



Driver's License

If you have an out-of-state driver's license, you MUST receive a Georgia driver's license within 30 days. You must be over 16 years of age and must present at least one original or certified document to prove your identity (birth certificate or passport), your Social Security card, at least two documents to prove your residential address and appropriate name change documents, if needed. The Georgia Department of Driver Services, 994 Hwy 1 North, is open Wednesday and Thursday ONLY, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. They can be reached at 678.413.8400.

Motor Vehicle Registration

To register your motor vehicle, please correspond with the Emanuel County Tax Commissioner, 101 S. Main St., Swainsboro. The office also handles transactions for mobile homes, timer tax, property tax and intangible recording tax. Georgia law requires ALL auto tags be renewed by owner's birthday. New residents have 30 days to renew license plates. Renewals after the deadline are subject to a 10% penalty on the ad valorem tax and a 25% tax on the tag fee. Hours of operation are Monday – Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. They can be reached at 478.237.3351.

Mobile Home Registration

Mobile homes must display a current mobile home decal, which may be obtained at the tax commissioner's office upon payment of ad valorem taxes each year. Tax bills for mobile homes are mailed out in late January and are due by May 1.

The mission of Emanuel Medical Center is clear, and it has been since it was founded in 1952. Almost 75 years later, the hospital is thriving and excelling like no other time in its history.

"We've always had a culture of excellence," said Damien Scott, CEO of Emanuel Medical Center. "I want everybody in this facility, no matter the department you work in, to be excited

about being excellent."

The hospital has received recognition and honors in a variety of areas. It was named one of only nine 5 Star Hospitals Georgia **CMS** by (Centers for Medicare Medand

icaid Services) in 2023. It was EMC's third 5 Star Rating in the last four years. This is a wide-ranging evaluation to help quantify healthcare processes, outcomes, patient perceptions, and organizational structure and/or systems that are associated with the ability to provide high-quality healthcare and/or that relate to one or more quality goals for health care. These goals include effective, safe, efficient, patient-centered, equitable, and timely care.

"The awards are great," Scott said. "But, what really matters is that you go home at the end of the day, knowing you made an impact on somebody's life."

That impact is made stronger by the home-grown staff that makes up the majority of the more than 400 employees of EMC. That personal connection to the staff is the reason why so many residents choose Emanuel Medical Center.

"You might think going out of town to a bigger hospital is better, well that's not true," said Frank Canady, owner of Emanuel County's Yard Master. "Your local hospital is awesome! They son to person. It just makes a huge diftown hospital."

Emanuel County are 80 minutes away from a Level 1 Trauma Center. These facilities are located in significantly larger areas like Augusta, Savannah, or Macon. Emanuel Medical Center is certified as a Level IV trauma center, one of only eight in the state of Georgia.

"The community wants to know that if my loved one was in an accident that they are going to get excellent care," said Scott. "We have to be at a much higher level than a lot of places, because it's a long way to get to a higher-level trauma center. I want our team to be excellent in the field, excellent here at the facility. We have invested greatly in that training. So much so that we are creating a course that will be piloted here at Emanuel

Medical Center and be able to teach it to rural hospitals throughout the state."

Those types of investments and commitments are seen throughout the facility, giving the citizens of the county peace of mind and confidence in their local hospital.

"Growing up in Emanuel County and now raising my family here, you realize that there are certain services that are part of everyday life and vital to the survival of your community," said Wade Johnson, President of Emanuel County's Durden Banking Company. "The hospital is one of those top

> providers. certainly understand and appreciate what the hospital does here for Emanuel County."

The impact the hospital has reaches beyond just qualithe ty care that is provided within its walls. The

longevity and excellence make it a pillar of the community, and something that attracts people and businesses into our county.

- Name changed to "Paris" in 1852 but was changed back to "Swainsboro" in 1861
- Known as "Pine Tree Country" or "Crossroads of the Great South" since transcontinental U.S. Highways 1 and 80 intersect downtown

 Once two neighboring and nearly identical towns, Summit and Graymont

GARFIELD

- Incorporated August 23, 1905
- Is thought to be named after President James Garfield who was assassinated in 1889

ADRIAN

 Was named by the first postman of the first post office, W.R. Smith, in 1899. He was given the honor of selecting a name for the city because of his position

OAK PARK

• Owes its existence to Hansel R. Williamson, a pioneer settler and land owner in the area

STILLMORE

• When this town sprang up as a result of the booming railroadlumber business, the U.S. Posts Office sent a list of names for the townspeople to choose from, saying that if none were suitable, they would send "still more." This caught the attention of the residents, and they adopted the name "Stillmore" for their city

NUNEZ

 Named for Dr. Samuel Nunez, who was credited for stopping a contagious epidemic through the new colony of Georgia in the 1700s, or Dr. Jackson Morgan Nunez, long-time Emanuel County physician who dies in 1934

NORRISTOWN

 Got its start over 235 years ago when Williams Laird opened a cotton gin and gristmill there



SUMMERTOWN

 Received its name from early settlers of the area building summer homes there to get away from the malaria-infested mosquitoes of the Ogeechee lowlands

CANOOCHEE

• There is some dispute over the origin of the name. Most agree that it comes from the Native American word "Kanooche", meaning "little ground", but some argue it's from "Canosi", the name of an ancient Native American country, and "Ink andoshi", a Creek Indian word meaning "graves are there".





Education in Emanuel County Schools

Education in Emanuel County has a rich historical foundation that dates back to the 1800s. The Emanuel County school system, with its humble beginnings of over 50 one-room schools scattered across the county, has always been a beacon of quality education. Our dedicated educators, then and now, have tirelessly worked to ensure that our students have every opportunity to acquire the essential skills needed to grow, prosper, and succeed. Today, the system has evolved to include seven school sites and educates approximately 4,000 students annually.

Emanuel County Schools employs approximately 372 certified and 294 non-certified employees, which has a significant economic impact. The Education Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (ESPLOST) has been instrumental in keeping Emanuel County's education millage rates low. This local tax has enabled the school system to provide up-to-date technology, instructional supplies, and textbooks, maintain modern facilities, purchase necessary buses, and fund facility projects. The recent reduction in the millage rate from 12.52 to 12.0 is a testament to the stability and security that ESPLOST provides.

Creating a safe learning environment in our schools is essential for fostering academic success and emotional well-being among students and staff. ECS has implemented proactive safety measures. Our comprehensive safety plan includes numerous safety tools and strategies to protect our students and staff. A silent alert system, school resource officers, training and drills, and safety and communication protocols are some of the critical components of our safety plan.

The positive economic impact of our school system benefits all citizens of Emanuel County. However, the greatest reward comes from knowing that our children are receiving a high-quality education and are prepared to compete in today's world. The educator

and student interaction is at the heart of the system—and the cornerstone of economic success. Whether in kindergarten or high school chemistry, this interaction is crucial in unlocking each student's fullest potential, making every educator's role vital to our community's educational success.

ECS's mission is to prepare and inspire all students for college and career success through personalized learning and relevant experiences. Strong literacy skills form the foundation for success in higher education and workforce readiness. The Georgia Early Literacy Act (House Bill 538), the upcoming implementation of Georgia's new K-12 English Language Arts Standards in the school year 2025-26, and the ongoing efforts in Georgia to address dyslexia (Senate Bill 48) are all important initiatives that will shape our approach to literacy. Our teaching and learning department is working to provide teachers with additional

training to enhance their skills and to better support literacy instruction. The training focuses on the science of reading and equips teachers with effective strategies for teaching reading and writing. Literacy instruction will shift from students memorizing sight words to concentrating on decoding and phonics instruction.

The school system has a strong and productive partnership with local post-secondary institutions. Many students participate in the dual enrollment programs at East Georgia State College and Southeastern Technical College. By doing so, these students earn both high school and college credits. Every year, several graduating seniors not only receive their high school diploma but also their associate's degree or technical college certificate.

The system's transportation department provides transportation for more than 2,500 students daily, covering more than 2,500 miles of paved and dirt roads. In a typical year, our buses travel 451,000 miles to and from school, with extra-curricular competitions and field trips adding several thousand additional miles. This particular department oversees 65 buses.

School nutrition is more than just providing meals; it also creates a healthy learning environment. Proper nutrition is essential for students' physical and cognitive development, directly impacting their academic performance. Our team is committed to ensuring that every student can access nutritious meals that fuel their bodies and minds. These meals are served at no charge and are available for breakfast, lunch, and after-school snacks.

Joined with parents and the community, our schools hold great potential. Our students today will become the future leaders of our community. At ECS, our vision is to strengthen our community one student at a time. The future is profoundly influenced by education. The significance of this cannot be emphasized enough.

All of these accomplishments and steps of progression would not be possible without the love and support of




supporters continue to be proud of the progress of our Academy.

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Historic Twin City – Twice as Friendly, Twice as Nice

Approximately 12 miles east of Swainsboro in Twin City, home to George L. Smith State Park and one of Georgia's National Register Historic Districts. The Twin City Historia District encompasses approximately 225 acres of historic residential, commercial and community landmark resources associated with the development of two towns that were incorporated as one in 1921. The Historic District runs northeast to southwest through the center of the district following the railroad bed that were removed in 1952. The northeast part of the district is the historic commercial and residential area of Summit, and the southwest part is Graymont. Between the two towns, at the intersection of Railroad Avenue and US Hwy 80, is the area established in the early 1900's as the "civic center". The small towns of Summit began c.1889 with the charter and then construction of the Rogers & Summit Railroad, later known as the Millen & Southern Railway, the town was charter in 1898. The town of Graymont, established in 1896 and chartered in 1900, was located one mile from Summit and had its own depot and post office. Even after their incorporation into one town, they maintained separate post offices until 1952. The community is unique, "a little town with a big





history".


The Twin City Historic District has several areas of significance: architecture, for its excellent examples of historic residential, commercial and community landmark buildings representing the common architectural types and styles found throughout Georgia in the late 19th through the mid 20th centuries; commerce, as the tow historic central business districts represent the typical stores and businesses found in small rural communities in Georgia; and community planning and development, as the original plans of both Summit and Graymont are excellent examples of a railroad strip-type town in Georgia with the main street running parallel to the railroad through the center of town.

In celebration of their Centennial in 2021, Mayor Matt Donaldson, along with a Centennial Committee, formed a 'Cotton Blossom Festival'. The festival is now a yearly event, held the first week in November.

The historic districts boast 136 resources, including excellent examples of house types from late Victorian to modern movement and is a time-capsule community for architectural house types. Architectural styles include Queen Anne, Folk Victorian, Craftsman, English Vernacular Revival, Classical Revival and International Style. House types include Queen Anne Cottage, New South cottage, Georgian cottage, Georgian house, English cottage, gabled-wing cottage, bungalow, central hall and ranch house.

Historic Twin City, GA, Inc., a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, continues to work to put Twin City on the map in Georgia tourism. They celebrated their first birthday in June 2015 and spent the previous year bringing entertainment to the city, making significant changes that helped awaken a sense of pride and accomplishment in Twin City's citizens.





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

The Emanuel Arts Council, Inc. (EAC) is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization whose purpose is to empower and grow the community through cultural programs in all areas of the arts for the general betterment and ben-

efit of the people of Emanuel County and surrounding areas. The EAC is supported by the City of Swainsboro, the Swainsboro Downtown Development Authority, and operates through membership, donations, fundraisers, and grants.

Members of the EAC board serve on numerous committees in the county, including Swainsboro-Emanuel County Chamber of Commerce, Family Connection, Pine Tree Festival, Downtown Development Authority, and the Emanuel Coalition for Cultural & Economic Development.

The City of Swainsboro is currently working on a major project to renovate and develop the old theater in downtown Swainsboro to become the Barbara and Tobe Karrh Community Arts Center. The EAC and Kalmanson Gallery will share this space with The Karrh Center.

IULY 4TH

Each year, the Swainsboro Jaycees host an Independent Day Celebration which includes a free fireworks show beginnings at dark. For the past few years, this event has been held in Downtown Swainsboro.

SOUTHEAST GEORGIA JAYCEES FAIR

The Southeast Georgia Jaycees Fair takes place each October at the Jaycees Fairground. The week-long event also includes rides and games, pageants, 4-H exhibits and agricultural events. (OUR HISTORIC SOCIETY

The Emanuel County Historic Preservation Society was an idea that began in 1976 in honor of the nation's Bicentennial. The actual Society was incorporated in 1993. 2024 is its 31st year! The Society is a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization. Membership dues, fundraisers, and tax deductible, charitable contributions support programs and projects of the Society.

The Historic Society's motto is "Celebrating our Heritage, Preserving Memories." The museum is located at 161 Museum Rd, across from the Jaycee Fairgrounds. It replicates an 1890s farm named Longview Farm in honor of the original community near the museum.

Our Fall Harvest Open House will be October 12, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., no admission charged. February 9, 2025, will also be an Open House in conjunction with Georgia Day.

We continue to be open for tours, family reunions or picnic opportunities for clubs. Membership is not required for this.

The Society continues to add and improve. Membership is growing with over 425 members across the country. People who have Emanuel County roots continue to donate family items for display.

We have enclosed part of our group shelter in order to display our extensive agricultural equipment collection. We will enlarge the "Veterans' Wall", dedicated to local World War II veterans, and the naval stores display containing more than 50 artifacts used for



gum dipping from the early 1900s. We will also enlarge the business section and make room for a donation of Boy Scout items. Children on tours are excited to find their parents' photos on the high school photo wall and trophy collection. Class photos from 1937 to 1982 are on display there. The commissary, Steven's Crossing Post Office, and grist mill now have handicap ramps as well as sidewalks for all main buildings. Don't forget the ladies' five-holer outhouse from Sardis Church.

The Society's three history books, *Pine Log Echoes, Vol. 1-3*, are available at Swainsboro's Main Street Market along with *Tram Lines to Longleaf Pines* (Emanuel's railroads) and *Smithton-Blundale*. We con-

ness of the Year went to Wincore Windows and Doors. Wincore was founded in 2006 by a group of 12 inveswith tors decades of experience in the design, manufacture. and sale of vinyl window products. These investors believed they would "win" the marketplace with this "core"

group of people, thus the name Wincore was born. The Company established its headquarters in Parkersburg, West Virginia and produced its first window in July 2007. Over the next several years, and despite the worst economic recession in several decades, Wincore continued to expand and grow its operation, shipping vinyl windows and patio doors to customers east of the Rocky Mountains.

In 2010, Wincore expanded its product offering to include fiberglass entry door systems.

As part of this decision the Company leased additional manufacturing space

open a second manufacturing location in Swainsboro, Georgia. Wincore worked with the Emanuel County Development Authority to find a building suitable for its needs and settled on the old

All core vinyl window products are capable of being manufactured in the Swainsboro facility. The Swainsboro location currently employees 216 people. Wincore continues to grow and is expecting picture window, slider, and casement. Customers can also order vinyl patio doors that are purchased from an outside vendor and assembled in-house, as well as garden windows, bay/bow win-

dows and geometrics. In addition, customers can order a variety of color options both for the interior and exterior of their windows and doors. Wincore also manufactures fiberglass entry door systems that can be made in a number styles of and with variety of options.

These include gle doors and double doors with side lites, transoms, decorative glass options, and several different color options for both the interior and the exterior of the door. Wincore's products are sold to a variety of customers, including distributors, dealers, specialty installers, and contractors. The Company believes that the service it provides is what sets Wincore apart from its competitors.



at its

headquarters, bringing its total facility size to approximately 167,000 square feet. In 2017, Wincore began to ship products to the west coast, expanding its footprint to include the entire continental United States. Due to significant and continued growth, particularly in the southeast region, and an inability to expand its headquarters in West Virginia, Wincore made the decision in 2018 to Husqvarna facility. The Company leased a 75,000 square foot building and began producing windows in

May 2019. In 2021, due to continued growth, the Company leased an additional 100,000 square feet of space adjacent and connected to its existing Georgia facility bringing its total local investment more than \$10 million dollars. Two additional vinyl lines and a second glass line were added.

to surpass \$200 million in gross sales in 2024. Of its 12 original founders, 6 remain actively employed with the company helping it continue to grow and succeed. Wincore manufactures vinvl windows for both new construction and repair/remodel projects, though the vast majority of its sales are for repair/remodel projects. Windows can be ordered in a variety of styles, including single hung, double hung,
