifth Amendment to the Constitution provides that no person shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law," he said. "That's what your EPD does. Make your case for seeking a permit. You may lose but you have had your due process of law. If we pass this bill, that goes away." The bill did not pass. He says he has no inter-



est in Twin Pines or their efforts. Interestingly, he does say that if chemical giant Chemours, which is rumored to be buying Twin Pines, were involved, "I have met with Chemours in the past, but I have no agreement with them to mine. If it is determined by studying past and current mining operations up, down and near Trail Ridge that mining the Toledo depos it would have no adverse effect on the swamp, they would certainly be my company of choice to do the mining due their long history of successfully mining heavy minerals in our area." Hopkins says mining has been conducted up and down Trail Ridge for close to 70 years. "Why don't we all pause, do a three-year study to determine what effects mining has had on water tables on Trail Ridge and then make a decision based on scientific evidence?" he says. "A moratorium on any future permits could be enacted until the results are in. All parties could provide their own experts to monitor the research to satisfy themselves that the results are accurate." As for Twin Pines' application seeking to withdraw more than 1.4 million gallon daily in its mining operation, Hopkins offers this perspective: "Pumping 1.4 million gallons of water per day over a 365-day period equals 511 million gallons a year," he says. "One inch of rain over 400,000 acres (the Okefenokee swamp) equals 10,861,718,271 gallons of water. 511,000,000 divided



by 10,861,718,271 equals a little less than 5% or 1/20th of an inch or rainfall over the swamp." The Okefenokee gets roughly 50 inches of precipitation annually. Citing the number of manmade canals and ditches (canoe trails) that already exist in the swamp and drain water from the Okefenokee, Hopkins says he would be glad to sit down with a hydrologist and have them explain to him how the water drawn out of a well would adversely affect the water levels in the swamp. Another solution for those opposing mining in the Okefenokee, according to Hopkins, would be for them to purchase the titanium from the landowners that are in the area that they wish to ban from mining. "That would permanently resolve this issue, "he says, "and would be a win/win situation. The swamp would be saved by those who think it will be harmed; the landowner will be compensated for the mineral, and everyone can go home satisfied." I have given Mr. Hopkins the opportunity to offer his position on the proposed project as I have opponents. Whether you agree or disagree with him is for you to decide. I did mention to him in our conversations that the final judge will be the Court of Public Opinion. And that's you. You can reach Dick Yarbrough at dick@dickyarbrough.com or at P.O. 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





SUMMARIES OF PROPOSED C O N S T I T U T I O N A L AMENDMENTS

Pursuant to requirements of the Georgia Constitution, Attorney General Christopher Carr, Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger, and Legislative Counsel Betsy Howerton hereby provide the summaries of the proposed constitutional amendments that will appear on the November 5, 2024, general election ballot for consideration by the people of Georgia (short captions are those adopted by the Constitutional Amendments Publication Board):

-1 - Provides for a general law state-wide homestead exemption that may differentiate among political subdivisions. House Resolution No. 1022 Ga. L. 2024, p. 1191

Shall the Constitution of Georgia be amended so as to authorize the General Assembly to provide by general law for a statewide homestead exemption that serves to limit increases in the assessed value of homesteads, but which any county, consolidated government, municipality, or local school system may opt out of upon the completion of certain procedures?"

Summary

This proposal amends Article VII, Section II, Paragraph II of the Georgia Constitution to add a new subparagraph (a.1) to authorize the General Assembly to provide by general law for a state-wide uniform homestead exemption. The law may limit this exemption to different political subdivisions that do not already have existing homestead exemptions, and may provide for political subdivisions to opt out, or for future political subdivisions to opt in.



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
